Another bored voice comes on, this one male.

"You need south western sales, not north eastern sales, what did you call here for? I'll try and connect you" he says, and without giving me a chance to say a word I'm once more listening to that bland musical presentation that filters from the black hole we call "Hold".

After a while another voice comes on the line. This one informs me that I've reached W H O L E S A L E FIZZLEWIDGETS...and I'm going to have to call the retail number. Yes, they can give it to me, but it's in Metroboon, not in New Dork City (where they are).

So, here I am, with yet another number to call. I dial it.

And, sure enough, what do you think I get...that's right.

"Thank you for calling Fizzlewidgets N More...your one stop shop for ALL your fizzlewidget needs. If you are calling from a touch tone phone...."

Whatever happened to going down the street, walking up to a friendly faced salesperson and saying "Hey, I need about a dozen number 5 fizzlewidgets?"

If big business would try going back to a little friendly, personal service, they might be surprised at the results.

And I'm not convinced that having all these specialized offices, departments, locations and such are helping them at all.

And isn't it grand to go into stores that have people on hand...not to take your order, but to point out the computers on which you can place your own order...but then, that's another story.

More Stolen Cattle Recovered

Pct. 1 Constable Randy Boren and Investigator B.J. McCoy report that five more stolen Lamar County cattle have been recovered.

Boren reports that he and McCoy went to DeKalb and found the five head on a horse ranch north of DeKalb.

Phil Whitaker and Bill Mercey, the owners of the cattle, which were stolen in December 1991, identified them. Boren, McCoy and Texas Ranger Howard Duncan and a DeKalb Investigator, Huggins arrested a DeKalb man, Stanley Hawkins, charging him with possession of stolen cattle by receiving.

Three men were apparently involved in the cattle theft ring.

Stolen cattle have also apparently gone through a sale barn in Texarkana.

Boren stated that they are still trying to track more cattle through the sale barn in hopes of recovering more of them.

Pct. 1 Constable Report

Boren responded to Blossom on a theft of a 16 ft. trailer.

Feb. 21st, Arrested a Paris woman on DWI.

Feb. 21st, Boren arrested a Paris man for Public Intoxication and making alcohol available to a minor.

Boren also stated he took some pills from the suspect and sent them to the DPS lab to have him identified.

Feb. 22- Responded to an attempted theft of Livestock just south east of Pattonville.

Burns Seeks Re-Election As Lamar County Sheriff

Sheriff Gene Burns has announced that he is seeking re-election to the office of Sheriff of Lamar County. Burns, 59, is a native of Lamar County and has been a working law enforcement officer for over 35 years, beginning as a deputy sheriff under the late Sheriff Dan Bills and later working up through the ranks of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission to the position of District Supervisor which he held at the time of his retirement after 31 years of honorable service.

Sheriff Burns said that there have been a few ups and downs in his first three years in office, but that he feels this has made a better person, administrator and law enforcement officer of him.

"The major problem, of course, has been jail overcrowding. Since January 1, 1991, we have booked more than 2,400 persons through the Lamar County Jail. We have been holding an average of 130 inmates daily for the past several months. Seventeen inmates are currently housed in Upshur County, and we are holding 64 inmates who are processed and awaiting transfer to the Texas prison system. At one time this year, we housed 73 prisoners awaiting space in the Texas facilities.

"I feel we have done a good job in keeping out of Federal Court and in meeting the State's jail standards requirements. This has not come easy, but through constant vigilance, working with the Justices of the Peace and other courts seven days a week, bonding out those who are eligible and processing those who plead guilty and pay their fines. This helps keep the jail population down.

"The new jail and administrative offices will be an answer to most of these problems. Scheduled to open in mid April of 1992, this facility will house 196 inmates. Our present capacity is 78 inmates. Lamar County recently received three checks from the State totaling \$120,834.29 in payment of housing persons awaiting transfer to Texas prison systems. The county will be receiving 20 dollars per day per prisoner for each one who is paper-ready for transfer.

"Our deputies have made over 4,300 calls this past year in which reports were filed, and they made numerous calls that proved unfounded on which no report was required." Sheriff Burns stated that he feels that his staff is to be commended for a job well done. There are currently eight field deputies, three investigators, one civil processor, the chief deputy and

the sheriff who answer those calls. "The sheriff's Reserves also fill many areas in which we are short in personnel. They serve many unpaid hours for which they deserve our undying gratitude," Burns continues.

"One other program which has been implemented during the past three years is the prisoner work program. We currently have 15 to 20 trustees assigned to the county commissioners where they work approximately

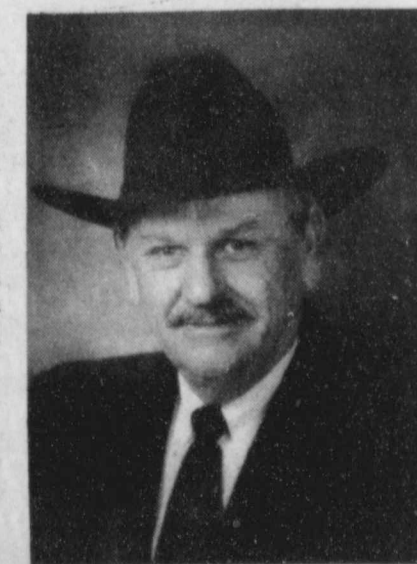
eight hours a day. This saves numerous taxpayer dollars. Others work in the courthouse on an as-needed basis."

Sheriff Burns is the oldest of six children of Gladys Ritchie Burns and the late Boyd Burns. He attended schools at Ballinger, Jennings and Delmar High School. He served 17 months in the Texas National Guard and, following graduation from high school, enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps for four years where he served as supply sergeant, drill instructor and a military policeman. In 1951 he married Wanda Bowman. They have two sons and daughters-in-law; Eric and Gala Burns of Lafayette, LA and Craig and Kristi Burns of Cunningham, and two grandsons.

Burns continued his education at Paris and Kilgore Junior Colleges on the GI Bill. He holds the Advanced Certificate in Law Enforcement with the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education and numerous certificates of completion of various law enforcement training courses. Since he became sheriff, he has received instruction through the Sheriff's Association training in Austin, Jail Management at Sam Houston State University and much more.

He currently serves on the Board of the Lamar County Alcohol Drug Center and the Boys Club of Paris, where he has been active for the past 16 years. He holds membership in the Sheriff's Association of Texas, Texas Farm Bureau, American Quarter Horse Association and the American Paint Horse Association. He is a landowner and taxpayer of Lamar County, operating a small herd of registered paint horses on 234 acres south of Paris.

Sheriff Burns states he feels that he has kept his campaign promises and will continue to do so if re-elected by keeping the open door policy and executing fair and impartial law enforcement, close budget controls and supervision of personnel and incarcerated persons.



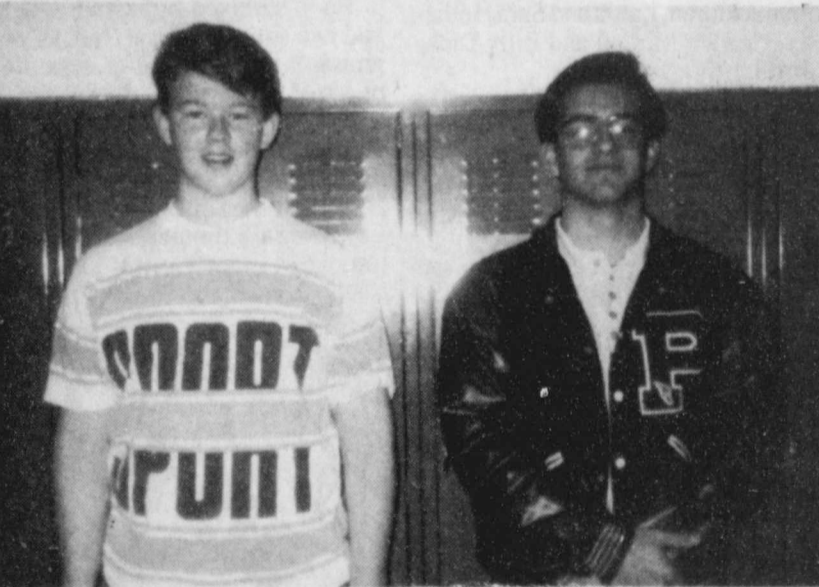
Gene Burns Seeking Re-Election to Lamar County Sheriff Position

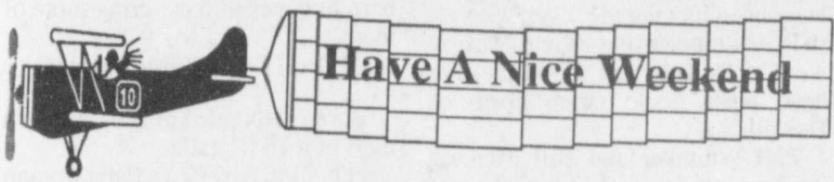

Aunt Rets Carmel Pie
By Margie Mayes

2 cups milk
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs, save whites
1 tsp. vanilla
4 tbl. flour
6 tbl. butter or margarine
dash of salt

Brown 1 cup sugar in margarine in thick saucepan until brown. Remove from heat. Add the mixture of sugar and butter to ingredients, mix 1/2 cup sugar, flour, eggs, vanilla, salt and milk. Blend well. Add small amount at a time, stirring well. If mixture should lump, it will dissolve and cook creamy.

Meringue:
4 T sugar to 2 egg whites. Beat until stiff pour pie filling into cooked pie crust top with meringue. Brown top in oven.

Deep Freezer Pickles
1/2 gal. diced thin cucumbers
3 large thin sliced onions
sprinkle with 1 tablespoon salt
Bring to boil:
1 qt. white vinegar
4 cups sugar
1 tablespoon mustard seed
1 teaspoon black pepper
Pack in freezer containers. Pour vinegar, mix over cucumbers and onions. Freeze solid, thaw as needed.

Earthquake Cake
Mix 1 cup coconut and 1 cup pecans. Press into 9x13 pan.
1 box german chocolate cake mix and directed on box.
Pour this mixture over coconut and pecans.
Mix 1 box powdered sugar, 1 8 oz. box cream cheese and 1 stick butter. Spoon this mixture into cake batter. Bake at 350 for about 50 minutes.

Coconut Cake
1 cup Crisco
2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cup buttermilk
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
1 tablespoon bakin powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
5 large eggs, save 3 whites for icing
1 tablespoon vanilla
Cream sugar and Crisco. Add eggs, beat until fluffy. Sift flour, baking powder. Add to mixture, mix soda with buttermilk, add alternately. Bake in 3 pans at 350.

Icing:
Cook 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/4 cup water until spreads a thread. Beat egg whites well until they stand in dry peaks. Pour hot syrup over an beat layer cake with icing and moist coconut.

Chicken and Spaghetti
1 box spaghetti
1 can mushroom soup
1/4 lb. grated cheese or cheese sauce
1 medium onion
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup stuffed olives, chopped
2 boiled eggs
1 cooked hen chicken, boned and chopped
1 bell pepper, chopped
salt to taste
Cook spaghetti in chicken broth. Sauté pepper, onions, celery. Drain spaghetti, saving broth. Add sauted ingredients and boiled eggs, olives. Add cheese. Add enough broth to be the right consistency. Top with grated cheese.

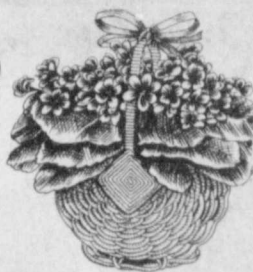

Andra Allen of Prairiland had the best individual score for Prairiland. Other team members were Marti Gifford, Kim Reep and Mendy Dobbs.

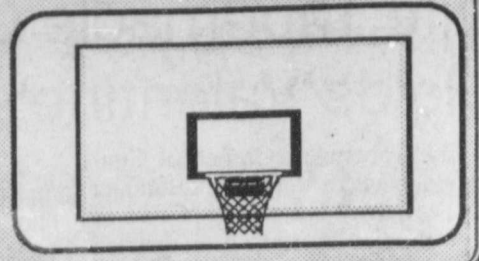
The girls will compete at Mt. Pleasant Golf and Country Club on Monday, March 2.

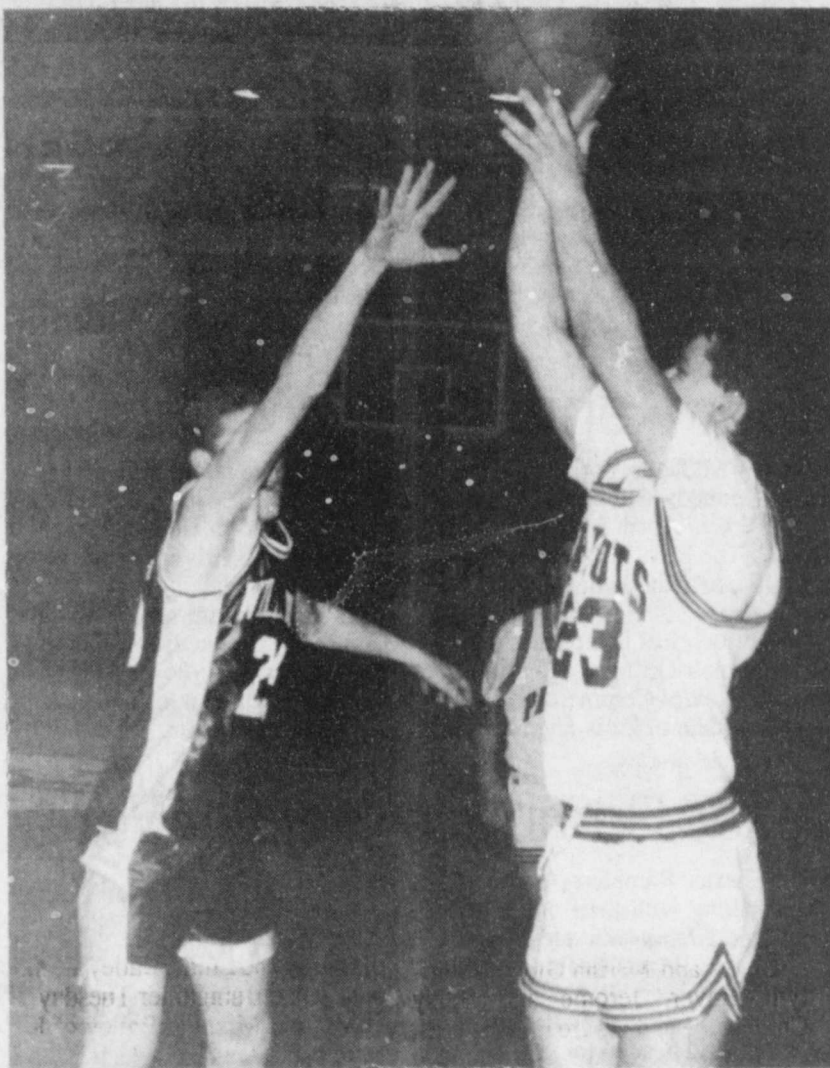
Wills Point scored the first six points of the final stanza. The Pats mustered three treys from Gordon and sophomore wingman Brock Blasingame, but the Tigers matched

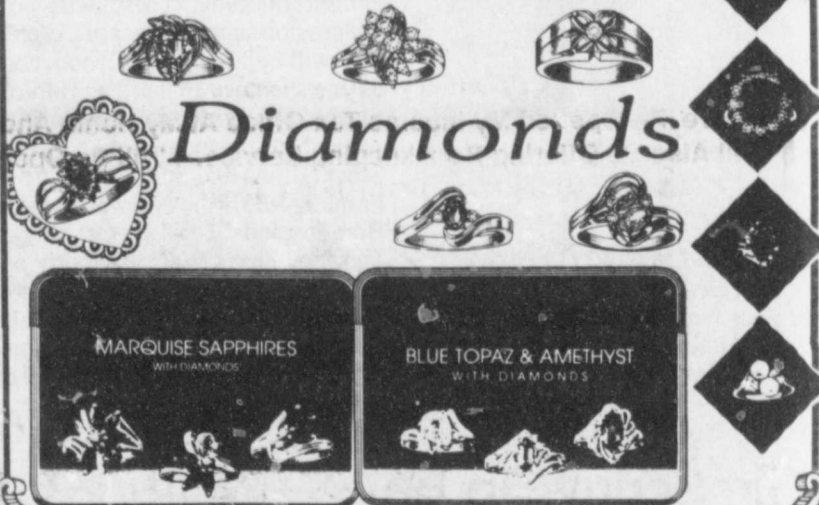

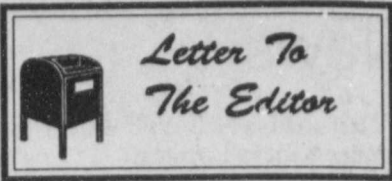

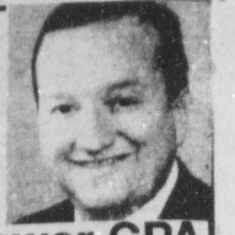

business owners seeking the liability protection of a corporation without the extra level of taxation of a regular corporation should explore the S corporation alternative. The primary benefit of electing S corporation status is that an S corporation generally pays no income tax at the corporate level. The corporation's income is passed through to the shareholders and taxed on their individual income tax returns.

A regular corporation pays tax on corporation income. When the corporation distributes this income as dividends, shareholders are taxed again on the dividends they receive.

The S corporation does have some disadvantages. Generally, it must use a calendar year-end. Also, it is limited to 35 shareholders and may only have one class of stock.

Though an S corporation can deduct certain fringe benefits provided for shareholder-employees, those employees who own more than 2% of the corporation's stock will have the benefits taxed to them as additional wages.

Regular "C" corporations considering a switch to S corporation status must consider a number of additional factors including the built-in gains tax and the treatment of carryover items (tax credits or losses). Calendar-year corporations must file an election by March 15, 1992, in order to be treated as S corporations for 1992. Before an election is made, the impact on both the corporation and its individual shareholders should be considered. Area Cities Show Decrease In Rebates From Comptroller For Current Period

State Comptroller John Sharp said today the office mailed checks totaling \$163.4 million to 1,066 Texas cities, a 1.8 percent increase above last February's \$160.5 million.

Checks to 106 Texas counties totaled another \$17.7 million, 4.7% more than last February's rebate of \$16.9 million.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected by yearly, quarterly and monthly taxpayers.

"Texas retail sales were better than

the nation's as a whole during 1991 but the year was sluggish and the Christmas season just brought us more of the same," Sharp said.

The city of Houston received the state's largest payment for February, \$26.3 million, a decrease of 1.5% below last February's payment of \$26.7 million.

Blossom received \$2,901.92 for a 12.42% decrease in total payments to date.

Deport received \$2,561.98 for a 12.25% decrease.

Paris received \$305,750.31 for a 12.40% decrease.

Talco received \$2,677.16 for a 3.15% decrease while Mt. Pleasant received \$148,524.421 for a 5.27% decrease.

Bogata received \$4,370.64 marking a 16.98% decrease and Clarksville received \$25,348.219 for a 10.70% decrease.

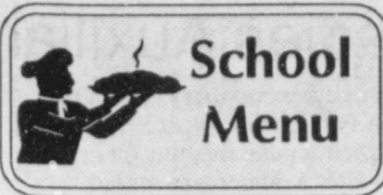
A medication administration course is offered from 6 to 10 pm, Monday and Wednesday for 17 consecutive weeks beginning Feb. 24.

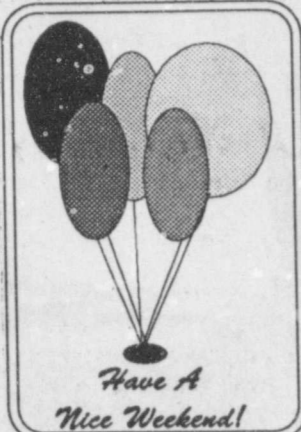

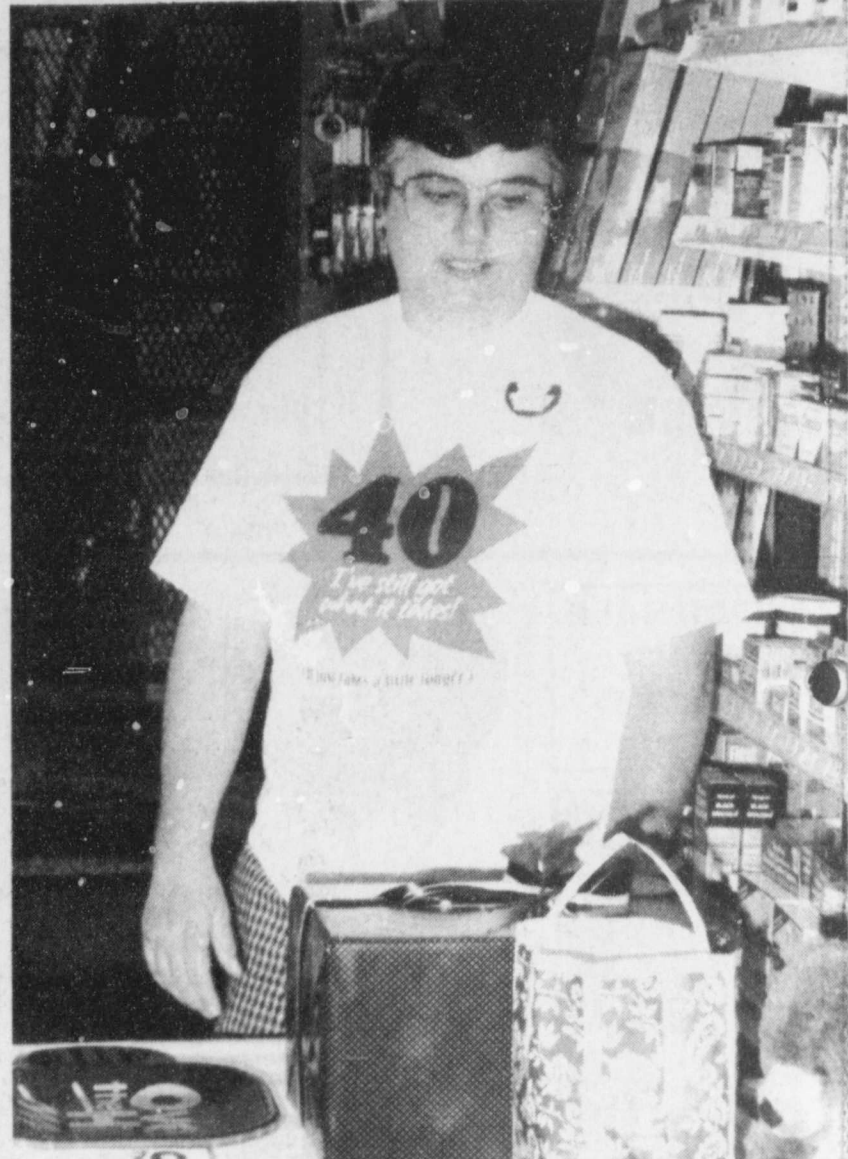

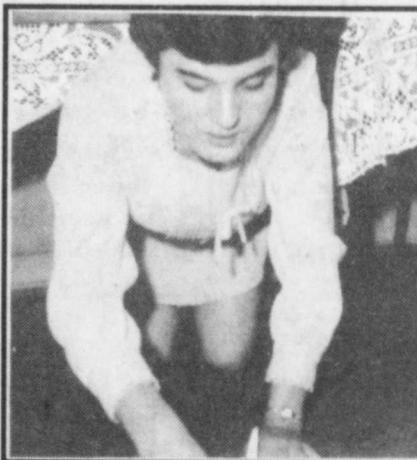
Forage Tour Will Be April 29
