

AIDS---A Killer Loose In Our Community

Magic Johnson's announcement that he is abandoning his multimillion-dollar basketball career because he had tested "HIV Positive"--the condition that leads to AIDS--shocked us all. It made it harder than ever for people in our community to regard AIDS as somebody else's problem.

IT'S HERE
AIDS is a clear and present problem in Blossom, Deport, Bogata and Talco and in the countryside and communities around them. Friends and neighbors have died of AIDS, others are infected and will die. Nationwide, about one person in 200 tests "HIV Positive", and there is no reason to believe our communities are privileged. In fact, the authorities tell us that in Lamar, Red River and Titus counties, there are more known victims per capita than have been reported for the United States as a whole.

This newspaper has consulted public health officials, medical professionals, clergy, and published sources to find out some of the things people in our community should know. What we have learned is cause for alarm, but not for panic--AIDS, like a rattlesnake, probably won't threaten you unless you venture where it strikes.

THE NATURE OF THE THREAT
AIDS, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, is an invariably fatal disease. People get it from absorbing the body fluids of individuals already infected, most commonly through sexual activity. Intravenous drug users who share unclean needles are also highly at risk.

Blood transfusions are no longer dangerous, as tough tests establish the purity of blood or plasma used. Doctors and dentists, and other health care personnel now follow strict procedures to avoid contracting the disease or passing it to their patients. It is not contracted through non-sexual physical contact or association with infected persons, even if close and prolonged.

One special characteristic of AIDS makes it uniquely difficult to control. Unlike other socially transmissible

diseases, it may be years before symptoms appear in individuals who are already highly infectious. And even an infected and infectious person may not test "positive" immediately. Individuals testing "negative" are often advised to be retested after a period of several months, during which time the infection may become detectable.

Children and young adults with their natural tendency to think "it can't happen to me" and "I'll live forever" do not have the example of dying classmates to bring home the threat. Classmates who are already infected, already doomed, may not become actively ill until well after their school days are over.

SIMILAR THREATS
One of the authorities we consulted emphasized that AIDS is not the only "sexually transmitted disease" (older people may still call them "venereal" diseases) that now threaten our society. Syphilis, certain forms of hepatitis, and other diseases spread through sexual conduct are on the rise, in epidemic proportions in our area. They, too, can kill, and infection with these diseases leaves the door open for AIDS.

ANYONE CAN GET IT
As recently as eight years ago, AIDS was regarded as primarily a disease of homosexuals and drug users. Today, about 80% of new cases of HIV positive are heterosexuals, authorities say. Clearly, all sexually active individuals are risk, whatever their orientation. All races and sexually active people of every age group are equally menaced and victimized. AIDS is an equal opportunity killer.

In our area, victims who are a threat to their sexual partners are found among both children and adults of every age. All ages, even the elderly, have tested "HIV positive" in our community. Students in every high school in our area have tested HIV-positive, and even younger children are at risk.

WHAT YOU CAN DO
This report is being published because authorities have convinced us that Step One is "Learn the Facts"

The most important single fact is that there is no such thing in this world as totally "Safe Sex" except between strictly monogamous partners who have had sex only with each other.

For everybody else, information about reducing risks is widely available; public libraries in Paris, Clarksville and Mt. Pleasant have materials that can be checked out or read on the premises. Our public schools have educational programs (of widely varying depth) for teachers and/or students. Individuals wanting more personal advice may telephone the Health Department in Paris at 903/785-4561 or the Ark-Tex COG Aids Education Project at 903/632-4521, a Bogata number, or 903/832-8636, a Texarkana number. Advice from any of these sources is free and strictly confidential. Tests, like all medical procedures, are also kept strictly confidential. Individuals, schools and other groups will be served.

Authorities all urge that parents discuss the threat with their children and make information about avoiding the disease available to them. While parents understandably prefer to think their own children are not at risk, they need to think hard about the consequences of being wrong. Parents who think "kids know everything about sex these days" are only half right: kids know things their parents learned later in life, but unwanted pregnancies and AIDS infections are evidence that school children also have a great deal of misinformation.

School instruction programs have made a contribution. Authorities tell us that one of the best ways to bring reliable information to children is through other children. Children who are required to write research papers about AIDS not only inform themselves, but may also be trusted teachers to their schoolmates.

You, our readers, have already taken a positive step by reading this article. You may wish to consider bringing it to the attention of others--including your children. You could save lives.

Pats Play Roxton, Rivercrest

With only one day of preparation, the Lady Patriots put Roxton away, 46-32.

To start the game, both teams kept the score close until Katie Mowery's free throws put Prairiland up by two, 8-6. Then at the end of the first quarter, Janee Jackson nailed a three pointer to increase their lead to 13-8.

The second quarter started slowly, with two and one-half minutes expiring before either team scored. Finally, Jan Scudder and Katie Mowery combined their efforts to increase the score 19-10 at the half.

Maketa Sims took charge and helped Roxton score after the half with six crucial points leaving them only down by three. Scudder, Hayes and Mowery added money to the bank to increase the score to 25-20. Cathy Sugg entered the game and scored four quick points inside ending the quarter 29-20. The fourth quarter was dominated by strong Lady Patriots bench play, and the game ended 46-32.

The Lady Pats limited practicing time caught up with them Friday night at Rivercrest. The Patriots were defeated 58-41.

Soon after the tip, Jan Scudder knocked down six quick points to hang close to the intense offense ran by the Lady Rebels. At the end of the quarter, the Lady Rebels scored a dozen, the Pats only half that.

As play resumed, Scudder attacked the goal for three points. Further into

the contest, Melissa Miller and Dana Monday added to the team's tally, but the Pats still trailed at the half 27-15.

In the second half, the Pats lack of practice, due to their volleyball play-offs, showed greatly as the Lady Rebels kept up their intense offensive strategy. The Pats couldn't close the scoring gap and finished the fourth quarter with only 41 points. The Lady Rebels led with 58.

The nightcap found the Patriots boys matched with the scrappy defense of the Roxton Lions to play to a 10-10 tie, with 1:57 left in the first quarter. Wesley Rhoades and Justin Gordon spearheaded a mini-run to end the quarter 16-12, Patriots.

The Lions picked up the tempo and used an eight point run to open up a 30-24 Lion halftime lead. The third quarter saw more of the same with the quicker Roxton squad widening the lead to 53-36 at the end of the third stanza.

The Pats came to life as the last quarter began with wingman Toby Dockray hitting 7 straight points, closing the score to 55-45. A Rhoades bank off the glass and a Jimmy Little jumper brought the Pats to within six at 55-49. But time was running out and the Pats were forced to foul to get the ball. Roxton converted at the line, and the final score was 61-56, Lions. Wesley Rhoades led the Pats scoring with 21, followed by Little's 11 and

Dockray's 8.

In the boys contest, the Rebels opened a quick 7-2 lead featuring their 6'7" and 6'5" post men teaming for some strong board play. But the Pats fought back with Swede Ladd converting a three pointer and Wesley Rhoades canning a duce to tie at 7-7. Jimmy Little's jumper gave the Pats their first lead at 8-7, but the Rebels hit three buckets to close the quarter, 17-11.

Rivercrest continued drawing fouls underneath, and forcing the ball inside. The halftime buzzer found the Pats on the short end, 29-21. Teal Rebels superior height advantage continued to be a factor, and coupled with fine outside shooting the score was 43-29 with 1:55 left in the third quarter. But the Pats clawed back and Ladd hit another three pointer closing the third quarter 47-36, Rebels. The fourth quarter opened with a David Singleton 8 foot jumper, followed by a Rhoades bank shot and brought the Pats to 47-40. Despite spirited play the Pats would get no closer and a technical foul against the Patriots gave the Rebels a 53-44 advantage and the ball with 4:50 left. The stall began and the Patriots were forced to foul to get the ball. Rivercrest converted from the charity stripe and came away with a 64-55 win. Cody Bowen led the Patriots with 15 points, Ladd had 13 and Singleton had 9.

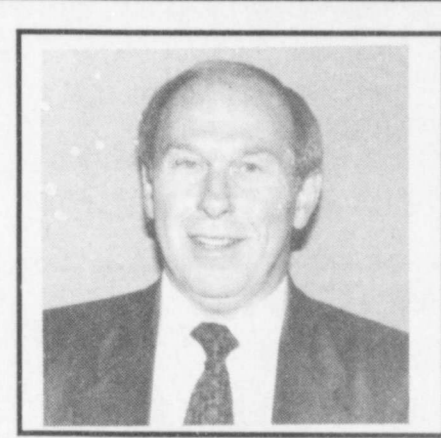

WESLEY RHOADES shoots for two points as the Prairiland Patriots scrapped to a 10-10 tie

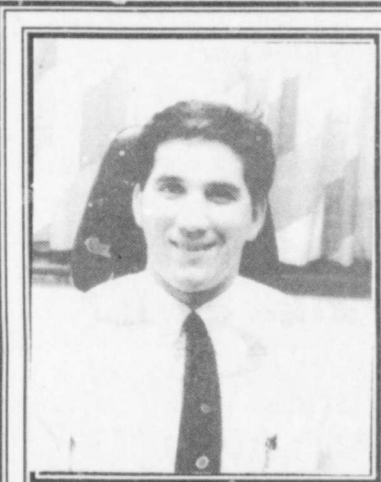

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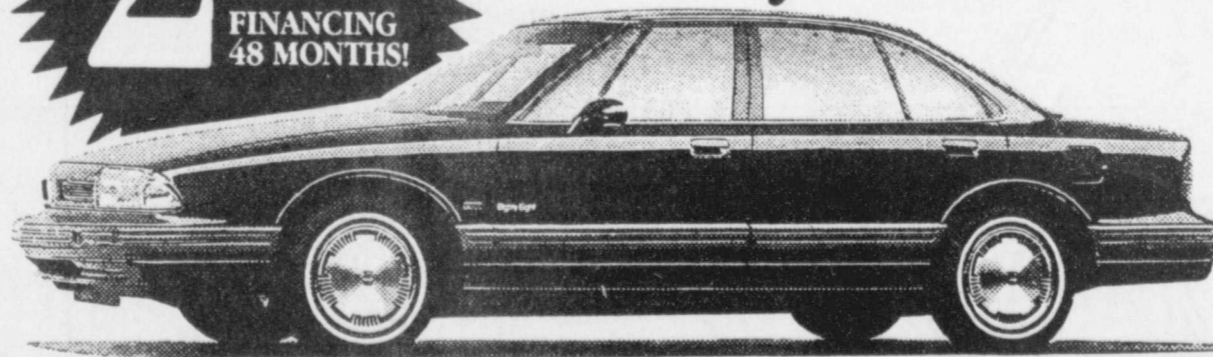

Keeping Healthy

Detached Retina

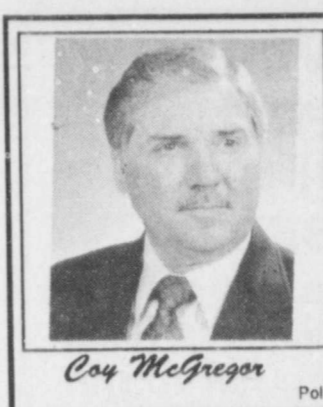
If diagnosed early, small tears in the retina can be repaired with lasers, preventing further tearing and the retina's eventual complete detachment.

Laser treatment for retinal tears is painless, bloodless, safe, and successful, and does not require hospitalization. It has become a standard method of eye surgery.

Retinal tears are heralded by all or some of three classic symptoms: floating spots, flashing lights, and an expanding curtain appearing across the field of vision.

If a tear is not repaired at an early stage, the vitreous may seep through the tear and bubble the retina off the inner wall of the eye, much like wallpaper can bubble off a wall.

It is important to treat retinal detachment before it involves the macula, the center of the retina which is largely responsible for detailed vision. The longer the macula is detached, the greater the residual loss of vision even after the retina has been repaired.

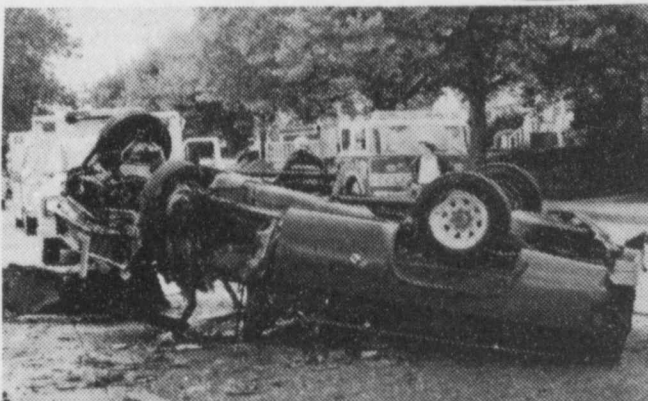

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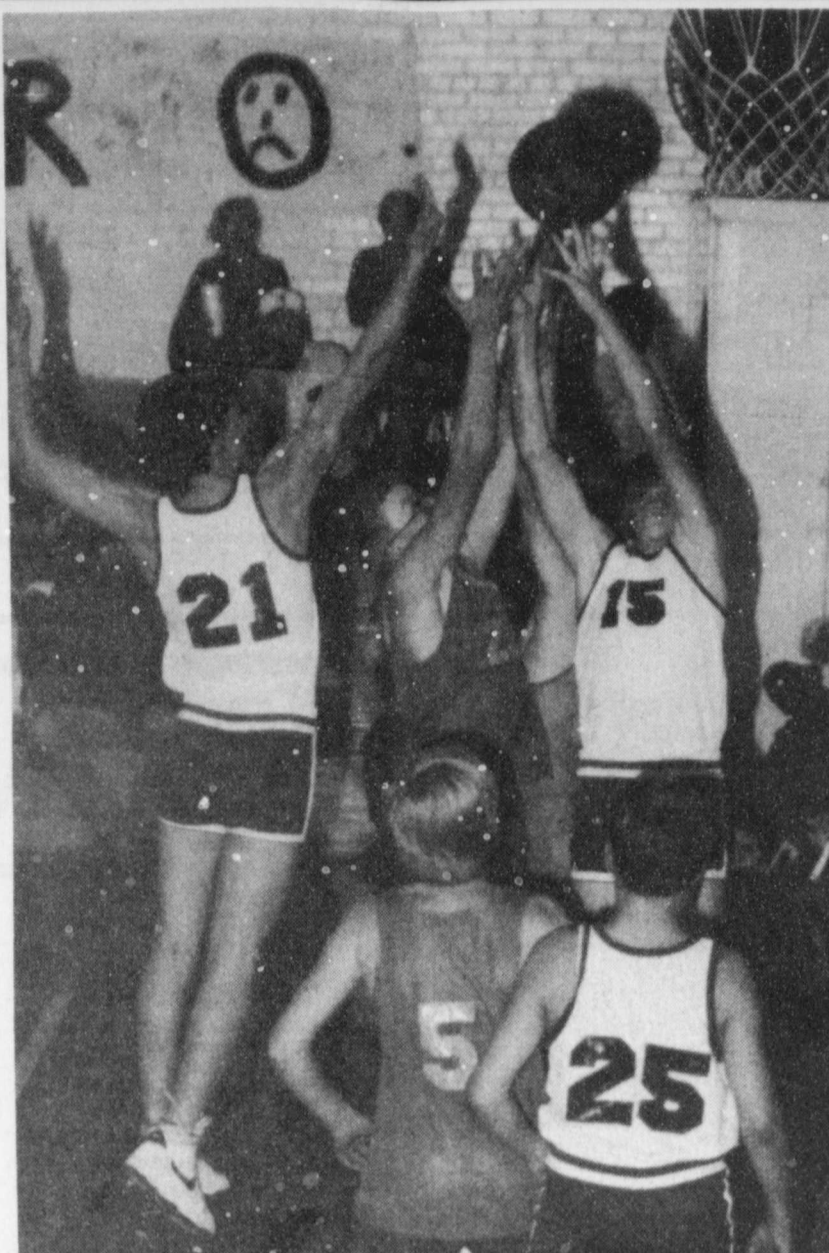
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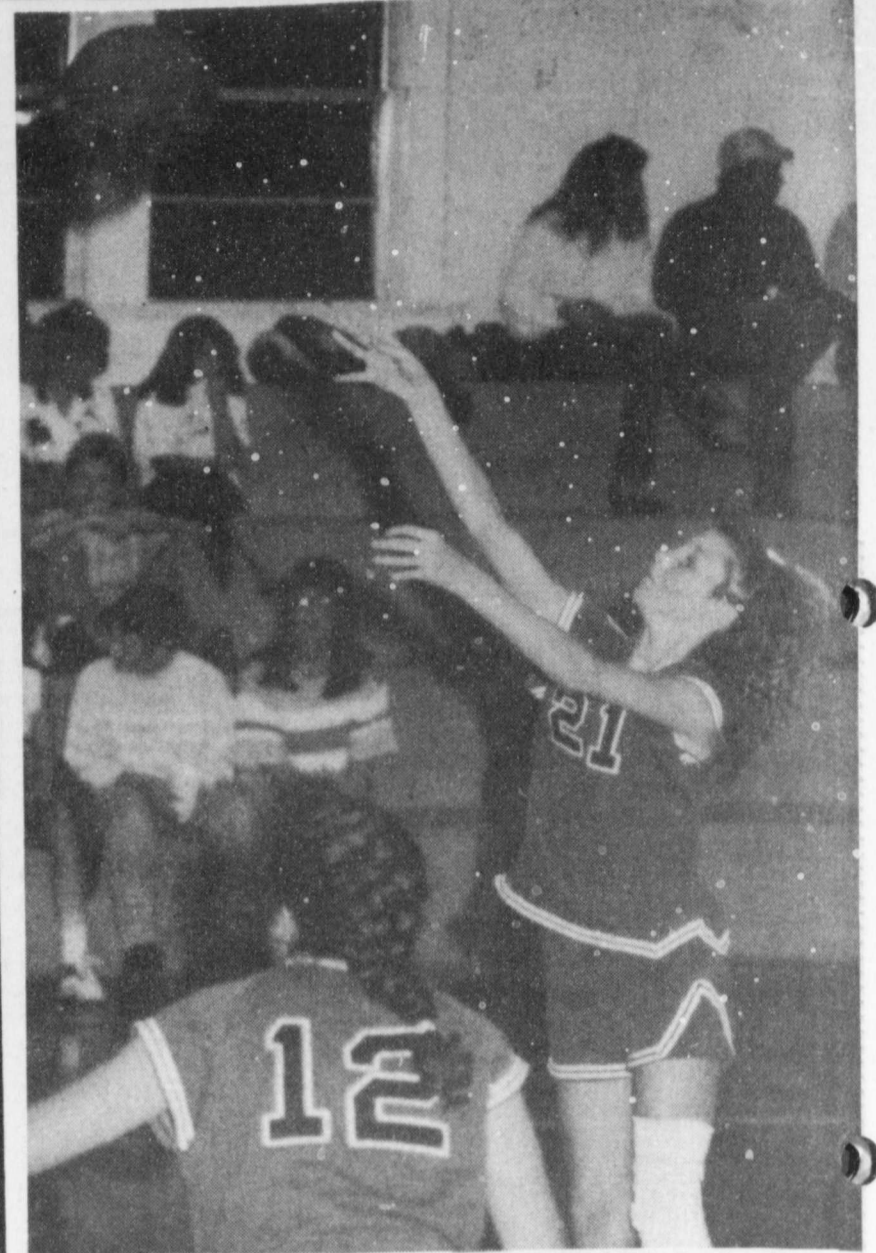
