Citizens Raising Money For Video Camera To Go In Constable's Car

ready been received, and several fundraisers have been scheduled towards the purchase of a special video recorder unit to go in the Pct. 1 lConstable's vehicle.

This camera would become of the property of whoever served as Pct. 1 Constable. Currently that office is held by Constable Randy Boren.

A series of community meetings and suppers will be announced in the near future to raise money for this camera, and to raise campaign funds for Boren, spokesman Reggie McDowra said.

The video camera is becoming more and more a useful and important took as more and more law enfrocement officers have them. In DWI, wrecks, family disturbances and other law enforcement areas the cameras are invaluable

The camera can be installed in minutes, and runs of a 12 volt car system and plugs into the cigarette lighter. It does not interfere with communications or radar, and can be removed for interviewing people or

The law enforcement official can cange the camera angle to point in almost any direction and it comes iwth a remote wireless microphone which can record sound up to 1,500 feet aware from the vehicle.

One thing the camera is doing, according to DPS Captain David McEathron, is to increase the DWI conviction rate tremendously. It brings evidence right into the courtroom. According to McEathron, when DWI defendant's attorneys learn that the prosecution has an officer's video tape he quickly advises his client to plead guilty. This reduceds court case backlogs.

The recordings eliminate situation where a law enforcement officer's word is against the defendant's.

The cameras are the result of Brazos County Attorney Jim Kuboviak. Back in 1988 he purchased two video cameras for four officers, two of them DPS troopers, for a pilot study in DWI prosecution.

AETNA Insurance and Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD)

A number of donations have al-filing an entire accident scene. donated 50 cameras to DPS/TLE The early camcorders were big, mounted behind the trooper's head and shoulders. Now they are much smaller, and mount on the dash board of the vehicle.

They cost about \$1600.

More and more Highway Patrolmen have them now, and they serve to help in convictions, reduce court costs and also as a deterrent. Nationwide several grim scenes of murder including the murder of a Nacogdoches constable, have been recorded on the cameras. They have tremendous impact in the courtroom

Nation-wide law enforcement officials are installing these cameras as one of the biggest boons to patrolling

The benefits to constables, county officials, or city police and citizens are obvious.

Paris city Police are budgeting the cameras and hope to have them soon. The date for these community

meetings will be announced in a later edition of the paper.



Young Farmer Endowment Program Explained

By Paul D. Payne

The Texas Young Farmer Endowment Program is still weeks away from being in its final form, however, the initial rules have been approved by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority, and they have been published in the Texas Register. During this 30-day comment program, individuals may make written comments.

The program is not designed to assist existing full time operators, and in fact, an applicant cannot have generated more than 15% of their adjusted gross income from farming or ranching in any of the previous four years. If this definition of an eligible applicant remains in the final program, then the vast majority of the individuals who have had questions on this program in the county would not be eligible.

As the program now stands, there will be two application periods each year. Application deadline for the first period would be the first Monday in October and the second would be the first Monday in April.

Let me emphasize that the above comments are "proposed" and not final. It could very well be that some of these could be changed as a result of the present comment period.
