## Storms Do Severe Damage

It was a dark and stormy night...again. Tuesday night, July 14 storms proved once again to be expensive and damaging. Huge trees were toppled, many doing damage to homes and vehicles, especially in Deport.

A huge thunderstorm line moved into the area, with the first storm hitting in Paris about 7 or 7:30 p.m. Large hail did most of the damage there. That line of storms continued moving eastward down Red River. Blossom sustained small hail and lost some large tree limbs. Some street flooding was reported.

Around an hour later another storm built over Deport. This storm did its worst damage on Depot street. It took down two trees in the front yard of the

Ronald Nichols'. When the trees fell they sheared off a gas meter and took down a light pole. They also totalled the Nichols' pickup and car.

Deport Volunteer Fire Department had to evacuate the area as natural gas and live electric lines provided the potential for fire or explosion. Between 15 and 20 people left the area until gas a power could be restored to a safe state.

At the Denman home on Pecan street in Deport Bessie Denman's car was destroyed as a large tree toppled directly onto it.

On North Jeffus Street a big limb blocked the road for a while, and two smaller trees narrowly missed the home of the Randy Talley's. At Grant park another big tree was blown

down. Lightning struck and exploded a pecan tree on Fourth Street, and numerous smaller trees and limbs were ripped loose.

Lightning did damage to several homes, burning out televisions and appliances. Along with the wind and rain was mothball sized hail which covered the ground briefly.

The storm moved eastward, tearing small limbs and providing more lightning damage as it approached Bogata and went on through Talco. Neither town suffered as heavy damage as where the storm first struck, however.

Another thunderstorm of much milder proportions went through the area Wednesday morning. The forecast? More of the same!

## Deport Council Sending Certified Letters To Owners Of Overgrown Property

The Deport City Council agreed to mail out several letters, most of them concerned with fire and health hazards.

It was agreed to mail out certified letters containing portions of the ordinance about vacant or derelict properties to the owners of these unkempt properties stating that they constitute a fire and health hazard.

The council also decided to send a certified letter to the property owner of the buildings on the North End of Main Street because of the condition of the buildings creating a hazardous fire and health situation.

In addition the council hear a presentation from Nancy Gresham about the warehouse which Blackland Prairie Gin is proposing to build in the future.

They also agreed to enforce the grease trap ordinance on several local businesses.

Mt was decided to call A-1 Tree Service to remove the large pecan tree in the street on Beville St.

They discussed the budget for the next meeting, August 10th, approved the minutes as read, financial report was approved as presented, and payment of all bills approved.

## School Board Awards Bids, Changes

The Prairiland School Board met Monday night and accepted bids on food items. Oak Farms was awarded the milk bid based on lowest fixed bid and Mrs. Bairds Bread received the bread bid.

They approved changes in the high school curriculum and plan to award the Salutatorian and Valedictorian awards based on Grade Point Averages.

They approved a plan to purchase insurance coverage for all students participating in any UIL sanctioned event in grades 6-12. This includes football, basketball, baseball, softball, track, tennis, golf, band, cheer-

leaders, UIL trips and other sanctioned events sponsored by the school.

They heard and accepted a report on Prairiland AEIS scores.

Accepted and approved changes in student handbook and approved a resolution for Lamar County Appraisal district to handle delinquent tax property.

All food service personnel was placed on a salary schedule.

Cheryl Brooks was hired subject to assignment at Deport.

The minutes were heard and approved, and they accepted the financial report and budget amendments.

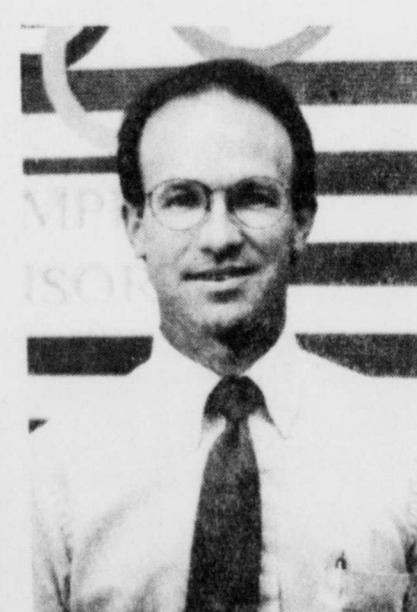

### Play Dough By Beth Roach

1 cup white flour  
1/4 cup salt  
2 tbs. cream of tartar  
1 cup water  
2 tsp. food coloring  
1 tsp. oil  
Cook over medium heat and stir 3-5 minutes. Keep in refrigerator when not in use.

1 can cream of chicken soup

2 cups grated cheese  
salt and pepper

1 can crescent rolls  
1-1/2 lb. sausage, browned and drained  
8 oz. pkg. mozzarella cheese, grated  
4 eggs  
3/4 cup milk  
salt and pepper  
Butter oblong pyrex dish. Line bottom with rolls and seal seams. Crumble sausage over rolls. Sprinkle with cheese. Beat eggs and milk and season. Pour egg mixture over sausage and cheese. Bake at 425 for 15 minutes.

### Fresh Apple Cake

1 cup Mazola oil  
2 cups sugar  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 teasps. soda  
1/2 teasps. salt  
3 cups flour  
2 cups fresh apples, in small pieces  
1 cup pecans
