What Goes Into A Chili Cookoff?

If you didn't come out for all or part of the Chili Cookoff in Deport this past weekend you really missed out on a lot. You missed good food, fun, an auction, an egg hunt, duck races, absolutely fantastic bed races, chili and bean awards, games and prizes. You missed watching youngsters and their parents working and playing together, and achance to invest in the future of this community. If you did come out it's a cinch you enjoyed it more than anything on television!

In my personal opinion the event went off smoothly, and was a tremendous success. That doesn't mean there weren't moments of panic or flared tempers...only that all was overcome and worked out in the end.

So why this editorial? Well, there are two things I want to put before you for your consideration.

Number one is the reason for the cookoff. That reason is to raise money for the Deport American Legion and the Deport Volunteer Fire Department's charities. That may not sound too important. Sometimes it might be easy to even be a little tired of the word "charities"

But think about this: if the fire department has the proper equipment they provide not only fire protection...but they keep all our insurance rates down! As for the American Legion's charities...they are directed primarily towards the young people in our area. And young people are the future of this community...the only future any community ever has.

My second subject is this: have you considered the enormous amout of work that went into these events? The whole thing began months and months ago when it was time to begin notifying and inviting the CASI chili cooks. Auction donations have been solicited and picked up . Tee shirts designs and trophies have to be made, cook sack "goodies" must be collected, assembled and bagged. Judges have to be selected.

Baked goods must be solicited, then dozens and dozens of people pitch in to contribute by doing that baking.

Chili and stew ingredients have to be collected and purchased, and lots of time is spent peeling, measuring and simmering the concoctions. Cobbles must be baked, tea and coffee made and plates, napkins, bowls and spoons have all been

Before the events begin the town is spruced up. Mowing, trimming and street cleaning must all be tended to.

Beds for bed races have to be made, eggs must be dyed, prizes purchased and age groups labled for the egg hunts...and then the eggs must be hidden and prizes

Ball association parents spend their day running games to keep the kids occupied and to earn money for ball league needs.

People are required for all types of things. People must man concession stands, sell raffle and meal tickets, dish up food, and generally manage things.

And afterwards? Long after the crowds have gone home people are still there, washing, sweeping, scrubbing and packing things up, returning kettles and pans, collecting sack after sack of trash.

Then certificates of appreciation and thank you letters must be sent out. And all of this costs, too. Money has to be spent for postage, for prizes, for

briskets and stew ingredients, for tee shirts and caps, for printing and tickets and paper goods and supplies. If it weren't for the incredible generosity of those who donate there wouldn't even be a profit. In a small town we have choices to make. We can spend our lives wishing


someone else would do something to make our lives more interesting ... or we can get out and do something ourselves. We can wish we had more businesses...or we can actively encourage them.

VERY REAL 'PHANTOM PAIN'

Can you feel pain in a foot or toe that has been amputated? Ask anyone who has lost an appendage due to accident or surgery and the answer will likely be an anguished "Absolutely!" Although phantom pain is still something of a mystery, we know that remaining nerves continue to process pain messages in ways that register in the brain identically to the way they did when the messages were sent by the once-present tissue. In years past, there wasn't much that could be done for the excruciating sensations of pain that resulted. Today, several techniques are effective. Whirlpool baths and motion exercises are surprisingly successful. Injection of local anesthetic into the area of the amputation can also help.

P.S. If other methods fail, surgical removal of scar tissue or the regional nerve supply may be in order to stop "phantom pain."

Section 1: There is hereby established the following addressing standards for numbering property and naming public streets/roads within the incorporated areas of the City of Talco (and any other areas by joint ures within this area are subject to ddressing in accordance with this

Section 2. Street naming and property numbering procedures shall be established in conjunction with the platting and subdivision requirements of the City of Talco.

a. A survey and inventory of all public street names within the City boundaries shall be prepared by the City within three (3) months for use with addressing procedures. Property needing street naming or number assignment on public roads will be identified. Duplicate names or similar-sounding names will be repealed and renamed on the fecomndation of staff and the approval

by the commissioner's court.
b. Street Name Criteria: Nonduplicative of existing names, limited to thirty (30) characters, no similar-sounding names. Directionals are spelled out (North). Deadending roads may not be designated treets but cul-de-sacs, cove or court. Other road types may be classified (boulevard must include median or be a minimum of 150 feet in width) as appropriate by the City.

Name changes are considered for historical or clarification purposes and are limited to reconsideration three (3) years hence. Name changes must meet same criteria established for new street names. Petition for change must be presented with signatures from 3/4 of property owners and traffic volume may be considered as additional criteria.

c. Property Numbering Criteria: Number assignment is based upon a grid system: center point within the community, with axis forming base line, north-south line being 6th. and east-west line being Broad. Block assignments will be consist of 300 feet per block where possible. Number assignment progresses from the center point outward each direction, with the interval distance of 50 feet alowed for each number. Traveling from the center point, odd numbers assigned to the left and even numbers to the right street side.
d. Final approval of new street

names and name change requests resides with City of Talco (examples-

Commissioner's Court, county engineer, review committee, emergency services personnel, or other). Street name adoption or changes must comply with criteria established under these standards.

Section 3. Addressing standards

shall include requirements of prop-erty owners and inhabitants to post assigned property owners and inhabitants to post assigned property number at structure. Number must be visible from the street and not be obscured. Residential posting may be no less than 3" high; business structure posting may be no less than 6" and, when located adjacent to roads with speed limits above 45 m.p.h., no less than 24". Grace periods for incorporating this requirement are within 3 months of new address notification.

Section 4. Street naming and property numbering procedures are standards as authorized in the County Road and Bridge Act (Art. 6702-1 Texas Civil Statutes). These procedures will include:

a. A plat book containing public roads with proper numbering assigned shall be kept on file for public use. Property undergoing subdivision, developing, or building permits issued in areas without street addresses must comply with the addressing procedures.

b. Notification in written form must be presented to the property owner and/or tenant when final assignment of addresses occurs. Notification also should be made to the U.S. Postal Service. Once notified. the address becomes effective within thirty (30) days.

c. Within 60 days of notification, proper address number signage should be posted. After 20 days, if no number sign is posted, the enforcement shall consist of the proper authority posting such number and to apply applicable charges to the

resident or property owner.
d. Maintenance of the City's addressing procedure will reside in the City Hall

Section 5. Street signs should be erected at all intersections of public roads regardless of current route markings from state, federal or local designation. For new property development, the signage will be required at the expense of the developer. Signs must conform to guide lines established by the City public works office.
