The record shows that charges against sports figures are dropped, sentences are reduced, or the athletes are given special treatment.

NO ONE should be above the law. I don't care how important they are on a team. I don't care how popular they are.

Professional athletes on the whole are aware that they should set an example to the young fans that adore them. They are aware that fans are the reason that they have a sports career at all. The majority are worthy of the hero

worship they receive. But so much publicity goes to those that have a bad attitude, who cause troubleand who create disruptions.

.If punishment for improper behavior was shift and sure, then the message to those youngsters who look up to them would be

Sadly, I'm afraid that the message going out to kids these days is quite the opposite.

Remember...it's your tax dollars being destroyed! Be a good neighbor, call when you see someone.

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

Ag Briefs

By Paul D. Payne CEA-AG, Lamar County

Most area pecan trees are now in the budbreak stage of development, and that means that it is time to make the first zinc application. Remember that a pecan tree is unable to absorb sufficient quantities of zinc through the root system, and that zinc should be applied to the leaves. The first application is at budbreak folowed by another application at prepollination or when leaves are one-third grown. Another suggested application time is about May 25, when one applies an insecticide for control of pecan nut casebearer.

Individuals can reduce many insect pecan problems by picking up and destroying fallen limbs, twigs and old pecan nuts. Specifically, one will reduce the problem with twig girdlers, hickory shuckworm and pecan weevil. Do not place these in a compost pile. They need to be destroyed or the nuts can be buried.

Information on pecan production is available at our office in the County Courthouse.

All claims require approval by both the Treasurer's Office and the Attorney General's office. The Comptroller of Public Accounts will produce the check.

For claims that have no legal complications, the process takes less than 90 days form the date the claim form is received.

There are no charges or fees assessed by the Treasury to process and pay your claim. Returning your property is considered a public service. If you are contacted or sign a contract with an outside "Search/Heirfinder Firm" to assist you in claiming, their charges may not exceed 10% of the claim amount

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by natural disaster due to freeze and heavy rains are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in Paris, FmHA County Supervisor Joan M. Salisbury said today.

Lamar County is one of 39 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the natural disaster.

Mrs. Salisbury said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the in-

"As a general rule, a farmer must

have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Salisbury said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until October 28, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Salisbury said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which USA citizens hold a majority interest.



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

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

Section 1: There is hereby estabished the following addressing standards for numbering property and naming public streets/roads within the incorporated areas of the City of Talco (and any other areas by joint agreement of municipalities). Structures within this area are subject to addressing in accordance with this

ection 2. Street naming and numbering procedures shall blished in conjunction with the platting and subdivision requirements of the City of Talco.

a. A survey and inventory of all blic street names within the City boundaries shall be prepared by the City within three (3) months for use with addressing procedures. Property needing street naming or number assignment on public roads will be identified. Duplicate names or similar sounding names will be repealed and renamed on the recomindation of staff and the approval by the commissioners' court.

b. Street Name Criteria: Nonduplicative of existing names, limited to thirty (30) characters, no similar-sounding names. Directionals are spelled out (North). Deadending roads may not be designated streedts but cul-de-sacs, cove, or court. Other road types may be classified (boulevard must include median or be a minimum 150 feet in

width) as appropriate by the City. Name changes are considered for historical or clarification purposes and are limited to reconsideration three (3) years hence. Name changes must meet same criteria establishing

Property Numbering Criteria: Number assignments is based on a grid system: center point within the community, with axis forming base lines, north-south line being 6th. and east-west line being Broad. Block assignments will be consist of 300 feet per block where possible Number assignment progresses from the center point outward each direc-tion, wih the interval distance of 50 feet allowed for each number. Traveling from the center point, odd numbers assigned to the left and even numbers to the right street side.
d. Final approval of new street

names and name change requests resides with City of Talco (examples-Commissioner's Court, county engineer, review committee, emergency services personnel, or other). Street name adoption or changes must comply with criteria established under these standards. Section 3. Addressing standards

shall include requirements of prop-erty owners and inhabitants to post assigned property number at struc-ture. Number must be visible from the street and not be obscured. Residential posting may be no less than 3" high; business structure posting may be no less than 6" and, when located adjacent to roads with speed limits above 45 m.p.h., no less than 24". Grace priods for incorporating this requirement are within 3 months of new address notification.

Section 4: Street naming and property numbering procedures are standards as authorized in the County Road and Bridge Act (Art. 67 02-1, Texas Civil Statutes). These procedures will include:

a. A plat book containing public roads with proper numbering as-signed shall be kept on file for public use. Property undergoing subdivision, development, or building permits issued in areas without street addresses must comply with the
