Local Sales Taxes Up, Sharp Says Economy Improving

"This month's local sales tax rebates are positive proof that our Texas economy is steadily improving," Comptroller John Sharp said Mon-

Sharp announced today that his office this month sent checks totaling \$91 million to the cities and counties across Texas that collect sales taxes.

Blossom received \$563.95 for this

period, for a 7.73% increase while Deport received no payment this period.

Paris received \$190,206.78 for a 1.875% increase.

Bogata received \$1,637.79, for a 2.18% increase while Clarksville received \$13,911.24 for a .36% in-

Mt. Pleasant received \$100,857.17

Talco received no payment for this period, marking a 16.83% decrease.

'A good portion of that increase is due to Texas' stronger economy, but some of the rise is because more cities collect sales tax thi year than did last year. A few other cities have also increased their local tax rates which makes for higher rebate checks

The next day you call Bob and ask him to do a plug for you. "Sorry" Bob say "I can't do that. We





Dear Mom and Dad,

(Dec. 26) By the time you get this etter, what is to take place will probably be over. I have had good trianing, by the best leaders and professionals and I can defend myself if need arises. I will be coming home safe, and functional then this is over. Pray about eveything. God bless you all. lear Randy,

(Dec. 27.) Well, Christmas was nlike any I've ever experienced. I hope it is the worst one I ever go through. Folks back home, I guess, don't realize just how cold it gets over here. By the time this gets to you, whatever is supposed to happen will in fact already have happened or will be. I have no idea whee I'll be, or what I'll be doing when it goes down, but know this, I've been told to tell loved ones that I have good training and preparation for whatever the future holds. Are we infallable? No, I suppose not. So don't worry, what you can do is spend as much time as you can with Mom and Dad, because who knows when it'll be over, days or months. I almost got to play dental ssistant translator for an Iraqui eserter or Kuwaiti refugee who

showed up at a neighboring border outpost with a toothache, he saw a Dr. Cunningham, our senior medic, everyone sees him for their aches and pains, and I interpret for both.

We had a baby camel living out back in our goat pen, but a Bedouin racher came today and took it away. You've never heard an animal bawl as loudly and sadly as a baby camel crying for its mom. The mother must have died after coming here from Kuwait or Iraq.

(Jan. 4) How was Christmas on that side of the planet? Your brother is only 1,200 or so miles away from where Christmas began so many years ago. A few days prior to festival of the birth of the Messiah, I was sitting out under the stars around a brush fire built on the cold sand at 3 a.m., shivering in front of the fire with the smoke making my already sore eyes water, and I thought about the shepherds, not too different from their semetic cousins here with me. I went to bed at 6 a.m. and got up at 9 a.m. on Christmas day. Our battalion commander, chaplain, Det. commander and others came up to wish us a Merry Christmas and give us a news update. They sent up turkey, dressing, roast beef, salad, U.S. style bread. I chose no celebration or party, it would only make me think of home and make me sad. God bless.

Now Is The Time To Control Garden Soil Insects

Insects such as cutworms, white grubs and wireworms can destroy garden transplants, seeds or seedlings as they begin to grow, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Garden sites should be treated now to control these soil insects," said Dr. James Robinson. "It is important to treat the soil in advance of planting to allow the insecticide sufficient time to dissipate and work rior to planting.

"The primary insecticide used for soil treatment in gardens is diazinon," Robinson said. "It can be applied as a wettable powder, granules or liquid. Label directions should be closely followed for application rates. After application, the material should be incorporated three to six inches into

This application of insecticide should also help suppress fire ants in the garden site," Robinson said.

Discovering How Our **Blood Grows Old**

An apparent cause of aging in red blood cells, and perhaps in all body cells, has been traced to oxygenrelated compounds, a Texas A&M medical researcher has shown for the first time. The study also found that vitamin E deficiency causes premature aging in red blood cells. An increase in the amount of reactive, unpaired oxygen atoms and the effects of reaction-prone atoms that the increase creates have been singled out as one of the elements that trigger the aging process.







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Tax Credit Given For Care Expenses

Working taxpayers may qualify to claim a credit on their federal tax returns based on child or dependent care

Depending on the adjusted gross income, the credit could be as much as \$720 for one qualifying person of \$1,440 for two or more. To qualify for the credit: 1. The taxpayer, and spouse if married, must work or be looking for work, and 2. The qualify ing dependent must be your child un der age 13, disabled dependent or disabled spouse. There are some exceptions for students and disabled spouses.

To claim the credit, file your return on Form 1040 or Form 1040A. Married taxpayers must file a joint return. Remember, you must list the social security numbers for dependents that have reached 2 years of age, and the name address and social security number of your dependent care provider or be able to show that you tried to get the information.



Rep. Patterson To Chair House Committee

"The committee system is a real backbone of the legislative process in the House. And the system works because of the dedication and hard work that Rep. Patterson and all the othe rmembers devote to their committee assignments," the Speaker said.

Varieties Must Be Considered When Selecting Vegetables

One of the most important decisions when deciding which vegetables to plant in selecting the proper vari-

"Only varieties adapted to your climatic conditions and the soil in your garden should be considered," said Marty Baker, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extensin Service. "Various varieties have characteristics which allow them to produce better in some areas than in others."

Variety differences include things as tolerance to temperature, moisture requirements, size of fruit, flavor, resistance to insects and diseases, size of the plant and others. For example, if the gardener in East Texas wants a small tomato produced by a small plant, he should choose Basket King, Small Fry or Red Cherry. For a

largter, juicier tomato, he might choose Bettery Boy, Carnival, Celebrity or Floramerica.

Disease resistance is very critical in many areas. Many diseases persist in the soil and can destroy non-resistant varieties in a short time.

Baker says that another important consideration is temperature tolerance. Some varieties are developed to grow best during cool temperatures, while others may grow best in hot temperatures. This may allow the gardener to produce over a longer period of time by selecting vrieties of the same vegetable that grow at different temperatures.



Keeping Healthy

Early Education About Drugs and Alcohol

A three-step campaign to stem drinking and drug abuse in families is recommended to parents by Dr. G. D. Talbott of Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia.

Dr. Talbott stresses the need for parents to communicate with their children and to establish formal family discussion periods. Children should be educated about alcohol and drug abuse, he maintains, with parents demonstrating through their own actions that drinking and drugs are not necessary.

Dr. Taibott urges that the education start in grade school and observes that many youngsters experiment with these substances before they reach high school and by the time they have reached seventh and eighth grades.

As reported in a medical publication, the doctor conducted a study which found that television programs aired during prime time commonly show the use of drugs or alcohol and states that "there's no doubt that it has a tremendous impact on the new generation."





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

There is a lengthy list of the various types of proceeds that are not subject to income tax. The most common of these untaxed receipts are: . Gifts and inheritances

2. Certain disability benefits 3. Interest on state and local

4. Child support payments . Borrowed money 6. Death benefits

7. Benefits under the G.I. bill 8. Accident and health proceeds 9. Dividends on unmatured life

insurance policies 10. Combat pay.

This list is by no means exhaustive. These are the receipts on which people have a tendency to pay income taxes, where they have no obligation

Although gifts and inheritances are not subject to income taxes when transferred from onperson to another, they may be subject to a transfer tax. If there is a liability under the "gift tax or estate tax laws," the liability is on the transferor. This means that in most cases the money will have been taxed before you receive it. In no event is it subject to the income tax laws.

Even though you pay no "transfer taxes", you are subject to taxes on the earnings. If you invest any of the above non-taxable receipts, the income you earn from that investment is subject to the normal income tax laws.

If you have questions on the taxability of any transaction, it is worthwhile to seek professional advice.
