## Comptroller Sends June Rebates Totaling \$105.6 Million

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent a total of \$105.6 million in June sales tax rebates to 934 Texas cities and 105 counties, a 7% increase over payments a year ago.

Another \$142.5 million in quarterly payments went to six transit authorities in the state's largest cities.

Houston received the largest city sales tax rebate for June, \$14.1 million, down 5.6% from the city's \$14.9 million in 1991.

Locally, Mt. Pleasant received \$113,991.85 for this period, a 4.15%

decrease from last year. Talco received \$1,042.11 for a 12.63% decrease.

Bogata received \$1,574.31 for a 16.99% decrease while Clarksville received \$16,984.36 for a 0.11% decrease.

Blossom received \$1,250.07 for a 0.46% decrease.

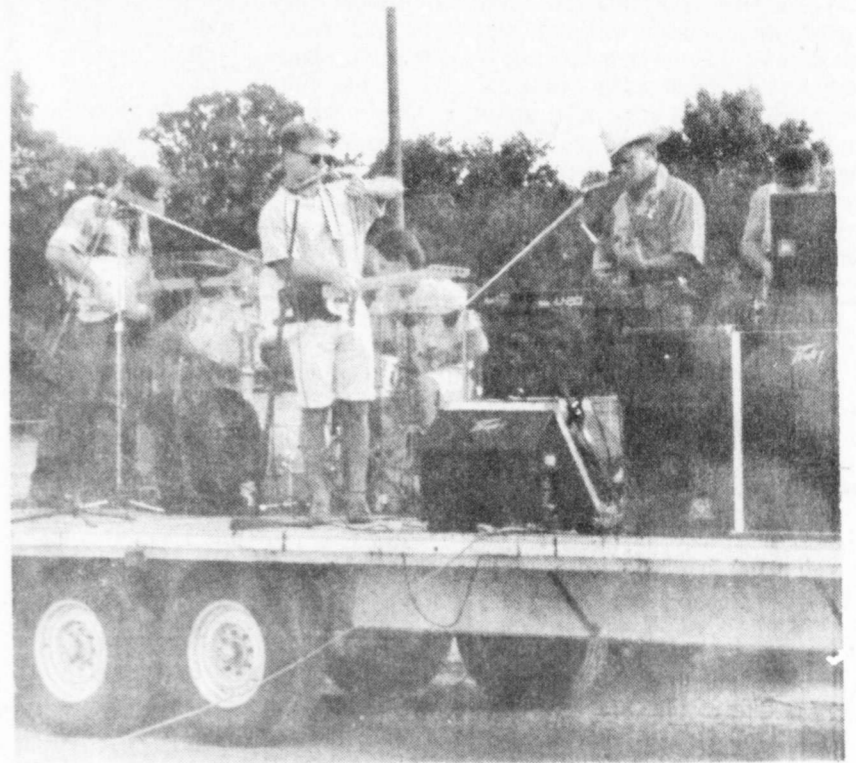
Deport received \$667.35 for an 11.52% increase.

Paris received \$185,655.17 for a 5.75% decrease.

"Eroded consumer confidence and

other recessionary woes have resulted in cancellation or delay of many construction projects and dampened demand for manufactured goods. Strong job gains in the government, services, transportation and trade sectors in Dallas have helped balance losses in other sectors," said Sharp.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on April sales and reported to the Comptroller in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

The Country Cooking Column is coming to you this week from the overflow file folder of recipes I want to share that I have received lately or have had quite sometime.

It is very exciting to receive country cooking mail. Recipes have come from many, many different states since I started this column and I thank each of you for the great response.

I know many of you have great recipes to share who live too far away to be interviewed, so I'm encouraging you to continue sending them in. Also I want to encourage you who raise a garden, etc. to send in vegetable recipes or fruit recipes that we may not have run. For example: squash, there are lots of things you can do with this vegetable and right now we have an abundance of it and need new recipes. This also holds true with tomatoes, okra, etc. Two of the recipes I'm sharing this week come from two of my sisters-in-law, one from Lubbock, Melba, and one from New Mexico, Elaine. Both are ex-

remely great cooks and I hope you enjoy these recipes.

Recently we had a request for syrup pie. I have received a syrup pie and a syrup cake recipe to share from Wootie Harville of Bogata. She says these two recipes were her mothers and if she were alive, she would be 104. Wootie has used the recipes for over 50 years. Thanks, Wootie. I also had a request for a chocolate chip pie recipe and have had great response. I want to share two recipes I received and I will run another one later. Bobbye Slusher of Cunningham sent the Chocolate Chip pie recipe and Kitty Mays of Clarksville sent the Derby Pie recipe. Thanks to both of you and also to Nellie Lowell of Dallas for sharing her Easy Caramel Pie recipe with us.

**Syrup Pie**  
By Wootie Harville  
1/4 cup butter or oleo  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 1/2 cups sorghum syrup  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 beaten eggs

Melt oleo, add flour, stir until smooth; then add syrup and sugar, boil 3 minutes. Cool, add eggs and salt, blend well. Pour into unbaked crust. Bake in hot oven (450) for 10 minutes, reduce heat to 350, bake another 30 minutes.

**Syrup Cake**  
By Wootie Harville  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
2 cups flour  
1/2 cup boiling water  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups syrup, sorghum or ribbon cane

1 teaspoon cinnamon  
Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy, add eggs, then dry ingredients alternately with syrup and boiling water. Beat enough to mix thoroughly. Bake in loaf pan or 12 1/2x8x2" pan, in 300 oven for 40-45 minutes.

**Derby Pie**  
By Kitty Mays  
1 stick butter  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup flour  
2 beaten eggs  
1 cup chopped pecans  
1/2 cup chocolate chips  
1 tsp. vanilla

Melt butter; pour into sugar and flour mixture. Add eggs, vanilla, chocolate chips and pecans. Pour into pie shell and bake at 325 for 45 minutes.

**Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf**  
By Melba Bankhead Holbert  
2 lbs. hamburger meat  
1 small onion, chopped  
1 1/4 T salt  
1 egg  
1 1/4 cups cracker crumbs  
black pepper to taste  
Sauce:  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce  
1 cup vinegar  
1 T mustard

Half mixture. Put half in meat loaf, pour the other half over loaf and bake. **Wheat Bread, Montana Style**  
By Elaine Bankhead Wheeler  
4 cups extra warm water  
2 1/2 cups wheat flour  
3/4 cup oil  
2 T salt  
1 cup honey  
2 pkg. yeast

Mix all with mixer real good and smooth. Let set 1 hour. Add 10 c. regular flour, knead 25 or 30 minutes, the more the better till it squashes then let rise and make loafs or rolls. Let rise real good. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes.

**Chocolate Chip Pie**  
By Bobbye Slusher  
1/4 cup plus 2 Tbs. butter or oleo, softened  
1 cup sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
1-6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips  
3/4 cup chopped pecans  
1/2 cup flaked coconut  
1 unbaked 9" pie shell.

Combine butter or oleo, sugar and vanilla in medium mixing bowl; beat well. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in flour. Gradually stir in chocolate chips, pecans, and coconut. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Bake at 350 for 35-40 minutes. Yield: 1 9" pie.

**Easy Caramel Pie**  
By Nellie Lovell  
Crust:  
Pinch holes in bottom of pan pie crust with fork. Bake 15 minutes at 350 then raise heat to 400. Keep from burning. Put 1 cup sugar in iron skillet to melt on low heat.

Sift:  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
in stewer, stir well. Pour 1 3/4 cup milk in slowly, stir until no lumps. Cut 1/2 stick margarine into small pieces. Mix together with 3 egg yolks beaten well. When sugar is melted, pour slowly with one hand. Stir constantly with other hand. Put on heat and cook until caramel is melted and filling is thick. Put 1 tablespoon vanilla in stewer. Stir well, pour into baked crust.  
Beat 3 egg whites, put in dash of salt, beat until stiff. Put 1 tablespoon sugar, beat more. Put on top pie. Bake at 350 until brown as you want.

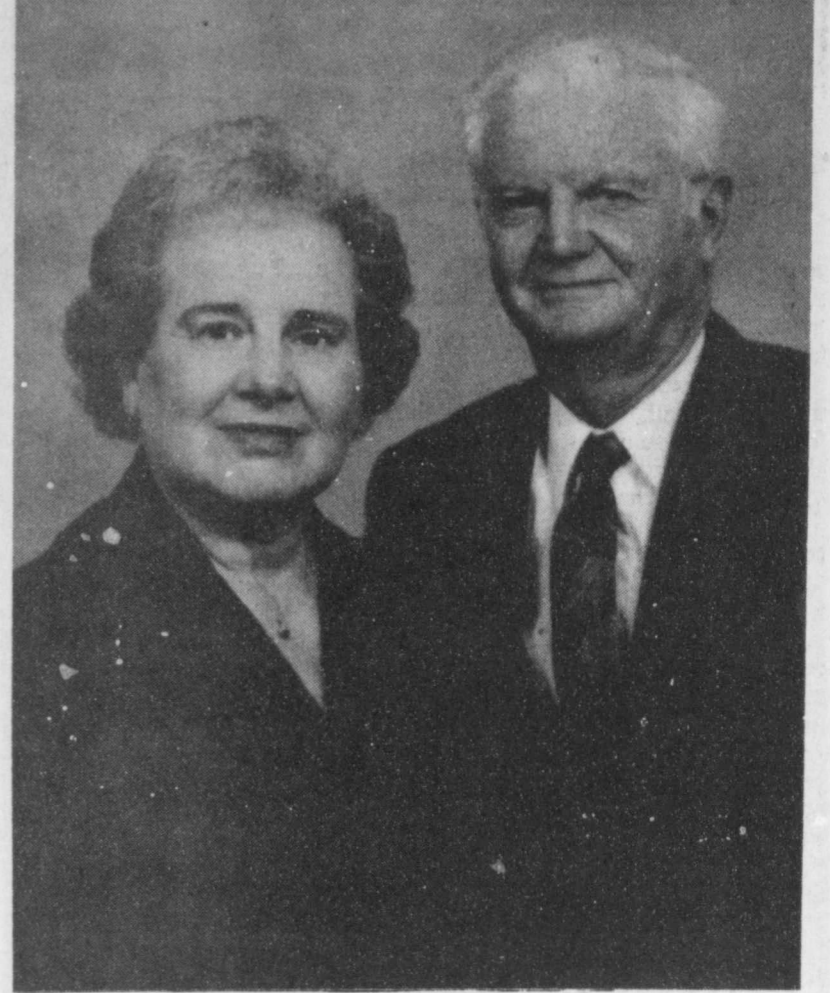

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# A Nighttime Tour Of Old Edinburgh Can Be A "Spooky" Experience!

Murder, mystor, ghosts and torture...a walk through the darker side of old Edinburgh was how we spent our first night in Edinburgh!

And, to make it even creepier, the evening was, as our guide said "Dreek". Dreek meaning very very damp.

Our group of thrill seekers gathered outside a restaurant on castle hill called "The Witchery". Our guide introduced himself as one Adam Lyle, deceased, hanged for his crimes in the 1700's.

He came to us dressed in a black cloak, white shirt with lace at collar and cuffs, and a dead white face.

We scrambled along wet cobblestones up to the grounds just down from Edinburgh castle.

There we stood at the witch's fountain while Adam explained about the terrible witch trials of long ago.

In Scotland there were over 4000 people executed as witches! Where we stood had seen the deaths, by strangling, then burning, of over 300 poor souls.

The civil authorities, he explained, were corrupt and they took possession of the worldly goods of a convicted witch. For that reason many wealthy people were accused of witchery! Others were poor old women caught talking to their cat, or simply mumbling to themselves as they wandered around the marketplace.

A list of crimes, taken from the registers of the city, included "Talking to the devil; causing people to lose the power of speech; causing people to fall from their horses and break bones, or enticing the devil up".

The manner of confession was pretty tough, too. It seems that they used to sit a poor woman on a "ducking stool" and duck her into the loch. If she drowned, then it meant she was innocent. If she was a witch she would save herself by popping to the surface! Then, they took the "witch" and strangled her and then burned her.

Hmmmm, what a system of justice.

We followed our ghostly guide up and down narrow single file alleys called closes. We heard of hangings, ghosts, and the way things were in old Edinburgh centuries ago.

We also, at unexpected times, were joined by some rather strange visitors.

Ghosts and old women came to join us, popping out of dark corners and places at the least expected of times.

No matter how hard we tried to anticipate their appearances, they always managed to surprise us enough to make us jump in spite of our vigilance!

It seems that back in the 1600 and 1700's hanging used to be about as much entertainment as baseball is today.

Up to 25,000 or 30,000 people would come to see a "good" hanging! Rooftops and windows were rented out if they had a clear view of the gallows.

All these stories were told to the accompaniment of blowing wind, falling, ice cold rain and pitch darkness! Needless to say there was quite an atmosphere to go along with the tour.

We were finally in a wet, very dark place at the back of a building. There our guide began his tale of the much famed Burke and Hare...the body snatchers who used to murder people and take them up the hill to Edinburgh Medical College. Dr. Robert Knox bought the nice, fresh cadavers for dissection.

The infamous pair would entice some indigent, village idiot or stranger to an evening of hard drinking, then smother them (so there wouldn't be marks on the corpse) then take them to the doctor, who paid 10 pounds per body.

They were finally caught when they killed a young woman who was a "lady of the night" whom many of the medical students recognized! This aroused suspicion since she was known to be healthy the day of her death.

One of the two men turned state's evidence and the other was hanged for his crimes. Ironically, he was wheeled up to the back door of the medical school for dissection after his hanging.

About the time these horrendous stories were being told a yell erupted, there was a crash and some strange creature dashed right through the middle of us. We jumped, some of our party screamed, and away we went again, up stone stairs to yet another narrow close.

The mad monk came to visit then. A small, hunched figure in a monk's habit, he had a horrible skeletal face, and muttered and whined most convincingly.

We had a lengthy discourse on the horrors of the plague, which killed so many people. Adam Lyle then pulled out the famous plague carrier...a rat!

This brought on more shrieks and screams than anything so far...even though the roden t proved to be stuffed.

We also learned about the closes sanitation...or lack of it.

Everyone would throw all their garbage and other unmentionable stuff down into the street from their windows for collection. The odor must have been horrible!

At the very last we rounded a corner to be greeted by boiling, foul smelling smoke rolling down stairs towards us.

As we began up the steps, almost choking on the eery, backlit vapors, the mad monk plunged among us, setting off fire-cracker like flashes and pops from something!

It thinned us out pretty quickly! We wound up back on the Royal Mile, wet, tired and as happy as a bunch of clams.

The tour had given us a look back in time, to Deacon Brodie, the model for Robert Louis Stephenson's "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, to tortures and

accusations of witchcraft, to hangings and the cruelty of an earlier age.

The whole evening was filled with lots of fun as our ghostly guide cracked jokes and filled the evening with lots of chatter. It wasn't designed to be really frightening, only fun, and they certainly succeeded.

But it also brought home the harsh realities of what life must have been like hundreds of years ago.

In the dark and wet the stories of a plague-filled world stalked by death, of a justice system capable of stacking all the facts in their favor, and a city of filth and garbage became much more real than if they were told

in the bright sunlight which revealed the autos, luxuries and modern conveniences we take for granted now.

We walked back down the hill to our hotel for a hot cup of coffee a hot shower and dry clothes.

Our night time tour of Edinburgh proved to be one of the most interesting parts of the whole trip, and our video of it is a real "scream" to watch!

The next morning we were up nice and early to take a daylight look at castle hill, and the castle on top of it.

We'll discuss that next week, as Archie, our 84 year old guide, gave quite a history lesson.



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
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# Tales of Skye and Highland Flings

Here is a continuation of our vacation in Scotland. A I've said before, don't read it if you don't have interest, it's purely voluntary.

Anyone who has ever been in the city of Edinburgh knows that castle hill dominates the city.

Early the morning after our late night prowling the dark, wet streets of the old town we were back for a daylight tour of town and castle.

Archie was our guide that morning, a spry 84 year old dressed in his kilts and telling tales of the old city.

The view from Edinburgh Castle is absolutely superb.

Misty islands were visible in the harbor, and big ships plied the water.

We saw the dog cemetery, where animals attached to military regiments were buried, and toured the state apartments, wandered up and down.

The Scots crown jewels, while not as impressive in England's, are the oldest in Europe.

Most of the Scottish crown jewels were looted by the English, leaving very few pieces.

We saw Deacon Brodie's tavern, the Robert Lewis Stephenson House, Admiral Nelson's monument (a huge tower built in the shape of a telescope) and the monument to Greyfriar's Bobby.

This is a little fountain topped by a long haired, floppy eared dog likeness.

Bobby was a dog who followed his master's funeral procession into the cemetery. After everyone departed he continued to lie on his master's grave. This the faithful little dog did for fourteen years, leaving only to go to a nearby pub for a meal, then returning to his master's grave.

Holyrood Palace was closed to the public because the royal family would be coming up from London soon.

We did see the ruined abbey, the grounds, fountains and ornate gates.

Then we rode up to Arthur's seat, a wilderness park with wild flowers blooming.

That afternoon Thomas and I wandered around the Royal Mile. We found a grocery store and bought Scotch eggs (hardboiled with sausage wrapped around them) and sodas, then repaired to Canongate cemetery for lunch and a long look at the gravestones.

We made our way to Registry House, where every birth, marriage and death is recorded, shopped for some gifts, then came back to our hotel worn out, but contented.

We joined the rest of our tour group for an evening of Highland Dancers, bag piping and singing, plus a meal held in an old stone stable, with a canvas roof, we were a little disappointed in the evening, finding it too "touristy" for our tastes.

Next morning it was up and on our way for a beautiful day's drive.

A brief stop at the eighteenth hole of St. Andrews golf course put the avid golfers into heaven. The wind was howling at 35 mph, and the waves on the north sea were being stripped of their tops and blown back out to sea.

At the small town of Pitlochry we toured the Blair Atholl Distillery, seeing how one of Scotland's major exports is made. Scotch Whiskey is world famous. We went through the old stone buildings, past vats of fermenting liquid, through rooms with enormous copper stills, then to a room where we were offered a "wee dram" (taste) of the whiskey made here. I'm sorry, but it tasted terrible to me!

We visited Blair Castle, a snowy white building filled with artwork and armour.

Then we wandered along through the Grampian mountains, capped with snow and absolutely magnificent.

Throughout the day our tour director, David, had proceeded to tell us that we would be getting up at

3:30 in the morning to go hunt Haggis.

The Haggis, he insisted, was a tiny bird that was very elusive.

We would go out in our "wellies" (rubber boots) with Firkle Sticks and Gotcha sticks to frighten the birds into falling down the moutain, then use the Gotcha sticks to capture them.

Imagine his surprise when a tour member phoned him at 3:30 in the morning to tell him that there were six tour members in the lobby waiting to go Haggis hunting!

A good sport, he took the joke quite well. It had, after all, happened to him before.

The next day we drove to the most famous Loch of all...Loch Ness. Twenty-three miles long, one mile wide and 900 feet deep, it's a lovely lake (excuse me, loch), we didn't get a sight of the monster, of course, although we did see a striking ruined castle on the banks.

Up at the peaks of the moutains we stopped in the middle of nowhere for a view that was breathtaking.

As far as the human eye could see mountain peaks swept in paler and paler shades of blue and purple until they could no longer be distinguished from the sky.

Lochs and trees whispered and rippled in the wind below us, and the road stretched on, seemingly forever.

We made our way to the isle of Skye then.

Skye is one of the famed "misty Isles" and is reached by a ferry.

The famous song about bonny Prince Charlie goes "Fly bonny boat like a bird on the wing, onward the sailors cry, carry the lad that was born to be king, over the sea to Skye."

This refers to Charles Edward Stuart's flight after his massive defeat at Culloden, when the Scots would not reveal him to the English who had placed a huge price on his head.

Skye is an island isolated and pleasant, with small cottages and stunted, sea- and- wind twisted trees.

While on the island we visited the "Black House" a crofters museum with furnishings and articles showing what the harsh life of long ago must have been.

A pleasant smelling peat fire burned in the fireplace. Peat burns with no sparks, and chimneys can be made of mud and straw!

We returned to the mainland by the ferry once more, learning that construction of a bridge to the islands

is now underway, practical, I'm sure, but certainly not as romantic.

A boat ride on another loch made famous in song completed the day. Loch Loman was gull filled, cool and pleasant, and our boat ride delightful.

It was much warmer and sunnier than had been going back to the Drumossie Hotel, perched above Inverness.

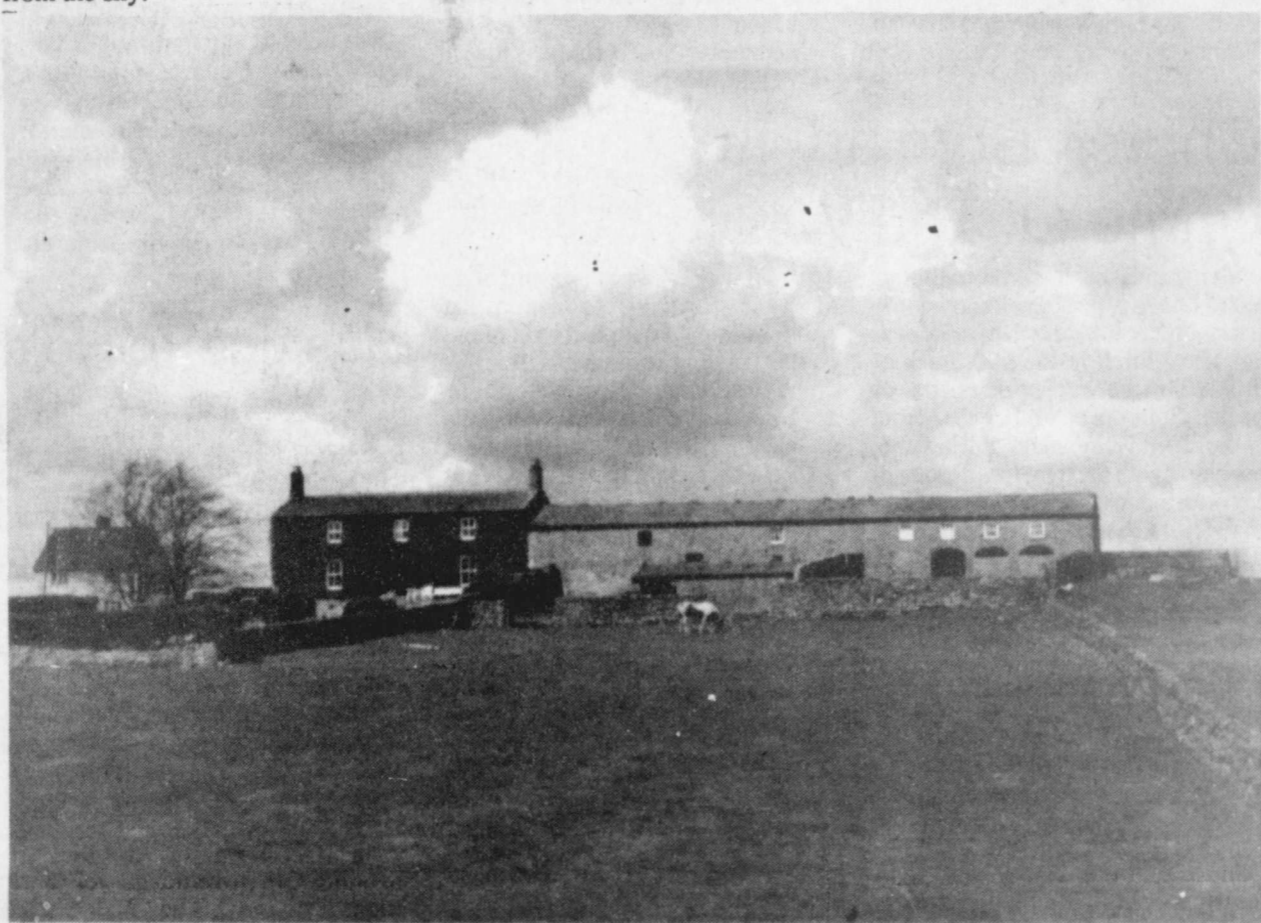
That night we had a treat, the Highland Dance School had a host of little girls on hand to do the Highland Flings, and many other Scottish dances.

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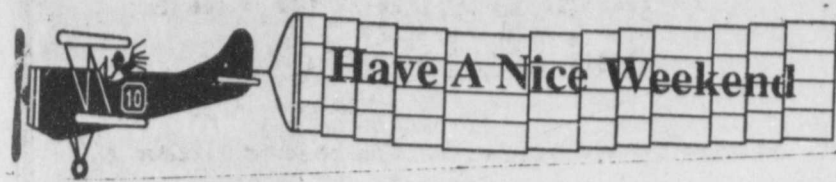

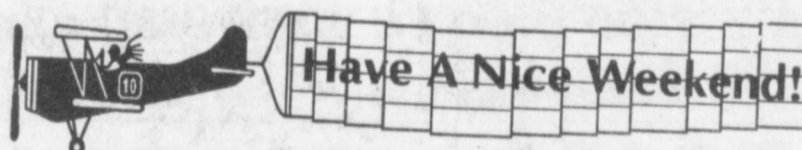

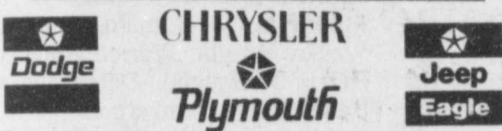
