Sammy Woodall Sheds Light On Life In Russia

"People Are People..But Shopping Is Sure Different", U.S.Embassy Construction Worker Says!

Sammy and Betty Woodall's living room is western. Horse pictures, spurs, trophies for roping and horsemanship abound. But now mixed in with this cowboy-oriented decor there is a new influence to be seen...that of Russia!

Sammy has been home recently from his job site...which is Moscow, Russia, where he has been working on the U.S. Embassy for the past year.

To say that it has brought new insight into his life would probably be an understatement.

Like many of us, Sammy had the idea that there was something evil about Communists in Russia. Now, he acknowledges "They're just people like you and me".

But, Sammy has also discovered that the comparisons about how much more freedom and luxury Americans possess are also true.

Over two and a half years ago a friend of Sammy's called to say that there were going to be some job openings working on the U.S. Embassy. Sammy rather casually filled out the papers that set the wheels turning. After months went by and he hadn't heard a word he pretty much forgot about the job application he had submitted. Then he received a phone call asking if he still wanted to go to Russia.

It took a year and a half to receive the Top Secret clearance necessary to go.

When asked why he ever even thought about taking a job most people wouldn't consider he explained that he had traveled all over the United States in his job as an insulator, and he felt that going to Russia would be something truly unusual to do...and that the pay was good.

When he first set foot on Russian soil, in April 28, 1989, he admits to feeling "a kind of chill at being there". That vanished pretty quickly though.

Although he is not at liberty to talk much about his work in Moscow, he is happy to answer all the questions asked about what living in the city of 8 million people is like.

"Probably the biggest difference of all is in shopping" hegrimaces.

"In the stores there is very little to buy, and how you buy it is absolutely different from here"

In Russia a shopper first stands in line until they can point out to a clerk the item they are interested in. After examining it they tell the clerk if they want to buy it and are given a slip.

Then they take the slip to a cash register (one cashier frequently serves several stores), where they stand in line and pay for the item. Then they

go back to the store with the item and stand in line again until they can hand the slip in and receive their goods!

An alternative is the markets that farmers and craftsmen sell from. These are part of Perastroka, the "New Freedoms" being initiated. There one can buy fresh fruits and vegetables and hand made goods directly from the producer instead of from a state store. The prices are higher, but quality is often better.

Some of the many things he has brought home to family and friends include hand painted dolls that nest inside one another, beautiful crystal, tiny pewter cups, gorgeously patterned scarves, attractive pictures, figurines and dolls, as well as newspapers in both Russian and English.

Sammy says that the new MacDonald's in Russia is really a hit. They have had little concept of "fast food" until now, since meals in restaurants are served in leisurely courses and can take about two hours from start to finish!

Under the new freedoms many churches are being restored, and Sammy says some are absolutely beautiful.

Older people, who have been taught that Americans are evil, and who lived through the repressions of an earlier time, aren't nearly as friendly as younger people, Sammy reports.

"One of the freedoms you miss" he says, "is the freedom to go out at nine or ten o'clock at night and get a sandwich or snack" In one of the world's largest cities everything is shut down at eight. There are no all night groceries, no all night pharmacies.

Television there is vastly different. There are very few ads, and very little except news or talk shows, although he says that there seems to be a soap opera put on just recently.

Learning Russia has been difficult, as it a complex language.

He grins ruefully when asked if it's still exciting. "Well," he smiles "now it's just a job. The weekends are long, and there's only so much tourist stuff to see each weekend within the city"

He explains that for months after his arrival he went with co-workers to visit the fabulous cathedrals, Kremlin, and other tourist attractions. Now, after a year, that's pretty well used up, and they aren't allowed out of the city limits without applying for special permits. Permits have to show destination and reason and be approved.

The embassy workers have a car, and Sammy now drives with confidence in the Moscow traffic.

There are no bill boards or ads, and it is only since the new freedoms that

bad news was allowed into the papers. Before that there was no admission of crime, no reports on shootings or robberies by the government.

When Sammy first went down to the market he made the mistake of wearing his black cowboy hat. Soon he had a crowd of people following him everywhere, begging to buy it!

At an automotive store there are all kinds of parts on display, but they have to be ordered, and it may take months, or even years for the needed part to become available!

If younger Russians hear two people in a store discussing buying something in english they want to buy what the Americans bought, sure it must be the "in" thing!

There is a housing shortage in Moscow. Apartments are very small, since the state figured how many feet of space each human required to live in. Now, though, there may be several families living in space designed originally for one family.

Private ownership of homes or single family dwellings is almost unknown. Sammy says one of the biggest problems with production stems from the Communist system. The man who works hard for eight or nine hours doing the best he can gets no more than the man who spends the day being lazy, hardly an incentive to put forth the best effort!

For entertainment the Russian people go to opera and ballet and concerts, there are very few theatres, and they show only Russian movies.

"I hear that movie videos are a big item on the Russian black market" Woodall reports. The black market is where Russians frequently go if they want little luxuries. To get things like a TV or car one must sign up for it. And then it can be six or eight months before it is available.

At the U.S. Embassy which is heavily guarded on the outside by Russian troops and inside by U.S. Marines, there are from 200 to 400 people wanting to leave Russia every day.

There are no laundromats or home washers and dryers, people do their washing in the bathtub.

Sammy and his co-workers live at the Hotel Mezhdunarodnaja. They simply call it the "Mez" for short. There they fix most of their own meals, and live a pretty normal life.

Betty plans on visiting him this summer.

"People are pretty much the same there as here" Sammy says, "it's been great experience, but I've really learned to appreciate all the little things that make life in the U.S. so different and so good."

Two Prairiland Students Qualify For UIL State Meet

Prairiland High School has qualified two students for the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, May 3-5 at the University of Texas at Austin.

Qualifiers include Susan Richey, first place in Feature Writing; and Elman Chau, first place in Accounting.

The students earned eligibility by placing first, second or third at the UIL regional meet held on the University of Texas campus at Austin.

Contests range from headline writing to Lincoln-Douglas debate, calculator applications to accounting. Of the million and one-half students who participated in UIL activities in 1988-89, over one-half million students competed in one or more of

the 20 general academic contests.

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1989-90, the TILF awarded more than \$468,000 in scholarship grants to 361 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1990-91, the TILF expects to award an estimated 370 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$489,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has almost \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

Dip And Vaccination Clinic To Conclude This Saturday

The Deport Community Club's dog dipping and vaccination clinic will be held again this Saturday, April 28 from 9 a.m. until noon, at Dr. Sam B. Kelsey's veterinarian clinic on Highway 271, just west of Deport.

The first dipping and vaccination was held last Saturday, with more than 30 dogs being brought in by their owners for the community service.

According to club officials, anyone who brought in their dog last Saturday and paid for a dipping, may bring the animal back this week for a free dip! Those who did not bring their animals in last week, however, will have to pay the prescribed cost

for the dip and vaccination. Any pet owner can bring their pet to the clinic. The price is \$3.00 for the dip to kill fleas and ticks and \$5.00 for the rabies vaccination, per dog.

This annual event is sponsored by the club as a service to the area and to help rid pets of ticks and fleas, protect pets (and people) from rabies and to help the club raise funds which can be used on other community projects.

All area pet owners are urged to take advantage of this service, which provides comfort for their pets, prevents the spread of a dangerous disease and provides money for local charities.

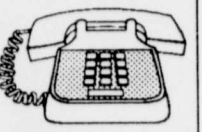

Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. Chili-Stew Fundraiser Is Friday.. Cunningham VFD, Serving For 16 Years!!

The Cunningham Volunteer Fire Department is sponsoring a chili and stew supper this weekend. On April 27, starting at 7 p.m. they will be serving up stew and chili for \$3 to raise funds for fire fighting equipment and operating expenses. The event will take place at the Community center and it will be an excellent opportunity for area residents to show their appreciation to this band of volunteers who have been so diligent in controlling grass and brush fires, extinguishing house fires and assisting other area fire departments with big blazes.

The Cunningham Volunteer Fire Department was established in 1974 and has seen many improvements since that time.

Claude O'Neal was the first Fire Chief, and helped to organize the department. Tragically, O'Neal's life was claimed in the line of duty that same year.

The first truck was a 4x4 forestry truck with a 500 gallon water tank, an air cooled engine and pump.

The department was made up of farmers and ranchers and anyone in the community who wanted to help.

Membership back then was slightly larger than today because Taylortown now has a fire department too.

According to current Fire Chief Jimmy Anderson, the Cunningham VFD has twenty members on the roll now and just last year the old forestry truck was replaced by a 1970 2 and a half ton Chevrolet truck.

The bright, newly painted red truck still bears the bed and pump from the original truck.

A new PTO pump has been added, and a new water tank was constructed by a local man which has furnished the department with a reliable truck, Anderson says.

The Cunningham fire fighters have added a radio to the truck, a base station has been added next to Chief Anderson's home, adjacent to the newly painted and refurbished fire station.

The fire station has been relocated to the Community Center Grounds, making way for a new Post Office and store which will be constructed on the old site.

Chief Anderson's wife, Cindy, operates the base station in order to summon more help if needed, and the truck radio puts them in contact with Lamar County Sheriff's Department and all other fire departments in the county.

The station now has a central heating system to aid in efficiency and an overhead inhouse filling system has been added to fill the truck in cold weather better.

They have regular monthly meetings and elect officers. This year the officers are Chief Jimmy Anderson; Asst. Chief, Tomy Pressley; treasurer and secretary Mickey Anderson.

Chief Anderson says "What we really need now is some personal protection equipment". Anderson says that right now they have 3 fire coats, 3 helmets, no boots and no grass fire paddles. They are also in dire need of operating funds.

Anderson says "some fires cost up \$10 in fuel alone, or even more. All the funds we get come from the County Fire Fighters Assn. We get about \$1,200 per year, and our truck insurance alone costs us \$700!"

"We made 17 fires last quarter and 2 structure fires" he continues. "We're called out more now that we have a reliable truck."

They are planning to have a CPR training seminar in the near future "because we need to know how to help people in every way possible if we are called out to a fire or accident."

"It would be great to save someone's life, and sooner or later we will be faced with that type of situation."

They hope to raise enough money from the chili supper to purchase some new equipment and most of all to put some money in the bank to operate with.

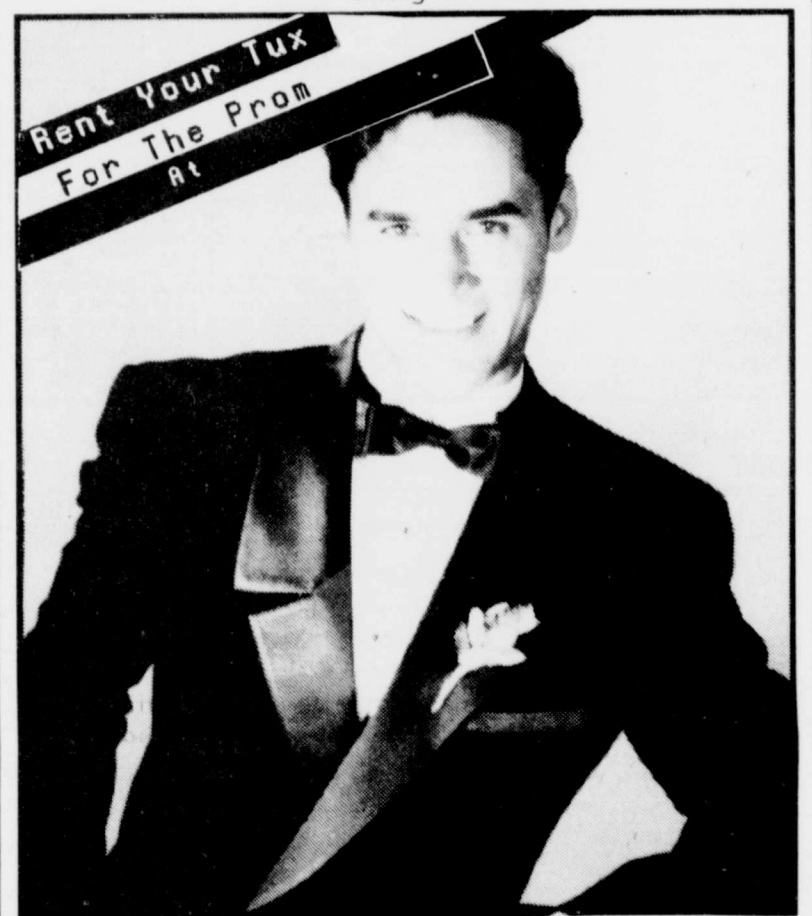

Texas-New Mexico Power Company Files Application For Rate Increase

Texas-New Mexico Power Company filed a retail rate increase application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the Texas cities it serves on April 11, 1990.

Included in this application, TNP filed a proposed phase-in plan that would limit the increase to 13.34% or \$43,074,934 during the first year of the plan. This plan calls for a three-step, 10-year phase-in of rates to lessen the overall cost impact to customers. Without the phase-in, the company's filing requests a 17% rate increase, or an increase of \$54,879,334 over adjusted test year revenues.

Under the phase-in plan, a residen-

tial bill for 1,000 kilowatt hours would increase by \$12 a month, compared to an increase of \$14 a month if the increase is approved without the plan.

The rate increase is necessary partially to recover the costs of a 150-megawatt power plant unit being constructed for TNP in Robertson County, said Jack Chambers, company vice president of Contracts and Regulation. The unit is designed to burn lignite, western coal or natural gas and is 99% complete.

When the first unit is placed in service, the company will become less dependent on the purchased power rates of other utilities. This

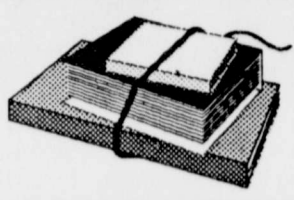
transition should ultimately give TNP greater control over its rates, Chambers said.

The PUC is expected to establish a schedule for the case within the next two to three weeks. The company anticipates the hearing on the merits of the case to begin in late July, 1990.

The proposed effective date of this increase is May 18, 1990. The cities served by TNP and the PUC have until that date to either act on the application or start the hearing process.

The company expects that the rates from this application will be in effect in October, 1990.

Letter To The Editor:

Dear Friend,

I would like this opportunity to update you on recent activity in the U.S. Congress to fight the War on Drugs. This past year, the Congress, with my strong support, appropriated over \$8 billion to fight the drug war. Law enforcement was granted more money, drug eradication began in South America and treatment centers were expanded at home.

Yet despite these accomplishments, we are still losing some battles against drugs--we must step up our efforts with new and stronger initiatives. For eight years as the elected District Attorney for the 8th Judicial District of Texas, I became familiar with the severe consequences of drug abuse; too many lives and careers have been destroyed. I, along with many East Texans, believe that drugs constitute one of the greatest threats to our nation.

With this in mind, I firmly believe our military forces should be used to interdict the supply of drugs. To the extent lessened world tension frees up our military, we should redirect our efforts to drug interdiction. Our military has the training and equipment to help patrol and secure our borders. With their efforts on land, sea and air, we could help keep drugs off our streets and out of our schoolyards.

Congress must also increase the punishment for drug pushers; we cannot tolerate a revolving door prison system. Since 1980, the inmate population has increased by more than 90%, yet still too few drug dealers go to prison. While we should get tough on the dealers, we should explore sentencing alternatives for youthful, first offenders who are victims of those dealers. I recently introduced the Chapman Boot Camp Prison Program to meet our nation's need for tough, yet constructive sentences for youthful drug offenders. We cannot afford to lose this war and the young Americans who are its victims. With all of us working together, Texas and America will win.

Deciding Red River County's Future

Until the opposition's mud-slinging and lies became public, I had not planned to do anything more than present my qualifications and ask my friends to vote for me. But I am not going to sit quietly by while Red River County's future is buried under those lies and dirt spread by a minority coalition of tax protestors, Clarksville haters, and anti-everything people.

LIE #1 Judge Garrison ruled to dissolve the Red River County Water District (Dimple Reservoir).

TRUTH The ruling just permitted the Dimple Reservoir Board to have a *trial* without automatically being ruled to be wrong. Depositions and other discovery will begin in the near future and the truth of what has been happening should finally become public information. Ed Miller has admitted that the election to dissolve the district was invalid!!

LIE #2 The elderly and others will be taxed at an unlimited tax rate.

TRUTH The Red River County Water District (Dimple Reservoir) has NO power to tax the elderly or any other person! Only property can be taxed and all the legal exemptions provided by law are available to the property owners. If you own no taxable property, you pay nothing!! At a rate of \$.33 per hundred dollars of valuation, if you have \$10,000. of taxable property you would pay \$33 per year; if you have \$100,000 of taxable property, it would be \$330. per year and only \$3,300 per year for \$1,000,000 of property. What is unfair about that?? If you are a millionaire, you are certainly *receiving* more of the blessings from our bounty and should *pay* proportionately more.

LIE #3 The taxpayers of Red River County must pay the entire cost of the Dimple Reservoir.

TRUTH The bonding capacity of the property in Red River County will be used to secure the necessary *credit* to build the lake. The water will be *paid* for by the people who use it, whether for personal consumption or industrial use. The lakes in all our surrounding Counties are major contributors to their local tax bases and economies!! Clarksville will buy a significant portion of the water but the present Dimple Reservoir Board members refused to discuss the purchase in a serious, business-like way. Red River County Water Supply Corporation, Annona and Avery all need additional water supplies according to state records and Texarkana has been unwilling to commit before determining their own needs. Bogata is also trying to secure more water to meet its minimum needs and is planning to drill another well. Remembering the problems we had in finding water in that area when I represented the Fulbright Water Supply Corporation in the early 1960's, we can all just wish them the best. Dimple Reservoir would assure all the users a reliable future supply of water.

LIE #4 You will get no individual benefit from Dimple Reservoir.

TRUTH The Dimple Reservoir will decrease your tax burden because it will increase the taxable property values for the County, bring in additional sales taxes and tourists' dollars. In addition, the lake will be there for fishing, boating, picnicing, camping and relaxation for your personal use at any time.

LIE #5 We should wait until someone commits to use the water before we start planning the lake.

TRUTH If you wait that long, it is too late!! It takes about seven years or more to plan and build a lake and neither industry nor government can wait that long after their needs are apparent. In the meantime Red River County is likely to lose all its future water rights to the North Texas Water District or to a surrounding County, all of which realize the natural value of such rights. The bickering needs to stop now. Red River County must not lose its last chance to have a future!! Our future can disappear with our water rights. If we do not retain those rights, then in 20 years, 90% of our people will have to go to Dallas/Ft. Worth to get a drink of our own water!

LIE #6 Since the Board owes me about \$11,000 that circumstance will influence my personal actions and considerations.

TRUTH Absolute Hogwash!! This debt was incurred by contract with the original board to fight lawsuits filed by the very people who now control the Board and are trying to kill the lake. This debt will be paid to me whether or not the lake is built and I am disappointed and surprised that such a good man as my opponent, Majle Jones, has allowed his name to be associated with such nonsense and mud-slinging. Indeed, as long as I am a member of the Board whatever future legal work I do for the Board will be free!

LIE #7 The Anti-Lake board members represent the views of Red River County.

TRUTH All nine members of the present Board take their marching orders from Don Cole. Apparently he has secured the financing for all this tax protest and his own campaign from the "Boys Down On The River" who, no doubt, issue the marching orders to him. Those nine members have refused to allow even one voice to speak out in opposition. They refused to seat me as a member of the Board as Clarksville's representative.

Every other community and the Red River County Water Supply Corporation all are permitted to name their own representative, but the City with 1/3 of the County population that pays 1/3 of the County taxes was not allowed to do so.
