Comptroller Delivers January Sales Tax Rebates Of Over \$98.7 Million

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$98.7 million in January sales tax rebates to 955 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 3.7% increase over their payments of one

year ago. Texas cities received \$88.2 million, up 3.2% over the \$85.5 million they received last January. Counties

received a total of \$10.4 million for their January rebates, an 8.3% increase over January 1992 payments. Locally, rebates are as follows:

annual sale not only represents an opportunity for girls to increase troop funds, but also teaches them business skills and gives them experience in meeting the public. In addition, girls who participate in the sale earn awards and camp credit according to the number of boxes they sell.

Beware Mail Fraud

The Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers today not to fall prey to a nationwide mail order scam that is encouraging the underpayment of first-class postage. Promoters of the mail order scam are selling an information package at a cost ranging from \$5 to \$100 that describes how to mail first-class letters for 2¢, rather than the current rate of 29¢. The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date information, says Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader.

The information packages cite Title 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the 2¢ first-class rate. Inspector Strader advises that this section was eliminated in August 1970 under the Postal Reorganization Act. The current first-class rate is 29¢ for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Unfortunately, some letters bearing only a 2¢ stamp have been delivered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent scheme.

This is because most mail is processed through automated equipment, and not because it is legal to mail at the 2¢ rate. Postal Inspectors investigating this scheme have filed administrative and criminal complaints against the promoters. It is our goal to protect the Postal Service from loss of revenue and to stop this fraudulent promotion, says Inspector Strader.

Postal employees have been alerted to the scam and are being instructed to check first-class mail for appropriate postage. Any mail carrying less than 29¢ will be delivered with a charge for the amount due as required by postal regulations.

Inspector Strader advises postal customers not to fall victim to this illegal scam. The penalty for mail fraud is a fine of not more than \$250,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. Postal customers who receive this package are asked to forward all the material to their local postmaster or to the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth Division, P. O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.

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Country Cooking

Until recently, I had always thought that the reason I could not stay slim and trim was because I could not stick with a diet. Now we learn that the diet is at fault. For the last 30 years, I have gone on the latest diets. I'd lose 20 pounds and gain back 30. This is called yo-yo-ing. I have yo-yo-ed myself to heights I could never have imagined. Donald and Tana also yo-yo. We are soon to start an un-diet. Actually, Tana has already started and is losing weight once again. Donald will start on a Monday. Donald starts everything next Monday. I'm still working on my frame of mind. Just as soon as I get my mind right, I plan to start on an eating program that I should be able to live with.

Experts have discovered that instead of having a large T-bone with a small salad and baked potato, we should have large portions of vegetables, fruits and breads with thin slivers of meat. The un-diet focuses on the absence of all but a small amount of fat grams and almost guarantees that I will never be hungry at

any time.

The foods which I should eat are all things that I like. There are also many new, almost fatless recipes. So what is the problem? The recipes this week come from a new cookbook I have. Most of the dishes are practically fat free. If you try one and it doesn't quite measure up, try to get satisfaction from thinking about how slim and trim we are going to be.

January 21, 1993

Tijuana Bean Dip

1-16 oz. can pinto beans, undrained, mashed
1 cup Alpine Lace or Kraft Free cheese
Jalapeno peppers, chopped (to taste)
1/4 cup chopped green onions
1 medium tomato, chopped
1 Tbsp. salsa or taco sauce
1/2 tsp. Lemon juice

Microwave beans, cheese, peppers, and onions in 1 1/2 qt. microwavable dish. Cover with waxed paper and microwave 4-5 minutes or until cheese is melted. Stir after 2 minutes. Stir in tomato, salsa and lemon juice. Serve with Guiltless Gourmet Tortilla Chips.

Chinese Chicken Salad

2 cups cooked boned, skinless chicken breasts, cubed
4 oz. sliced water chestnuts, drained
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 lb. seedless green grapes
1/2 cup fat free sour cream
1/4 cup fat free Ranch dressing
1 tsp. curry powder
1 tsp. soy sauce
1 tsp. lemon juice

Mix chicken, water chestnuts and celery. Blend together the sour cream, fat free dressing, curry powder, soy sauce and lemon juice. Pour over chicken mixture. Stir in grapes. Chill several hours.

Homemade Low Fat Pizza

Crust:
1 pkg. dry yeast
1 cup warm water
1 tsp. sugar
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt

Dissolve yeast in 1/4 cup warm water, add sugar and let stand 10 minutes. Add remaining water, flour and salt and beat well until dough is completely smooth. Dough will be sticky, but no kneading is required. Place dough in bowl sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Cover and let

rise until doubled. About 1 hour. Divide dough in half and let stand 10 minutes. Dough will be very elastic. Roll out into 2 8 inch crusts.

Basic Sauce:
1 can Chunky Spaghetti Sauce
1-6 oz. can tomato paste
1/2 lb. ground turkey (skinned and drained)
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 tsp. dried basil
1/4 tsp. dried oregano
1/2 tsp. thyme

Toppings:
1-8 oz. can drained mushroom pieces
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
2 cups grated non-fat Alpine Lace Mozzarella cheese

Place crust on cookie sheet sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Spoon sauce mixture on top of two crusts. Top with any combination of the above choices. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 450 for 8-10 minutes. (Check the fats in your ground turkey. Sometimes they don't differ from lean ground beef.)

Rich Fudge Brownies
1 cup packed brown sugar
3/4 cup sugar
1 cup all purpose flour
3 eggs beater
1/4 cup applesauce
1/4 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup cocoa
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup grapenuts cereal (optional)

1/2 jar Braum's Lite Fudge Topping
Combine sugars, flour, Egg Beaters, applesauce, corn syrup and cocoa. Mix until well blended. Stir in vanilla and grape nuts if desired. Spread in a 13x9x2 inch glass baking dish that has been sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Bake at 350 for 25 minutes or until done. Cool in pan on wire rack. Frost with Braum's Topping if desired.

Learning What Happiness Means

Some of the most popular ideas about what makes people happy are incorrect.

Studies by psychologists have measured little difference in happiness between teenagers, males and females, the middle-aged and the elderly. Knowing whether someone is rich or poor, black or white, healthy or handicapped, does not make it possible to predict how happy that person is likely to be.

Generally, people are as happy today as their parents were 30 years ago. Researchers say that external circumstances have little effect on psychological well-being. They agree that the following four inner traits foster happiness:

SELF ESTEEM - Those who are happy like themselves. They protect themselves from anxiety and depression by feeling good about themselves. Those who believe positive things about themselves suffer less from ulcers and insomnia and are less likely to abuse drugs. They tend to be more resistant to pressures and to conform and are more persistent at difficult tasks.

PERSONAL CONTROL - Americans who have a strong sense that they control their own lives and feel satisfied and themselves are twice as likely to be very happy as the national average. Those who agree with statements like what happens to me is my own doing or the average person can influence government decisions typically do better in school, cope better with stress and live more happily than those who lack that sense of personal control. Those given little control over their environment, such as prisoners or even people in nursing homes, suffer from lower morale, greater stress and worse health.

OPTIMISM - Optimistic people tend to be healthier as well as happier. They suffer less from illnesses and tend to recover better. Positive thinkers get positive results, succeeding better in business than pessimists. However, unrealistic optimism can make people believe they are invulnerable and stop them from taking sensible steps to avoid danger.

SOCIALIZING - Those who are more sociable and outgoing tend to be happier and more satisfied with life than introverts. Extroverts are cheerful and high-spirited people who like themselves. When they meet strangers, they are confident the strangers will like them as well.

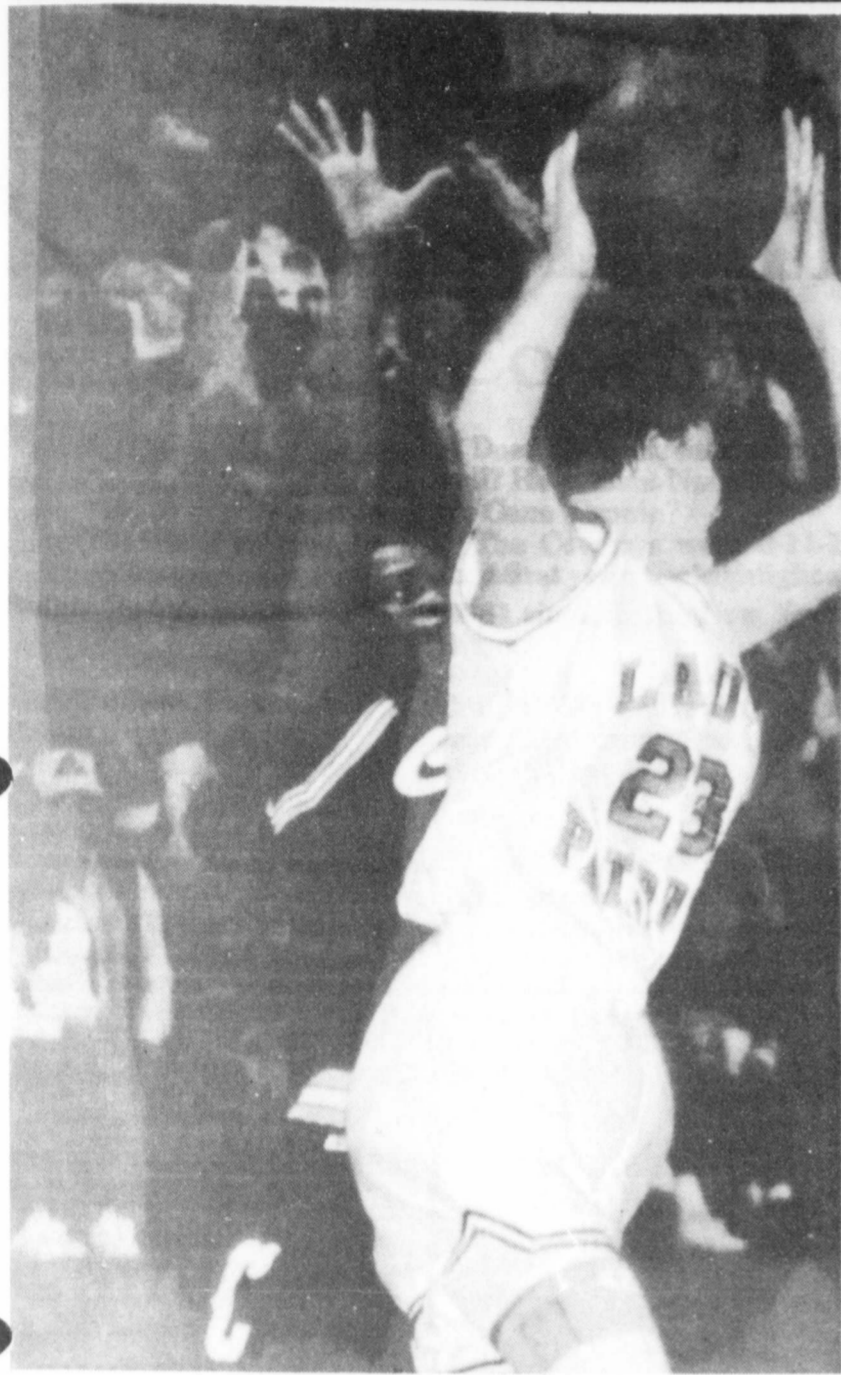

John Pasquill led scoring, pouring

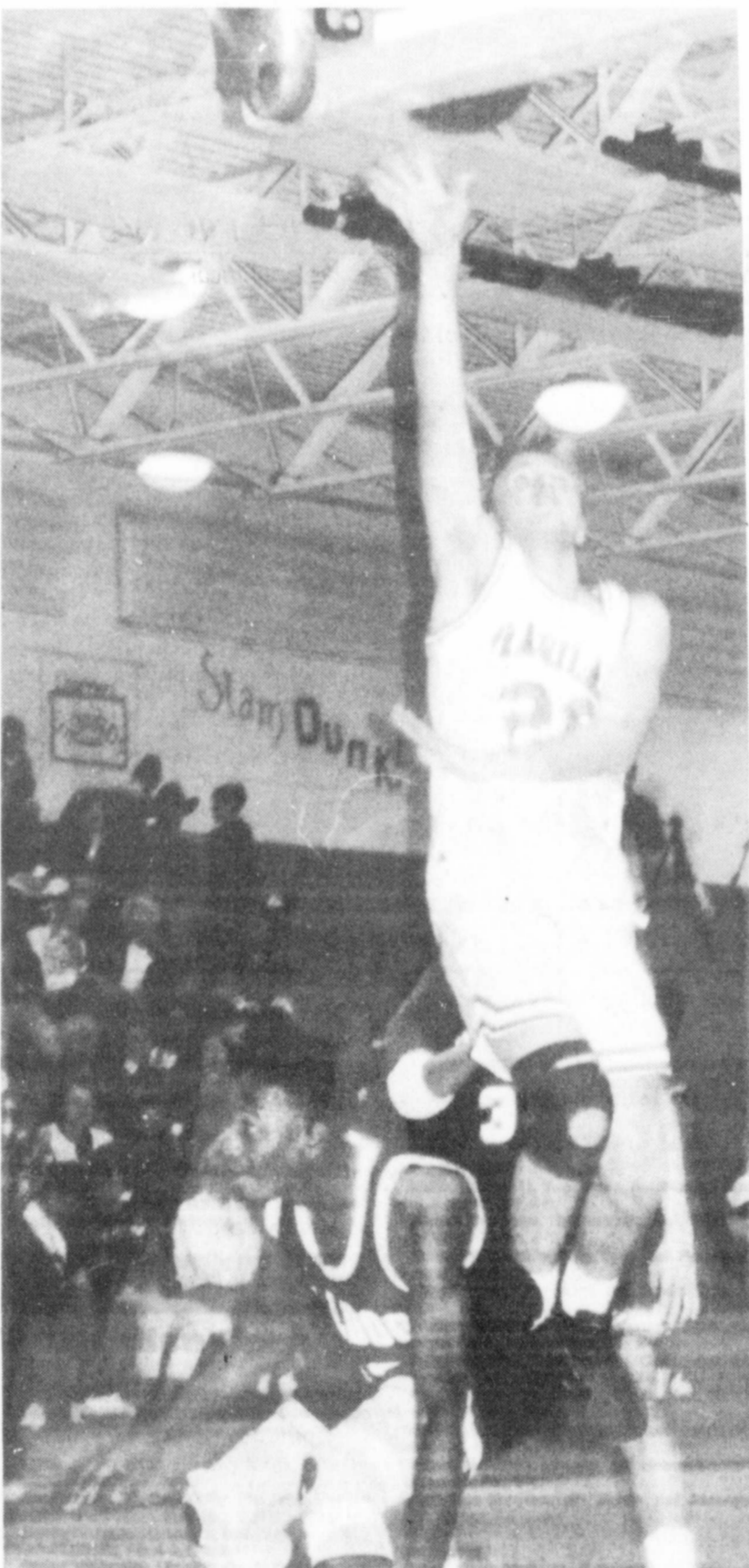

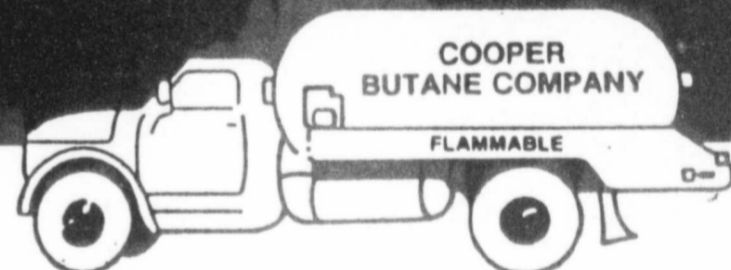

The fourth grade team lost to Detroit 14-5. Jennifer Taylor led with four points while Samantha Maroney had one.

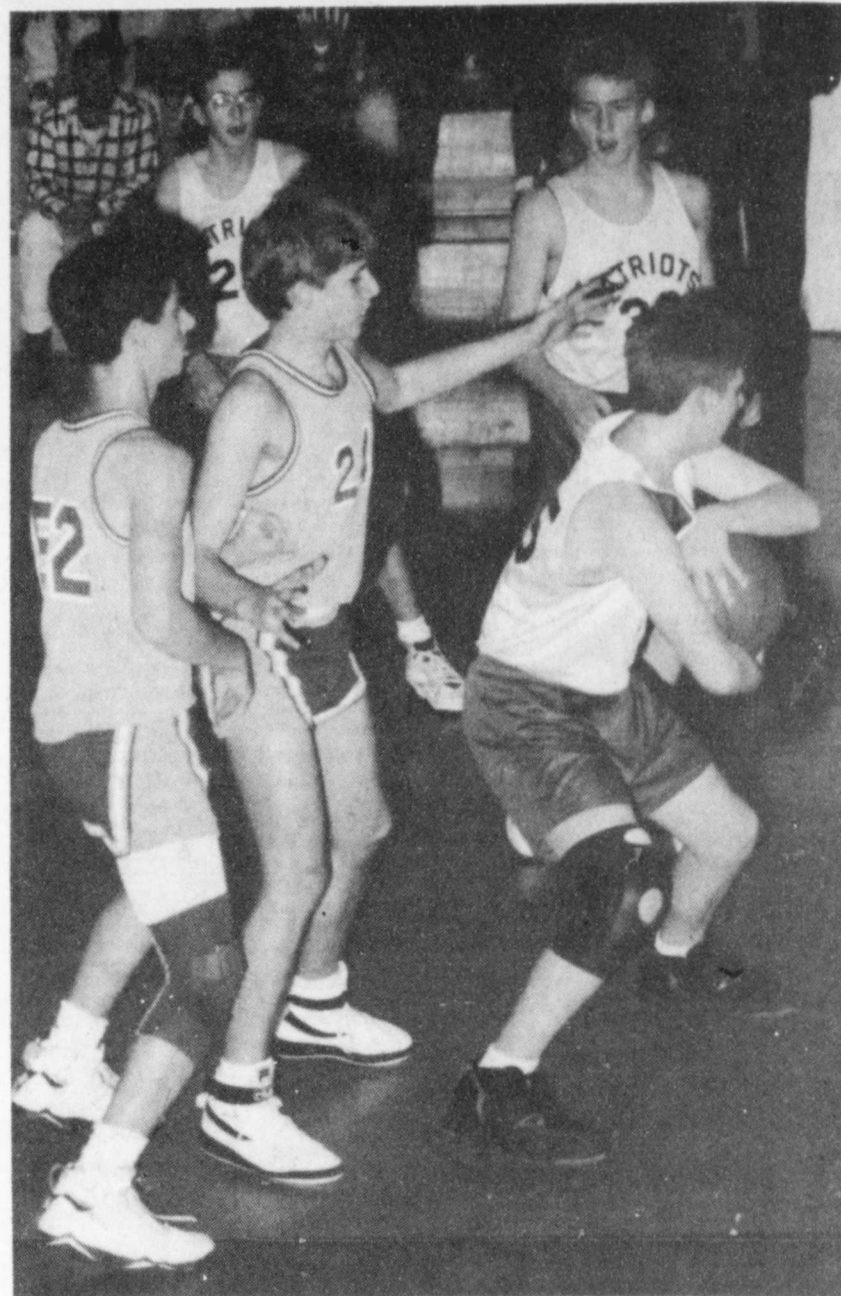
The fourth grade boys lost 28-2. The book does not show who scored for Deport.
