We received our Christmas gifts from England last week.

Included was a small card for my parents, addressed to my mother and "Daddy Hugh".

The reason for this is that our British friends thought grown people calling their father "Daddy" was quaint, sweet and quite unusual! Soon they were calling him daddy too, even though they are about the same age as he is!

All of this set me to thinking about the different terms we use for our parents. They tend to be quite regional.

Around here most children refer to their mother as "Mama" and their father as "Daddy" or "Dad". We have a friend who was horrified to hear her nieces and nephews (who had been living up north for years) refer to their maternal parent as "Mother" instead of Mom or Mama.

In much of the U.S. mothers are "Mommy".

In the southern portion fathers are "Pop" or "Papa" as well as "Dad" or "Daddy".

In areas which have had some French or Italian influence children call for their "Pa Pah" with the emphasis on the last "Pah".

Of course, "Paw" isn't that unusual in the western portion of the United States, even today.

"Pappy" has, for the most part, been relegated to movie about hill billys.

In England one hears youngsters in the streets of London, or the narrow ways of a small village calling to their "Mum". But, in the tradition of a father figure that is a sterner disciplinarian than his American counterpart, Father is just that. "Father", seldom "Daddy" although sometimes "Dad".

Sometimes "Mummy" becomes a term of endearment.

Here in North-East Texas any child can count on knowing they are deep trouble when they hear "your Father will talk to you when he gets home" or "What did your Mother tell you".

Those two terms, reserved for "being in the dog house" can be said with extreme emphasis. Coupled with the use of a child's full name (including the dreaded middle name) almost any kid knows that they have overstepped the bounds of good sense.

But it really doesn't matter whether it's "Pop" or "Dad", "Mom" or "Mama"...it's the thought that counts.

And those abbreviations of the rather formal "Mother" and "Father" may well be the sweetest words any parent ever hears!

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

During my visit in Deport on November 6, I picked up a week old edition of your Deport Times. I would like to respond to Phebe Allen's "Letter to the Editor", which peaked my interest.

First, I am simply "on edge" concerning Phebe's request that her flag be returned. My curiosity has spawned this letter, and I would appreciate knowing if she got her flag back.

Second, I felt that Phebe might be interested in the charade that Congress went through in its masquerade in connection with a supposed Constitutional Amendment to protect our flag from desecration.

In the first place, their action wrongfully insinuated that the Constitution is deficient. It is not. Article III, Section 2, paragraph 2 gives Congress the authority to deny jurisdiction to the Supreme Court. On the flag burnign issue, Congress only needed to inform the Court that it shall have nothing to say on the issue of flag desecration. Then the state law against such action would stand.

Right now, there is a silent revolution going on in American under the pretense that the Constitution is somehow deficient and must be amended. What is badly in need of

## Rebates Running \$123 Million Ahead

"Local sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties are running \$123 million or 10.6% ahead of total payments this time last year," State Comptroller John Sharp said recently. "That's real money that's going into city and county treasuries for vital services to local residents," Sharp said.

This month's rebates to 1,065 Texas cities totaled \$137.2 million for a year to date total of \$1.2 billion, compared to 1990's year to date total of \$1.1 billion, or a 10% increase.

Payments to counties are up in part this year because five more counties have started collecting the sales tax

since this time last year, and one additional county has raised its sales tax rate since last November.

Locally, Blossom received \$3,422.76 for a 16.42% increase.

Deport received \$2,897.00 for this period for a 1.06% increase.

Paris received \$257,681.54 for a 3.66% decrease.

Mt. Pleasant received \$138,213.43 for an 11.55% increase.

Talco received \$2,533.07 for a 4.67% increase in payments to date for 1991.

Bogata received \$4,458.86 for a 12.04% increase.

Clarksville received \$22,646.27 for

a 2.18% increase.

Houston received the largest check of \$23.4 million as its November rebate. Dallas received the state's second largest payment, almost \$13 million, for a 1991 total of \$113 million. San Antonio received the third largest payment, \$7.4 million.

This month's payments include taxes collected on September sales and reported in October by businesses filing monthly returns. November's rebates also include taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in July, August and September.

## Lady Pats Finish Season As Region II Finalists

The Lady Patriots' volleyball team ended their successful season at the Regional Tournament in Commerce Saturday evening. Four teams attended the tournament, but only one left on top. The Patriots defeated Frisco 15-5 in the first game, 15-7 in the second. This put the Patriots in the tournament finals.

In the first game, the Lady Patriots shot out of the gate quickly, building a 7-1 lead forcing a Frisco Lady Raccoon time out. When play resumed, aggressive net play by Patriots Laura Hayes and Jan Scudder rapidly ended the first game 15-5.

Game two began much like the first with Prairiland jumping out to a 11-4 lead. Saving assists by Holley Kent and killer spikes by Scudder and Hayes finished Frisco 15-7.

A few hours later, the Patriots went head to head with the #1 ranked Springtown Lady Porcupines. The Lady Pats struggled to keep up with

the almost error-free Porcupines.

Springtown opened with a lead, but the Pats fought back tying the score at 4 apiece. The score would be tied at 7-7 before the Pats got their first lead at 8-7, coming off a block by Hayes and Katie Mowery. Coach Frankye Sessums called a time out when Springtown reclaimed the lead at 10-9, but the momentum was lost and the Porcupines served their way to a 15-9 victory.

In game two, Springtown built a quick 5-0 lead, but Scudder led a comeback attempt for a 7-2 score. A Melissa Miller smash and a Scudder block brought the Prairiland fans to their feet in renewed anticipation of a turn-around at 14-7.

But Prairiland scored no more, as the Lady Porcupines scored eight unanswered points, to win the match 15-4. The Lady Patriots finished very good as Region II finalists, and had a fine 24-7 record.

## Kathy Stout Helps In Search For Missing Man

Kathy Stout, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L.C. Stout, as been part of the dog-human search team that has been searching for an eighty-year old Annona man.

The first time the search and rescue team of handlers and dogs was called in was shortly after the man was missing. The dogs and handlers, along with nearly a hundred other people, searched for the missing man. Bitter cold and heavy rains hampered the search.

Sunday, November 17, the Dallas area based search and rescue team was back.

This time, Kathy says "The dogs alerted real strong on an area of heavily silted creek". While this does not by any means guarantee the man's body is there, Stout says it does mean there is something there.

"People are constantly astonished at how strong these animal's sense of

smell is" she states. She says that last summer on a lake the dogs alerted so excitedly that one actually jumped out of the boat into the water, swimming in circles and barking. The team dropped a buoy and scuba divers followed the line on the buoy down. What they found was a stolen car...abandoned there for over 10 years!

The dog's sense of smell was so incredible that it had picked up the scents coming from the vehicle even after so long a time.

Kathy Stout spends many hours with her dog, Meg, training and honing rescue and search skills.

The teams go all over the state helping to locate lost or missing persons, or, less rewarding but still important, the bodies of accident victims, crime victims or whatever need might arise.

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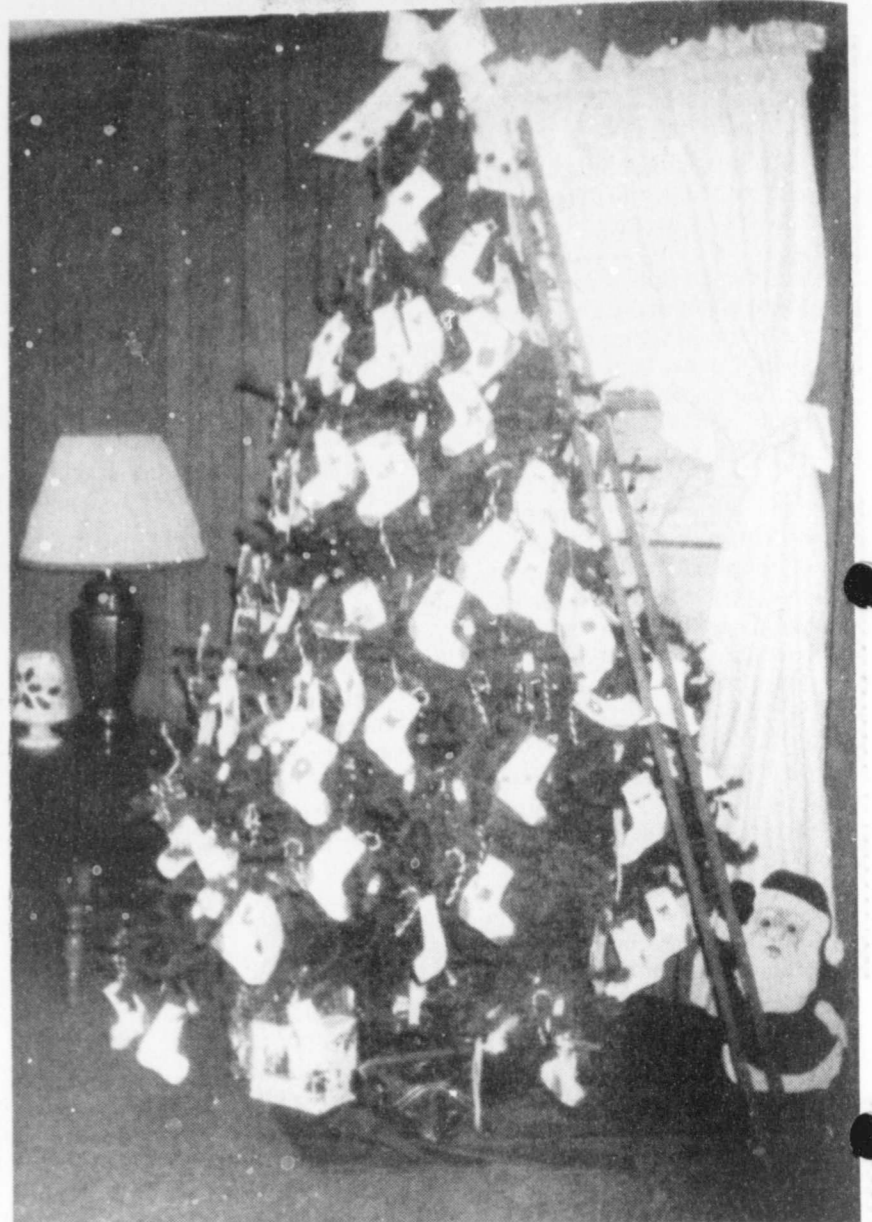

CITY OF DEPORT, P.O. Box A-354, Deport, Texas 75435 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10741-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 183,000 gallons per day. The wastewater treatment facilities are on the south side of Farm-to-Market Road 1503, approximately one mile south of the intersection of U.S. Highway 271 and Farm-to-Market Road 1503 in Lamar County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Mustang Creek; thence into Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of Mustang Creek have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic habitat. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing in stream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of a person making the request; (2) the statement "...request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing.
