Teenager Killed In Head On Collision

Prairiland High School students were stricken by the tragic death of Jennifer LeAnn McFadden, a16 year old student killed Sunday evening in a car accident.

Although she had transferred to Prairiland in January, she had quickly become an accepted student with friends who feel her death keenly.

Devastated parents can only look at the prom pictures that arrived Monday, showing a vibrant, pretty teenager.

Miss McFadden was travelling home after picking up supper for her family, heading southbound in a 1988 Buick LeSabre that came into collision with a 1964 Ford F 250 pickup driven by Glendon Dale Taylor of Brookston.

According to Trooper L.D. Watson of the Texas Department of Public Safety it was a three-vehicle acci-

Reports indicate that two vehicles

were northbound when the driver of the pickup attempted to pass in a nopassing zone on a hill.

The McFadden vehicle apparently also came into collision with a 1977 Ford van driven by Sandra Jean Nel-

Earl Ellis, a passenger in the van, said he and his son Deloy tried to aid Miss McFadden, and did manage to pull Taylor to safety.

Taylor was first listed in critical condition, but has since been listed at St. Joseph's Hospital as serious and stable.

The accident is still under investigation by authorities, no charges have been filed.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Prairiland High School Gymnasium with gravestide services Thursday at 11:30 a.m. at Greenwood Cemetery in Ft.

Loose Dogs A Problem Once Again...Child Bitten

Once again the Deport City Council has asked this paper to speak to the public about the problem of dogs running loose witin the city limits. This plea for co-operation from citizens goes out after an incident nearly a week ago in which a child riding on her bicycle was bitten by a loose dog. The child is currently still hospitalized

Dogs run loose with no sign of collar or tag, and their owners are frequently unknown.

The City of Deport does not have the funds to establish a pound or holding area that would meet the strictly specified standards set by the government, and obviously does not want to have to impose taxes on the citizens of Deport in order to establish one.

They cannot begin killing dogs without having the citizens of Deport upset, as beloved pets would undoubtedly die as well as strays, and killing the animals would be a cruel and unpleasant solution to the problem.

What can be done then? Basically the situation has only one solution, and that is for people to accept responsibility for their dogs. Voluntary cooperation is by far the best, cheapest and most humane way to handle the

Pets who are kept up are less likely to be run over, attacked by larger animals or poisoned. They are healthier and generally happier.

Even if someone absolutely won't confine their pet, rabies vaccination and an identification collar is inexpensive and easily obtainable. The Community Service Club sponsors clinics (two have just recently been held) where dogs can be vaccinated for rabies at a nominal fee. Anyone who can afford to feed a dog can surely afford the simple shot that keeps this deadly disease under control!

The next dog bite incident may be even more serious that this last one. Citizens are urged once again to take responsibility for their own animal so that this problem can be solved through voluntary efforts!







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Glimpses Of Village Life, Farm Life and Life As Past Royalty

As you may recall from last week's vacation account, we had arrived in Oatsmarsum, a village over 1,000 years old, and were getting ready to go into Germany.

I suppose most of us who have grown up on tales of World War Ii have some prejudice against Germany deep within us. And the little we saw of Frankfurt, Germany on our unscheduled stop there only two days before had done nothing to dispell

When our tour bus arrived at the German border it looked rather forbidding, with military vehicles and personnell around. But we made only a brief stop ther, then proceded to Munster the "City of Churches".

Our little group quickly split up as some went shopping, others simply wandering.

Bill and Berniece Buck, from Channelview, were looking for a few children's books such as Mother Goose. Their daughter, who is a teacher, wanted her class to be able to see what familar stories looked like in another language. So we went from book store to book store, finding that not as many Germans spoke English well enough to communite as the Dutch do.

Still, we made side trips to beautiful cathedrals, and saw window shutters painted in bright red and white, newspaper windows with their best issues glassed and on display, and stairways with a ramp to roll bikes down. Yes, bicycles were the primary mode of transportation in Germany too.

We had lunch in a Greek restaurant, where the little waitress spoke little English. Figuering out the menu wasn't easy, in fact, we dever did know for sure what we were eating, only that it had beef and macaroni in

We had started back down the street when a cry of "Allo, allo" rang out and the waitress came running down the street as fast as she could with Berniece's camera!

Everyone was friendly and pleasant, and most of those stereotypes about Germans went down the drain.

After Munster we went to Tecklenburg, a quaint village in hills much like those found in Arkansas. There, on the simple cobblestoned square, old men sat with their dogs and swapped tales and smoked their pipes. Little blond headed boys peeked at us from the door of flower shops, and bells sent their timely message over

the hills. We wandered once more through the local cemetery, surprised to find that every grave was a minature flower garden, planted with the brightest of living plants. Somehow, we always like to visit a local cemetery, for we believe how a people care for their dead says something about them.

The Germans frequently take picnic lunches to the cemetery on Sundays, an elderly lady told us, and tidy the graves and visit with friends who have also come.

For a while I couldn't figure out what the" Heir Rust" at the top of so many headstones meant. "Surely", I asked Thomas, "there can't be that many people with the last name or Heir Rust or Rust?" Slowly it soaked into my thick skull. That was German for "Here Rests"!

After a leisurely drive through the Tutoburger forest we were once more "home" in Oatsmarsum. We hurried downtown to do some shopping at the pleasant stores, purchasing hand painted tiles for friends back home. The shop keeping at the antique store spoke no English, but we managed non the less to get prices straight and purchases wrapped safely.

Dee, a tour member from New York, came flying up to us to ask if she could borrow ten guilders, being short and finding that they couldn't take Traveller's Checks or credit crads.

After loaning it to her we walked back through town with her. There we discovered a statue in honor of the town nightwatchman-and discovered a striking differance between American and Dutch philosophy.

The nightwatchman used to wander through the streets of villages, and he swung a large clapper or ratchet noisemaker. This alerted anyone who might be about to commit a crimed to quit what they were doing and flee, so that the crime was prevented, and no confrontation occurred. Quite a difference between the American attitude of catch if you possibly can!

The next mornig we went to Palais Het Loo (pronounced Low).

This was once the royal residence and was simply awesome.

It contained uncountable rooms, with striking murals adorning ceilings and walls, crystal chandaliers, procelains and a wide variety of stunning fireplaces, carvings and furniture.

At one time Napoleon occupied the palace, and painted over much of the beauty with Empire Red and gilt!

The "backyard" was perhaps the most fantastic part of the place, though. Patterned after the gardens at Versailles in France, scrolls and intricate patterns trimmed from a wide variety of shrubs whirled the mind up and out to fasten upon fountains in the shape of huge glodes, complete with golden continents, and statuary to delight any eye.

Live horses champed and snorted softly in the lavish stables, and displays of royal sleighs, wgons, buggies and tack boggled the senses with the exquisite craftsmanship. Out under the stable porch the cobbles stone were actually wooden, to soften the sounds of carriages and horses iron-shod hooves.

Peacocks strutted their haughty way across lush green lawns.

I spoke for some time to the bus driver about the Dutch farming situation. They are in much the same situation as the U.S. farmers, with their prices fixed by the European Community of which they are a part, and production costs steadily going up. They are trying to reduce the number of farms, and pay farmers to quit farming. This seemed to us, so sad, since their farms were so beautifully kept, obviously cared for by people with a deep and abiding sense of love for the land and a willingness to work.

Late that afternoon we arrived in Amsterdam, and our tour took on a whole new tone, of which we will

Child Care Bill Can Help Put America First Again

will have an opportunity to sign into law a new child care bill that helps the states provide \$1.75 billion in child care assistance for low-income families who otherwise have difficulty finding or keeping jobs. He should sign the bill quickly a a major step in taking care this country's pressing needs after so many years of successfully promoting American-stylecapitalism abroad.

The legislation going to President Bush is distinctly American, however, has been fine tuned over the past year to comply with his ideas.

It contains the tax breaks the President wanted for low-income families in which one parent chooses to remain at home to care for the children.

The bill provides assurances that the states themselves--and not any federal bureaucracy--will be responsible for deciding minimal health and safety protections for child care centers. The bill recognizes that in America churches always have and must continue to play a big role in providing child care services. And the bill gives help to families who choose to leave their children with relatives.

The bill doesn't do anything new except change the odds on getting help and the opportunities for economic self-sufficiency. The sooner Congress can put finishing touches on this legislation, and the sooner the President can sign it, then the sooner America can start taking care of itself again.

Flood Damage Mounts

Damage to crops and pastures continues to mount as flood waters from the Red River covers thousands of acres. The full extent of the damage will not be fully determined for several days.

The hardest hit crop will probably be wheat although making a precise damage assessment at this time is difficult. It is safe to assume that wheat that has been under water for more than 48 hours is ruined. That which is standing in water will no doubt be severely affected. Most of the plants will die as the roots cannot survive in the absence of oxygen. Various forms of rots will develop which will weaken the stalk. We do not know what damage was done to the wheat which was only under water for a day. We will have to wait and

Grass pastures which remain under water will have a partial or complete kill of grasses. Although Bermuda grass can withstand lots of water, there is a limit to what it can tolerate. We can also expect to find much silting once the waters recede.

There, no doubt, will be hours and hours of work required to remove logs and other debris from fields. Early assessment indicates that roads and bridges disappeared and tons of money will be required to restore



Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Mgr. Paris Social Security Office

How bank accounts affect SSI eligibility...is an area that consistently confuses people who are receiving or applying for SSI. This column should help clear up some of that confusion.

To be eligible for SSI, a person must have resources of less than \$2,000 (\$3,000 for a couple). Bank accounts are usually considered resources; therefore, they count toward this limit.

What's so confusing about that, you wonder. Well, Social Security considers a bank account yours if you rname is on it as owner or co-owner and there are no legal restrictions that keep you from taking money out and using it for your own benefit. This is

true even if you don't use the account or don't consider the account yours. That means it's important that bank accounts are precisely titled to reflect ownership and access.

Let's suppose Mary Jones applies for SSI. Her daughter, Jane, has a \$3,000 savings account. Jane listed Mary as a joint owner, primarily so Mary would have access to the money in case something happened to Jane.

Although Mary doesn't consider the account to be hers, Social Security does, and she could be found ineligible for SSI because she is over the \$2,000 resource limit. Of course, if Jane's account is titled to restrict Mary's access, the account would not

be considered Mary's and would not affect Mary's eligibility.

Proper titling is also critical when community, civic or social groups collect money for a special reason such as to help pay an SSI recipient's medical expenses. Although the donors gave money to the person, they also placed restrictions on its use, and the account must be titled to show the restrictions. As long as the account title shows the money cannot be used for food, clothing or shelter, the ac-

count is not considered a resource. The best advice I can give is always check with Social Security about how to set up accounts involving SSI recipients. We can give you specific instructions so you can avoid
