What kind of role model is a man who spits at referees and fans who curses and throws things?

What kind of a hero is a man who takes drugs, is arrested for DWI, assault or rape?

What kind of an example is someone who flaunts their immunity, who wastes money selfishly?

We spend a lot of time talking about how impressionable young children's minds are. Shouldn't the people these kids worship be worthy of that worship?

And when those idols fail, and fall, shouldn't they be treated as any other person would be? If they aren't, what message does this send to youth? When action is delayed time after time when a sports star fails a drug test, how does that look?

The record shows that charges against sports figures are dropped, sentences are reduced, or the athletes are given special treatment.

NO ONE should be above the law. I don't care how important they are on a team. I don't care how popular they are.

Professional athletes on the whole are aware that they should set an example to the young fans that adore them. They are aware that fans are the reason that they have a sports career at all. The majority are worthy of the hero worship they receive.

But so much publicity goes to those that have a bad attitude, who cause trouble and who create disruptions.

If punishment for improper behavior was shift and sure, then the message to those youngsters who look up to them would be powerful.

Sadly, I'm afraid that the message going out to kids these days is quite the opposite.

## Law Suit Filed Against Deport Mayor, City Council

The Deport City Council has been notified that a lawsuit against them has been filed by Jerry Burns, former City Water and Sewer Superintendent.

Comett and Colson are representing Burns in the suit, which was filed in Lamar County Court the first of last week.

The suit alleges that Mayor Foster

and the council members ordered Burns to discharge raw sewage into the creek. The suit alleges that when he refused to do this he was fired from his job.

Burns is suing for one half million dollars from the Mayor, and from each council member except for one, Mayor Charles Foster, John L. Roach, Duane Glover, Nancy

Gresham, and Eric Pearson are named in the suit. It does not name Gilbert Arriaga.

The council says that they released Burns from his position because he failed to perform his duties numerous times.

Don McLaughlin has been selected to represent the city in this and a reply is expected shortly about the matter.

The Third Annual Deport American Legion and Volunteer Fire Department Chili Cookoff is rapidly approaching.

The first event in the fundraiser will be Friday night, April 17th, with a chili and stew supper beginning at 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the Deport American Legion Building. Adults and children over six years old will pay \$3 for chili, stew and all the trimmings. Children under 6 years of age are free.

At 7:30 p.m. on that Friday night the big auction will kick off at the Deport Fire Station.

This auction will have items from baked goods to farm equipment and most everything in between!

Saturday morning a free breakfast for the community and the chili cookers will be held from 6 until 9 a.m. at the Legion Building.

The Saturday schedule of events is as follows: Easter Egg Hunt, 11 a.m. at Charles Foster Park. All area children are invited to come hunt eggs and win prizes.

Booths for arts and crafts, fun and activities will go on most of the day. A concession stand will be open to provide food, drinks, custom designed chili cookoff tee shirts, and to sell

At 2:30 p.m. there will be a bed race. Five person teams will compete for prize money. Entry fee is \$5 and the first place will be \$100. Second place will be \$50.

These bed races are a lot of fun as nightshirt clad people push an iron bedstead, complete with occupant, down the street!

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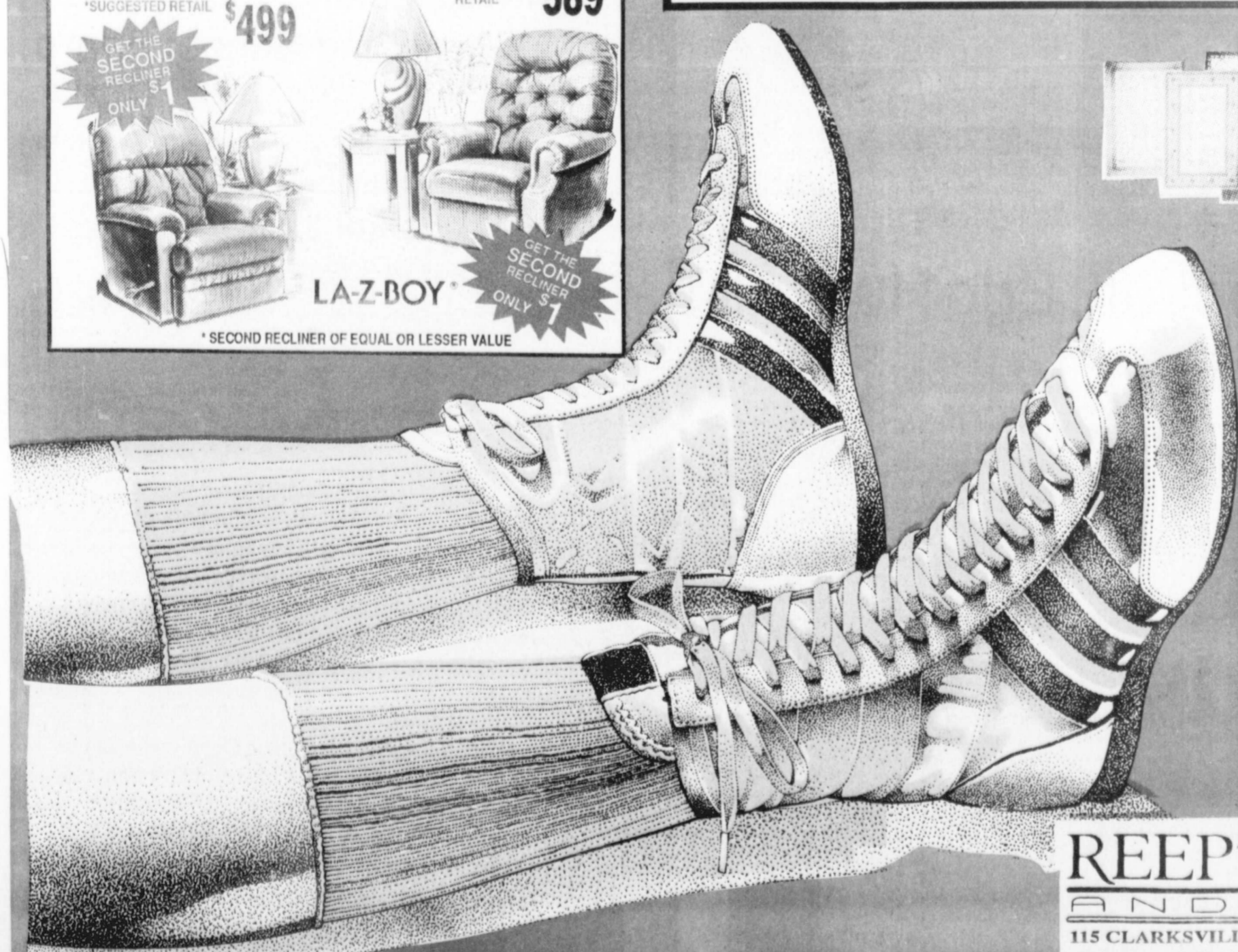
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CODY BOWEN swings as the Prairiland Patriots pounded the Paul Pewitt Brahmans at the

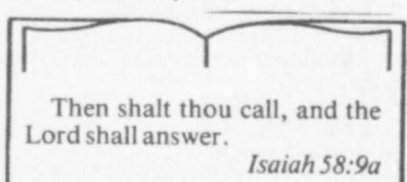

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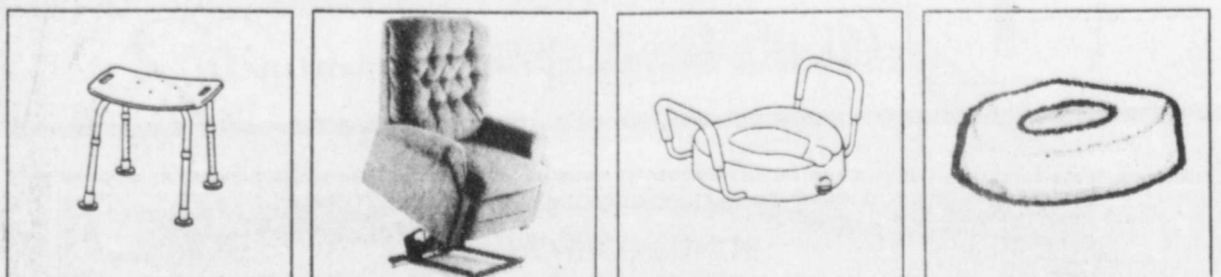
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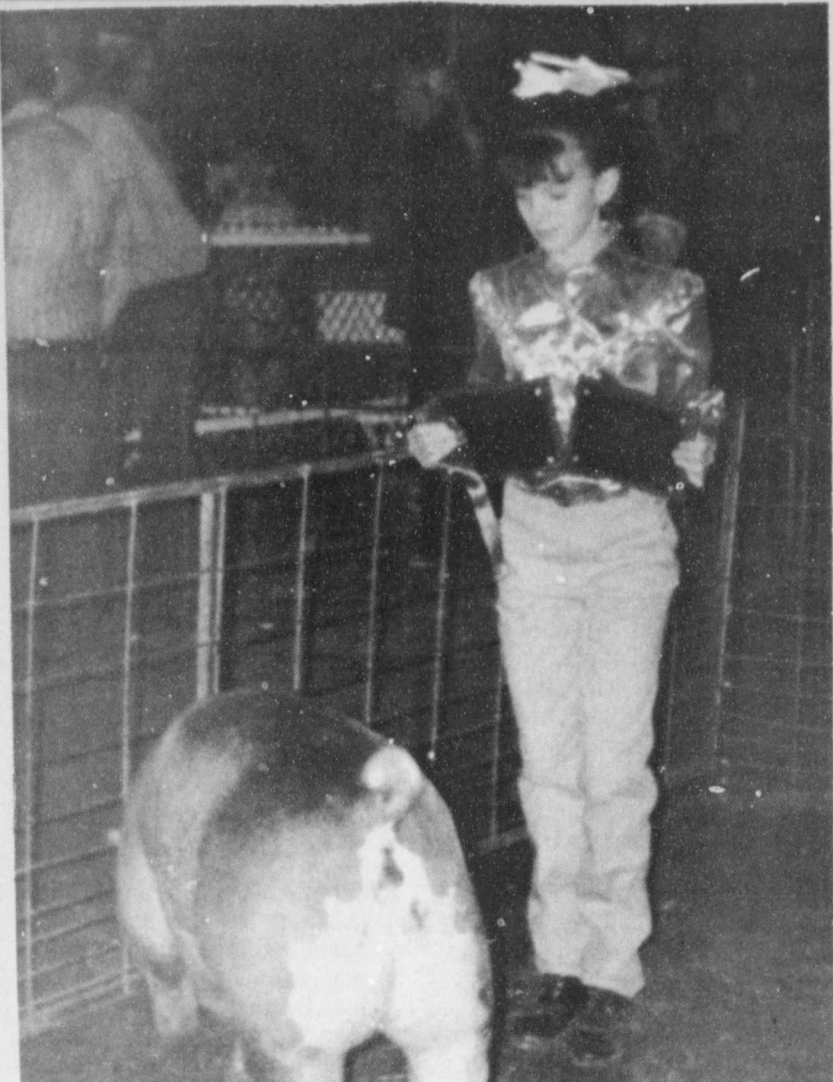

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**Wright Currently Deployed**

Navy Petty Officer 1st Class Stephen A. Wright, a 1977 graduate of Prairiland High School is currently in the Persian Gulf aboard the aircraft carrier USS America, homeported in Norfolk, VA and is in the middle of a six-month deployment.

Over the last several months, the carrier and its crew spent the holidays in Naples, Italy, where some of the crewmen helped rehabilitate a shelter for the homeless, donating more than 1,000 hours to the project.

His ship traveled to Souda Bay, Crete, becoming only the second US carrier to visit the port in over 20 years. Afterwards, Wright spent some

time in Athens, Greece, where the carrier hosted a parade, that included a performance by their 65-member Marine Corps detachment. More than 200 international dignitaries attended a reception and toured the carrier and its aircraft following the parade.

Most recently, Wright visited Antalya, Turkey, for a five day port visit before transiting the Suez Canal. The USS America is on its second major deployment in less than a year and was operating in the Mediterranean when reassigned to the Gulf.

He joined the Navy in December, 1978.

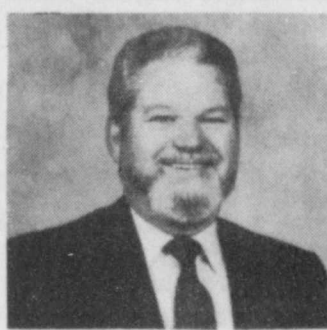

### Lamar County Volunteers To Sweep Highways April 4

**Ag Briefs**

CEA-AG, Lamar County  
Most area pecan trees are now in the budbreak stage of development, and that means that it is time to make the first zinc application. Remember that a pecan tree is unable to absorb sufficient quantities of zinc through the root system, and that zinc should be applied to the leaves. The first application is at budbreak followed by another application at prepollination or when leaves are one-third grown. Another suggested application time is about May 25, when one applies an insecticide for control of pecan nut casebearer.

Individuals can reduce many insect pecan problems by picking up and destroying fallen limbs, twigs and old pecan nuts. Specifically, one will reduce the problem with twig girdlers, hickory shuckworm and pecan weevil. Do not place these in a compost pile. They need to be destroyed or the nuts can be buried. Information on pecan production is available at our office in the County Courthouse.



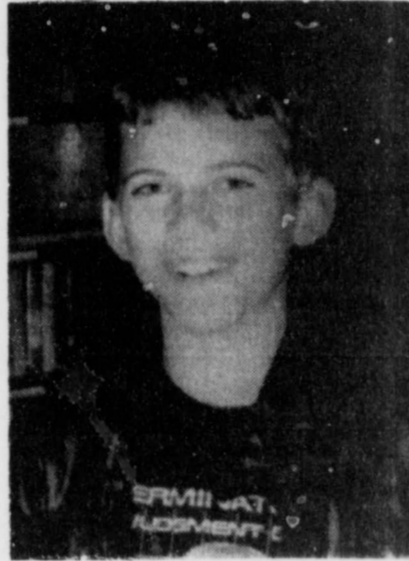


**Friday 42 Club Meets**
