Deport City Council Discusses Options For Replacement Of Fire Truck

The Deport City Council met in regular session Monday night, January 11.

The minutes from the previous meeting were approved and the financial report was approved.

Among the first items of business discussed were handicapped ramps. McClanahan and Holmes was approved as the 1993 auditor for the City.

The council voted to have the City's

water tower inspected to determine if any repairs are needed. There will be no charge for the inspection.

The Council discussed the closing of Grant #700841.

Appearing before the Council were Robin and Sherrie Weddle to ask for help from the City to control the water that stands on their property on Hayes Street.

Also appearing before the City

Council was Joe D'Ambrosio, sales representative for Ferrara Fire Apparatus Inc. from Baton Rouge, LA. Various truck combinations were discussed, used and new, with the type of equipment needed to fight fires in the City. The Council took no action but plans future meetings in the process of replacing the City's pumper truck that was destroyed in a traffic accident in late December.

Prairiland CISD Board Hears Report On TAAS Testing

One of the first items on the agenda at Prairiland CISD's regular meeting Monday night was a report on the TAAS tests.

Dr. Richard Nash and Dr. Gary Ballard gave the report on this, which was the 11th grade exit test.

The scores showed a slight downward trend in writing, and plans were made to improve these scores.

A consultant will come and spend

four days with teachers and students in the 4th, 8th and 10th grades before testing.

They purchased a Mastery Development Computer Program for the elementary schools which uses the existing computer system.

Teachers, students and administrators are very excited about this program, Dr. L.C. Stout says, and they invite anyone who would like to see

the program to drop one of the elementary campuses and see it.

The board also extended the Superintendent, Dr. L.C. Stout's, contract to June of 1995 and gave him a positive evaluation.

Bills were approved for payment, the minutes were read and approved and the financial and tax reports were heard.

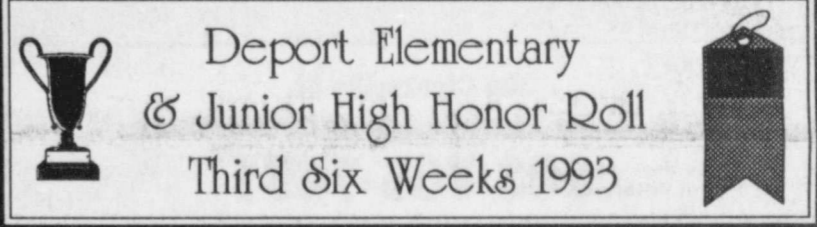
Nominations For Gifted/Talented Program Underway At Prairiland

Country Cooking

This week I visited in the home of Mollie and Mike Williams of Bogata. Mollie is a secretary/teller at Peoples National Bank and Mike is co-owner of an extermination service.

It was Saturday, and the house was teeming with activity. Mikel Ann, Mollie and Mike's oldest daughter, along with her sons, Micah and Matthew were visiting. Mikel's husband, John Haynes, wasn't around at the time. Marla and Mandy, the younger daughters, were busy fixing hair and make-up and all the other things teenagers do on Saturdays.

The Williams family attends the Assembly of God Church where Mollie is WMU President.

Marla and Mandy's school activities keep everyone hopping. They are both cheerleaders, and Mandy plays JV basketball. Sometimes the busy parents have to attend events at two different schools in one night in order to be part of their children's activities.

When Mollie was in high school, she attended beauty school during the summer so that she would be ready to open a beauty shop when she graduated from school. She went on and got her certification to teach

cosmetology, and did so at Paris Beauty School for a while. She will soon be registering for classes in PJC's Continuing Education Department to take some business related classes.

Out of necessity, quick, simple recipes are the type Mollie fixes during the week. When she has the time to cook, though, she enjoys plain southern cooking, such as fried chicken and all the trimmings. She prefers to cook these large meals on the weekends or when the whole family can be together.

Mollie serves as secretary on the Talco-Bogata School Board. This is very important to her, as is anything to do with her children's education.

The recipes Mollie is sharing with us this week sound delicious. The Maple Pumpkin Cheesecake and the Lemon Chiffon Pie recipes came from a Classic Desserts Book. The Quesadillas and Chicken Pie are dishes that the family likes and she just put them together by trial and error.

I didn't ask Mollie, but I always wonder when I see her how she manages to still look like a kid, and always have a smile on her face. I think I'll ask her the next time I see her.

January 14, 1993

Quesadillas By Mollie Williams

- 1 lb. hamburger meat
- 1 can refried beans
- 1 pkg. fajita seasoning
- flour tortillas
- shredded cheddar cheese
- shredded mozzarella cheese
- diced tomatoes
- diced green onions

Brown meat, drain. Add refried beans and seasoning. Mix well. Spread mixture on flour tortillas, add shredded cheeses; top with flour tortilla. Place in buttered skillet or on griddle; brown until cheeses are melted inside. Cut in four pieces with pizza cutter and serve with diced tomatoes, green onions, sour cream, hot sauce and guacamole.

Easy Chicken Pie

- 2 pie crusts
- 1 can mixed vegetables
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can boned chicken
- salt and pepper to taste

Mix vegetables, soup and chicken together. Pour into pie crust and top with crust. Make vent holes in top crust with fork. Bake in over 350 degree oven until golden brown.

Lemon Chiffon Pie

- 1-9" graham cracker crumb crust or baked pastry shell
- 1-14 oz. can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk)
- 1/3 cup ReaLemon Lemon Juice from concentrate
- few drops yellow food coloring, optional
- 3 egg whites
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

In medium bowl, combine sweet-

ened condensed milk, ReaLemon brand and food coloring if desired. In small mixer bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar until stiff but not dry; gently fold into sweetened condensed milk mixture. Pour into prepared crust. Chill 3 hours or until set. Refrigerate leftovers. Use only Grade A clean, uncracked eggs.

Maple Pumpkin Cheesecake

- 1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted
- 3-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened
- 1-14 oz. can Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (not evaporated milk)
- 1-16 oz. can pumpkin (2 cups)
- 3 eggs
- 1-8 oz. bottle Cary's Pure Maple Syrup
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 300. Combine crumbs, sugar and margarine; press firmly on bottom of 9" springform pan or 13x9" baking pan. In large mixer bowl, beat cheese until fluffy. Gradually beat in sweetened condensed milk until smooth. Add pumpkin, eggs, 1/4 cup maple syrup, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt; mix well. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Cool. Chill. Top with maple pecan glaze. Refrigerate leftovers.

Maple Pecan Glaze: In saucepan, combine remaining 3/4 cup maple syrup and 1 cup (1/2 pint) Borden Whipping Cream; bring to a boil. Boil rapidly 15 to 20 minutes; stir occasionally. Add 1/2 cup chopped pecans. (Makes about 1 1/4 cups)

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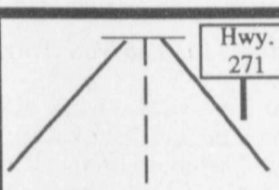

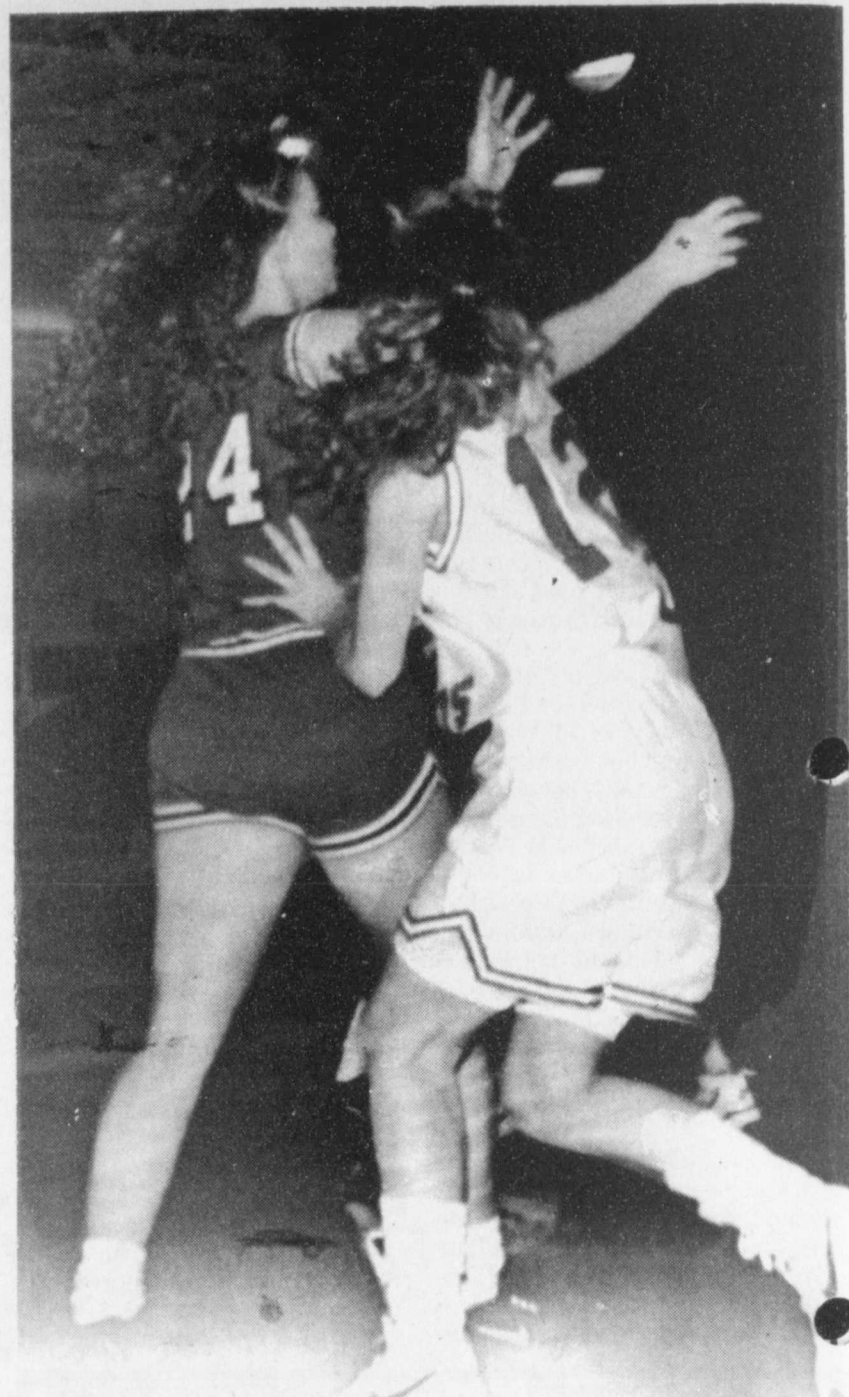

Social Security Notes

Social Security beneficiaries will receive statements in the mail in January showing the benefits they received in 1992. This statement should be used to determine if any benefits are subject to Federal income tax.

At least 9 out of 10 of those who receive the statement--Form SSA 1099--will not have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits because their total income is less than the taxable ceiling. If you receive Social Security benefits as your only source of income, you are unlikely to owe Federal taxes on the benefits.

An Internal Revenue Services (IRS) worksheet--IRS Notice 703--comes with the benefit statement. The worksheet shows you how to determine if your Social Security benefits are subject to tax. If, after completing the worksheet, you have questions about your tax liability, you should call the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-829-1040 and ask for Publication 915, which contains tax information about Social Security benefits.

Beneficiaries who file an individual tax return may owe taxes on some of their benefits if their combined income exceeds \$25,000. (Combined income is an individual's, or married couple's, adjusted gross income as reported on the Form 1040, plus nontaxable interest, plus one-half of the total Social Security benefits received for the year.) Married couples who file joint tax returns may have to pay taxes on some of their combined income exceeds \$32,000. Married couples who live together but file separate tax returns probably will pay taxes on part of their benefits.

DeKalb outscored Prairiland in the fourth quarter 18-7, but the Patriots' lead was too much as they pulled off the 65-55 victory.

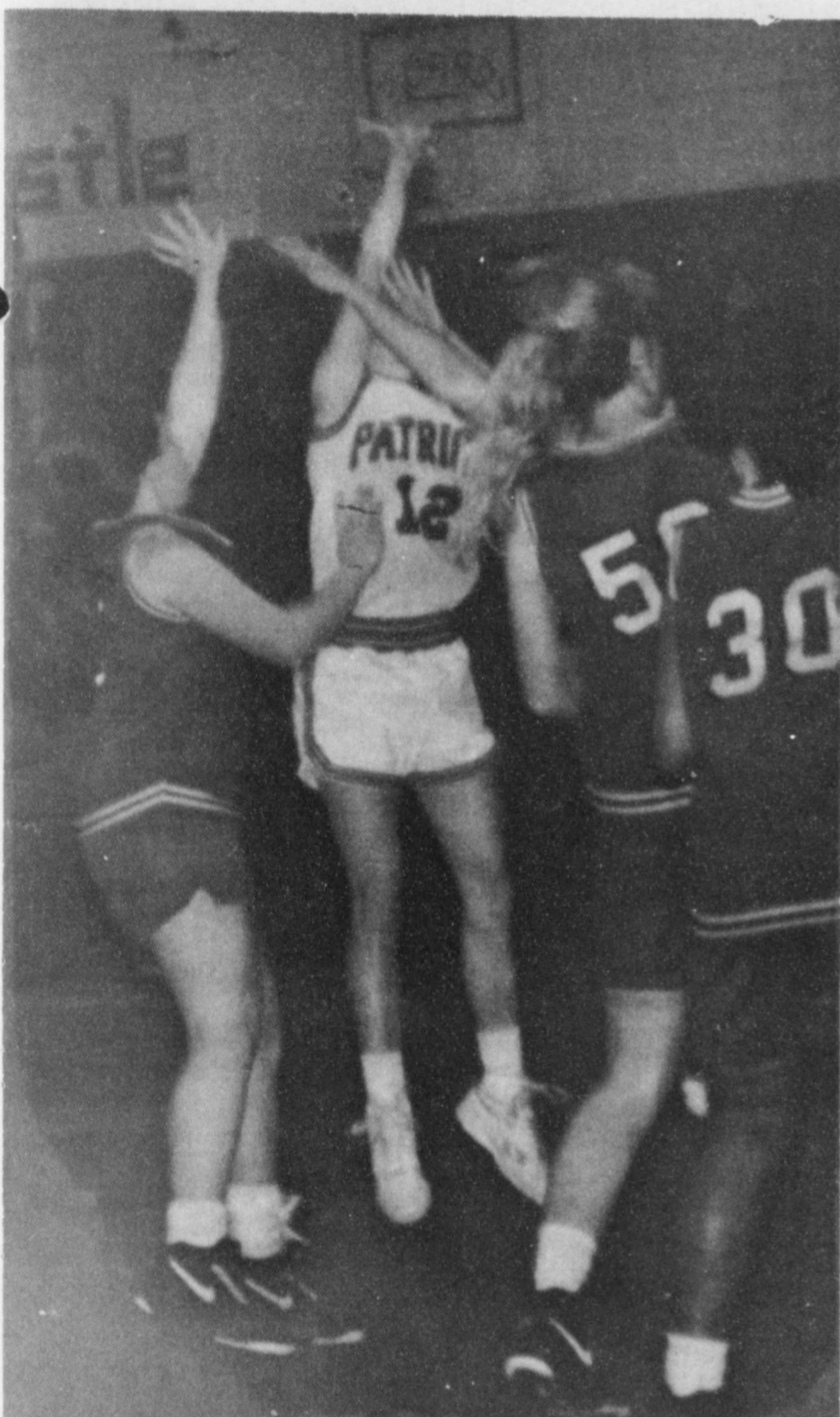

Planting Tips Shared

We are now in the middle of the tree planting period in our part of the world, and one needs to follow a number of planting suggestions in order to be successful. Fruit trees, pecan trees, shade trees and ornamental plants may be successfully planted during the dormant period.

Some of these plants have arrived at local plant outlets in our area, while the bulk of these plants will be arriving closer to spring. A majority of the fruit and pecan trees are available mostly as bare rooted plants. This simply means that there is no soil on the roots. Remember that it is critical that plant roots never dry out or freeze from the time the plants are dug at the nursery until they are planted.

Many of us order our trees from a large nursery and it is sometimes impossible to plant these trees when they arrive. If this is your predicament, unpack the trees when they arrive and "heel in" in moist soil. This simply amounts to digging a shallow trench, placing the roots in the trench with the trees lying down and covering the roots with moist soil.

I hope you developed a diagram of your proposed planting area prior to ordering your trees. Plant spacing is important. Plant spacing for a fruit tree is 24 X 24 feet apart. One may plant closer, but water requirements would be greater. The suggested pecan tree spacing is at least 40 feet apart. Homeowners should think in terms of perhaps 60 feet. Although one sees pecan orchards where the trees have been planted at a much closer spacing, one should keep in mind that about half of those trees should be removed after a few years of pecan production.

Make the planting hole only large enough to accommodate the root system. There is no need making the

hole deeper than what is needed by the plant. In fact, that is a "no, no." Your aim should be to plant the plant at the same soil depth as it grew in the nursery. This soil line can be easily seen by examining the plant.

Prior to planting, the roots on the trees should be pruned to fit the hole. Excessively long and/or broken roots should be shortened or removed. Never wrap the roots around in the hole.

Use the same soil removed from the hole when planting the tree. Do not add fertilizer at the time of planting. It is very important that one remove all of the air pockets around the roots. This can be accomplished by adding water after the soil has been placed in the hole around the plant. Think in terms of adding five to seven gallons of water. This should be enough water until the plant begins to leaf in the spring. Do not overwater.

Then you will need to remove part of the top to bring the top of the tree in balance with the reduced root area. In peach and prune trees, cut the tree back to 18 to 24 inches with all side branches removed. If you need additional planting information, stop by your County Agent's Office.

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
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
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PJC Continuing Education Classes Offered

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THOUGHT FOR FOOD

Ramona Tarts

- 1 pkg. Ready-Crust Graham Cracker tarts (6)
- 2 pkgs. (3 oz. ea.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 tsp. unflavored gelatin
- 2 tsp. chopped dates
- 2 tsp. golden raisins
- 3 tsp. chopped almonds
- 1 tsp. sherry
- 1 tsp. grated orange zest
- Whipped cream
- Freshly grated nutmeg

Place cream cheese in blender container. Combine orange juice and gelatin in small saucepan; let stand 5 minutes to soften gelatin. Heat over low heat, stirring until gelatin dissolves. Add to blender container; blend on low speed until smooth. Stir in dates, raisins, almonds, sherry and orange zest. Pour into tart shells, dividing fruit and nuts evenly among shells. Refrigerate until set, 30 minutes. Garnish with whipped cream and nutmeg. Six servings.
