gifts from England last week. Included was a small card for my parents, addressed to my mother and "Daddy Hugh".

The reason for this is that our British friends thought grown people calling their father "Daddy" was quaint, sweet and quite unusual! Soon they were calling him daddy too, even though they are about the same age as he is!

All of this set me to thinking about the different terms we use for our parents. They tend to be quite regional.

Around here most children refer to their mother as "Mama" and their father as "Daddy" or "Dad". We have a friend who was horrified to hear her nieces and nephews (who had been living up north for years) refer to their maternal parent as "Mother" instead of Mom or Mama.

In much of the U.S. mothers

are "Mommy". In the southern portion fathers are "Pop" or "Papa" as well as

"Dad" or "Daddy' In areas which have had some French or Italian influence children call for their "Pa Pah" with

the imphasis on the last "Pah". Of course, "Paw" isn't that unusual in the western portion of

the United States, even today. "Pappy" has, for the most part, been relagated to moview about

hill billys. In England one hears young-

sters in the streets of London, or the narrow ways of a small village calling to their "Mum". But, in the traiditon of a father figure that is a sterner disciplinarian than his American counterpart, Father is just that.. "Father", seldom "Daddy" although somtimes "Dad".

Sometimes "Mummy" becomes a term of endearment.

Here in North-East Texas any child can count on knowing they are deep trouble when they hear "your Father will talk to you when he gets home"..or "What did your Mother tell you".

Those two terms, reserved for "being in the dog house" can be said with extreme emphasis. Coupled with the use of a child's full name (including the dreaded middle name) almost any kid knows that they have overstepped the bounds of good sense.

But it really doesn't matter whether is "Pop" or "Dad", "Mom" or "Mama"...it's the thought that counts.

And those abbreviations of the rather formal "Mother" and "Father" may well be the sweetest words any parent ever hears!



The wastewater treatment facilities are on the south side of Farm-to-Market Road 1503, approximately one mile south of the ntersection of U.S. Highway 271 and Farm-to-Market Road 1503 in Lamar County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Mustang Creek; thence into Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. 

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
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
