Of course, not all have that unlimited slave labor, the early Colonists went around major obstacles, instead of rolling over them. That means our roads are often winding.

Roads are often sunk deep into the soil, with high walls of earth on each side. That's simply because of all the generations of wheels that have worn away the earth.

Property lines have had their natural effect on things too, of course.

A cantankerous property holder might not allow people to pass over his land in the old days. That meant a road might take a job or jig that today doesn't seem to have any reason at all.

Roads and rivers are paths to somewhere...anywhere...everywhere.

Next time you are driving on one as you wind along think about what caused it to take its path.

Is this curve to avoid a property owner...or a hard hill, or a chasm, or just to take advantage of a view? It's a fascinating thing to speculate on.

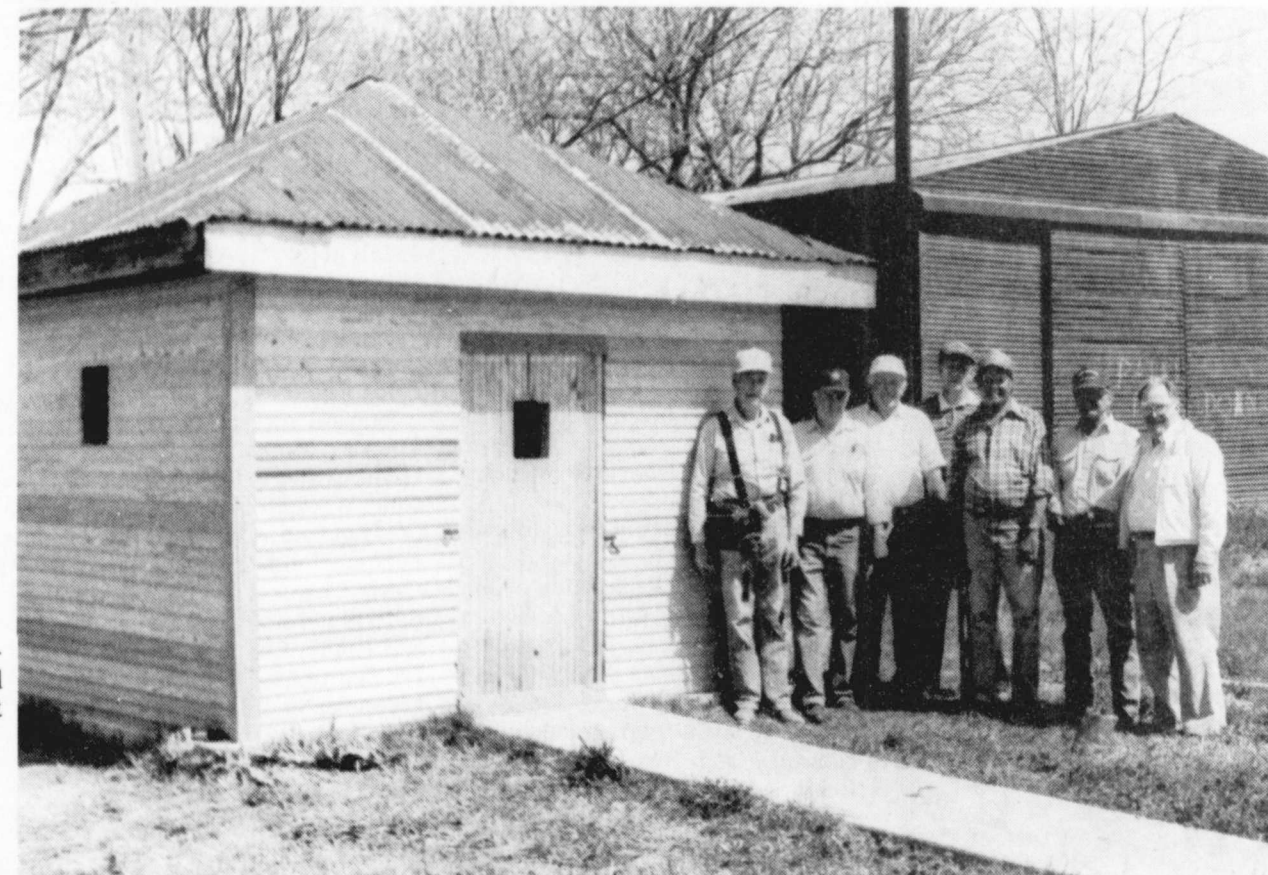
So, come one, come all, for a full time of fun.

Calaboose Is Ready For Use Well, Not Really, But It's Restored At Last!

After many, many man-hours and many dollars raised and donated by the Deport Community Service Club the old Deport Calaboose is finished. It has been moved and renovated, and sits at the end of Main Street.

The project was started in order to preserve and restore the historic structure, which was rotting away under a mass of brush and trees behind the city water tower. At one time the structure was completely covered in vines and barely visible as citizens and

Deport visitors passed it by. The Deport Community Service Club started the project with few funds, but lots of will and determination that the structure would be moved and restored to its original state as nearly as possible.

The late Gene Norwood of Norwood's Housing Moving helped the club relocate the heavy little building on a new concrete foundation, complete with a public walk way leading up to it.

Further help came from Hugh Jeffus Junior, who donated rough-cut 2x4 lumber to replace rotten sections of the wall.

The outside walls were covered with new siding last weekend. The siding was purchased from Paris Lumber Company at a reduced price in order that the club could finish the restoration.

Club members have used their own tools and man hours to work on the jail, which now has a new lease on life.

At the One-Act Play Contest at Tyler Lee High School, Miss Ballard was named to the All-Star Cast while Juli Chambers earned honorable mention.

Although there are no points awarded for the recognition, sophomore Danny Bradford was named the highest ranking contestant in the physics section of the science contest.

Worth, their four children and six grandchildren; a daughter, Melba and her husband Buddie of Lubbock and their four children, seven grandchildren and one late grandchild, Jimmy and a daughter Elaine and her husband, Roy of New Mexico and their four children and one grandchild; and a son, Clyde and wife Gerrie, and their three children.

Both are active members of the Abundant Life Church in Pattonville.

 IRAs-Your Investment In
 The Future

Are you looking for ways to reduce your income tax liability? Don't rule out a contribution to an individual retirement account (IRA). Even if your contribution is not deductible, earnings on your investment will be tax-deferred until the year they are withdrawn.

Subject to a maximum age requirement, anyone with net compensation may contribute to an IRA. Compensation includes wages, salaries, tips, bonuses, commissions and self-employed income, including partnership earnings of any active partner.

If neither you nor your spouse is covered by a pension plan at work, you can take a full IRA deduction for contributions of up to \$2,000 or 100% of compensation, whichever is less. You can also make a spousal contribution of up to \$250 for a nonworking spouse. If you are covered by a pension plan at work, you can still make a fully deductible IRA contribution if your income doesn't exceed \$25,000 (single individuals) or \$40,000 (married). Singles earning between \$25,000 and \$35,000 qualify for partial deductibility of an IRA, as do marrieds with income between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

The IRS Code places few restrictions on the nature of acceptable investments. Self-directed IRAs let owners call their own shots. Unlike other tax-deferred investments, switching investments within an IRA does not trigger a current tax. For example, when IRA money is invested in a brokerage account, the owner may make purchases and sales in much the same manner as through a regular brokerage account.

A final tip: Fund your IRA early in the year instead of on April 15th of the following year. You will get an additional fifteen months of tax-deferred earnings.

Locals Son In Kuwait City

Spec. Bradley O'Brien, son of Ruth and Stanley O'Brien of Garland, is currently stationed in Kuwait City.

O'Brien was among the first special forces of the Military Intelligence to arrive in Kuwait. A Green Beret, he is in his 7th month in the Middle East.

O'Brien's objective there is to help the prisoners who surrendered. He said he conversed with them in Arabic and assured them he meant no harm while guarding with his M16. They were elated to be taken and led in prayer by one of Brad's Saudi friends.

In a recent letter to his parents, O'Brien said that the skeletal remains of horses remain in the stable that they are currently headquartered in, and some were eaten by the enemy.

In an earlier letter to his parents, O'Brien stated that Saudi Arabia had

sustained a lot of damage and he missed artillery fire by 250 meters. He stated he was safe in a phone call on March 8 and would soon be coming to the States with the Special Forces. He is an Arabic/Syrian Linguist, but had been in training with Kuwaitis, Saudis, Egyptians, French, British and Czechs soldiers. He said that he had to wait for five hours to place a phone call.

Among his experiences were the friendship of a Kuwait father and his daughter, who gave them Kuwait money as a souvenir and a kiss for the American soldiers from his daughter. Despite the war, O'Brien says Kuwait City is still beautiful. The letter indicated he would be home soon if peace still prevails and the O'Briens are waiting to celebrate Christmas with Brad, with his Christmas decorations still intact and ready to be enjoyed.

After the Mizpah benediction, Mrs. Singleton served a refreshment plate.

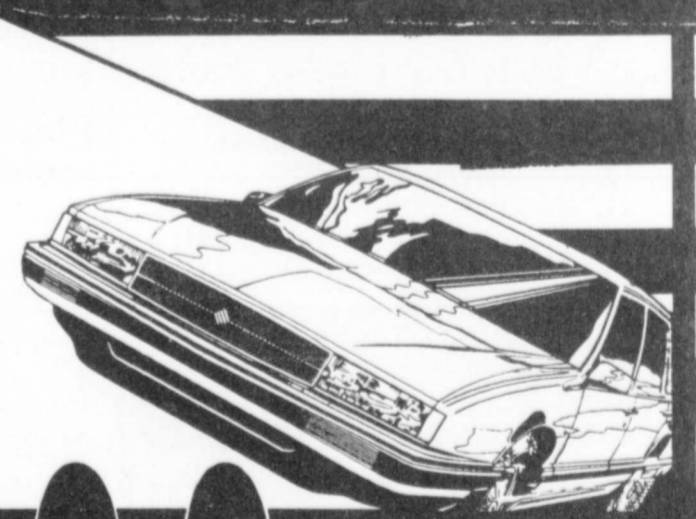
