In this scam, peple are told they have just won a contest and qualify for a large award, provided they first pay federal taxes on the award. The victims are told to send the money to

a bogus IRS address and then never see their supposed "Winnings". Morales said persons called by

someone making this offer should write down who they claim to be and the type of offer; then notify their local Better Business Bureau and the nearest office of the Attorney General Consumer P stection Division.





A pass ended on the five yard line,


but the Foxes punched it on through with a good extra point.

The Prairiland Junior Varsity squad opened the 1992 season with an impressive 13-0 win over the Caddo Mills Foxes.


