Of course not. If we don't think it would work we wouldn't buy it. But it makes me wonder just a little when they try to assure us of that.

Another thing. How many times can a product be "New_Imporved_Better_Stronger_More Powerful...Better Flavor....Healthieretc., etc.?

Does that mean it wasn't very good to begin with? Why didn't they make it the very best they could at the start of marketing instead of "improving" the product fifteen times in it's first year or so of production?

The answer is obvious...they do it to sell more.

But Sometimes I wonder just a little about their techniques.

Still, those lables with outrageous or silly claims don't bother me nearly as much as the new packaging strategies

The pound of coffee that isn't a pound is a well known thing, now. We adjusted to the fact that we

don't buy coffee by the pound anymore. Soon, I suppose, we will adjust to the sneaky fact that a five pound

bag of sugar usually contains only 4 lbs.

Marketing does this to avoid upping the price, so they say.

Of course any fool knows that when you pay the same price for 4 lbs. as you do for 5 lbs. there HAS been a price increase. But, like I said, they are pretty

sneak and hope no one notices. Bacon, little sausages, various canned goods are doing much the same thing, putting less into a package and charging the same. Somehow, the size of the container never seems to shrink ei-

ther! It doesn't matter much, we have to have the food items anyway. But somehow, someway, I can't help but wish that the marketing strategists would realize that the public isn't a bunch of idiots falling for these little tricks.

No, we know what they are up to, we just have to buy the stuff anyway!

Crawfish Etouffee 1/4 cup chopped onions 1/4 cup chopped celery

1/2 cup butter 2 lbs. peeled crawfish tails 1/4 cup water

2 tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. ginger tsp. cinnamon

1 cup hot water Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Mix in sugar, add eggs one at a time, beat well after each addition. Sift together flour, salt, baking soda ginger and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture. Add hot water. Pour into greased and floured pan 9" square and bake at 350 for 40 minutes.

Chocolate Chip Pie By Joyce Landrum

1/2 cup all purpose flour 1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar 3/4 cup butter, softened 1 cup chopped nuts if desired, I use pecans sometimes

cup semi-sweet chocolate chips unbaked pie shell

Preheat oven to 325. In large bowl, beat eggs until foamy, beat in flour sugar and brown sugar until well blended. Beat in softened butter, stir in nuts (optional) add choclolate chips. Pour into pie shell.

Bake about 50 minutes, until knife inserted comes out clean and top is golden brown. Cool on wire rack. This is good served with whipped cream, ice cream or with no topping at all.

In the event the owner fails or refuses to pay such expense within thirty (30) days after the first day of the month following the one in which the work was done, the City shall file with the County Clerk a statement of the expenses incurred in correcting the condition on the property. When such statement is filed, the City shall have a privileged lien on such property, second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements, to secure the payment of the amount so expended. Such amount shall bear interest at the rate of ten (10) percent per an-num from the date the City incurs the expense. For any such expenditures and interest, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had by the City. The statement of expense filed with the County Clerk or a certified copy thereof shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended in such work; improve-

ment or correction of the property, all as more particularly specified in Art. 4436, Vemon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, which is hereby adopted.




