School Board Race Sees Six Candidates Trying For Positions

The Prairiland School Board election is Saturday, May 1, with six candidates trying for the three positions up for election.

For the Blossom position, incumbent Ronald Roddy has filed for reelection, along with Liz Irwin and Billy Sessums.

For the Deport position, filing their candidacy are Kenneth Gifford and Kenneth Burks. Johnny Patterson has filed for the Cunningham position.

Roddy is self-employed as a partner in Roddy Construction Company. He is a graduate of Blossom High School and Paris Junior College and received a bachelor's degree from ETSU. His wife, Beverly, is employed by McCuiston Regional Medical Center in the medical records department. They have two children, one of which attends Prairiland High School.

Roddy is a member of the Blossom Church of God where he has served two years as Youth Director and as a member of the Christian Education Board.

Mrs. Irwin, editor of the *Blossom Times*, lives in the Red Oak community near Blossom. She and her husband, Jim, have three children, Cari Beth, a seventh grader at Blossom Juniro High; Amy Dabbs, who is married to Alan Dabbs; and Jamie, a sophomore at Tarleton State University in Stephenville. They have lived in the Blossom area for over 24 years.

She graduated from Rivercrest High School. She has been active in the Lamar County 4-H program for 14 years, serving as club leader, Presi-

dent and Publicity Chairman for the Adult Leader's Association, project leader for various groups and has received the Outstanding Leader award. She has worked as Troop Leader in the Red River Valley Girl Scout Association for eight years, serving as Neighborhood Chairman, receiving the Outstanding Neighborhood Award and working as Lamar County Day Camp Director at Camp Gambill for three years. She has coached girls softball for 12 years in the Blossom Girls' Softball Association. She received the Farm Home-maker of the Year Award and she, along with her husband, were honored with the Honorary Chapter Farmer Award by the Prairiland FFA for their work in the program. She currently serves as President of the Blossom PTA, is publicity chairman for the Lamar County Junior Livestock Association, and is vice-president of the Lamar County Extension Task Force.

Mr. Sessums is a life-long resident of Blossom and a 1971 graduate of Prairiland High School. He is employed by Lyon Barricade and Construction Company. He is an active member of Fellowship Baptist Church and serves as assistant Sunday School director. He coached boys' baseball for eight years and has coached a BGSA high school team for two years. He has also served for two years as president of the Prairiland Athletic Booster Club and president of the Blossom Girls' Softball Association. In addition, he serves on the Lamar County Junior Livestock

board, is a division III SVOA official and a member of the TGCA.

He and his wife, Frankye, a coach and teacher at Prairiland High School, have two children, B.A., a senior at Prairiland and Breah, an eighth grader at Blossom.

Kenneth Gifford is a graduate of Deport High School and owned and operated Gifford's Food Store for 18 years. He is currently self-employed as a state contractor and is also an employee of the Deport Housing Authority. He and his wife, Phyllis, are life-long residents of Deport and have three children who currently attend Prairiland schools.

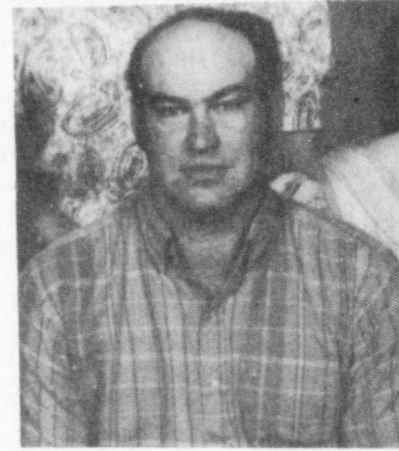
They are members of the Abundant Life Church.

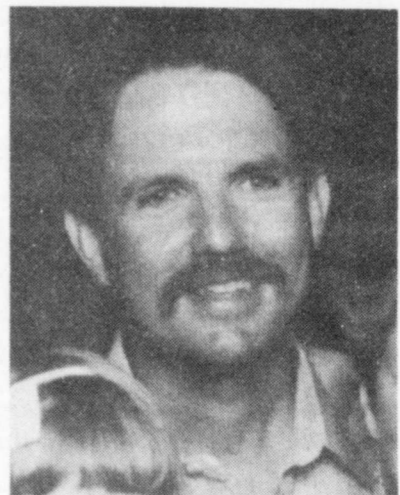

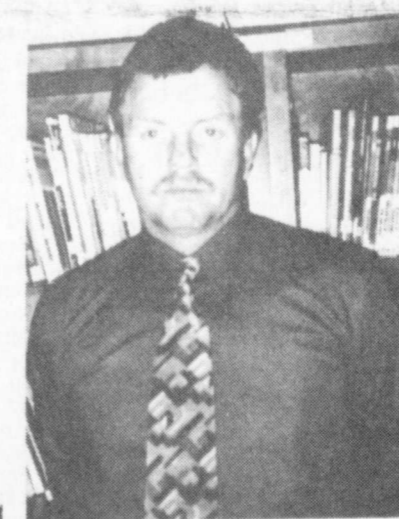

From Prairiland High School, Swede Ladd was named to the second team.

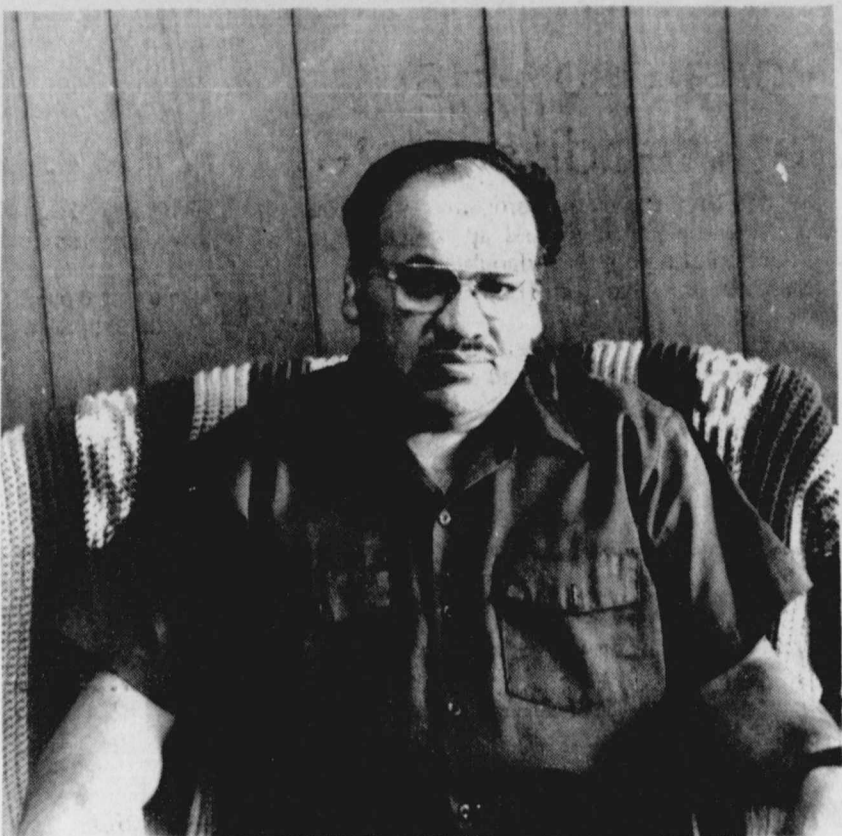
From Rivercrest High School, Eddie Williams, a junior, was named Defensive Player of the Year.

A couple of weekends ago when I was being kind enough to taste of all the chilli at the CASI Chilli Cook-Off in Deport, I ran across Gilbert Arriaga and his chilli. I had heard about his cooking, but had not had occasion to do much sampling. The chilli was delicious. I asked if I could feature him and his cooking in this column. He said that I could. Then we tried to make plans to get together. This was not as easy as it would seem. He finally just gave up and came down to the office and we visited here, which worked very well.

Gilbert and Melissa live in Deport. He works in the Quality Lab at Kimberly Clark in Paris. He has been employed there for 9 years. They also spend a lot of time with their favorite pastime, which is going to the pasture, where they have goats, horses, and geese. The horses are Melissa's. She's a real outdoors girl. She had once thought about being a Veterinarian, but decided she didn't want to go to school that long. The Arriagas haven't been married but a couple of years. Gilbert was a widower. He told me a cute story about when he and his deceased wife, Edith lived in West Texas. He said they almost ran out of anything to cook, but Edith had taken everything she could come up with and made Bologna Stew. I'm sure most wives could identify with that predicament at some time or the other. I know that I can.

Gilbert was raised in Dallas. His family always lived in a Mexican Community. He learned to cook by

his mother and grandmother. He said that most of the dishes they fixed had a small amount of diced meat in them and large amounts of vegetables, rice, pasta, or beans. He didn't have a hamburger patty or a steak until he was in junior high. He was also introduced to bread at the same time. He had always eaten tortillas with his meals. His favorite dishes now are either, roast beef or chilli.

The Arriagas travel all over Texas to cook-offs. Gilbert is a Life member of CASI. He also likes to cook stew and beans at charity events.

Gilbert has had to alter his recipes in the last few years to accommodate a diabetes condition. He tries to make most of his food without refined sugar and with most of the fat eliminated. He has promised to send me sugar free recipes as he tries them out, and makes sure they taste good. He has also had to add a 20 minute exercise routine to his schedule every morning to improve his health.

Every year at the Red River Valley Exposition and Fair at the Paris Fairgrounds, Gilbert has a booth with good things to eat. This year he plans to use a French theme. He will have French Cuisine, a Maitre de, and possibly even Can Can girls. Sounds interesting.

I appreciate Gilbert's being nice enough to help me out by coming to the office. I hope you all enjoy the recipes. They look really good. We'll be looking forward to the sugar free ones after he weeds out the ones which aren't wonderful.

DIABETIC OR WEIGHT CONSCIOUS MOUSSE PIE

Gilbert Arriaga

- 1 - Pkg. D-Zerta Whipped Topping (Nutra Sweet)
- 1 - Box Sugar Free Instant Vanilla Pudding
- 1 - Graham Cracker Pie Shell
- 2 - Large Bananas or 1 banana and 1 cup sliced strawberries (mixed)
- 2 - Pkgs. Sweet & Low, or Nutra Sweet
- Mix pudding according to directions on box. Set aside. Prepare whipped topping by directions on box. Fold 1 cup of whipped topping with pudding. Slice bananas and layer in graham cracker crust. Sprinkle sweetener over bananas or fruit. Pour pudding over fruit. Then top with remaining 1 cup whipped topping. Refrigerate. Variations- Use 2 bananas and chocolate pudding. Do not stir fruit with pudding. Just place in the bottom of the crust

Mexican Chicken Goulash

- 1 1/2 Tbsp. oil
 - 3 Boneless chicken breasts (cut in bite size chunks)
 - 2 Small diced zucchini Squash
 - 1 Small can Whole kernel corn
 - 1 Small can stewed tomatoes
 - 1/4 chopped onion
 - 1 tsp. Garlic Powder
 - 1 tsp. Cumin Powder
 - 1/2 tsp. Parsley or Coriander
 - 1 Can Chicken Broth
- Fry chicken pieces in oil until chicken is half done. Add onions and saute with chicken. Add chicken broth and rest of ingredients. Cook on medium until done.

Quick Cowboy Salsa

- 1/4 chopped or diced onion
 - 1 Tbsp. oil
 - 3/4 cup of your favorite salsa
- Saute onions in oil over medium heat until tender. Add salsa to sauteed onions and bring to a boil for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and serve over eggs of any style or may be served over any type of steak, or pork chops.
- Recipe will yield approx. 1 to 1 1/2 cups of salsa.

Cheese Enchiladas

- 2 1/2 cups of shredded cheese (Longhorn, Monterey Jack, or favorite cheese)
 - 3/4 cups of chopped onion
 - 1 can Old El Paso Mild Enchilada Sauce
 - 1 pkg. of 12 Corn Tortillas
- Combine 2 cups of cheese and 1/2 cup onion or more and set aside. Dip tortillas in hot oil to soften, approx. 2 seconds on each side and stack on a plate. Dip each tortilla in the enchilada sauce and top with cheese and onion mixture. Roll-up and place seam side down, pour the rest of the sauce over the top of the enchiladas. Top with remaining cheese and bake at 350 F. for 15 - 25 minutes, or until hot and bubbly.

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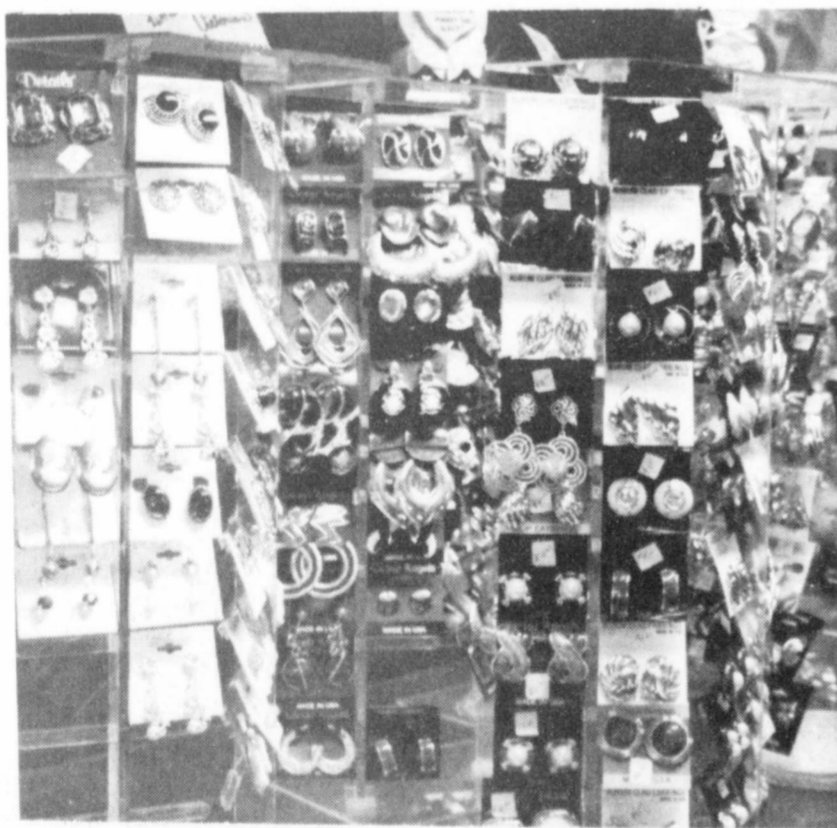

Jimmy Little went the distance on the mound striking out 10 batters while walking none and allowing only 2 runners to reach base. Little picked off one runner and shortstop Jason Whitley used the hidden ball trick to take out the other runner allowing Little to pitch to the minimum 15 batters.

Russell enlisted in Warren County TN and was wounded at the Battle of Murfreesboro, and later taken prisoner and parolled.

Ruth says her travels have taken her to Stokes County N. Carolina

where she picked up the marriage bond of her great-great-grandparents, Jessie Day and Mary McDowell, which was dated October 1809. They are both buried in Warren County TN.

The McDowell Cemetery overlooks the Seyuatachie Valley in Bledsoe County TN. Both Confederate and Union soldiers are buried there. The sons of W.M. McDowell and his brother Joseph McDowell who were first cousins are buried there.

The Union soldiers wrote letters home to Pennsylvania describing the wonderful crop of apples they had enjoyed. They were able to feed the horses 8 ears of corn three times a day. They expressed a dislike for women smoking and using profanity in the South. This was all provided by Joseph McDowell's "Fertile Valley Farm" at Nine Mile, just outside of Pikeville, TN.

Copies on these letters are in the possession of descendants in Pikeville, TN. Two books have been written, both with several pages of Day research; "Spanning the Years With the Hale's" and "The Gott Family History".

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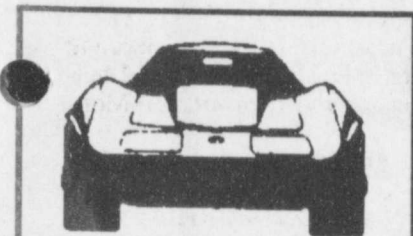
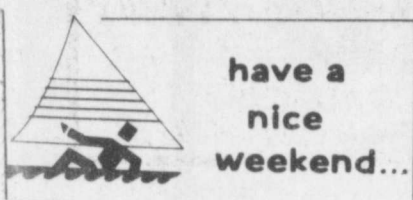

Apricot Bread Pudding

- 3 whole eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 6 tbsp. butter, melted
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 2 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 1/2 tsp. lemon peel, grated
- 1/2 tsp. ground allspice
- 2 3/4 cups milk
- 10 slices day-old whole wheat bread, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 2 cans (17 oz.) California apricot halves, drained and cut in half
- 1/2 cup raisins

Combine eggs and next 7 ingredients. Beat until well blended. Stir in milk; set aside. Place bread, apricots, and raisins in large bowl. Stir in egg/milk mixture; let stand 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour mixture into a buttered 9x13-inch pan. Bake at 325°F for about 70 minutes, until set and golden brown. Cut into squares. Serve warm or cold, with cream or whipped cream, as desired. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

Meat, Poultry, Fish, Dry Beans, Eggs And Nuts

Meat, poultry and fish supply protein, B vitamins, iron and zinc. The other foods in this group - dry beans,

eggs, and nuts - are similar to meats in providing protein and most vitamins and minerals. The Food Guide Pyramid suggests 2 to 3 servings each day of foods from this group. The total amount of these servings should be equivalent to 5 to 7 ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish per day. Two to three ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish is a serving. A 3-ounce piece of meat is about the size of an average hamburger or the amount of meat on a medium chicken breast half. For the other foods in this group, 1/2 cup of cooked dry beans, 1 egg, or 2 tablespoons of peanut butter are equivalent to 1 ounce of meat.

Here are some selection tips for choosing foods from the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts grouping:

- Choose lean meat, poultry without skin, fish and dry beans and peas often. They are choices lowest in fat.

- Prepare meats in lowfat ways by trimming away all the fat you can see and broiling, roasting or boiling these foods instead of frying them.

- Go easy on egg yolks which are high in cholesterol. Use only one yolk per person in egg dishes. Make larger portions by adding egg whites.

- Nuts and seeds are high in fat so eat them in moderation.

Enjoying a variety of foods from the five major food groups represented in the Food Guide Pyramid is the best way to achieve a balanced diet.

Room Temperature

Lemons, limes, tomatoes, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes and bananas are best if not refrigerated. Tomatoes and bananas may be refrigerated after they ripen.

Social Security Notes

Childhood disability benefits are aimed at the most needy. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits paid to blind and disabled children are designed to help the neediest youngsters.

Before the SSI program started in 1974, there was no Federal program providing cash benefits to needy children with disabilities. Today, any child who meets the income and medical qualifications is eligible for help, and once they get SSI, their chances of growing toward a more independent adulthood increases dramatically.

Since the Zebley vs Sullivan Supreme Court decision in February 1990, which improved the way Social Security evaluates disability claims for children, the number of children receiving disability benefits under the SSI program has increased from 296,298 to 624,000.

This numerical growth has led to some reports that it's now easy to get SSI. This is just not true. The strict income and resource limits for SSI assure that only low-income people qualify for payments, and those rules have not changed. The Zebley decision also did not change the definition of disability. It still requires a physical or mental impairment that is likely to result in death or be disabling for a year or more.

The Zebley decision requires that if we cannot find the child disabled on strictly medical grounds, we then evaluate each child to determine how the impairment affects his/her ability to function as compared to other children of his/her age group. To pass this test, the condition must be so severe that it substantially reduces the child's ability to function independently and in a manner similar to children in the same age group.

A disability decision is based on all the evidence from both medical and non-medical sources. Under no circumstance is a finding of disability made based solely on third party allegations, or on the fact that a child is enrolled in a special education class, nor solely on the basis of a diagnosis of a conduct disorder or learning disability. The impairment must be established by convincing medical evidence.

The information provided by the people who know the child is viewed in the light of the child's clinical diagnosis and evidence of behavior over a period of time; i.e., at least a 12-month period to determine if the impairment is disabling.

We need the help of those who see the child on a regular basis--teachers, day-care-workers, counselors--to establish to what extent the condition affects his/her ability to function in daily life.
