County Primaries Generate Close Stock Show & Auction Races For Sheriff, Tax Collector

Lamar County Primary races for lenger Pggy Noble received 3,670. Sheriff and Tax Assessor/Collector turned out to the the closest ones on the ballot as the county turned out a total of 9,480 voters on "Super Tues-

day".
The Sheriff's race, which has been all along, a hotly contested race all along, ended with B.J. McCoy leading the race with 4,052 votes, or 47.16 percent of the vote.

Incumbent Gene Burns garnered 3074 votes, 35.7 percent of the vote, and Jerry Griffith had 1,474 votes, or 17.10 percent of the vote.

The runoff between McCoy and Burns will occur on April 14th.

The Lamar County Tax Assessor/ Collector's race ran "neck in neck " the whole evening as vote total came in. The final call was 4,648 for incumbent Kathy Bolton and Chal-

This ended with Bolton having 55.8 percent of the vote.

Precinct One Commissioner Troy Owens triumphed over two opponents with 1,128 votes to avoid a runoff with his opponents, having 53.1 of the vote. Jim Satcher had 30.5 percent of the vote (650 votes) Jack Malone had 348 votes, 16.2 percent of the vote.

Precinct One Constable Randy Boren won over challenger Jackie Dearborn 606 to 314. A total of 920 votes were cast in the race. (People living within Paris city limits do not vote on the constable's race).

Tom Wells, incumbent in the County Attorney's race, was returned to office with 5,255 votes to Gary Waite's 3,297. Wells collected 61.4 percent of the ballots.

State Senator Bob Aikin destroyed his challenger 6,419 to 1,327.

District Judge Incumbent Jim N. Thompson collected a hefty 59.5 percent or 4,865 votes against George Prston, who garnered 3,300 votes.

Terry Hill received 4,826 votes for Democratic Chariman while Taylor received 2,664.

On the national level the Democrats voted overwhelmingly for Bill Clinton in the presidential primary, giving him 68 percent of the vote while Tsongas received only 15.6

In the Republican primary George Bush was the clear favorite in the county as 74.4 percent of Lamar County Voters cast their ballot for him. 21.05 percent voted for Pat

1/2 cup barbeque sauce 1 T. instant minced onion 2 T. brown sugar 10 refrigerated biscuits

3/4 cup shredded cheese. Brown ground beef; drain. Add barbeque sauce, onion and brown sugar. Set aside. Place 1 biscuit in each ungreased muffin cup, pressing dough up the sides of the cup. Spoon meat mixture into cups. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 400 for 10-12 minutes until golden

12 pasta shells (American Beauty jumbo) 1b. ground beef 1-12 oz. jar medium or mild picante

sauce 1/2 cup water

-8 oz. can tomato sauce 4 oz. can chopped chilies, drained c. shredded Monterrey Jack cheese can 2.8 oz. Durkee fried onions



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

A sore throat may indicate a bacterial infection (strep throat), a cold, influenza or even heavy smoking. Strep is treated by a prescription for antibiotics. There's no treatment for viruses that cause colds or flu, but nonprescription medicines can make you feel better.

Don't let a severe sore throat go more than two days before checking with your doctor. Always get treatment if your sore throat is accompanied by a fever, particularly if your oral temperature stays above 101 degrees for 24 hours.

Nonprescription lozenges or sprays containing benzocaine can help relieve sore throat pain. Try gargling with salt water (1/4 tsp. of salt to eight ounces of water).

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


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Legal Notice

THE STATE OF TEXAS CITY OF TALCO COUNTY OF TITUS ORDINANCE No. 1-T-92

An ordinance establishing regu lations covering the cleaning up of all property within the city limits of the City of Talco, Texas and making each person who owns property within the city limits of Talco, Texas responsible for the cleaning of their own property, and providing a pen-alty for all persons who violate this ordinance and repealing all conflicting ordinances and containing a severability clause, "approving au-thority" means the Mayor or his duly authorized representative or the City Council of the City of Talco, Texas: WHEREAS, the City Council and Mayor of the City of Talco, Texas has a responsibility to the health,

City of Talco, Texas. WHEREAS, the fact that there is both business and residential property within the City Limits of the City of Talco, Texas, that is both a safety and health hazard because the roperty is never cleaned and is hy, unsightly and a fire hazard. NOW THEREFORE BE IT OR

DAINED BY THE CITY COUN-CIL, THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS. SECTION 1. THIS ORDINANCE required that any person who owns property within the city limits of Talco, Texas will be responsible to see to it that the property owned by them is kept cleaned up and mowed to make the City of Talco a more clean and healthy place to live and to look at.

Some places at present time are unsightly and unhealthy as well as a THIS ORDINANCE required that there will be no garbage or trash of any kind dumped on vacant lots or in streets, road ditches or anywhere other than a state approved land fill of City approved Waste Disposal

THIS ORDINANCE requires that all trash such as garbage, furniture, appliances, etc., old wire, cans/ bottles, old scrap lumber, paper, brush or trash of any kind be kept cleaned from your City property and also requires that property be moved as often as needed to keep property in a present condition re-vent a fire hazard.

THIS ORDINANCE REQUIRES A PENALTY OF TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for every day

olation. When a property owner in the City limits of the City of Talco, Texas violates this ordinance, the property wner will be notified by the Mayor City personnel, or appointee one time in writing and ven thirty (30) days to e in compliae with this ordinance. The property owner will be told when notified in what way he is in violation of this ordinance, and after the time limit given by the City of Talco, or the notice has expired, and property owner has not made any effort to get in compliance with this ordiflance, then upon conviction, the City of Talco, shall charge the property owner a penalty of \$200.00 for the first violation and \$200.00 a day for every day in violation; and may also refuse City services, such as water and sewer if repeated violation occur. If at any time the City of Talco's services are used to dispose of and clean up waste found in Section 3 of this Ordinance, then same City shall recover cost of services thru the company leasing, company owning, or individuals responsible for land

HIS ORDINANCE REPEALS ALL CONFLICTING ORDI-SECTION 6

POWER TO ENTER by the Mayor and other authorized employees of the City bearing proper credentials and identification are entitled to enter any public or private property at any reasonable time for the purpose of enforcing this Ordinance.

SEVERABILITY. f any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other pro-visions or applications of the Ordi-nance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application; and to this end the prons of this Ordinance are de

to be severable. TIS ORDINANCE shall be in full force and take effect from and after approval of the Mayor and the City uncil of the City of Talco, Texas. Passed, approved and adopted this 24th day of February, 1992, by the City Council of the City of Talco,

ORDINANCE NO. 1-L92
AN ORDINANCE of the City of Talco, Texas making it unlawful for eny person, firm or corporation to permit weeds, brush or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow to a height greater than twelve (12") hes within one hundred fifty feet (150) of any property line which abuts street right-of-ways, alleys, tility easements, subdivided addiions, developed property or any uildings or other structures; prohibiting the growth of cultivated props within the right-of-way of any ic street or easement; making it the duty of any person to cut and

remove all such weeds, et cetera; providing that the cutting and removing of the weeds, et cetera, every thirty (30) days constitute compliance ith this ordinance; providing for notices to owners or other persons violating the terms of this ordinance authorizing the City to cut such weeds, et cetera, and charge the costs to the owners of the property; making the charges for the cuttings of the weeds, et cetera. A lien against the property upon filing a statement with the County Clerk; providing a savings clause; making and provid-

ing for a penalty not to exceed two hundred (\$200.00) dollars for each offense and declaring an emergency. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF TEH CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation owning, claiming, occorporation owning, ceanning, eccupying or having supervision or control of any real property, occupied or unoccupied within the corporate limits of the City of Talco, to permit weeds, brush or any objections. permit weeds, brush or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow up to a greater height than twelve (12) inches upon any real property within one hundred fifty (150) feet of any property line which abuts street right-of-ways, alleys, utility easements, subdivided, additions easements, subdivided additions developed property or any buildings or other structures. It shall be the duty of such person, firm or corporation to keep the area from the line of his property to the curb line next adjacent to it, if there be a curb line, or if not, then within ten (10) feet outside that property line, free and clear of the matter referred to above. All vegetation not regularly culti-vated and which exceeds twelve (12) inches in height shall be presumed to be objectionable and unsightly, except that regularly cultivated crops shall not be allowed to grow within the right-of-way of any public street or easement but shall be kept mowed

the same as provided above. SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of any person, firm or corporation owning, claiming, occupying or having supervision or control of any real property, as provided in Section 1 hereof, to cut and remove all such weeds, brush and other objectionable or unsightly matter as often as may be necessary to comply with Section 1 hereof; provided that the removing and cutting same at least once in every thirty (30) days shall be deemed a compliance with this ordinanc and to use every precaution to prevent the same growing on such premies so as to become a nuisance as herein defined.

SECTION 3. In the event that any person, firm, or corporation ownng, claiming, occupying or having supervision or control of any real property occupied or unoccupied within the corporate limits of the City of Talco, fails to comply with theprovisions of Section 1 and 2 hereof, it shall be the duty of the City personnel to give ten (10) days notice in writing to such person, firm or corporation, violating the terms of this ordinance, or be letter addressed to such person, firm or corporation at its post office address or by pub lication 2 (two) times within ten (10) consecutive days in the City's official newspaper. If such person, firm or corporation fails or refuses to comply with the provisions of Section 1 and 2 hereof within ten (10) days after date of notification in writing or by letter or date of second publication of notice in the City's official newspaper, the City may go upon such property and do or cause to be done the work necessary to obtain compliance with this ordi-SECTION 4. The expense in-

curred pursuant to Section 3 above in correcting the condition of such property, and the cost of publishing notice in the newspaper shall be paid by the City and charged to the owner of such property. In the event the owner fails or refuses to pay such expense within thirty (30) days after the first day of the month following the one in which the work was done, the City shall file with the County Clerk a statement of the expenses incurred in correcting the condition on the property. When such state-mentsfiled, the City shall have a privileged lien on such property, second only to tax liens and liens for rovements, to secure the payment of the amount so expended. ich amount shall bear interest at the rate of ten percent per annum frm the date of City incurs the expense For any such expenditures and interest, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had by the City. The statement of expense filed with the County Clerk or a certified copy thereof shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended in such work; improvement or correction of the property, all as more particularly specified in Art. 4436, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes,

which is hereby adopted. SECTION 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of the ordinance, shall be subject to a fine, upon conviction in the Justice of the Peace Court, of not mor than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day that the premises shall remain in a condition in violation of the terms of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. This section shall be in addition to and cumulative of the provisions for the abatement of the said nuisance and charging the cost of same against the owner of the premises by the City. SECTION 6. Should any word,

phrase, sentence, clause or paragraphi or section of this ordinance be de-The city council hereby estab-

clared or hold to be illegal or uncon-stitutional the same shall not affect remaining words, phrases, sentences, clause, paragraph or section of the ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 7. WHEREAS, the fact that there is no ordinances of the City of Talco, Texas adequately controlling or providing for the cutting and removal of weeds, brush or objectionable or unsightly matter, creates and urgency and an emergency and in the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare, uires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage as the law in such cases provides. An ordinance of the City of Talco, Texas, making it unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to convert a motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal, or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles without proper storage and removal of said vehicles; whether on private or corporate lands within the City of Talco; hereby does set rules and regulations stating proper storing, dismantling or abandonment of such vehicle and regulations stating removal of said vehicles by the City of Talco and charge of cost to owners of operations. This ordinance is to repeal all conflicting ordinances. SECTION 1. Definitions.

As used in this section, the following terms shall have the respective meanings ascribed to them: Demolisher: Any person whose business is to convert a motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal, or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles.

Junked vehicle: Any motor vehicle as defined in section 2 of Article 6701d, Vemon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, which is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate, and which is wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded or remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than one hundred twenty (120) days.

Motor vehicles: Any motor hicle as defined in section 2 of the Certificate of Title Act (Vernon's Texas Civil Statute, Article 6687-a. SECTION 2. Junked, etc. vehicles on private property. Definition.

For the purposes of this article, a motor vehicle shall be deemed wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative when the same does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid current motor vehicle inspection sticer, and the condition

(1) Wrecked. (2) Dismantled (3) Partially dismantled. (4) Not in condition to be legally driven upon public streets. (6) Discarded

SECTION 3. Same-Prohibition; declaration of nuisano (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to park, place, store or leave, for period of time in excess of thirty (30) days, upon any lot, tract of land or other private property within the city, any motor vehicle of any kind, or parts thereof, which is in a wrecked, junked, dismantled or

operative condition. (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner, occupant or in charge of any real property within the city to suffer, permit or allow any motor vehicle of any kind, or parts thereof, which is in a wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative condition, to be parked, placed, stored or left upon such real property for a period of time in excess of

thirty (30) days. (c) The parking, placing, storing or leaving of any wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative motor vehicle or parts thereof upon any lot, tract of land or other private property within the city in violation of this section shall this section shall constitute a nuisance, detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the city, and it shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or person in control of such lot, tract of land or other private property upon which such vehicle or parts are located to remove the same from such real property or effect compliance with the provisions of this section. SECTION 4. Same-Exceptions

The provisions of section 3 shall not apply to:

(1) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated within a completely enclosed building or structure. (2) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated wholly within the backyard area of a lot or building site which is completely enclosed be a solid fence ess than five (5) feet in height. (3) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated on the premises of a business enterprise which is necessary in the operation of such business enterprise and when such business enterprise is located and con ducted in an area authorized by the zoning ordnance of the city. SECTION 5. Abstement procedure

lished the following procedures for the abatement of the public nuisance defined in section 3, as authorized by Article 6687-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, as set forth in this section.

SECTION 6. Administration. This section shall be administered by the Constable of Precinct 3 or other designated officers and em-ployees of said City, except for removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property, which may be per-formed by any other person designated in writing by such officer, upon a form to be prepared by such officer, such officer and employees hereinafter referred to as "enforcing

SECTION 7. Notice to the owner. The enforcing officer shall pro-vide for the removal of any public nuisance, as herein defined, from private property, provided that such officer shall give notice by certified or registered mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists, which notice shall set forth:
(1) The nature of the public nui-

(2) That it must be removed and abated within ten (10) days; and (3) That a public hearing before the Justice of the Peace court may be requested, provided that such request is filed in the office of the city secretary prior to the expiration of such ten (10) day period.

If any notice to an owner or occupant, as above authorized is returned undelivered by the United States postal service, official action to abate such public nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return. SECTION 8. Public hearing.

When an owner or occupant, upon eceipt of a notice under section 7, files a request for public hearing within the time and in the manner therein specified, the city secretary shall proceedto set a public hearing before the Justice of the Peace court and shall post notice of the time, place and subject of said hearing on the city hall bulletin board and, also, shall mail a copy of said notice to the party requesting such hearing not less than three (3) days prior to such

SECTION 9. Order.
At the conclusion of the public hearing, the Justice of the Peace court shall, by order, require the removal of such junked vehicle or part thereof, and shall include a description of the vehicle and the license number of the vehicle, if such identification and license amber are available at the site. If the foregoing order is not made, or if no action is taken by the judge of the court, the proceedings shall be abated and no further action shall be taken by the enforcing officer with regard to the abatement of such public nui-

SECTION 10. Removal. When the owner or occupant has failed to abate a nuisance within the time hereinabove specified, or upon the making of an order pursuant to section 7, the enforcing officer shall arrange for the removal of the junked vehicle; or part thereof, by either such enforcing officer or any other duly authorized person, to the loca-tion as such enforcing officer may designate; provided, that any junked vehicle or parts which have been noved under the terms of this section shall not be reconstructed or made operable at the owners ex-

SECTION 11. Notice to state de-The enforcing office shall give

notice to the state department of highways and public transportation within five (5) days after removal of a junked vehicle, or part thereof. citing this section, setting forth all identification numbers and such other description as may be available at the site, and requesting can-cellation of the certificate of title to such vehicle, pursuant to Article 6687-1, Vernon's Texas Civil Stat-SECTION 12. Disposal.

The enforcing officer shall arrange for the disposal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, in accordance with section 11 of Article 6687-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as SECTION 13. Repeal.

This Ordinance repeals all previous conflicting ordinances. Passed, approved and adopted this 24th day of February, 1992, by the City Council of Talco, Texas. K.M. Sloan, Mayor



Community Service Club Tours New Jail

Members of the Deport Community Service Club were given a guided tour of the new Lamar County Jail last Saturday morning by Precinct One Commissioner Troy Owens.

The completion of the new 45,405 squar foot facility is scheduled for the end of April and according to contractors work is on schedule in spite of all the wet weather.

The 196 bed facility is divided into 31,279 square feet designed to house prisoners, 5,560 square feet of area for the Sally Port and 8,566 square feet for administration and a county court room. The facility also has a medical room where patients can be given physicals without having to be taken to the hospital

The Sally Port is a long garage area that is used to deliver prisoners. Once the doors are shut behind the county patrol cars, prisoners are in a confined area.

The facility can accomodate both male and female inmates classified from minimum to maximum security and even has a padded cell.

The facility carries a price tag of just under four million dollars when completed, according to Commissioner Owens, but the county, he says, will benefit as soon as the

complex is completed. Owens told the service club members that at the present time Lamar County is spending approximately \$20,000 per month to house inmates in other jails because of overcrowd-

Also in the new facility fewer jailers or guards will be able to control more inmates more efficiently.

The new jail with it's double concrete slabs, and dual security cells with concrete and steel living quarters is a long way from a motel, Owens stated to club members.

Tours of the jail are being conducted by commissioners and the sheriff's department to various interested groups in the area.

Owens told the Deport group that people or groups wanting a tour should contact one of the commissioners or the sheriff's office.

Gifford Awarded Contract

Kenneth E. Gifford Sr. of Deport has been awarded a contract with the Paris District of the Texas Department of Transportation. The two year contract requires the company to mow, remove and dispose of litter

from various picnic areas in Lamar County. Mr. Gifford's company will perform the work as needed as required by conditions of the maintenance contract.

From time to time, the name of Mrs. Dorthea McDowra appears in your paper. This great lady's name always takes me back in time to 1938. My father, Les Temple, share-cropped a small farm south of Cunningham on what we called the Eric Wicker place.

On Friday before starting my senior year in high school, the following Monday, my sisters and I were helping Dad finish the last bit of cotton picking. We had made a fair crop and all our school clothes had been purchased. We had even bought a new battery operated Zenith radio.

There was to be a bake sale that Friday night and my mother was baking some goodies for the event. About 2 p.m., we heard my mother's cry for help. We looked and saw our house completely engulfed in flames. The kerosene cookstove had exploded and nothing could be saved. My mother was lucky to escape harm.

The only clothes we had to wear to school on Monday were the work clothes we were wearing and they were quite torn, worn and tattered. McDowra (Dorthea's husband), I had a new pair of trousers and shirt to wear to school on Monday. Others were generous to us during those trying times, but Tom McDowra's generosity and thoughtfulness were most impressive to this 16-year old country boy. 
