

Grandson of "World's Biggest Man" Spends Christmas With Deport Kin

Being grandson of the "biggest man in teh world" makes J.A. Wadley, former Deport man, a target for a barrage of questions wherever he goes, even though he is not physically a chip off the old block.

Mr. Wadley, who resided at Deport for four years in the 1890's..... (the following portion of the article is unreadable)...... He is the son of of Henry Wadley and Mary Darden, his ...(unreadable)... being a daughter of the famous Mill Darden, reputed to have weighed 1040 pounds before his death.

The giant was born in the hills of North Carolina in 1799 and moved to Henderson County, Tennessee in 1822. He was said to have stood seven feet and six inches and to have

(Reprinted From The Deport Times, worn a coat that could be buttoned Her name was Tamesia Cooper. around three men, each of whom weighed more than 200 pounds. Mrs. Wadley recalls that his trousers waistband would button around seven averaged-sized women. This remnant of clothing was kept as a family heirloom until in 1880 it was put on exhibition at the Nashville State Fair.

His appetite and ability to stow away food was the talk of his part of Tennessee in his day. His traditional breakfast consisted of 40 biscuits, a pound of butter, two and half pounds of bacon and..(unreadable)...

The uncrowned of..(unreadable)... of his day established a record even in death. His special-built coffin occupies a grave....(unreadable)... feet and six inches long and is buried beside his wife, who weighed only 99 pounds.

Mr. Wadley, who will be 72 next July, says there were no Fairbanks scales in his grandfather's day and the way they arrived at his great weight was to mark the wagon springs when he sat in the seat and then to put other weights on the seat when he got off.
