Later that morning the smells of cooking onions and meat began to waft down the street as locals and professionals set to making their fa. vorite recipes.

Food booths, craft booths and soft drink stands added a carnival air.



Dip and Vaccination Clinic Set For Next Two Weekends

The time for ticks and fleas, and even more important, rabies, is here. The Deport Community Club is once again offering a dog dip and vaccination clinc at Dr. Sm B. Kelsey's Veterinary Clinic on Hwy. 271, just west of Deport. The clinics will be held from 9 a.m. until 12 noon on April 21st and again on April 28th. Any pet owner can bring their pet with the cost being \$3 for the dip to kill fleas and ticks and \$5 for the rabies vaccination per dog.

This annual event is sponsored by the club as a service to the area and to help rid pets of ticks and fleas, protect pets (and people) from rabies and to help the club raise funds which can be used on other community proj-

All area pet owners are urged to take advantage of this service, which provides comfort for their pets, prevents the spread of a dangerous disease and provides money for local

Attended by nearly 500 rural and urban business people, the event Tuesday night also paid special tribute to people working in law enforcement in Lamar County. Dr. Josie Williams of Paris, chairman of the agri-business committee, discussed the importance of good law enforcement that is provided in Lamar County by regular and reserve law officers in the sheriff's department and the Paris Police Department.

Judge Henry Braswell, keynote speaker for the banquet, explained further the importance of law enforcement and the growing need for more officers, better training and the need for the involvement and sup-

port of citizens in the community.

"They need your cooperation in solving crimes. They need your cooperation in providing adequate equipment and facilities such as the new jail Lamar County is getting," he said. "People will do the right thing. Give your law enforcement groups your support, and they'll get the job done for you."

Braswell said that law enforcement officials need the support and cooperation of the public in order to do their job.





Highway Department Seeks **Maintenance Contractors**

The highway department is sending a message to maintenance contractors: "We want you as a new recruit."

"Since the Legislature directed us last year to increase contracting to 25% of our routine maintenance budget, we need to attract more bidders to keep the process as competitive as possible," said Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver.

Routine maintenance includes just about any kind of work performed on the highway right-of-way, from mowing and picnic-area maintenance to pavement marking and crack sealing. Contracts are awarded throughout the year in all areas of the state.

In the past, each of the department's 24 districts maintained its own list of prospective bidders. When a contract was to be let, the district would notify contractors on the local list. Now, the department will maintain one computerized statewide bidders list in Austin. The data base will include the types of work each contractor can perform and the areas of the state where each contractor wants to work. When a district office needs bids on a contract proposal, contractors on the statewide bidders list will be notified automatically by

To reach more prospective bidders, the department has installed a toll free number for contractors to obtain information about getting on the list. The service is active between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at 800-535-9013.

Anyone can get on the list. Many of the department's contracts go to small businesses. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is an equal opportunity employer.

Delay Pasture Fertilization Until Warmer Weather

Even though some warm season grasses are beginning to show signs of growth, don't fertilize yet, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Overton.

"About the middle of April is a good time to begin fertilizing hay meadows and pastures," said Dr. Reeves. "By then, night temperatures should be above 60 degrees and bermudagrasses should really begin to grow.'

There is still tito take a soil test in ordero make ferilizer applications more precisd thus more economical. Guessing at the fertility needs a hay meadow or pasture can be an expensive gamble.

"If broadleaf weeds are a problem,

a post-emerge herbicide should be applied before fertilization," Reeves said. "This will prevent growing weeds from using all the nutrients before the bermudagrass gets growing good. Weeds make poor quality forage and take up space, water and nutrients that are needed by the higher quality bermudagrass.'

"Once the fertilizer to be applied has been determined, shop around for the best prices," Reeves said. "However, the price is not the only factor to consider. The honesty and reliability of the dealer must also be considered. A good job of spreading the fertilizer is very important for uniform production over the entire meadow or pasture."



How to cook up some energy savings





If you have an electric oven, you can save energy by limiting the number of times you peek in the oven. Each time you open the oven door, you lose approximately 20 percent of the heat.

You can also save energy when using electric surface units by turning off the unit a few minutes early. Your food will cook just as quickly, but with less energy.







Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Manager

If you work after you retire... If you are approaching retirement, you are probably looking forward to a well earned reward after years of hard work. Yet, you enjoy working and do not want to stop entirely. You may ask, "If I take a part time job or run a small business, can I still get Social security retirement checks?

The answer depends partly on your age. If you ar eunder 65, you can earn up to \$6,840 in 1990 and receive all benefits due. If you are 65 through 69, the annual exempt amount this year is \$9,360. And if you are 70 or older, there is no limit on earnings. The exempt amounts increase each year to keep pace with rising wage levels.

Even if you earn over these amounts, partial benefits may be payable. The basic rule is that for people under 65, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 earned over the

exempt amount. the withholding is \$1 of each \$3 earned for people 65-

There is also a special rule that applies in only 1 year, usually the year you retire. You can get a full benefit for each month earnings do not exceed one-twelfth of the annual limit, (in 1990, \$570 if you are under 65, and \$780 if you re 65-69).

This monthly rule allows you to start getting benefits right away in the year of retirement no matter how high your earnings are earlier in the year. If you are self-employed, your time and services devoted to the business are considered in addition to net income; you can get more information on this at the Social Security office.

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

According to the club's timed event organizer for April, Mike Barnett of Paris, the event was entitled RRVITT

The route started on FM 1501, south of Deport, and included FM 1503 and FM 196 in the 16 mile loop.

Barnett said that approximately 50 participants made the 16-mile route with one cyclist leaving the starting point every 60 seconds.

The club holds various time trials throughout the year. Trophies are awarded in theindividuals with the best time recorded in each event.

The club is sponsored by the American Heart Association. All funds raised throughout the year are donated to the association.

Club members can compete in the yearly events for physical improvements and to raise funds for a worthwhile cause at the same time.

Barnett said that cycling is a very rewarding sport and not as expensive as some other sports. The cycle depends on just how much a person might want to spend and how com-

petitive a person might want to be. Some bikes can be purchased for around \$150.00, but most of the cycles used in the time trial events cost

around \$650.00.

Barnett also said that the space program has developed materials that are being used in cycle production now that reduce the weight of the cycle tremendously. A cycle like Barnett rides would weigh only 19 pounds, but a cycle frame made out of space age materials weighs only three pounds. Of course, those cycles carry a considerable higher price tag,

What a cyclist wants is a lightweight cycle with narrow tires with approximately 100 pound PSI in order to bet the maximum speed with the least effort from the rider.

Barnett said his cycle, completely rigged out with a repair kit (to fix a flat tire) and water bottles (for the rider), weighs approximately 29 pounds.

When asked if 16 miles wasn't a long ride, Barnett smiled and said, ' It's just a baby ride. Most of the riders participate in 50 to 100+ mile compe-

Anyone who would like to be a member of a cyclist group could sure get in shape and help charities at the same time, Barnett said.

Not me, said I, as I puffed back to the pickup after a 50-yard walk. A slow walk, at that!!

According to Joe Misek, Red Cross volunteer for 19 years, the group has recently purchased a van that is being renovated to serve as a disaster vehicle, since the van is a separate project of the Lamar County chapter of the American Red Cross, it is not funded by the United Way.

"Right now, we are just getting the project started, so we are asking the citizens of Lamar County to help upport the Red Cross in any way ossible, either through financial contributions or commitments to help equip the van," he said. "We need citizen support to make it work.

"Although we do receive some funding from the United Way, those funds are strictly designated for other Red Cross functions. the disaster van is a separate project that we have taken upon ourselves, and that is why we are asking for donations to help the project."

Cabinetry, medical supplies, lumber, electrical fixtures and building materials would all be beneficial to the project, Misek said.

He said that completion of the van is up to the citizens of Lamar County helping provide the funding necesary for the project.

if needed. He said that the Red Cross plans to equip the van with facilities to furnish food, water and hot coffee. The group is currently seeking authorization from the Railroad Commission to set up a LP gas stove in the unit, making it possible to cook out of the

The vehicle will also be stocked with medical and first aid supplies to handle any type of injury. Misek said that only trained personnel will be utilized, insuring citizens that the people helping them have been trained

to handle emergency situations. The disaster unit will be available to assist police and fire authorities, and can serve as an EOC, he said.

"We do not want people to believe that we are an ambulance service," Misek said.

"We will be equipped to handle any emergency first aid situations until the ambulance service arrives, and will assist them in any way pos-

Presently, the Red Cross has eight instructors who will be able to work with the disaster unit, but he says more volunteers ar eneeded. Volun-The van would serve as a disaster teers receive eight hours of first and

and CPR training and an eight hour orientation on disaster services.

Although it is not a government agency, the Red Cross is chartered by Congress to maintain a nationwide system of disaster preparedness and relief. It is one of more than 145 national societies that make up the League of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland.

The American Red Cross was founded in 1881 by Clara Barton and is celebrating its 109th year this month. The Red Cross is always monitoring local disasters; providing a welfare inquiry, including location and information services for relatives of disaster victims; havinga disaster preparedness plan, including mass shelters, feeding and first aid; and the new disaster services vehicle.

Red Cross disaster shelters located in lamar County include First Christian Church, Paris; Immanuel Baptist Church, Paris; Aikin Elementary, paris; Chisum School, Paris; Oak Park United Methodist Church, Paris; First Baptist Church, Roxton; Fellowship Baptist Church, Blossom; and Powderly Baptist Church.

The Lamar County chapter, chartered in 1919, provides food, emergency shelter and clothing for victims of disasters.


