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
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November 30, 1933

It was a close and exciting game and it leaves the Patriots 3-0 for the





involved in various family activities in the community. Leslie is currently serving as treasurer of the Clarksville Chapter of the Business and Professional Women's Organization.



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



Due to the rapid increase in crime because of lax laws and a poor economy, Boren feels that he can be of even more benefit in a second term.


"All I want to do is the best job I can for the taxpayers" he says.
