

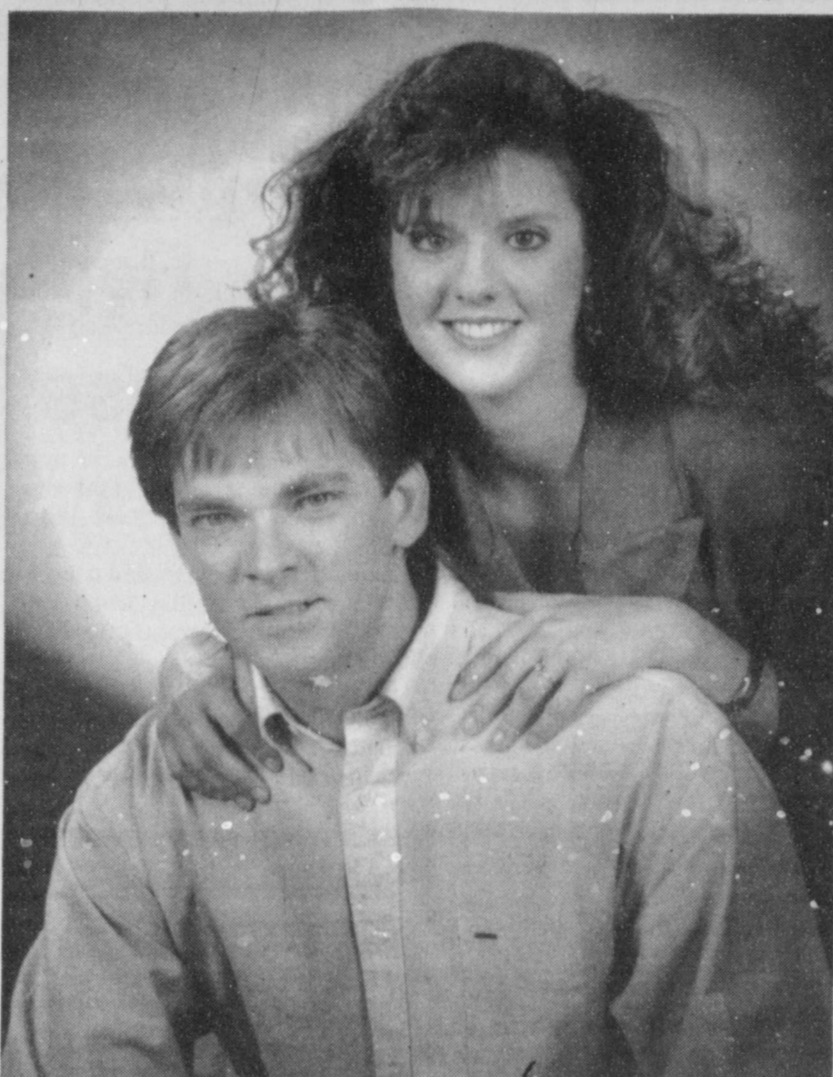




**Mowery-Jordan

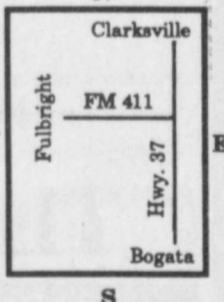

The Deport Methodist U.M.W. met in the church fellowship hall on May 4 for the regular meeting.

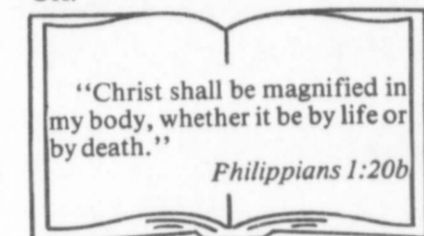
The president, Martha Glover, presided during the business meeting. The devotion, entitled "Wings of Love" from the book of Helen Steiner Rice, was given.

Rain forced Tuesday's game to be postponed until Thursday, and a wet home field forced a relocation to Mt. Vernon.

Larry Smith opened the bottom of the second inning with a sharp single to center, but the next three Pats all grounded out, leaving Smith at third

base. The Tigers used a fourth inning double and a squeeze bunt to score the game's first run. They added another run in the fifth on another well-executed bunt.

The Patriots found the Tiger hurler too much to handle until catcher Chad Whitley drove a high fastball out of the park in the sixth. The deficit had been cut in half at 2-1, but a fly out and back to back strike outs sealed

the Patriots' fate in the bottom of the seventh.

Mark Farris went the distance for the Pats, and he turned in a fine four hit performance while striking out eight. The loss drops the Patriots to 4-3 in conference play and 11-7 on the year.

## Crime Increased Only 2% In Texas For 1991

Despite a record number of murders, crime in Texas increased only 2% in 1991 compared with 1990, according to Uniform Crime Reporting information compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety. "We're pleased the overall number of reported crimes in Texas grew only slightly last year, but we're very concerned with the jump in violent crime, which was 12.7%," DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson said.

"All law enforcement agencies in Texas face a tough challenge." The crime rate, the number of reported offenses per 100,000 population, actually decreased slightly in 1991, dropping from 7,825.9 to 7,818 or by 0.1%. The DPS statistics show 2,651 murders were reported in Texas last year, compared with 2,388 in 1990. That amounts to an increase of 11%. The largest violent crime category

increase was in aggravated assault, which grew by 13.8% last year. Rape cases increased 5.9%, and robberies by 12.1%. "The news was a little better in the property crime category," Wilson said. "Overall, property crime increased by only 0.9%, though motor theft was up 6.1%. Burglary decreased by 0.6% and theft grew slightly by 0.4%."

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## Social Security Notes

Here's a good tip for anyone who works as a waiter or waitress--report your "tip" income now...and someday your Social Security benefits will be higher.

Many men and women work either full or part time as waiters or waitresses. And sometimes they are tempted to improve their current financial situation by pocketing tip income and not paying any income tax or Social Security tax on it.

But it's a case of being penny wise and pound foolish.

This is why. Many people tend to think of Social Security as a program only for the elderly. But Social Security offers more than just retirement benefits. There's also disability benefits, payments to family members and survivors insurance. In other words, depending on life's circumstances, you may find yourself collecting Social Security long before you ever

thought you would.

Social Security isn't designed to replace all earnings you no longer have because of retirement, disability or death. It is a base that you can build on, now and in the future.

However, that base of Social Security benefits is directly related to the amount of past earnings--reported earnings, including tips, on which Social Security taxes are paid.

To insure that you receive full credit on your Social Security record you should provide written reports to your employer of tips totaling more than \$20 per month.

The employer will then deduct your Social Security tax due on tips received from your wages and report your total earnings to Social Security.
