Take A Look At Texas Taxes!

How does Texas stack up against other states on our taxes? Well, as might be expected, some of our taxes are pretty steep while others are rather low.

According to "Fiscal Notes" a publication put out by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts office, here are a few statistics.

On our state sales tax Texas' rate of 6.25 percent is substantially higher than the national average of about 4.9 percent.

There are 45 states with sales tax, only 5 states have a higher sales tax, and 38 have a rate that is lower. Nevada has the lowest rate, and Connecticut has the highest with 8.0 percent.

As to alcoholic beverage taxes, Texas rates pretty low.

Texas beer tax is at 19 cents. This is about average. Forty-nine states tax beer, 20 states have a higher tax,

27 have a lower tax. Hawaii has the highest beer tax at .89.

On liquor Texas excise are substantially below the national average.

Texas is 2.40 while only six states are lower than that, with Maryland being the lowest. Florida has the highest tax on this. Twenty five states of the 32 taxing have higher rates.

On wine Texas is one of the nation's lowest rate at 20 cents per gallon.

Forty-six states tax wine, and 42 have a higher rate than Texas. Only 2 have a lower rate, and one has the same rate. Florida has the highest rate at 2.25 per gallon and Louisiana has only an 11 cent rate.

Cigarette Taxes are extremely high compared to other states, ranking third in the nation.

All fifty states tax cigarettes, with only 2 states having a higher rate than

Texas. Texas has a .41 per pack rate. Forty-seven states are lower than Texas with North Carolina having the lowest rate.

Gasoline taxes in Texas are fairly low. All fifty states tax it, with 35 having a higher rate. Rhode Island is the highest at .26. Texas rate is .15.

Motor vehicle taxes are the fifty highest in the nation.

Connecticut has the highest at 8.0 and Texas' is 6.0. The lowest is North Carolina has the lowest at 2.0.

Combined State and Local Sales Taxes? Well, Texas has a very high rate. In fact, it is the third highest in the nation, with Louisiana having the highest at 9.0. Texas isn't far behind with a 8.25 rate. Hawaii and Michigan have the lowest at 4.0.

Thunder Prairie Adopts New Rules On Billing For Small Ads

Beginning immediately Thunder Prairie Publishing, publishers of The Bogata News, The Blossom Times, The Deport Times and the Talco Times will no longer bill for an ad that costs less than \$6.

"It costs us \$1 every time we mail out a statement" publisher Nanalee Nichols says, "this means that for a \$3.50 garage sale ad we've already used up \$1 just from billing, and that doesn't count the employee time setting and placing it on the page, nor it's

space in the papers.

She expresses her hopes that people will understand this move.

Mini ads, small ads and word ads such as cards of thanks or garage sale ads must be paid for at the time of insertion.

Regular customers who run ads like mini ads every week of the month will still be billed as they have in the past.

"We value our customers, each and every one of them, but it just isn't

good business to keep on sending bills this way" Nichols reports.

In addition, we are going to put an additional \$1 on bills that remain unpaid for over a month to help cover the cost of rebilling.

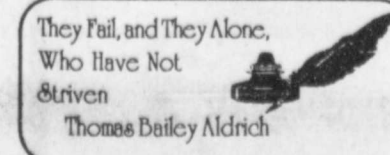

Prairiland Ag To Have Canola Growing Program

The Prairiland Agriculture Department is holding a meeting on Tuesday, September 10, at 7:00 a.m. for any area farmer interested in growing Canola. The presenter will be Phil McClendon of Cargill Seeds, and the meeting will be held at the Ag Department at Prairiland high school.

Canola is a new crop in the United States that offers new hope to wheat growers.

It is used primarily for oil, and Procter and Gamble have switched their "Puritan" cooking oil from a blend of soybean/sunflower to 100% higher quality Canola.

They are changing "Crisco" to a blend of Canola/sunflower/soybean

oil. Other food producers such as Kraft, Hunt, Wesson, Frito-Lay and many more are making similar changes.

Right now Canola is primarily being imported from Canada and Europe.

It has a lower saturated fat content, such as 6% as compared to 13% for corn, 15% for soybean and 27% for cotton and 51% for palm.

Wheat prices are extremely low, and Canola is in demand and the 1990-95 Farm Bill has several new provisions which favor Canola.

Cocunut Cake

1 Golden Butter cake mix (add 1/2 cup oil)
Cook in sheath pan as directed.

Icing:
1-12 oz. Cool Whip
1 8 oz. Sour cream
2 cups sugar
1 large can coconut (1/2 in icing and 1/2 on top)
Refrigerate

Brownies
2/3 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
6 tsp. cocoa
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup nuts
4 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla, beat well. Add cocoa and dry ingredients. Stir in nuts. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes.

Steak Strips
Cut 1 1/2 lbs. round steak into strips. Place meat in dry electric skillet on 400. Brown, then remove, but leave fat-mix 1 tbsp. flour well. Put meat in again, turn heat down to 300. Cut up 1 onion and 1 green pepper. Mix together:
3 tsp. soy sauce
1/2 cup catsup
1/2 cup water
1 tsp. black pepper

Pour over steak, cook on low (100) for 10 minutes, then simmer til steak is tender. Serve over rice. Serves 4.

Enchiladas
2 lbs. ground meat (browned)
1 lb. American cheese (grated)
2 pkgs. tortillas
2 onions (chopped)

Roll meat, cheese and onion in tortillas and place in pan. Dip tortillas in grease to soften before filling.

Sauce:
3 cups boiling water
1 tsp. garlic
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. oregano
3 tsp. chili powder
2 heaping tps. flour mixed with enough cold water to make a runny paste
1 can chili

Mix all ingredients and heat until chili melts, pour over enchiladas. Heat in oven 30-45 minutes or until hot. Can sprinkle extra grated cheese on top before heating.

Quick Bread
2 pkgs. yeast
6 tps. sugar
1 1/2 cup warm water
4 tps. oil
1 tsp. salt
4 cups flour, more if needed to make stiff

Dissolve yeast and sugar in warm water. Add other ingredients and mix well. Let rise til double before baking. Put pan on oven door to speed up rising. Bake at 400 til brown.

Scratch Cornbread
2 cups white cornmeal
2 tps. flour
2 tps. sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
2 eggs
2 cups buttermilk

Mix all dry ingredients and add buttermilk and eggs, mix well. Put about 12 tps. meat grease in 9" iron skillet and heat til hot. Pour 3 or 4 tps. into batter and stir well. Put 1 to 2 tps. cornmeal into remaining grease and brown before pouring batter into skillet. Cook in preheated 400 oven for 30 minutes or til brown.

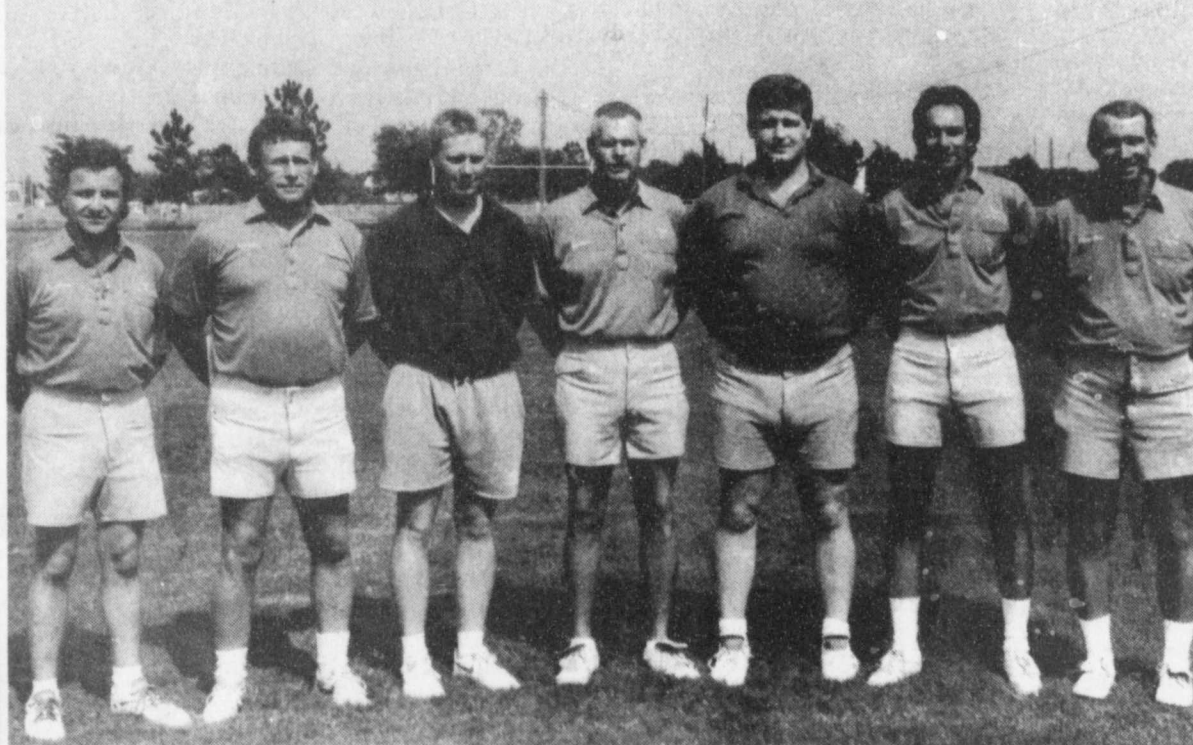

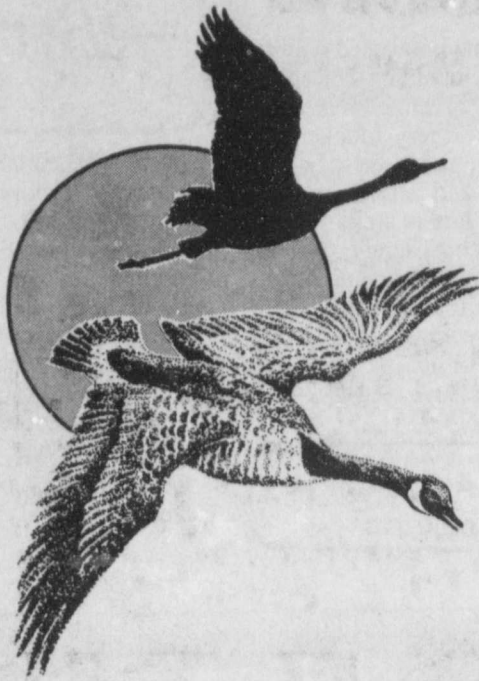

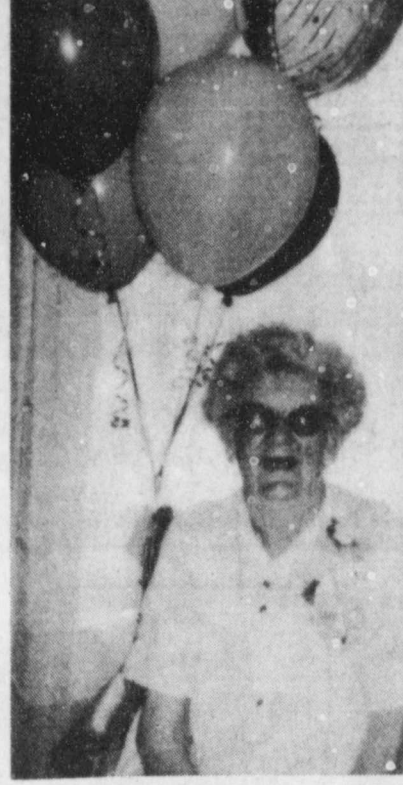
