## Hunters Should Be Aware Of Insect Infestations

With the hunting season getting into full swing, many hunters will be exposed to, many hunters will be potentially dangerous insect bites.

Precautions can eliminate most of the dangers. Wasps, spiders, ticks, fire ants and mosquitoes may infest camp houses or campsites. Insecticides are available to safely rid the area of unwanted pests.

Hornet or wasp spray is available in pressurized cans with accuracy up

to 30 or 40 feet. Most mosquito repellents work fairly well. Materials for treating fire ants are readily available. When used according to label directions products are available to control practically any insect pest hunters might encounter.

Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Lyme disease, both infectious to humans, are carried by ticks. Both diseases can be very serious if untreated or not diagnosed early.

**KEEP STIRRING** those beans, honey! says Wendall Davis to his wife, Jo Alice. They are sharing the recipe for their famous Pinto Beans in this week's Country Cooking article.

## Country Cooking

"Country Cooking" is coming to you this week from the home of Wendall and Jo Alice Davis. Wendall is employed at Blossom City Hall and Jo Alice has been a secretary for Smith & Coffman for the past 3 years in Clarksville. They have a four-year old son, Wesley.

For the past few weeks, Wendall and Jo Alice have been busy entering pinto bean contests all the way from Clarksville to Dallas. They read about the Red River County Fair contest in the paper and decided to enter. Jo Alice hurried to the grocery store to purchase her beans, and found the shelves almost bare, and she realized the contest was going to be competitive, but set out to win it.

Arriving at the fair, they found there were 19 pots of beans entered, however, they left the fair with a first place win. This win enabled them to enter the Pinto Bean Cook Off at the State Fair in Dallas, and they came home from there with another first place win. This week, Jo Alice is sharing her famous pinto bean recipe with us.

Jo Alice says everyone wants to taste her special beans so she takes them to work with her and she has committed herself to serve them at the Blossom City Hall in a few days.

Wendall and Jo Alice received several gifts from the State Fair win, one of which are two round trip tickets to anywhere that Southwest Airlines flies. They are still trying to decide where to go.

Jo Alice shares some secrets that help her with this recipe.

She mixes two kinds of beans together, pinto and kidney beans,

adding the kidney beans to make the juice redder in color and thicker.

She cooks them fast, not slow. Some people soak their beans and cook them slow, she doesn't.

Her grandfather teases her and says her secret is how she stirs the beans. She stirs them left-handed. Maybe there's something to it.

Another secret is the pepper. She uses peppercorn instead of black pepper, and she grinds her own. She believes this makes a tremendous difference in taste.

Along with pinto beans, you must have some good old-fashioned hot cornbread. Jo Alice is sharing her recipe for this also. The third recipe is her mother-in-law's favorite Beef Mushroom Cheese Casserole.

I received another popcorn ball recipe I want to share. This recipe, called Grandmother's Popcorn Balls, came from Mrs. M.A. Ferguson, Jr. at Scroggins. She gets the paper each week and says she cooks all the recipes. Clyde and I didn't know where Scroggins was, we thought perhaps West Texas, but learned it is in the Lake Cypress area. Thank you for the recipe, and I am glad you are enjoying the article.

In last week's paper we ran a caramel pie recipe which listed 1 heaping tablespoon flour. This should be corrected to 2 heaping tablespoons of flour. Please make this correction on your recipe, so your pie will thicken as it should.

### Grandmother's Popcorn Balls

Cook until soft ball stage is reached.  
1 cup ribbon cane or Brer Rabbit syrup (do not use Karo)  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 stick oleo  
2 tsp. vinegar  
dash salt  
8 qts. cooked salted popcorn.

Divide corn into two large shallow pans, pour 1/2 syrup mixture over each pan of corn, dampen hands, shape into balls.

### Pinto Beans

1/2 pound pinto beans  
1/2 lb. kidney beans  
Wash beans put in pot to cook, add 2 or 3 glasses of water.  
Add 1 medium onion, cut up  
Add 5 to 7 cloves garlic, cut up  
Add 4 or 5 slices ham, fat trimmed  
Add 10 slices jalapenos (less if you don't like them hot)  
Add salt, pepper (a little now, more later)  
Add all ingredients with beans and boil rapidly, adding water as they cook down some, but not completely dry, keep adding water (a glass or two at a time) as they cook. When they have cooked for a couple of hours, you can turn down to medium and cook to desire consistency. Add more salt and pepper to taste if desired.

### Beef Mushroom Cheese Casserole

1 lb. ground beef  
1 onion  
1 bell pepper  
1 tsp. garlic powder  
1 small box macaroni and cheese dinner  
1 can mushroom soup  
Brown meat, onion and bell pepper. Add garlic powder. When meat is done, add mushroom soup. Set aside. Prepare macaroni and cheese as directed on box. Layer in casserole dish. Bake for 20 minutes at 300.

### Cornbread

1 cup meal  
1/2 cup flour  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. sugar  
1 tsp salt  
1 egg  
1 cup buttermilk  
oil  
Mix all ingredients except oil. Put oil in pan, add a little cornmeal. Heat, then add mixture. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes.

play. The players were selected by the coaches based on their freshman year baseball season and. They must be current sophomores of the college they represent.

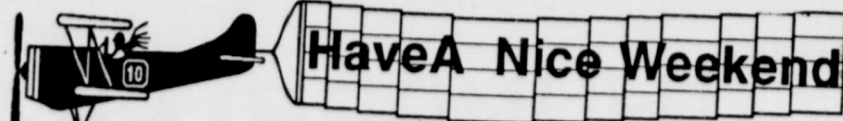

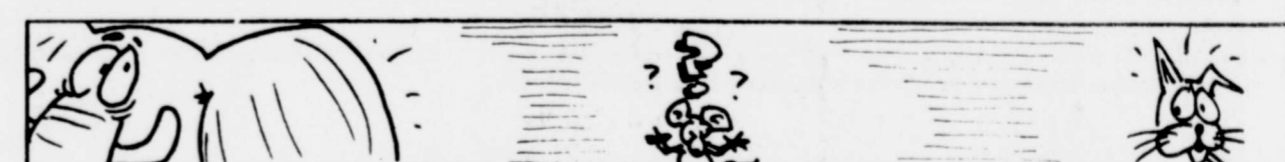

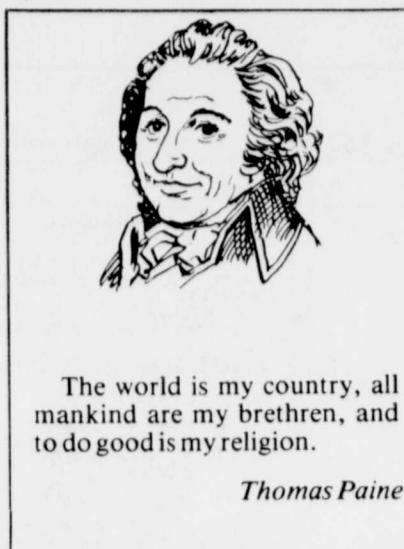

## HEALTH NEWS & NOTES

### Seafood: Get The Good Without The Problems

An increasing number of health conscious Americans are consuming low fat seafood. However, as with other foods, seafood can cause foodborne illness due to microbial contamination. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration inspects and analyzes seafood to help assure its safety. It also recommends these steps to take when handling and preparing seafood—especially shellfish—to further reduce your risk:

#### Storage

Seafood should always be refrigerated at 35 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit until preparation time. For added freshness and safety, put wrapped fish on ice when storing in the refrigerator. Because many refrigerator freezer compartments don't reach zero, they should be used only for temporary storage. Use separate freezers for long-term storage.

#### Cooking

Almost any fish can be baked, broiled, poached, steamed or fried. Some people prefer to bake fatty

fish and poach or steam lean fish. Fish fillets and steaks are excellent charcoal broiled or barbecued.

Allow 6 to 12 minutes cooking time for each inch of thickness. Turn it halfway through the cooking time. Fish is cooked properly when the thickest part becomes opaque and the fish flakes easily when poked with a fork.

Bake at 450 degrees F.

Broil about 5 inches from the heat source.

Shrimp can be simmered 3 to 5 minutes depending on the size and quantity or until the shells turn red.

Clams and mussels may be steamed over boiling water until the shells open (5 to 10 minutes). Oysters should be sauteed, baked or broiled until plump and opaque and the edges curl, about 2 to 3 minutes.

Follow these simple rules to help assure that the fish and seafood you eat is as healthful as it is delicious.

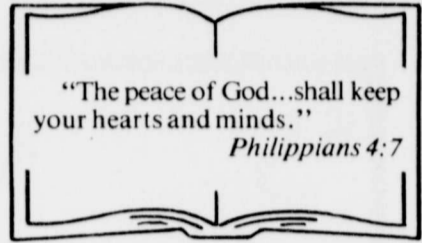
