Volunteers Experience Life As "Big City " Firemen What's it like to be a firefighter in dollars worth of budget annually. a large city? What is it like to eat, sleep, cook, clean and care for equipment twenty-four hours out of a day? What kind of calls does a big city fire department answer?

Over the past weekend, six Deport volunteer firemen experienced these things.

Jim Short, Eric Pearson, Barry Matthews, Charles Langston, Jeff Smith and Billy Smith, all members of the Deport Fire Department reported to Central Fire Station in Plano last Friday evening.

Captain Rodger Smith assigned the six firemen to three of Plano's seven fire stations.

The PlanoFire Department dates back some 120 years. Today the department consists of 7 stations and is in the process of building three more stations. It is made up of 156 firemen, with six chiefs, fifty paramedics and operates on seven million

Plano Fire Department serves a population of 126,000. They respond to all types of medical emergencies as well as fire calls.

They have been helped in their development by H. Ross Perot. The fire units are equipped with on-board computers, rescue equipment and up to date medical equipment.

Deport's assistant drill master Eric Pearson set the training session up with Plano's chief of operations, Kirk Owens earlier in the year.

The Deport men were on duty around the clock from Friday until Sunday morning.

Jim Short and Jeff Smith were assigned to station number 2, which was a Hazardous Material Unit. Short reported that while on duty his unit responded to a victim of an overdose, a pregnant worman with birthing complications and a bomb explosion that resulted ina toxic material clean

up operation and a structural fire. While on these calls the pair helped with all duties, taking vital signs of victims, holding IV bags during administration, and generally being usefull in any capacity.

Eric Pearson and Charles Langston were assigned to central station. They received a tour of the seven stations and made some medical calls, a wreck call, fire calls and spent time working in radio dispatch.

Pearson reported serving on engines and a \$460,000 ladder truck. Part of the ladder truck exercise was climbing a 105 foot ladder.

All of the firemen were well received and invited repeatedly to come back



One of the burdens of being in the newspaper business is the sad, sure knowledge that we sometimes must run news and photos that are painful to people. The victims of fires where everything is lost, the family of those killed in auto wrecks and accidents surely find the accounts painful. Those who know us can attest to the fact that we try very hard to keep the pain to a minimum. We have passed up many prize-winning shots because we felt they were an invasion of someone's privacy.

However, in this incidence we plead totally unaware that there was a problem.

It is the policy of this paper to run the fire department's activities whether it be a training session or an emergency. We had absolutely no way of knowing that Mrs. Gifford was just out of the hospital, or that she was apparently unaware that her house has been in the process of being torn down for some time. We did not refer to the house as "trash". We had run ads advertising the fact that the contents of the house were for sale previously.

We certainly did not intend any cruelty to Mrs. Gifford, and indeed I have fond memories of her and her house, since it was across the street from my grandmother's home and there was quite a bit of visiting.

We are very sorry that Ms. Hignight read "cruelty" into a picture which was simply a report of the volunteer fire department's ongoing efforts to be prepared for fire fighting, and a record of the changes taking place within our community.

Glenda's career consists of being a loan officer at the First National Bank of Deport and Burl Dean is self-employed. Hobbies of Burl Dean's are watching sports on television, hunting and fishing. Glenda's hobbies are cooking, hunting, fishing, sewing, making crafts and yard work.

While living in Houston, hunting was an all time sport. They hunted in many counties and belonged to several different leases. Burl Dean was th eorganizer of many big hunts all over the area, one in particular, where Glenda was the only woman who was a paid lease member and each year she always killed her quota during the first two weeks of the season. This didn't go over well with the rest of the men. She always harassed them about it and her motto was "I take one bullet with me when I go hunting." It only takes one to get him and that's what I do. This always poured more gas on the fire, but all in all, they enjoyed it. Glenda and Burl Dean have lots of mounted deer but have killed many they did not mount. Burl Dean made great hunters out of daughter Susie and Ronald also. day she could become a mother. They have all hunted together as a family since 1975 and enjoy the sport very much. The largest deer Glenda ever killed was a 9-point and dressed out at 160 pounds. Burl Dean's largest was a 12-point and dressed out at 180 pounds. They stated that deer grow larger in South Texas than they do here.

Lots of deer meat is cooked at their house. They cook what they kill. Killing deer for the fun of killing is not an enjoyment. They nver waste any of the meat. The secret to keep deer meat from tasting wild is what you do once you kill it. You must skin it immediately, do not wait three or four hours. Skinning one first elimi-nates the possibility of any hair getting on the meat. Gut it, cut it up, wash it as soon as possible an refrigerate it and always keep the meat refrigerated until you can process it. Also, keep it wrapped tightly so air cannot get to it.

Notice each recipe has the way to cut the meat. This is also a secret to tenderness. Always allow the meat to marinate in the refrigerator to savor it's best flavor. If you prepare and cook venison correctly, it is almost impossible to tell it from beef. When Glenda started this sport, she decided she would learn everything she could about how to make it taste great, and she has. All the recipes shared this week have been used by Glenda and Burl Dean from 3 to 15 years. They both share with th cooking. Burl Dean does not admit to liking it very much, but I have seen his results of a delicious meal.



# AIDS----A Killer Loose In Our Community

that he is abandoning his multimillion-dollar basketball career because he had tested "HIV Positive"--the condition that leads to AIDS--shocked us all. It made it harder than ever for people in our community to regard AIDS as somebody else's problem.

**IT'S HERE** 

AIDS is a clear and present problem in Blossom, Deport, Bogata and Talco and in the countryside and communities around them. Friends neighbors have died of AIDS, others are infected and will die. Nationwide, about one person in 200 tests "HIV Positive", and there is no reason to believe our communities are privileged. In fact, the authorities tell us that in Lamar, Red River and Titus counties, there are more known victims per capita than have been reported for the United States as a whole.

This newspaper has consulted public health officials, medical professionals, clergy, and published sources to find out some of the things people in our community should know. What we have learned is cause for alarm, but not for panic--AIDS, like a rattlesnake, probably won't threaten you unless you venture where rks.

THE NATURE OF THE THREAT AIDS, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, is an invariably fatal disease. People get it from absorbing the body fluids of individuals already infected, most commonly through sexual activity. Intravenous drug users who share unclean needles are also highly at risk.

Blood transfusions are no longer dangerous, as tough tests establish the purity of blood or plasma used. Doctors and dentists, and other health care personnel now follow strict procedures to avoid contracting the disease or passing it to their patients. It is not contracted through non-sexual physical contact or association with infected persons, even if close and prolonged.

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One special characteristic of AIDS makes it uniquely difficult to control. Unlike other socially transmissible

Magic Johnson's announcement diseases, it may be years before The most important single fact is that symptoms appear in individuals who are already highly infectious. And even an infected and infectious person may not test "positive" immediately. Individuals testing "negative" are often advised to be retested after a period of several months, during which time the infection may become detectable.

Children and young adults with their natural tendency to think "it can't happen to me" and "I'll life forever" do not have the example of dying classmates to bring home the threat. Classmates who are already infected, already doomed, may not become actively ill until well after their school days are over. SIMILAR THREATS

One of the authorities we consulted emphasized that AIDS is not the only "sexually transmitted disease" (older people may still call them "venereal" diseases) that now threaten our society. Syphilis, certain forms of hepatitis, and other diseases spread through sexual conduct are on the rise, in epidemic proportions in our area. They, too, can kill, and infection with these diseases leaves the door open for AIDS.

ANYONE CAN GET IT

As recently as eight years ago, AIDS was regarded as primarily a disease of homosexuals and drug users. Today, about 80% of new cases of HIV positive are heterosexuals. authorities say. Clearly, all sexually active individuals are risk, whatever their orientation. All races and sexually active people of every age group are equally menaced and victimized. AIDS is an equal opportunity killer.

In our area, victims who are a threat to their sexual partners are found among both children and adults of every age. All ages, even the eld-erly, have tested "HIV positive" in our community. Students in every high school in our area have tested HIV-positive, and even younger children are at risk.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

This report is being published because authorities have convinced us that Step One is "Learn the Facts".

there is no such thing in this world as totally "Safe Sex" except between strictly monogamous partners who have had sex only with each other.

For everybody else, information about reducing risks is widely available; public libraries in Paris, Clarksville and Mt. Pleasant have materials that can be checked out or read on the premises. Our public schools have educational programs (of widely varying depth) for teachers and/or students. Individuals wanting more personal advice may telephone the Health Department in Paris at 903/785-4561 or the Ark-Tex COG Aids Education Project at 903/632-4521, a Bogata number, or 903/832-8636, a Texarkana number. Advice from any of these sources is free and strictly confidential. Tests, like all medical procedures, are also kept strictly confidential. Individuals, schools and other groups will be served.

Authorities all urge that parents discuss the threat with their children and make information about avoiding the disease available to them. While parents understandably prefer to think their own children are not at risk, they need to think hard about the consequences of being wrong. Parents who think "kids know everything about sex these days" are only half right: kids know things their parents learned later in life, but unwanted pregnancies and AIDS infections are evidence that school children also have a great deal of misinformation.

School instruction programs have made a contribution. Authorities tell us that one of the best ways to bring reliable information to children is through other children. Children who are required to write research papers about AIDS not only inform themselves, but may also be trusted teachers to their schoolmates.

You, our readers, have already taken a positive step by reading this article. You may wish to consider bringing it to the attention of others--including your children. You could save lives.



#### **Detached Retina**

If diagnosed early, small tears in the retina can be repaired with lasers, preventing further tearing and the retina's eventual complete detachment

Laser treatment for retinal tears is painless, bloodless, safe, and successful, and does not require hospitalization. It has become a standard method of eye surgery.

Retinal tears are heralded by all or some of three classic symptoms: floating spots, flashing lights, and an expanding curtain appearing across the field of vision.

If a tear is not repaired at an early stage, the vitreous may seep through the tear and bubble the retina off the inner wall of the eye, much like wallpaper can bubble off a wall.

It is important to treat retinal detachment before it involves the macula, the center of the retina which is largely responsible for detailed vision. The longer the macula is detached, the greater the residual loss of vision even after the retina has been repaired.






