If it were financially possible we would do them over...but it isn't, that would cost hundreds and hundreds of dollars in labor, chemicals, press costs, plus postage.

Instead we can only apologize and hope that you will extend your understanding to us.

And to all the seniors...good luck and a great life!

One Teen Dead In Accident

The traditional last-day-of-school joyousness at Prairiland High School was shattered Thursday, May 27 by a tragic accident which claimed the life of one Prairiland Senior and injured three others.

Sunny Salter, age 18, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Hospital and Health Center Trooper John Cross of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported.

Jason McQuatters, 19 was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital and Cortney Morgan, 15 and Kelly Townsend, 17 were hospitalized at McCuistion Medical Center after the accident.

All four of the teenagers were

thrown from the vehicle when it rolled over.

On Tuesday, June 1, McCuistion Hospital reported that both girls had been released, one over the weekend and the other on Monday.

McQuatters was released from St. Joseph's Hospital on Tuesday, June 1st, hospital officials said.

According to Trooper John Cross of the DPS, McQuatters had been driving the pickup all four were in north toward Pattonville when the accident occurred.

Reports indicate that the driver lost control of the truck while cornering

and pulled the truck onto the east side of the road on to the shoulder area, which was unimproved. The trooper reported that it appeared that when control of the vehicle was attempted the truck turned over on its side and rolled through two revolutions before coming to rest facing south. The accident occurred almost in front of the high school.

At graduation ceremonies Friday night at Prairiland Sunny Salter's chair was draped with his cap and gown, along with flowers, and his diploma presented.

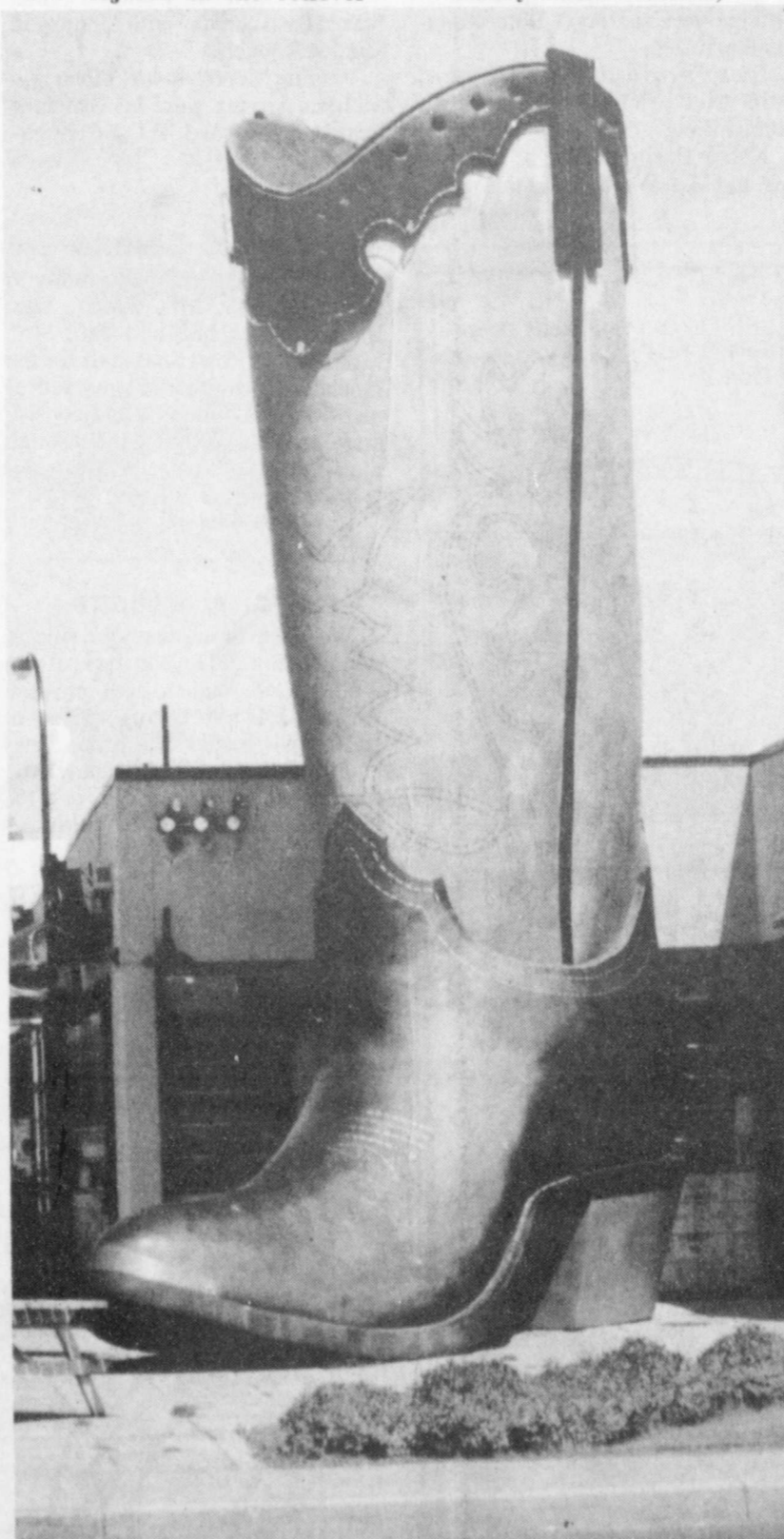

Country Cooking

This week readers are going to have to take "Potluck" as my mind seems to be blanker than usual. The recipes should be as good as ever, even if my gift of gab has departed...temporarily, I promise!

GINGERBREAD
 Nora Scoggins
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons ginger
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 cup oil
 1/2 cup Maple syrup
 1/2 cup buttermilk mixed with
 1 teaspoon soda
 1/2 cup raisins
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 Mix quickly in order. Bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes.

TANGY CARROTS
 1 pound young tender carrots, 5 to 6 inches long
 1 large shallot, very thinly sliced
 1 tablespoon margarine with 2 or less grams of saturated fat
 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice
 1 tablespoon coarsely ground mustard
 coarsely ground black pepper
 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 Peel and trim carrots. Cut them lengthwise, then in half. Place carrots and shallot in vegetable steamer. Cover and steam 8 to 10 minutes, or until tender.
 In a small skillet over medium heat, melt margarine. Add lime juice, mustard and pepper. Stir until thoroughly heated. Remove from heat and add parsley.
 Pour on sauce, and toss to coat. May serve hot or cover and refrigerate to serve cold.

SLOPPY JOES
 American Heart Assoc.
 1 pound lean ground beef
 1 onion, diced
 1/2 cup ketchup
 2 tablespoons chili sauce
 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 1 teaspoon cider vinegar
 1 teaspoon sugar
 6 whole wheat hamburger buns
 Brown meat and onions in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Pour off fat.
 Add all other ingredients except buns, mixing well. Reduce heat and simmer 20 to 30 minutes, uncovered.
 Spoon onto hamburger buns and serve immediately. Makes 6 servings. 270 calories 26 gr. carbohydrate 55 mg. cholesterol 10 g total fat per serving.

 Mix 1 can Eagle Brand Milk

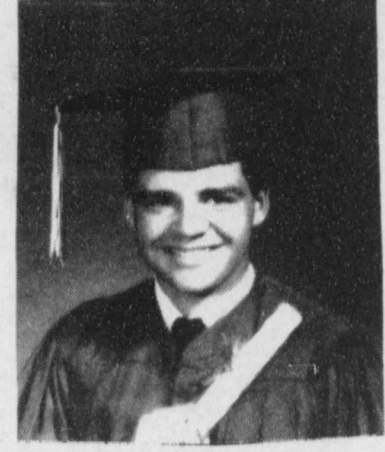

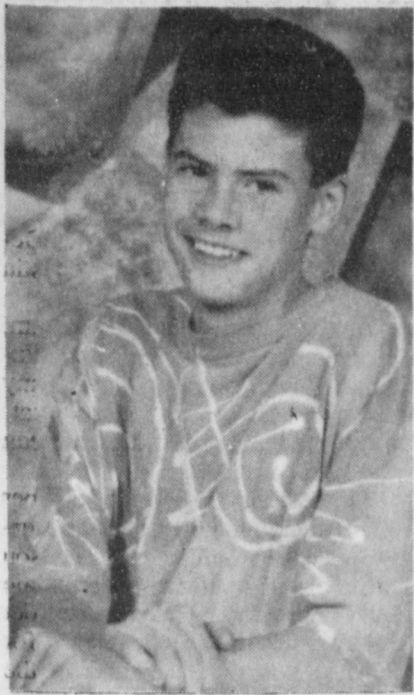

Degrees Awarded At ETSU Spring Commencement

The greatest challenge facing today's college graduates is to achieve racial harmony and justice, Dr. Stuart Anderson told spring graduates at East Texas State University.

Speaking to the graduates in three ceremonies on May 15, Anderson urged his audiences not to become

complacent.

"Individuals must instigate harmony and justice; we must each find our station and act now to mend and to heal," said Anderson, head of the ETSU department of mathematics.

Those who have obtained an education need to be leaders speaking up and helping others, the ETSU faculty member said.

"Help because you have evaluated your obligation to society. Be heard, not because you are an obnoxious squeaky wheel, but because you are articulate. Lead, not because you are part of an elite, but because you have well-formed opinions about where society should go," Anderson commented.

"If each of you contribute to a solution, there is cause for great hope. If we can solve these embarrassing and ruinous racial problems, other difficulties will dissipate," he said.

Of the 550 degrees conferred, 395 were bachelor's degrees, 135 were master's, and 20 were doctoral degrees.

To graduate with Academic Distinction, students must earn a grade point average of 3.75 or higher on at least 54 semester hours at ETSU.

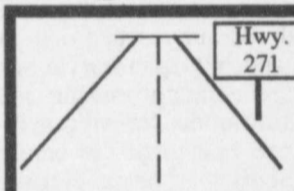

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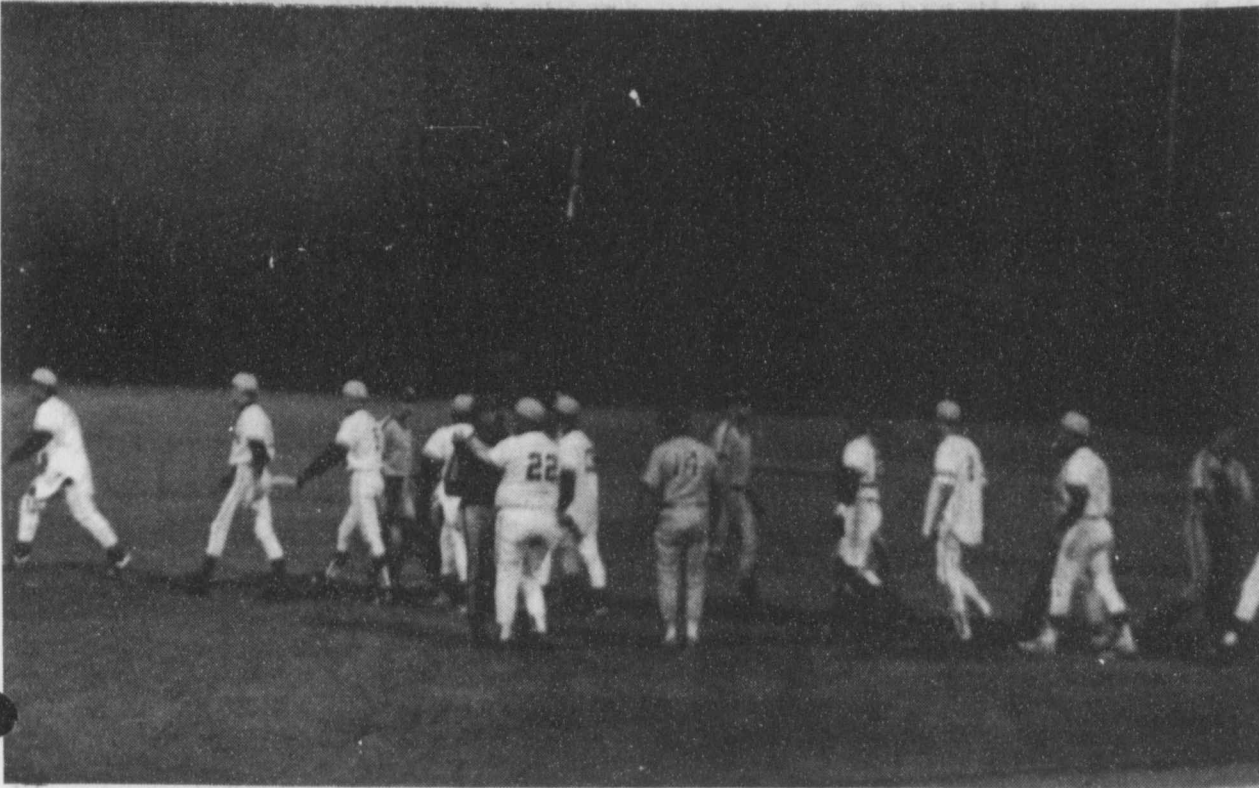

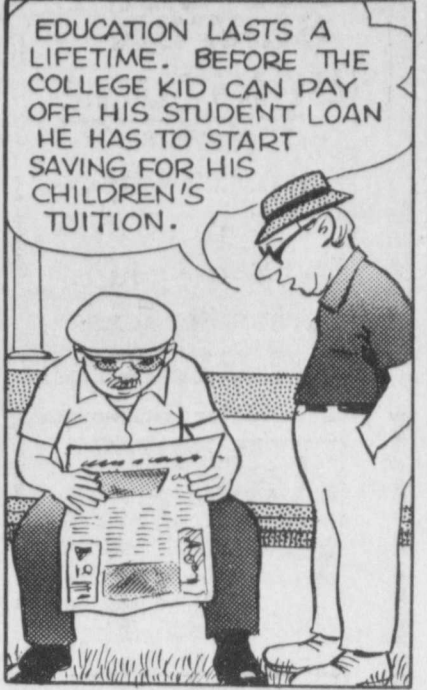

Senate Passes Medical Malpractice Reform

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said a bill passed Tuesday by the Texas Senate represented major progress toward reforming the state's malpractice law.

Senate Bill 1409 by Sen. Carl Parker "is an excellent bill that resulted from extraordinary effort by the senator and those at the negotiating table," Bullock said.

While this stops short of comprehensive malpractice reform, it shows major progress and Sen. Parker is to be commended," he said.

The bill, negotiated by the Texas Medical Assoc., Texas Hospital Assoc., Texas Trial Lawyer Assoc., the Texas Medical Liability trust and others, attempts to expedite the resolution of malpractice cases.

The bill streamlines the discovery process, encourages settling cases out of court, allows spouses access to the medical records of their deceased wife or husband and extends the cap on damages for medical negligence.

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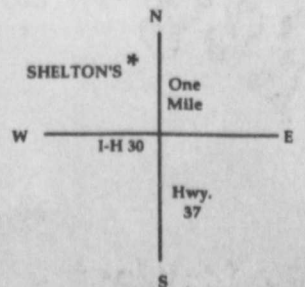
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FAITHFUL MAN-Wood Armstrong of Bogata stands beside the First Baptist Church of Bogata sign. He

Wood Armstrong Given "Royal Treatment" By Man Who Remembers First Job

Would you like to be given a suite in a plush hotel with all your meals furnished, and whatever you wanted to eat provided, anytime, day or night? Throw in a plane ticket round trip from Dallas to O'Hara Airport in Chicago with that limo on hand to meet you and your personal attendant on hand to cater to your every whim and you have the stuff that dreams are made of.

For Wood Armstrong of Bogata this dream has come true not once but twice.

Wood is a familiar figure in Bogata, a friendly, active eighty-eight year old who knows hard work and leads a simple life, attending church regularly and helping others when he can. His journey towards luxury dream trips began sixty-six years ago. Wood was a young, hard-working man who attended church at Morris Chapel Baptist Church, south of Rugby. There he served as church Superintendent. His duties included hiring a preacher for the small congregation. When a young man just returned from the service asked for the job Wood gave him his chance.

The young man needed a job as a

pastor in church somewhere to become ordained.

His first job may have been humble, but he is very well known today, since he is the pastor of the largest Baptist Church in the U.S. His name is Jack Hyles, and he is pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hammond Indiana.

Pastor Hyles has travelled all over the world, preaching to the masses and has authored books, been on radio and his services are now broadcast from his church in Indiana throughout the nation on television.

Hyles' book, published in 1964 is titled "Let's Hear Jack Hyles". In it he quotes a scene from his memories at Morris Chapel Baptist Church, where he said "Wood Armstrong would always say 'well, brother pastor, if you ain't got nowhere else to go you can come eat blackeyed peas at our house.' Hyles' reply was always 'I would I would'."

Through the years the once struggling young minister who has done very well never forgot the man who gave him his first job as a pastor.

In March of this year Pastor Hyles sent for Wood Armstrong to fly to Hammond for two days and nights of

the "royal treatment".

This trip was the second trip of it's kind, the first one coming three years ago.

Wood stood with Pastor Hyles in front of 7,500 people and recalled their first meeting and sang gospel hymns. The service Wood attended was taped for television and will be aired later this year.

Wood was given a love offering from the church, as well as the royal treatment of limosinetransportation, hotel, and that custom tailored suit.

Then, it was time to board the plane homeward back to the quieter life in Bogata.

Wood is still a very active member of the First Baptist Church in Bogata where he serves as a Deacon, a Sunday School Teacher and a Trustee in the church.

Wood says "I never miss a Sunday". He is a simple man who lives his faith, doing his duty when he sees it. It's nice to know that someone he gave a chance to so many years ago hasn't forgotten, and feels Wood deserves the royal treatment every now and then.

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Girl Scout Camping Season Begins

Registration for summer resident camp sessions at Camp Gambill, located near Paris, Texas, is still in progress. Under the direction of Vicky Campbell, Director of Camping Services for Red River Valley Girl Scout Council, the camping season will begin on June 13 and continue through July 17.

Girls who have completed the first grade through age 17 may attend their choice of a three-day, one-week or two-week session, said Ms. Campbell. Girls ages 15-17 may also apply for the four-week Counselor-in-Training (CIT) course, she said.

"Brownie Trailblazer," three-day sessions for younger girls who are unaccustomed to being away from home, will take place June 27-30 and June 30-July 3. The fee is \$50.

One-week "Explorer" sessions are scheduled for the following dates: June 13-19, June 20-26, June 27-July 3, and July 4-10. According to Ms. Campbell, the fee for this session is \$105.

The two-week "Adventurer" sessions will be held July 4-17 for a fee of \$150. This session allows more time for advanced program in campcraft and aquatic skills, as well as sailing and boating (as qualified).

Girls who are interested in becoming camp counselors, or who want to learn more about working with children, may be interested in the CIT course. The course will be offered June 20-July 17, for a fee of \$200.

According to Ms. Campbell, camp fees include room and board, all program supplies, cook-outs, and recognitions earned during the session. Swimming and boating lessons are provided by American Red Cross certified instructors.

Patterson's Farm And Ranch Finance Bill Passes

A bill authored by State Representative Pete Patterson (D-Brookston) that transfers the administration of the Farm and Ranch Finance Program from the Veterans Land Board to the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority has received approval from the Legislature.

Created in 1985, the Farm and Ranch Finance Program was developed to provide affordable financing to eligible Texas farmers and ranchers to buy land. Originally the program was administered by the Veterans Land Board and funded by \$500 million in general revenue bonds. In 1987, the Legislature created the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority within the Texas Department of Agriculture to oversee finance programs that benefit agriculture. Representative Patterson said the move from the Veterans Land Board, which is a division of the General Land Office, to the Texas Agriculture Fi-

nance Authority, was agreeable to both entities in the interest of better serving the state's farmers and ranchers.

Under the new legislation, the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority will administer loans up to \$150,000, with a minimum down payment of 5% of the purchase price of the land. Farmers and ranchers applying for loans under the program must have a net worth of \$250,000 or less, and 25% or more of their gross income must come from farming or ranching for the past three years. The program will be funded with commercial paper in lieu of bonds to provide a competitive interest rate.

"I am delighted the bill passed. It will certainly have a positive impact on young people wanting to establish a base operation," he said.

The bill must now receive final approval from the Governor to become law.

Red River Valley Limousin Cattle Sale Saturday in Paris

The annual spring cattle sale sponsored by the Red River Valley Limousin Association will be conducted Saturday, June 5, at the Rocking W Ranch sale facility beginning at 1 p.m. Selling will be 88 lots of females and bulls. The cattle will be at the facility late Friday afternoon and Saturday morning for your inspection.

This will be the 14th annual sale of the RRVLA, and association members are offering some of their best animals for this sale. There will be something for everyone. For the individual needing a breeding age herd sire, there will be 10 bulls 18 months of age and older. Perhaps you will not be needing a bull until next breeding season, then you will have 14 bulls less than 16 months of age.

Nine of these will be herd sire prospects less than one year of age that have been carefully selected based on high performance criteria,

top genetics and visual appraisal. Each consignor has consigned their top bull calf of their calf crop.

In the female portion of the offering, there will be 30 pairs, 15 bred cows and heifers, and 18 open heifers. All females are less than eight years of age, calving vaccinated for brucellosis, tested for tuberculosis and bred cows pregnancy checked. There will be a few 75% Limousin, but the majority will be either purebred or fullblood. The majority will be red and horned. However, there are some polled as well as a few blacks.

Lunch will be served beginning at 12 noon, and anyone interested in the beef cattle business is invited to attend. A large number of Limousin breeders from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana are expected for the event which normally attracts in excess of 250 people. The sale facility is located 10 miles northeast of Paris on FM 195.

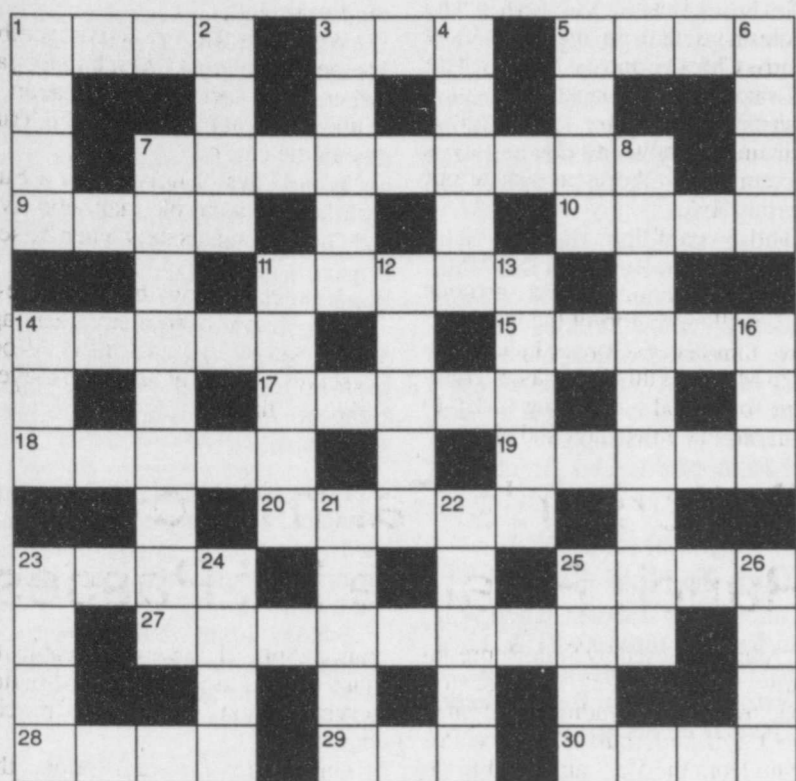

Social Security Notes

Social Security--What's In It For All Of Us?... "What's in it for me?" That's a commonly asked question -- and human nature being what it is, an understandable one. We hear it a lot when it comes to Social Security, especially from younger workers. Normally we respond by telling them about the benefits of Social Security -- but we don't just talk about retirement. Instead, we stress the often overlooked benefits Social Security provides younger people -- disability benefits, payments to the spouse and children of someone with a disability, and survivors benefits for the members of a deceased worker's family.

But in this column I would like to pose a different question. Instead of "What's in it for me?," how about if I ask: "What's in it for all of us?" The answer to that question goes well beyond the bounds of assessing each American's personal investment in the Social Security system. When you consider that Social Security has brought generations of American from the brink of poverty to a safe plateau of financial independence, it's easy to understand why it is often regarded as one of the most successful of all government programs.

Social Security is a complex "social insurance" system that embodies elements of group term insurance, pension policies, and income redistribution. Unlike private retirement plans, social objectives are an integral part of Social Security. I've already hinted at one of those objectives: ensuring that workers and their families are covered not only in their retirement years but also in the case of disability or death. In addition, the Social Security benefit formula is weighted in favor of workers with lower earnings who have less opportunity to save during their working years. They receive a Social Security benefit that represents a greater per-

centage of their average earnings than do their higher-salaried counterparts.

Some would argue that they could realize a greater return on their taxes if they were permitted to invest their own retirement funds. It is reasonable to assume that some individuals might invest their money profitably, avoid crippling disability or early death, and generally remain immune to ill fortune. These people would eventually be able to retire financially secure. But how does one determine before the fact who those fortunate few will be? Disability and death are equal opportunity occurrences, striking men and women of all ages. In fact, statistics show that about 42% of all men and 30% of women entering the workforce today will die or become disabled before reaching retirement age.

One of the advantages of requiring all workers to invest in a national pension program like Social Security is that the financial risks associated with life's misfortunes are spread throughout the population. In addition, a broad-based social insurance system reduces the impact that inflation and other economic setbacks can have on individual contributors.

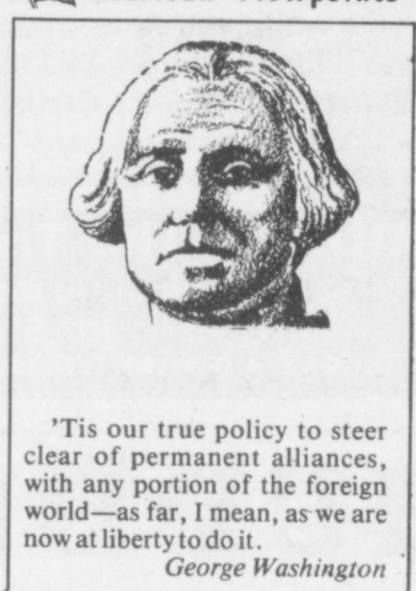
Rather than considering private investments as an alternative to Social Security, they should be regarded as supplements to the program -- especially since Social Security was never intended to be a retiree's only source of income.

So -- what's in it for all of us? Considering what Social Security means to individuals in terms of retirement, disability, survivors, and family benefits and what it means to the country in terms of a better standard of living for many of its citizens, Social Security is one of the most important and far-reaching investments Americans -- and America -- can make.

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4-H Poultry Workshop Slated For June 5

Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) expects more than 300 Texas and Louisiana youngsters to attend the 4-H Poultry Feeder Shortcourse on June 5 in Henderson.

Poultry is not paltry business in Texas. The broiler industry alone accounts for 382 million dollars in income for Texas family producers. Most broiler operations in East Texas are family-owned.

"4-H projects and Future Farmers of America (FFA) classes train many of the next generation of East Texas broiler feeders. About 100 young people were involved in our county poultry show alone last year," says James Greer, county extension agent. Shortcourse topics will include

selection of birds, nutrition, health practices and feeding facilities. Eight jTAEX and industry experts will conduct the training.

The shortcourse, held at the Rusk County Youth Exposition Center in Henderson, is sponsored by the District 9 Poultry Project Development Committee. Advance registration for the day-long event is \$7, a cost that includes the noon meal. Children under 9 years old may register for \$3. Late registration - after June 1 - will be \$10 per person.

David Ferguson, who is Chairman of the Lamar County Fruit & Nut Committee, reports the sighting of casebearer moths in his trees last week, which are located in the Red River bottom at Forest Chapel. This would indicate that the insecticide should be applied immediately if control of the insect is to be obtained

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

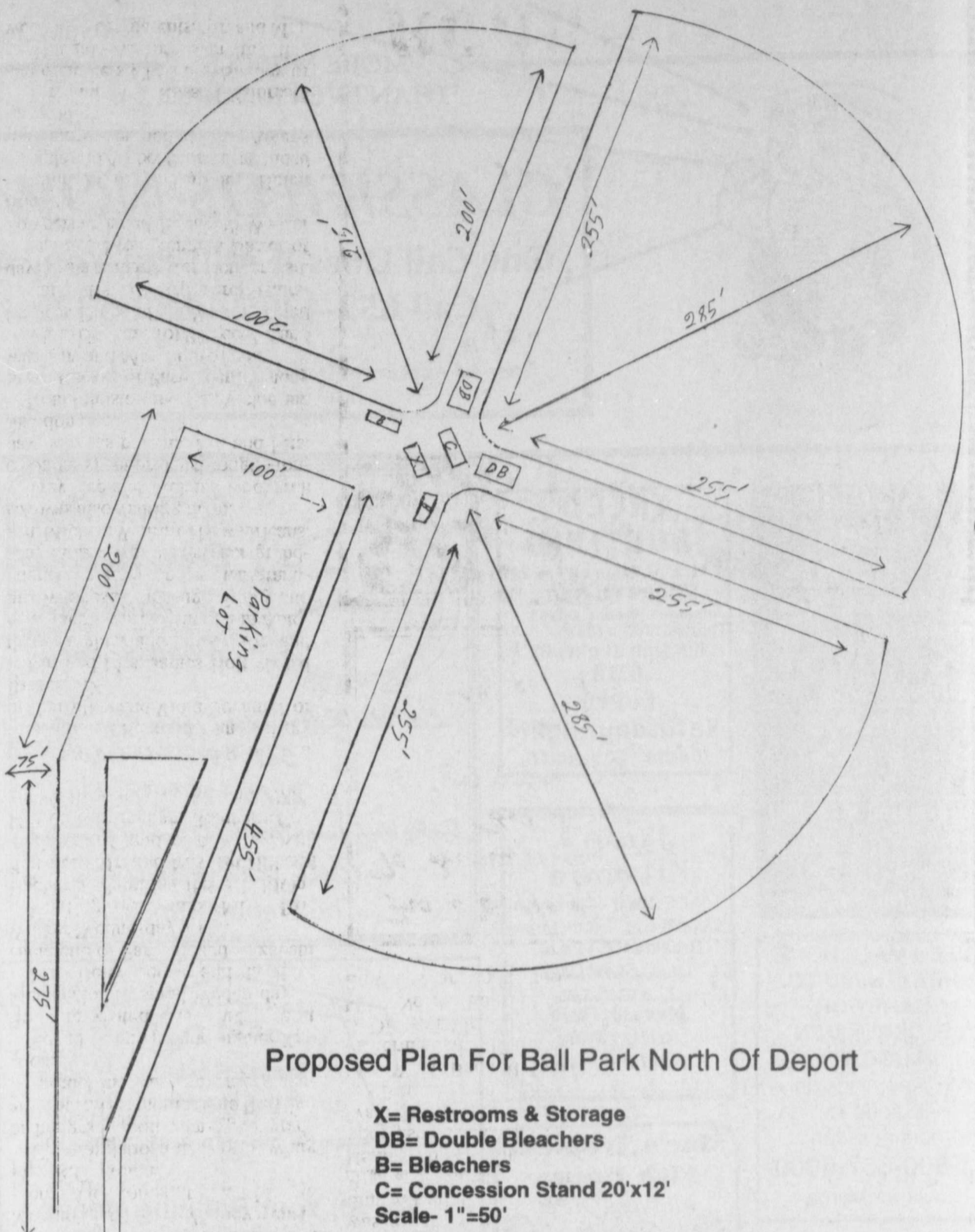
