Hearing Concludes, Brooks Attorney Says OCC Allegations Untrue

The public hearing concerning Preston J. Brooks, former president of the First National Bank of Deport concluded Wednesday September 23 with Administrative Law Judge Arthur Shipe of Washington, D.C. taking under advisement information he heard during the two day hearing in Dallas.

The hearing was held relating to a proposed civil penalty and permanent removal from the banking business against Preston J. Brooks, former president of the First National Bank of Deport.

The final judgement on this issue may take months, however Dean Debeck of the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency said that the judge will render a recommended decision in the matter, and the Comptroller of the Currency will make the final judgement.

Brooks was dismissed by the board of directors of the First National Bank of Deport in Nov. 1990, where he served as chairman of the board in addition to holding the office of bank president.

He is accused of violating banking laws and regulations and of having engaged in unsafe and unsound banking practices.

The OCC (Office of Comptroller of the Currency) alleges that Brooks on four different occasions manipu-

lated bank-controlled accounts for the benefit of members of his family and that the bank's board or loan committee had not given prior approval to such activities.

He is also accused of causing the bank to pay an illegal dividend to the bank's holding company in 1989, of which he was the principal shareholder.

He also is accused of concealing the actions from bank examiners and causing the bank to pay the expenses of his real estate agency.

A press release sent to this newspaper by Brooks' attorney Michael D. Mosher, denies these allegations. Mosher's release states that "When the OCC made its press release it knew that the implication carried by its press release was completely false and deliberately intended to slander Preston Brooks".

Mosher contends that the testimony at that hearing demonstrated what OCC already knew, that on Nov. 8, 1989, Preston Brooks' brother, Edward Brooks, had \$4,000 in his checking account in the First National Bank of Deport.

Edward Brooks on that day directed the bank to wire \$300 from his account to his account in the bank in Austin, Texas, and also directed the bank to wire \$700 to his wife's account in Austin.

Mosher insists that "OCC knew, because it had all the documents and the deposition of Edward Brooks, that Edward Brooks made the wire transfer of his own money..."

Mosher's press release states that OCC knew the wire transfers to Brooks' sister-in-law and brother were their own money made from their own bank account to their own bank accounts.

The press release also says that the \$18,150.00 wire transfer made from the bank to Preston Brooks' mother, made October 31, 1989 represented a loan to Preston Brooks to repay money owed to his mother., and that again, OCC had the documents and knew this. Mosher says that "the minutes of the board of directors meeting show that the loan was unanimously approved on October 31, 1989, and that the bank had personal financial statements on Preston Brooks and the title to his property pledged as collateral, whose value exceeded by thousands of dollars the amount of the loan."

Mosher also says that OCC admitted that all of the facts stated above were true during cross-examination during the public hearing.

"Why the OCC chose to publish the false and defamatory account it cause the press in Paris and Deport to publish we have no idea." Mosher's press release states.

October 6 will be Color Day and everyone will attend the County 4-H Banquet in Paris. On October 7, a flag ceremony will be held at school.

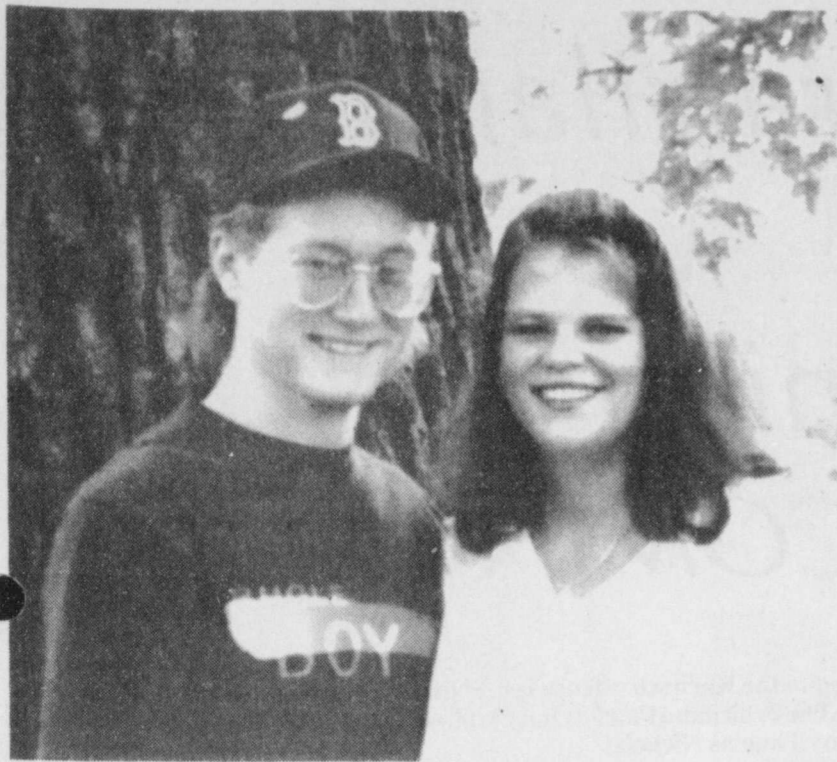

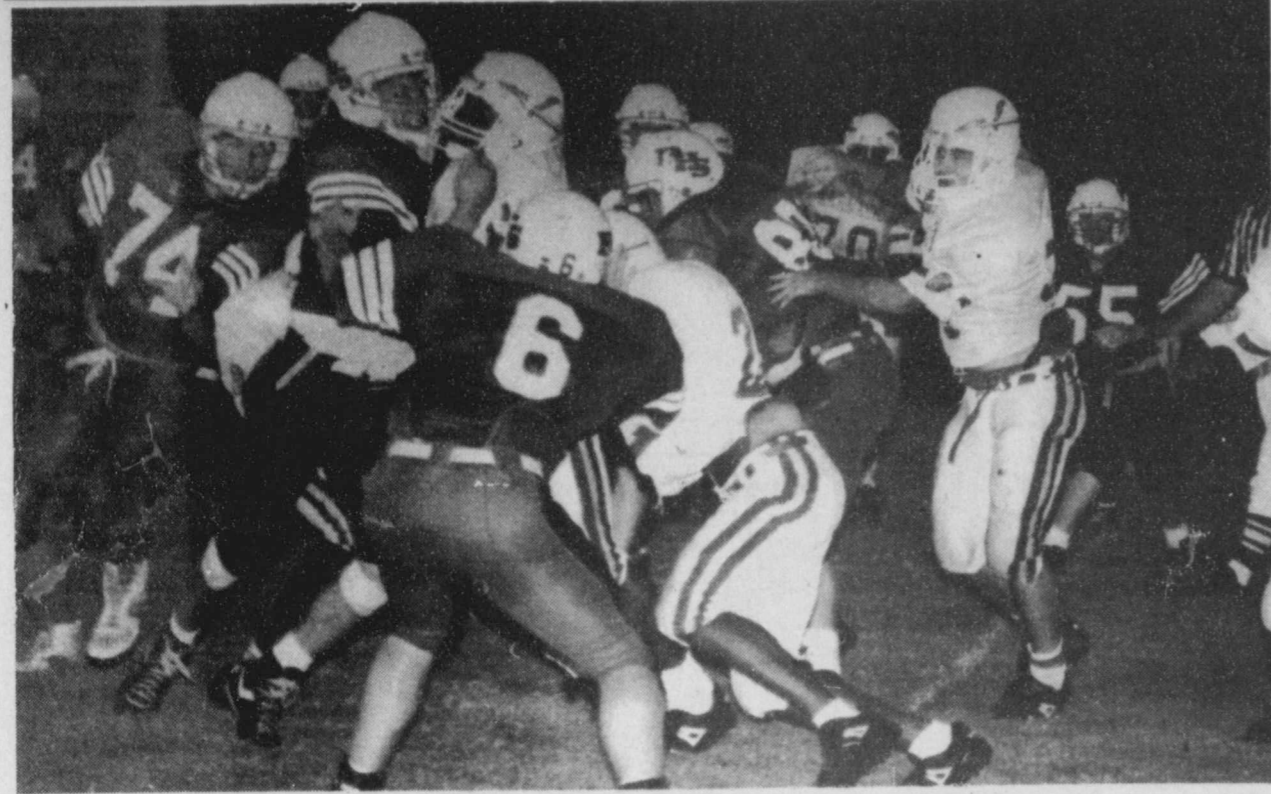

After the game last Friday night against Karnack, there was no question who the hero was for the Patriots. It was the defense.

During the first half, the defense spent most of the time on the field. This, due to the fact that the offense could only get three first downs, and only 56 total offensive yards. The individual heroes for the Pats "D" were Jeremy Pasquill, who intercepted a pass, and big Jay Harrison, who picked up a fumble and ran five yards before being brought down. Also the linebacking corps of Cody Bowen, Stephen Swaim and Jeff Gilbert helped out the Pat's defense. The offense had three chances to score in the first half, but did not succeed. One of the chances was set up by a Swaim interception, that he ran to the Karnack 1-yard line.

During the second half, the Karnack offense kept feeling the wrath of Brad Thomas and Steven Fernandez.

Finally, the Patriots scored on a Bowen blast up the middle from the Karnack 1. This touchdown was set up by good runs by Bowen, James Dudley and Chad Whitley.

In a last stick effort to score, Karnack threw the ball, just to have it batted down.

During the second half, the Patriot defense held Karnack to only 59 yards and two first downs.

Dudley ended up with 71 yards on 12 carries, Bowen got 54 on 22 carries and Swaim had an 8.0 run average on three carries.

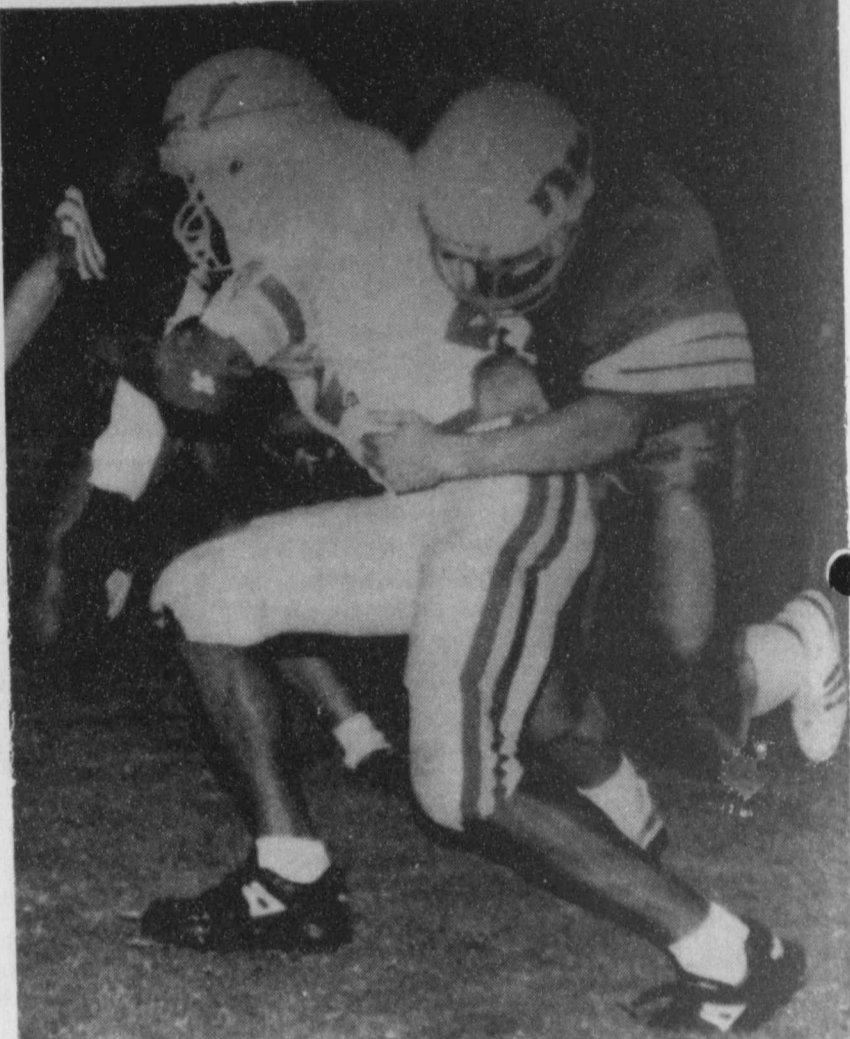

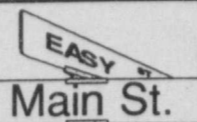

Keeping Healthy

Sprains and Strains of Raking Autumn Leaves

Yardowners, beware: Raking leaves may be hazardous to your health.

Stooping, bending and stretching can punish your back, shoulders, neck and arms with painful muscular strains and sprains.

To avoid injury, perform these stretching exercises for at least one week before hitting the lawn:

—*Side-to-Side Rotations:* Standing with your hands on your hips, turn as far as possible to the left, holding the position five seconds, then turn to the right and hold that position five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—*Overhead Stretches:* Standing with your feet slightly apart, stretch both arms over your head. Hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—*Front-and-Back Arm Stretches:* Standing, with a straight back and arms at shoulder height, stretch arms straight out in front of your body and hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times. Holding arms at a comfortable height, swing straight arms behind body until shoulder blades touch, holding five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

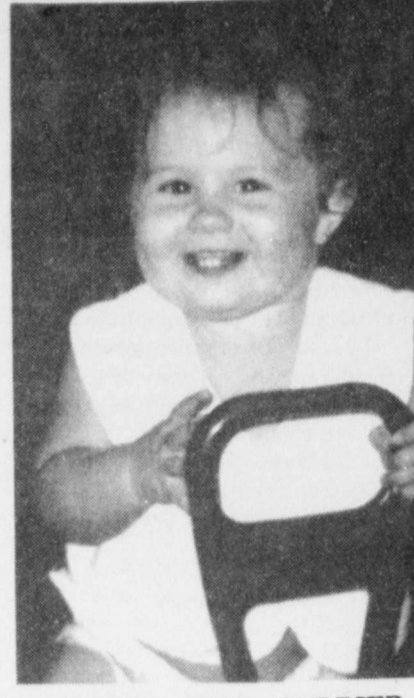

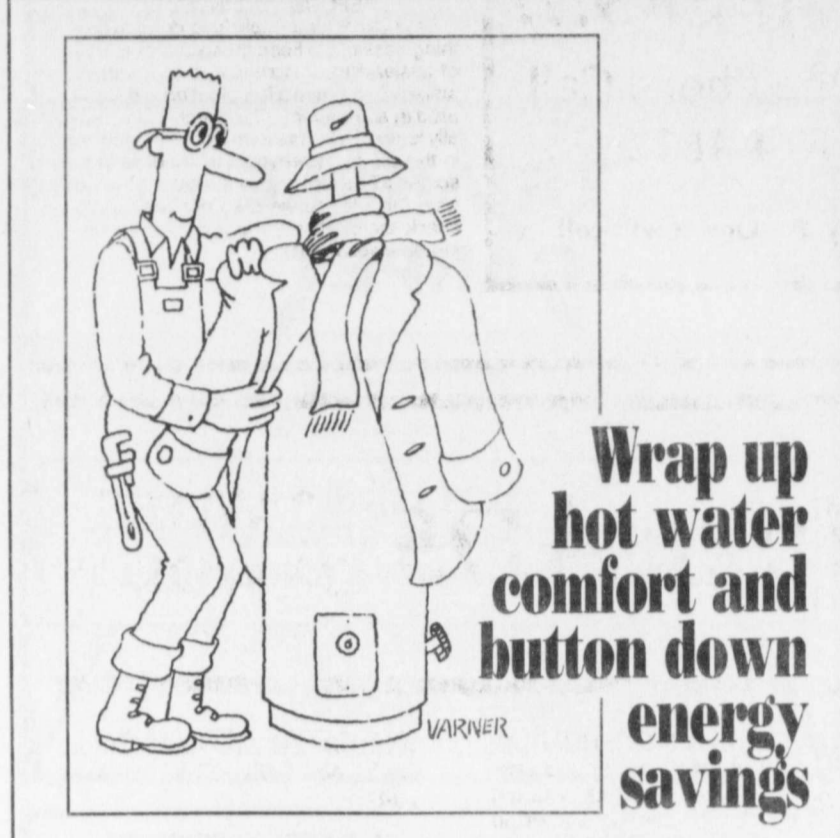

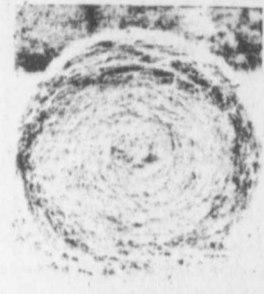
