Letter To The Editor 

To The Editor: This is not really a "Letter to the Editor", but is a letter to all the members of the Lamar County Electric Cooperative Association.

Each of them shoul dhave already received a notice from the CO-OP advising that a special membership meeting will be held June 19 at the PJC Hunt Center at 2 p.m. The purpose of the meeting will be to vote on the removal and replacement of selected members of the current board of directors. However, I am not sure all CO-OP members are aware of the significance of this meeting. If not, perhaps the following will help them understand why it is extremely important that they attend the meeting and exercise their rights and responsibilities as voting members of the CO-OP.

The board members who will be elected at this meeting will be responsible for overseeing the operation of the CO-OP for a minimum of three years. Their job as directors is to be sure that the CO-OP is managed in the most efficient manner to provide the lowest possible electric rates for the members of the CO-OP.

A significant number of members feel that the CO-OP has not been properly managed during recent years. Prior to the regular annual meeting of the CO-OP April 17, 1993, a petition was presented to the Board of Directors asking for the removal of some of the board members. At a special meeting April 1, 1993, charges which had been brought against six board members (in the petition) were discussed, along with "Plans for the annual meeting to be held April 17, 1993." Twelve days later, a special meeting of the board of directors was held, on April 13-just four days prior to the annual meetingto discuss the "options concerning the charges brought against six board members....(CO-OP) coun-

sel was instructed to institute a law suit in Lamar County to determine the validity of a petition filed to remove directors and for clarification of the process to verify signatures of members signing petition." (Quoted from the official minutes of the board meeting.)

When the Board of Directors were unsuccessful in their efforts to have a Lamar County Judge issue an order for bidding the members to vote on the removal/election of board members at the April 17 meeting, they requested Judge Paul Banner in Greenville to issue the restraining order. The order was issued on Friday, April 16 by Judge Banner. From the timing of the order, it would appear this was simply a delaying tactic on the part of the Board to prevent the CO-OP membership from exercising its right to a vote for change.

Since that time, Judge Banner has ruled that the petition which was originally presented to the board, as well as a second petition which was subsequently submitted to the board by CO-OP members, was to be considered by the board for verification of membership signatures, and if found to be valid, that a special meeting of the membership was to be called for the purpose of voting on the removal and election of board members. udge Banner also commented, in his May 12 hearing, that "everybody knows what's already happened here is that there is a lot of bruised feelings, and apparently the waste of 13,000 bucks, or close to it." This does not include court costs, nor costs associated with the holding of the special meeting scheduled for June 19.

Normally, the President of the Board of Directors of the CO-OP presides at the annual membership meeting. However, the Board chose to bring in a moderator from out of town to preside at the meet-

ing. Even though the moderator led the members to believe that he was not being paid for his services, he was later paid \$1,730 for approximately 7 hours of "work", including travel time to and from Sherman. Not bad for a day's work. This converts to a rate of \$247 per hour! This is twice the rate awarded to the local attornies by Judge Banner for their services. The point of this long commen-

tary is: If the Board had been willing to discuss the petitions with the membership, thousands of dollars of expense to the CO-OP could have been avoided. Increased costs at the CO-OP mean higher electric rates for its members. And, speaking of costs, the 1992 CO-OP audit report indicates that Directors' fees and expenses during 1992 wer \$88,765. This amounts to an average of \$9,863 per board member. In addition to meeting feees and travel expenses, directors and their families are covered under the CO-OP health insurance program. The audit also shows that Net Operating Margins for the CO-OP declined by 34% during 1992; longterm debt increased by 30% to a total of \$9,179,301 (100% of assets are pledged to this debt.); interest paid on this debt was \$504,338 or 12% more than in 1992; interest rates were as high as 9.5% on longterm debt .... These, and other practices, have led members to believe that the CO-OP has not been managed as well as it might have been, and that a change in board mem bers and management should be

All members of the CO-OP should attend the June 19 special membership meeting and judge for themselves whether or not a change is required.
