## Local Sales Tax Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office sent checks totaling \$83.3 million in local sales tax rebates to cities and counties in

"We're seeing another month of strong sales tax figures and that's good news for Texas," Bullock said. Checks to cities totaled \$74.9 mil-

lion, an increase of almost 13% over rebates to cities last June, Bullock said. So far this year, total rebates to cities are up 7.8%.

Houston received \$12.6 million, the state's largest payment while Dallas received the state's second-

largest payment of \$8.2 million. San Antonio received \$4.5 million and Austin received \$3 million.

Locally, Blossom received \$879.69, a 14.75% decrease over last year's payment total.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to no payment for last year for the same period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$86,730.47 for a 4.58% increase and Talco received \$1,182.14 for a 5.80% decrease from last year. This month's checks include taxes

collected on April sales and reported in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Merchants collect the sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6% share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

## Eighty-Four Year Old Couple Continues Gardening Tradition

Clyde and Thelma Bankhead live in Cunningham in a small, pleasant house, deep shade sheltering their front porch.

Visitors during the summer months will frequently find the couple, both eighty-four years old, sitting in a porch swing under that shade.

But, even more often, the couple can be found in their beautiful vegetable garden, bending over rows of peas, cabbage, onions, beans and all the other garden "truck" that can be grown in this area.

This year they have tried something new. The Imapurchased a couple of climbing tomato vines. They filled an old tractor tire next to the house with decayed cotton burrs, and their son, Clyde Elmer, built a wire frame for the tomatoes to climb on.

Then, they sat back to watch as the tomatoes began to grow. And grow. And then grow some more!

The vine in now over seven feet tall, and loaded with beautiful tomatoes, promising a full crop of the delicious red globes!

They bought the plants at market square, and have never tried them be-

Of course, their garden is still loaded with lovely tomato plants. Mrs. Bankhead brought out a jar of

her beet pickles, put up this season. The deep, ruby tones of the pickles sparkled in the sunlight, and a little pride sparkled in her face too, as well

They were in the process of making kraut from the spring cabbage.

They make it the "old-fashioned" way, letting it sit for nine days before canning.

"We're going to have to start slow-

ing down on this gardening" they claim, but they do so with a hearty laugh. Acknowledging that it isn't really the gardening that is the real work,

but the canning, they still prefer home canned food. The Bankheads went back to that pleasant, shady porch after the interview, taking a little time to rest before

going on abuot their daily chores.

Those chores are as age-old as civilisation...hoeing, staking, feeding and tending those vegetables that make up such a healthy lifestyle. A life time on those homegrown, home preserved foods may very well have had something to do with the

couple's vigor and health at an age when many people are confined to a wheelchair! It's a pleasant sight, the couple, sitting there, waving goodby . And those beet pickles they sent home are mighty good too! For, again in an

age-old tradition, it's rare for a visitor to leave the Bankhead's home without some token of their generosity. Sometimes it seems harder and to find people who know the secrets of growing a flourishing vegetable gar-

den, then putting it up. But, as long as there are people who love the soil and love to garden, there will be couples like the

Bankheads. And the world is by far a richer place for them.


