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
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

1 cup sugar 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup butter, softened

2 tsp. vanilla

12 cup chopped pecans 48 rolo chocolate candies

l tbs. sugar Preheat oven to 375. Combine flour, cocoa and baking soda, set aside. Beat sugars and butter, add vanilla and eggs. Add to flour mixture. Stir in 1/2 of pecans. For each cookie, shape 1 tbs. dough around 1 rolo candy, covering completely. Dip one side of each cookie in remaining pecans and sugar. Place nut side up, on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 7-10 minutes.

Cranberry Salad 1 pkg. fresh cranb erries, 1 lb. 1 pkg. large marshmallows, 1 lb. cup sugar

1-15 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

1 pt. whipping cream 3/4 cup walnuts, chopped Grind alternately cranberries and marshmallows, an old fashioned meat grinder works well. Cover, refrigerate one hour. Whip cream and sugar until stiff. 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





The O'Briens plan to improve their farming interests in Shady Grove community and travel.







Of the 38 students participating, 10 placed in places first through sixth. In Ready Writing, Fair Shea Gifford won first and Melanie Griffin won third.


In Spelling, Shanna Pegg came in third and Kyle Mauldin placed fourth. Melissa Griffin placed sixth in Dictionary Skills.
