## Charges Filed In Accident

Criminal Negligent Homicide charges have been filed by the Texas Department of Public Safety on Lorine Eugene Twitty of 575 N.E. 12th St. in Paris, Texas in connection with the accident which occured on Thursday, April 1st and claimed the life of Odell Harv ey, according to DPS Spokesperson Christy Jordan.

According to the official report filed by DPS Trooper Tim Ray, Mr.Twitty was driving a 1986 Freightliner semi-tractor trailer gravel hauler leased to Red River Gravel Company.

Reports indicate that Twitty was travelling at approximately 65 miles per hour when the accident occurred. Both the semi and the 1971 Ford Pickup driven by T.G. (Mutt) Harvey were travelling northbound on Hwy.

Criminal Negligent Homicide barges have been filed by the Texas epartment of Public Safety on prine Eugene Twitty of 575 N.E. 271 just east of Pattonville when the accident occurred. Reports indicate that Mr. Harvey was driving slower than the posted speed limit.

The report states that Mr. Twitty looked in his rear view mirror, than looked back around just before the two vehicles collided.

The Harvey pickup was knocked off the roadway to the right. The cab was separated from the frame and struck a utility pole.

Odell Harvey, wife of T.G. Harvey and passenger in the vehicle was pronounced dead at the scene.

Mr. Harvey is reported to have a cracked neck and is listed in stable condition.

Mr. Twitty, Spokesperson Jordan said Wednesday morning, was arrested at a later date and charges were filed.

(Mutt) Harvey last Thursday, April 1st, a number of area citizens have placed petitions which they plan on sending to state legislators and officials. These petitions, Rev. Chief Warden says, plead for safety measures to include a blinking light at Pattonville and enforcement of speed limits on vehicles of ALL types travelling on Hwy. 271 in this area.

The owner of the store reports that they had some type of tool which pulled the core on the door lock and they broke into the safe. An undetermined amount of cash was taken. According to owner reports it seems that the burglars were only interested in cash as they did not take cigarettes, lottery tickets are anything but cash. Quickie Superette in Deport was broken into by twisiting the lock off of the front door. According to reports from store owner M.C. Johnston, the burglars took about \$95 in the money order bag, some money orders and receipts, about \$85 in one

another \$50 or \$60 in fishing license money. Two money bags are missing, one labled fishing license. If these, or any of the receipts are found, they should be returned to the store as they would be a help in bookkeeping.

Johnston reports that a special lock has now been installed to prohibit entrance from being made in this manner again. The store's video camera had been picked up for repairs, and was not available at the time of the burglary, although it has been returned and is once more in operation.

The third business to be burglarized was in Reno Quick Stop, and apparently the burglars used much the same methods.

Tee shirts will be available for \$12 each, and there will be PLENTY of large sizes for everyone this year. Badges with the "Gettin' Down in Deport" logo are also available.

Saturday morning will begin with a FREE breakfast for all the cooks and for the community too. This will be at the Legion Hall from 6 until 9 a.m. Everyone is invited.

At 11 a.m. the Community Easter Egg Hunt will be at 11 a.m. LAll children are invited to come and hunt for ages and prizes.

At present there are fourteen different booths lined up to sell things.

These booths feature handcrafted items, woodworking items, knife sharpening (bring your knives), knife sales, quilts, fishing equipment and garage sale items. There is still space available, and booth fee of \$5 can be paid Saturday morning by going to the Deport Times office between 9 and 10 a.m. Call Nanalee Nichols at 652-4205 or 652-5823 for more information.

The Deport Ball League is planning to have thirteen or fourteen booths featuring games of skills and fun for prizes. This will provide youngsters with lots to do.

During the day the chili cooks will be at their chili cooking. Chili Appreciation Society International cooks will be competing for 1st through tenth places, and local cooks for 1st through 5th places. In addition, people may purchase a "tasting cup" and spoon, and crackers that afternoon and stroll around, sampling the different chilis. They will be asked to vote for the chili of their choice to win the "People's Choice" award. Don't forget to ask or look for he clock at each different chili cook's place to make sure that the chili is ready. They usually have the time posted when tasting can begin. Not all cooks have enough for tasting, but most do.

The concession stand will have barbecue, soft drinks, nachos and lots of things for sale all day long to satisfy any hunger pangs.

Raffle tickets will be on sale for a drawing to be held for a hand painted outdoor stove, barbecue smoker and a battery charger. One raffle ticket means three chances to win! This year's stove

is in memory of Sammy Wilkerson and his blue ribbon chili and is painted with hills and trees, Sammy cooking chili and visiting with friends. The smoker is hand made by Eddy Sheppard and is a handsome item. The battery charger is something almost any household can use.

Duck race tickets are \$5 and earn the winners \$150, \$75 and \$25 respectively. The duck race is at 2 p.m. and the little brightly colored plastic ducks will race down the creek (aided by the ire hose).

One of the biggest hits of last year's cookoff was the bed race. At 2:30 p.m. nightshirt clad contestants (of questionable sanity) will race against other teams, with four people pushing and one riding the wheeled iron beds. It is absolutely hilarious.
