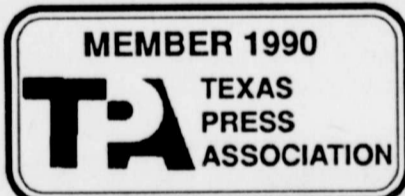

Satellite Link Keeps Prairiland Ag Department Up To Date-Area Farmers Can Benefit Too!

The Prairiland Ag Department has a new teaching tool, and it is also a service available for area farmers.

DTN (Data Transmission Network) is a service received through a computer link with a satellite and provides the very latest information concerning the price of livestock commodities and stock exchange activities.

The service Prairiland receives is provided from Omaha Nebraska and costs the school \$300 a year for the use of the service.

According to Buddy Freeman, Ag Teacher, other programs can be purchased for a small fee that can provide any source a person might conceivably want or need in their particular business or interests.

Freeman teaches Ag Management with the computer system, and last semester each student in his class was given a token (and imaginary) sum of \$50,000 and allowed to make "investments" in any form they wanted, such as the stock market, futures market, livestock, etc.

Freeman reports that out of the class only about four students could show a profit on their investments, but each one finished the class with a

Now, with the new system the information can be obtained when it is released.

As farming by necessity must become more and more computerized and high tech, information such as this will become more and more important.

It is imperative for schools to provide the training in computer usage to students so that they will be better prepared to go to work in the job market upon graduation...whether that market is in high finance or farming. With this system, Prairiland is able to boost student's education in these fields considerably, plus provide a service for area farmers.

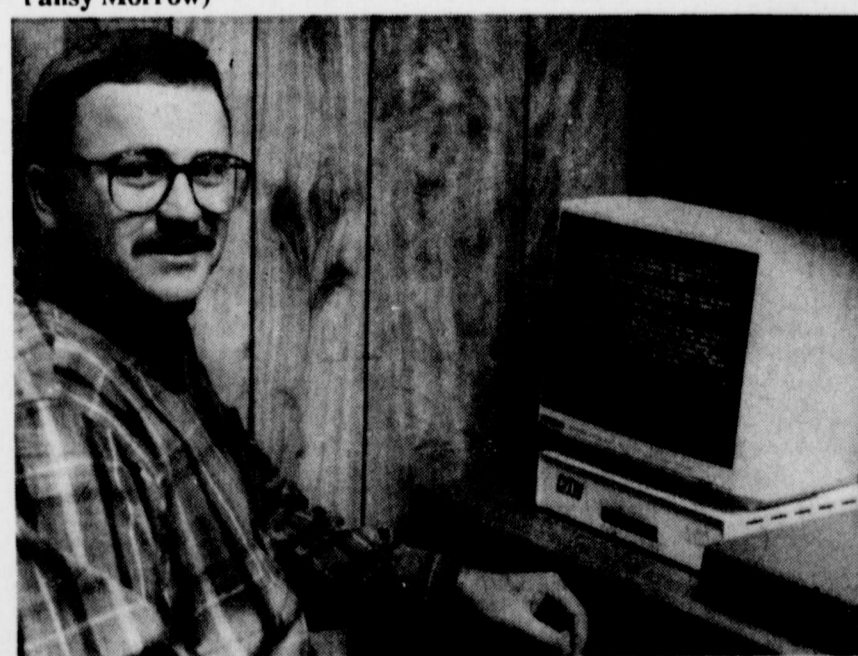

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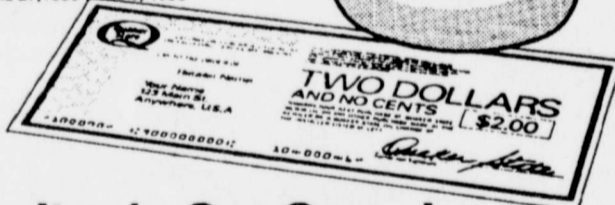

"Lost Sheep" Find Dutch Farms Fantastic...Gardens Spectacular

Lots of you seem to want to hear about our trip. When there is space over the next few weeks, we will run it.

As most of you have already read, it was kind of chaotic getting to the Netherlands. But, after arriving, it was fantastic.

We got on the train for Valkenburg, where we were to catch up with our tour, and sat across from a wonderful lady who spoke just enough English to help us figure out the trains we needed to take.

The trains in Europe are clean, fast, and efficient. If it isn't rush hour, they are pleasant means of transportation.

We watched as spotless farmsteads, immaculate harbors and glistening canals passed by. Guernsey, Holstein and Freisian cattle grazed along the way. The occasional windmill reinforced our conception of Holland, and numerous herons, storks and waterfowl paddled around in the canals that are the ever-present signature of a country below sea level.

That night, after getting a hot bath and some clean clothes, we met for dinner with the other 25 tour members, and our guide, Anne Marie.

The other members of the tour were mostly older, friendly and helpful. Everyone was interested in hearing about the "lost sheep".

Anne Marie was a young, enthusiastic woman who had spent some time at Oxford University.

Dinner in Holland was, as in most European countries, served in courses. The weather was cool enough for us to enjoy the hot soup that began the meal, the salads, pork and attractive desserts that were served.

Coffee was available only AFTER the meal, a quirk most Americans found really peculiar. Ice tea wasn't obtainable at all, of course.

The next morning we found the cobblestoned square outside our hotel transformed. A flower and flea market was being set up. That was our first taste of the gardening abilities of the Dutch. The fresh plants were so gorgeous, and the variety so endless.

We met John, (pronounced Yon)

our bus driver, and crawled aboard for the hour and a half journey to Castle Arden. Along the way were pollarded trees, beautiful farms and people moving slowly up and down flat-topped rows planting asparagus.

Pollarding is a method whereby the Dutch keep a trees branches trimmed. Often a tree will have a trunk of massive girth, to be topped by a small ball of thick leaves.

One of the most apparent things about the Dutch is that they are a neat, clean people.

Their farms were always nicely arranged, immaculately managed.

At the castle we roamed through acres of gorgeous gardens, spotted with fountains, masses of tulips, and brightened by whimsical creations such as giant frogs poised on the edge of a pond, or a concrete tree trunk with a huge fiberglass cat perched on the limb.

Then we loaded back into the bus and went ahead to the Kroeller-Muller museum where we saw over 200 drawings by Vincent Van Gogh.

We had carefully selected this tour because it was largely unstructured. Our guide did not accompany us as we toured castle, exhibit or anywhere else. Often we were simply shown a land mark and were then free to split up and roam a town at will, with a loose time to be back at the bus. This was perfect for us, allowing everyone to gravitate towards what they preferred instead of being "babysat" and doing exactly the same thing.

I loved the Van Gogh exhibit, while many on our tour remained unimpressed. Afterwards Thomas and I strolled through the sculpture park in a light rain, enjoying the variety of highly contemporary artwork displayed there.

Back on the narrow roads of Holland once more we passed towns with names that prove difficult for East Texans. Nijismede, Issledorf, and others don't lend themselves to a Texas tongue too well.

The villages were like the farms, neat and well ordered, with everyone going about their business on bicycles.

The bicycle is the primary mode of transportation. Alongside almost every highway is a cycle road, complete with it's own traffic signals and rules.

We learned that there are virtually no school buses in the nation...children ride five or six miles on their bikes to school and back.

Eighty year olds peddling sedately off to market, tiny tots trailing behind the rest of the family, young and old alike make use of a low-cost, pollution free mode of transportation.

Holland is a small country, and while bicycles wouldn't work in Texas, they are perfect for there. They also seem to have created a remarkably fit and healthy population, a very significant benefit!

We pulled into the villag cof Ootsmarsum (pronounced Oats, Oots) for our next two nights.

The Twents Etoes Hotel was lovely. The rooms were plain and simple, but looked out over misty vistas of grazing cattle, draft horses and a peaceful little town.

There are two major features to homes in Holland...crisp white lace curtains and red tiled roofs.

If a roof doesn't have red tile, it probably has thatch, but the curtains will be there, white and perfect, and usually in a lovely design.

We walked around the town with Bill and Berniece that night, enjoying window shopping at meat markets, grocers with their baskets of fresh vegetables, and bakery shops. There was a single antique store, a "junk shop" several sidewalk cafes and a beautiful florist shop. A tall spired church overlooked the town square, and the bells wafted the hours over the whole.

Frequently the houses in the country had a unique feature. The front part of the home would house the family while the back part housed the milk cows and farm animals. There was no hint of dirt or odor, a testimony to the remarkable cleanliness of the Dutch!

The doctor came to attend two of the tour members, who had been ill with throat infections since the beginning of the trip. One look at this handsome young Dutch doctor and Anne Marie (unmarried and attractive) and Cynthia (tour member-also unmarried and attractive) were trying their best to find some way to get sick themselves!

We were scheduled to go into Germany the next day, so it was to bed at last!

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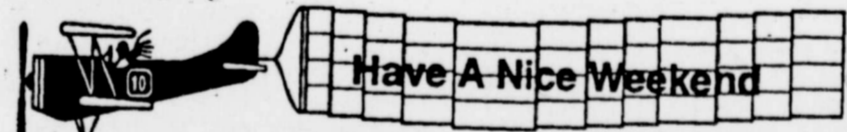

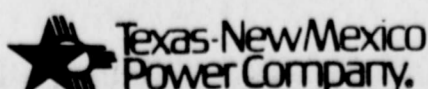


Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

June Bugs And Mosquitoes Becoming Active

Mid-April through May is the time June bugs are most active in East Texas, says an entomologist for the Texas

"June bugs are the adult stage of the white grub, a lawn pest that feeds on the roots of grasses, shrubs and other ornamentals," said Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "Do not confuse current freeze damage of lawns with white grub damage."

Robinson says to differentiate between the symptoms, dig several one-foot square sections of the lawn six inches deep and look for white grubs. If grubs are found, do not treat at this time. Treatments should be applied from mid-June to early July

in order to control the insect soon after it hatches from the egg.

County extension agents have lists of approved insecticides for grub control.

Heavy rains are resulting in a fairly heavy population of mosquitoes. "Some mosquitoes breed in flood waters and others breed in small water holding vessels, ditches and other still water areas," Robinson said. "Populations can be reduced by eliminating open containers of water and other standing water."

"Various repellants can be used to protect yourself from mosquito bites," Robinson said. "Bug lights are somewhat effective but should be located away from a major area of human activity."

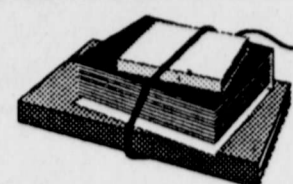

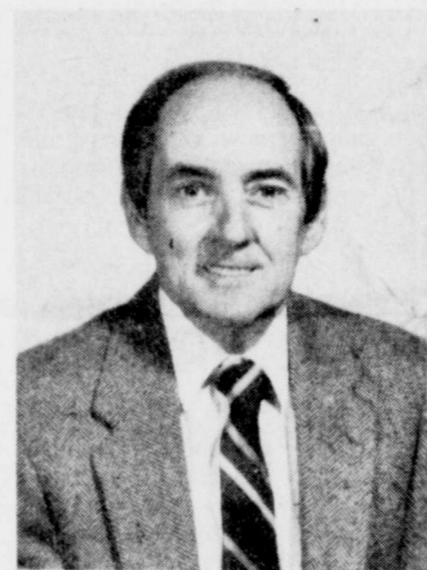

He has served as Pastor of Bethel Baptist Church of Clardy for 22 years.


