A light breakfast will be served to all attending.

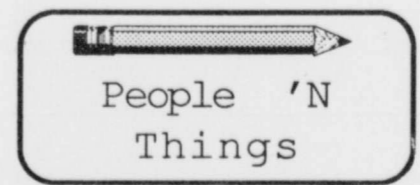
## Deport Kindergarten Roundup Is April 23

**Caramel-filled Chocolate Cookies**  
By Connie Basinger

2 1/2 cups flour  
3/4 cup cocoa  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup butter, softened  
2 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
12 cup chopped pecans  
48 rolo chocolate candies  
1 tbs. sugar

Preheat oven to 375. Combine flour, cocoa and baking soda, set aside. Beat sugars and butter, add vanilla and eggs. Add to flour mixture. Stir in 1/2 of pecans. For each cookie, shape 1 tbs. dough around 1 rolo candy, covering completely. Dip one side of each cookie in remaining pecans and sugar. Place nut side up, on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 7-10 minutes.

**Cranberry Salad**

1 pkg. fresh cranberries, 1 lb.  
1 pkg. large marshmallows, 1 lb.  
1 cup sugar  
1-15 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained  
1 pt. whipping cream  
3/4 cup walnuts, chopped

Grind alternately cranberries and marshmallows, an old fashioned meat grinder works well. Cover, refrigerate one hour. Whip cream and sugar until stiff. Cool Whip can be used instead of whipping cream. Stir in cranberry and marshmallow mixture. Add pineapple and nuts, mix well, refrigerate overnight.

**Mini-Cheesecakes**

1 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup butter, melted  
3-8 oz. cream cheese, softened  
1-14 oz. Eagle Brand milk  
3 eggs  
2 tsp. vanilla  
1 can pie filling (we like strawberry)

Preheat oven to 300. Mix crumbs, sugar, butter. Press equal portions into bottom of 24 paper cup lined muffin cups. Beat cream cheese, add Eagle Brand, then eggs and vanilla. Spoon equal amounts into prepared cups. Bake 20 minutes at 300. Cool, chill, then top with filling.

**Chocolate Chip Pound Cake**

Mix 3 eggs, 3/4 cup Wesson oil, 3/4 cup water.  
Add 1 cup sour cream, beat 1 minute. Add 1 Duncan Hines yellow cake mix and 1 small box chocolate instant pudding mix. Beat 4 minutes.  
Stir in 1-6 oz. Hershey's Milk Chocolate chips and 1 cup chopped nuts.  
Grease and flour bundt pan. Bake 45-55 minutes at 350. Let set in pan for a few minutes to cool.

**Hominy Casserole**

2 cans hominy, drained  
2-3 small green onions, chopped  
1-8 oz. cheese whiz (jalapeno or plain)  
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup  
crushed fritos

Mix and melt cheese and mushroom soup. Pour over hominy and onions in baking dish. Sprinkle crushed fritos on top. Bake at 350 until bubbly.

**Texas Chicken Ole'**

1 can Cream of Mushroom soup  
1 can Cream of Chicken soup  
1/4 cup water  
1 large can Pet milk  
1 small chicken, stewed, boned, skinned and chopped  
2 jalapeno peppers, chopped  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 pkg. taco shells (or Doritos)  
6 oz. grated cheddar cheese

Combine soups, water, milk, pepper and onion. Place layer of chips in 9x13 pan. Pour 1/2 of soup mixture. Add chicken and cheese. Pour remaining soup and top with chips and cheese. Bake at 350 until hot and bubbly.

## Cavender-Spray Engagement Announced

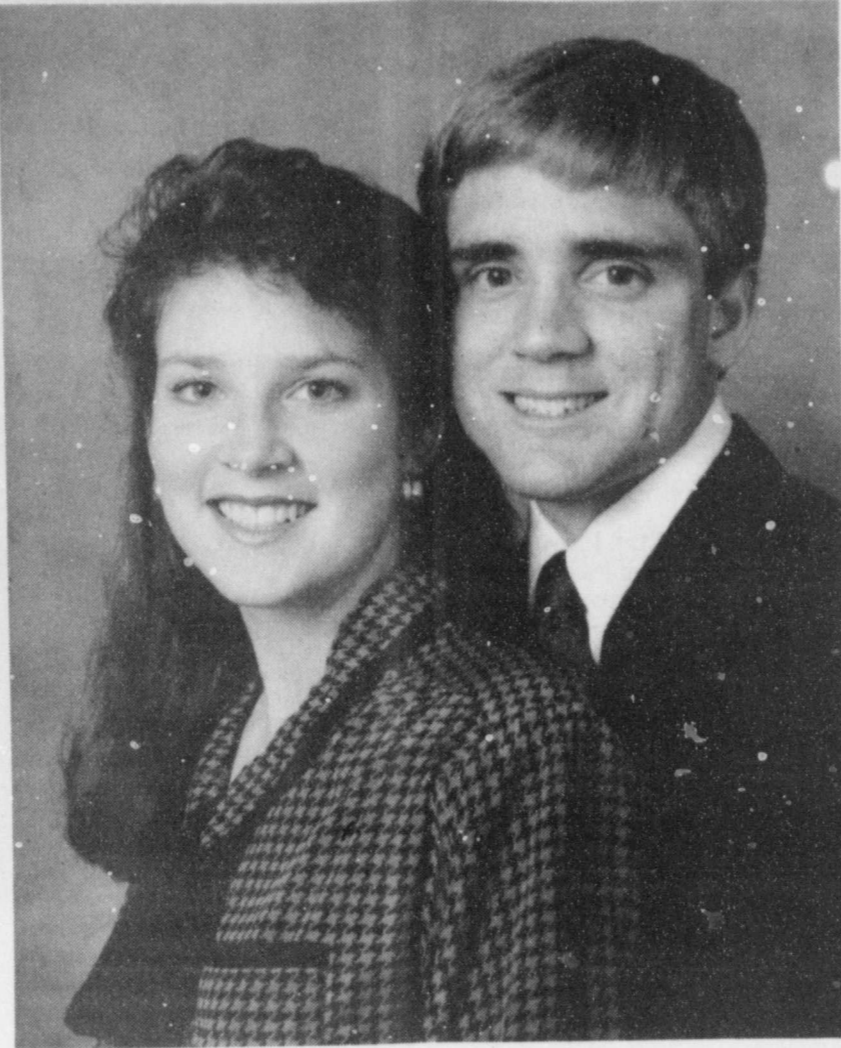

Stanley O'Brien was honored on his retirement from the Texas Department of Transportation on Tuesday, March 31 by fellow workers.

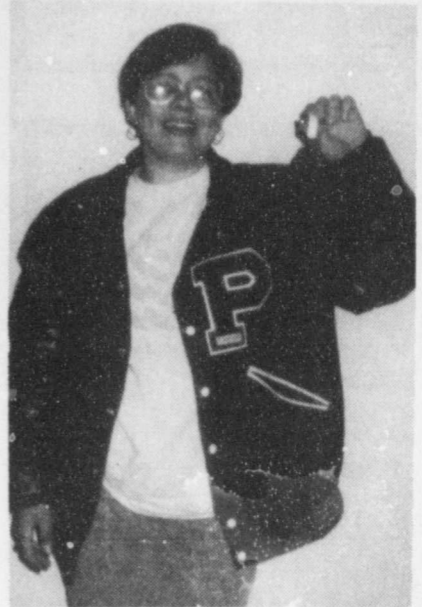

The theme of the State meeting is

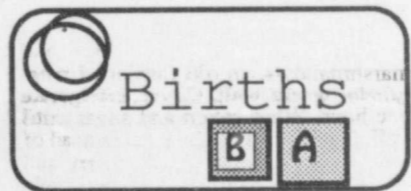

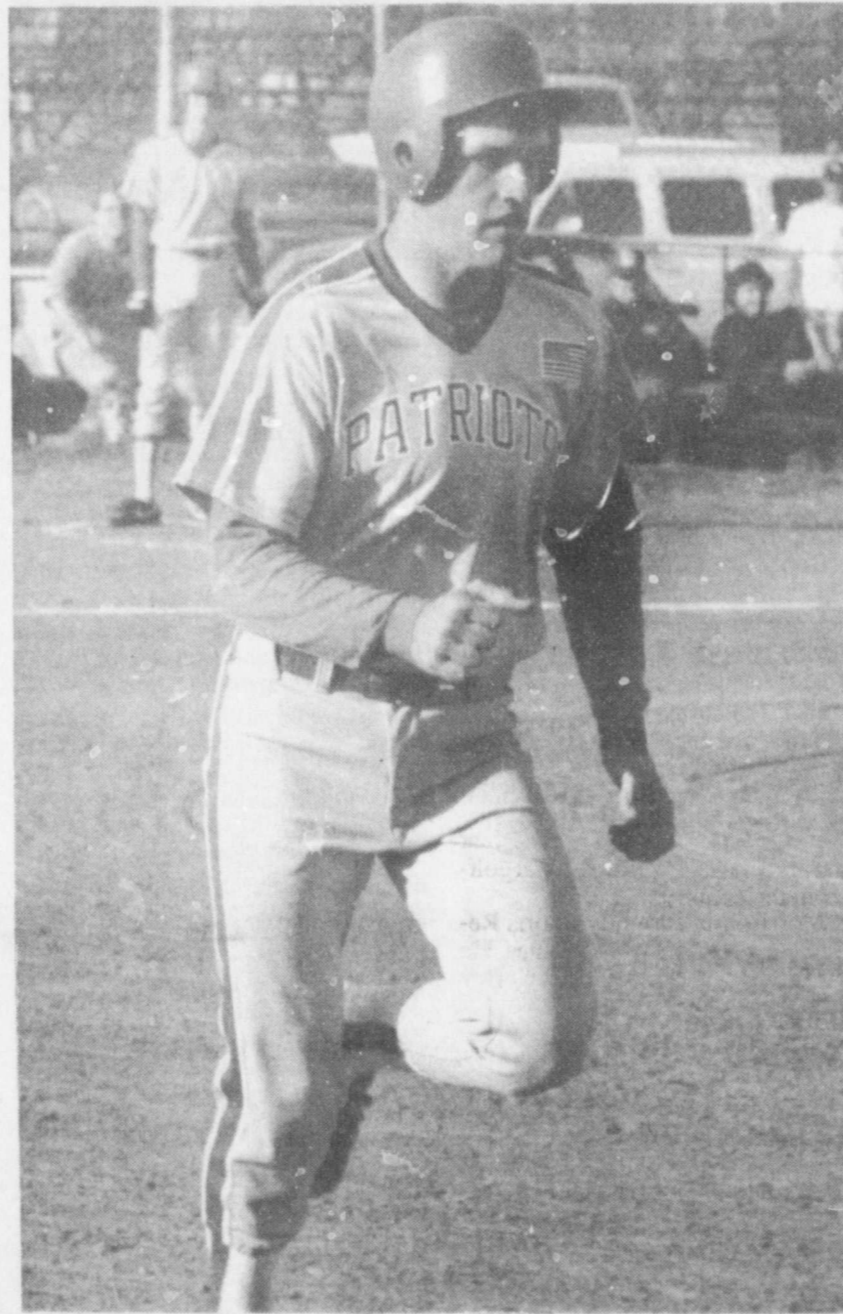

"She has natural thickness, good depth of ribs and balance, and is feminine. She's really something," Judge Randall Grooms of Overton said.

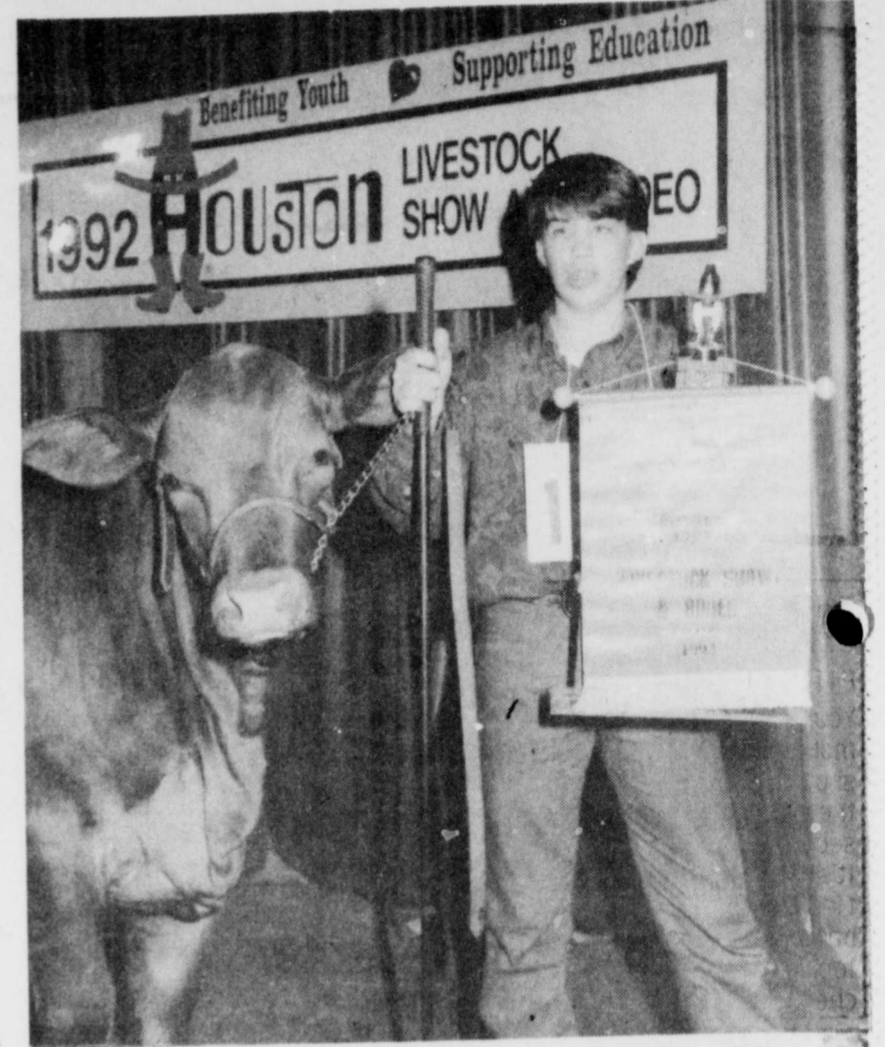
