Prairiland Is Celebrating National FFA Week

land FFA is celebrating National FFA Week with a variety of events and special events, according to Ag instructors at Prairiland, Bobby Winters, Frankie Norwood and Max Ballard.

Prairiland High School is a consolidated school district encompassing Blossom, Clardy, Cunningham, Deport, Pattonville and the surrounding small communities. The Prairiland school district is a rural district with most of the tax dollars coming from agriculture property taxes. There is virtually no industry tax support aside from a couple of machine shops and a peanut patty factory.

Frankie Norwood is also a graduate of East Texas State University and is in his tenth year in the Prairiland Ag department after teaching Junior High Science for seven years.

Bobby Winters is a graduate of Sam Houston State University and is in his fifteenth year at Prairiland.

Max Ballard is a graduate of Sam Houston State University, Huntsville. He began his teaching career in Redwater and spent the first five years as Elementary Principal. In 1968 he became Principal at Blossom School; in 1970 he became an Ag Teacher at Prairiland when consolidation took place; served as Business Manager then Superintendent in the Prairiland School District. Last year, as his choice, he resigned his position of Superintendent and asked to return to the Ag Department.

Prairiland High School is a AAA school with 135 students currently enrolled in Agriscience courses for the fall semester. Courses offered are Intro World Ag Science; Applied Ag Science; Ag Cooperative Training and Ag Mechanics. The most popu-

This week, March 22-26, the Prairillar courses are the Ag Mechanics related courses.

President for the Prairiland FFA Chapter this year is Georjeana Oats. Other officers are: vice-president, Justin Withers; secretary, Cathy Sugg; treasurer, Stephen Swaim; reporter, Jenny Roach; sentinel, Brad Allen Withers; and junior advisor, Tobye Dockray.

The facilities at Prairiland are more than adequate with a well equipped shop which was built in 1970. The administration and school board are very supportive of the ag program and are well supplied for a poor school district.

Prairiland FFA participates in all areas of competition available to members. Their motto is "They might can beat us, but they can't keep us from participating." The chapter has been very successful over the past years in leadership, having won the district sweepstakes award several times and having many teams going to Area competition and some to State.

Three Prairiland FFA'ers competed at Houston this year with their Beef Heifers. They were Justin Withers, Stephen Swaim and Paul Jackson. Nine FFA'ers took broilers to Houston for competition. They were Mike Vaccaro, Tuttle Jordan, Brandon Johnson, Allen Johnson, Cathy Sugg, Rhett Fendley, Isaac Unruh, Mendy Doggs and Tobye Dockray.

Katie Mowery, Georjeana Oats, Janee Jackson and Dustin May, which has constantly brought honors to Prairiland High School and the Prairiland FFA Chapter, won first place in Area competition this year and second place in District.

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


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Country Cooking By Judy Screws

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

McCoy Makes **Proposals To Commissioners**

Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy reports that on February 22nd he submitted to the Lamar County Commissioners Court his plans for improvments to the Lamar County Jail Facility.

He suggested adding jailers and building an evacuation area.

Last fall, McCoy says, the new

facility was cited by the Texas Commissioner of Jail Standards for fifteen violations that left the facilty out of compliance.

On February 12, 1993 McCoy received a letter from the Texas Commission of Jail Standards stating that all the violations had been corrected except for having enough manpower available at all times to maintain the facility.

McCoy states the facility now has a total of 24 jailers, counting the Chief Deputy and Transport Officer, and the facility needs a minimum of

This number (35) provides enough personnel to account for people having regular time off and accounts for people needing off in case of illness, McCoys states.

McCoy says that as of right now he has had to call in reserve officers at times to help man the jail because of personnel off due to illness and not being able to provide overtime pay to officers who are called in to work on their days off.

McCoy says he has devised a plan in which the fifth floor of the courthouse (the old jail area) could house 41 inmates, providing an income of \$1,445.25 daily or an annual income of \$527,516.25 by renting that space to TDC or other counties to house

To implement this plan nine jailers would have to be added. Six jailers would be added to the department and three would be added as civilian employees. The six would cost the county \$21,673.69 each in salaries. The three would cost the county \$19,065.83 each in salaries.

McCoy states that after the salaries are deducted from the \$527,516.25 income the county would make \$340,276.62.

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

dards. After expenses the county could net another \$20,711.46 in revenue, McCoy says.

He also says that these revenues could be used to finance other county projects such as roads, building re-

McCoy also proposed building an evacuation facility for prisioners and jailers in case of a major catastrophy such as fire, gas leaks, etc.

The facility would be constructed of ten foot high chain link fence and could provide an exercise area as well as (and most important) and evacuation area in case of a major catastrophy.

The Paris Fire Marshall's office recommendations for evacuation of the jail facility in case of an emergency state that "every building or structure shall be so constructed, arranged, equipped, maintained and operated to avoid undue danger to the lives and safety of its occupants from fire, smoke fumes or resulting panic during the period of time reasonably necessary from escape from the building or structure in case of an emer-

gency".

A Sally Port may be permitted as an emergency exit, but according to the Paris Fire Marshall the Sall Port shoul dnot be used as a holding area in case of a fire emergency evacu-

McCoy says the new facility can be constructed for approximately 18,000 or less.

Estimates range from \$13,000 up to \$18,000 so, McCoy says, so even with the \$18,000 price, McCoy says they could build the holding area out of the commissary fundwhich means no county tax money would be needed.

In other words, McCoy states the inmates' money already collected could be used to build the fence around this area. McCoy stresses that the area is a requirement by both state and local authorities, not just something that B.J. McCoy wants.

McCov insists that if and when the area is constructed and used as an exercise ara no inmates convicted of violent crimes will be permitted in the area unless there is a major catastrophy.

According to McCoy the Commissioner's Court is taking the matter under consideration.

On Thursday, Feb. 25, 1993 the State Jail Standards Commission will be at Lamar County Jail to do a Staffing Review.

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County Agent Report

The gardening season will soon be in full swing in Red River County weather permitting. Following are some questions commonly asked by

Q: I used potatoes purchased at the grocery store as seed for planting and they rotted without sprouting. Why?

A: Many potatoes sold for fresh

market consumption have been treated with chemicals to prevent sprouting in storage. These chemicals will also prevent sprouting after planting. Another possibility is that the potatoes that you purchased were form this year's crop and had not been stored properly to break the rest period. Potatoes have a rest period which must be broken before the seed will sprout. Cool temperatures or extremely warm temperatures can break the rest period and allow potatoes to sprout. Next time plant certified seed that has been properly stored to induce sprouting.

Onion:

Q: Is it necessary to remove the garden soil from around my onion bulbs in the spring to make large

A: Absolutely not. Bulbing of onions is controlled by variety, temperature and length of day. The onion will bulb when the required conditions are met. Removing soil around the base of the plant will not increase bulbing, although it appears to because the bulbs are visible. This operation may do more damage than good, especially to white varieties. Removing the soil from around white onions results in sunburning which turns the top of the bulbs green.

Q: When caging tomatoes, how large should the cage be?

A: The diameter of the cage should be at least 18-20 inches. Smaller cages often restrict plant growth and reduce yields. Height of the cage will vary but generally 2 1/2 feet is sufficient for the recommended varieties. However, if veining types such as Better Boy, Homestead or Terrific are used, a cage 5 feet in height is preferred. Regardless of variety, the 2 1/2 foot tall cage is sufficient for most fall garden tomatoes.

Keeping Healthy

variety of lens types available to them confusing. In addition to different sizes, shapes, forms and colors, lenses can be hard, soft, gas-permeable, extended-wear, bifocal and so on.

The choice of contact lens type must be made individually for each new finding can successfully reduce patient and should be made only by a qualified doctor. The medical doctor who specializes in treatment of eyes is an ophthalmologist. If you do not already have a personal ophthalmologist, your local medical society will be glad to help you find one.

Depression

This is not diagnosed as depression, medically speaking, and, in most cases, can be self-treated. Each of us knows what diversions will lift our spirits, and we usually seek that sort of distraction to dispel the temporary depressed feeling. In addition, it is natural for people who have had a recent loss, for instance, to feel grief, sadness and other symptoms of "depression" for even a longer period of time. This kind of grief reaction is also not considered a medical problem unless it

Depression becomes a medical problem when it immobilizes a person, leaving him or her unable to carry on normal activities or to derive pleasure from any source.


Too Many Tears Can Cause Infant **Eye Problems**

If your baby can't stop tearing, it may be from a blocked drainage system, a condition which can affect nearly one-third of newborn infants.

Many newborn infants experience watering eyes that overflow with tears and mucus. As a result, their lashes often stick together after they awake, leading to chronic infections that can be annoying for both baby and parents.

Howard L. Freedman, MD, clinical assistant professor of ophthalmology at the University of Washington in Seattle, says that overflow tearing can be treated by antibiotic eyedrops or ointment, combined with massage of the baby's tear sacs.

Sterilizing Mosquitoes Offers Biological Control

By Paul D. Payne **Extension Service**

Research scientists with USDA's Agricultural Research Service have discovered a hormone that sterilizes female mosquitoes and other bloodsucking insects such as biting midges, flies and fleas. It offers a possible new way of controlling the pests outdoors according to USDA.

A synthetic chemical mimic of the oostatic (oh-oh-static) hormone injected into female mosquitoes, inhibited up to 98% of their eggs from forming. The hormone also can block the production of enzymes necessary to develop eggs essentially sterilizing the females. 

care and Medicaid ... You've heard of Medicare. And you've probably heard the term, Medicaid. Is there a difference?

The answer is yes ... and although

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The differences between Medi- there also are similarities between the two programs, many people use the two words interchangeably and this can lead to problems.

Both Medicare and Medicaid are government-sponsored health care programs and both help pay medical bills. But there aren't many other similarities after that, and the eligibility rules for each are very differ-

Medicare is the health insurance program that's tied into the Social Security program (although it is possible to get Medicare without being on Social Security). Most people know it by the terms Part A and Part B, which refer to what are commonly called the hospital (A) and doctor's (B) parts of Medicare.

Part A is paid for by a poriton of the Social Security taxes you pay while working. Part B is paid for by the monthly premiums of those who enroll. You can get Medicare if you're 65 or older or if you've been getting Social Security disability benefits for two years. Some people with permanent kidney disease also qualify for Medicare. People getting Social Security are automatically enrolled in Medicare when they turn 65 or 24 months after they started getting dis-

ability benefits. Those not already getting Social Security benefits need to contact the Social Security office before their 65th birthday to sign up for Medicare.

Medicaid is a health care program that's tied into a person's economic circumstances. Generally, you qualify for Medicaid if you have a low income and few assets. For example, most people who get Supplemental Security Income (SSI) usually qualify for Medicaid. Medicaid is financed through general tax revenues -not through Social Security taxes. To apply for Medicaid only, you should contact the Texas Department of Human Services.

Some people qualify for both Medicare and Medicaid. But sometimes, people who have only Medicare confuse Part B of that program with Medicaid coverage. For example, someone visiting our office might tell us they have "Medicare Part A and Medicaid Part B." We would know they really meant they had both Parts A and B of Medicare, but if they were to tell the same thiing to a doctor's billing clerk, it could lead to problems.

One way to tell which program you have is by the identification card you were issued. The Medicare card is white with a red and blue stripe running across the top. Here in Texas the Medicaid document is a white letter-size sheet of paper with the seal of Texas stamped in blue ink.

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




