Avante Garde is pretty "far out" as the name implies.

Park Avenue is extremely elegant, one sees it used often on formal things like wedding invitations.

University Roman is absolutley one of the most formal, handsome fonts around. Why it is tagged University IRoman,

howver, is a mystery. Hobo is carfree and lighthearted.

Freestyle looks as if it were hand written and Brush Script is self-explanatory too.

However, I've always wondered who came up with the font P Bondoni Poster! P Bondoni Poster? Although it's a bold, good looking font, that's one strange

B Optima Bold, Memphis, Cairo, Helvitica Narrow, are all rather strange...I can't find a rea-

son for their names at all. Chicago has a distinct 1930's

gangsterish type of look about it. I can't help but believe that someone with a real sense of humor named the scrambled, up

and down look of the Los Angeles font. New Century Schoolbook is a

very traditional font. Zapf Chancery is rather pretty. But the one that causes the most raised eyebrows is Zapf

Dingbats. No, Zapf Dingbats isn't a joke. Instead of letters it produces small pointing fingers, arrows, stars, dots, whirls, tiny crosses, little dogs and a rather bewilder-

variety of odd things...including the check marks we use in election ads, boxes and thumbs up signs! We have about thirty fonts in

our computer system. There are literally hundreds


McCuistion Regional Medical Center has announced a major expansion project that will affect the hospital's surgery, women's services and newborn areas. The project will total more than \$3.5 million and will take 18-24 months to complete.

Included will be improvement of conventional delivery rooms as well as expension of the surgery area and labor rooms.
