I just finished reading a book about Richard the Third, King of England in the 1500's.

Richard III is mainly remembered because he was thought to have murdered his two small nephews rather than have them ever be able to wrest the throne from his grasp. The book proved fascinating because it offered as much evidence that he did NOT do this evil deed as is usually offered that he DID!

But even more fascinating was the carefully researched glimpse into what life was like back then.

It was thought-provoking to realize that the greatest kings and their extensive courts and entourages lived in worse conditions than most of the direst poor in England or the U.S. do today.

Limited diets of meat, breads and in summer some vegetables graced the tables of the most royal. No matter how beautifully prepared, or elaborately served, nothing changed the fact that in winter there was no fresh fruit and very little in the line of vegetables.

The poor fared even worse, of course, and bleeding gums and scurvy ran rampant. Of course, actual starvation ended many of these ills.

Of a family of five or six children only one or two might survive, even among the wealthy.

The medicines of the time consisted of herbs, and although there was actually some benefit in some of them, the royal household would have given all for a bottle of aspirin and an antibiotic.

People lived with rushes or straw scattered on the floor, and cold stone walls could be warmed only a little by tapestries and wall hangings.

The most exhalted of people, surrounded by doctors armed with leeches and blood letting instruments, would have had a much better chance of survival if they could have gone to the most over-worked and poorly funded free clinic in the nation!

The wealthy might own as many as seven complete dresses, while the poor owned only one. The middle class perhaps had one or two outfits. Though the richly dressed might have on a fortune of jewels, pearls, silver and gold they could not wash nor clean them.

The roles of men and women were sharply defined, and women were bartered and used as political pawns by royalty at every turn.

There were no insurance companies for disasters, no life insurance to aid a widow whose husband died, no Social Security, no welfare.

If a member of court displeased the monarch they might find themselves stripped of all their lands and means of livelihood...if not their life.

Filth prevailed, with the poverty ridden never bathing and the royals bathing perhaps once or twice a year.

Lice and fleas were a fact of life, and not just on pets, but on humans.

Temperatures were not controllable. No fans in the heat, nothing but inefficient fireplaces in the winter.

I enjoyed the book, and I enjoyed a look into the past.

It's strange to think that being "middle class" provides us with a much better way of life than the most powerful and world-controlling people of the past!

To Cart Or Not To Cart...That Is The Question! Public Hearing Deals With Trash Collection Options

The Deport City Council met in special session Monday, September 27th to discuss trash pickup service in the city.

A public hearing was held before the special meeting with several concerned citizens, city council members and Waste Management of Northeast Texas- Paris Site Manager Stoney Ormsby present.

Ormsby briefed the audience on new EPA rulings concerning the handling of trash pickup and disposal.

Ormsby presented options available to the city. Prices quoted are approximate figures.

1. Residents and businesses would use containers furnished by Waste Management. The cost to residents would be \$8.50 plus tax per month for a total of \$9.16 per month trash pickup fee. The trash would still be picked up one time each week. Businesses would pay a commercial rate of \$12 a month with a minimum 0-5 bags per week. These prices are

based on a 104 gallon container (cart on wheels) which will hold up to five 30 gallon plastic trash bags of trash. The commercial rate would increase accordingly based on the number of bags of trash generated. 6-10 bags would be \$20, 10-16 bags would be \$28, 16-20 bags would be \$36, etc.

Commercial customers could also face using larger trash bins at an increased charge, plus an additional charge of \$13 per month for a lock on the containers.

2. Waste management could continue to pick up trash in plastic bags just like the system presently being used for a charge of approximately \$7 per month.

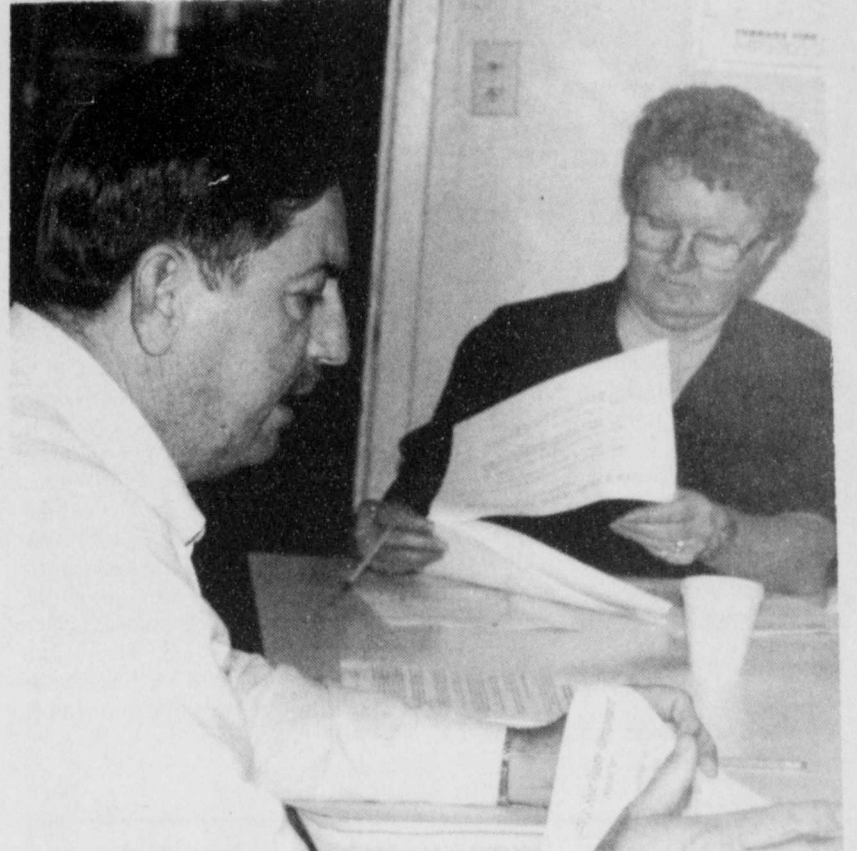
The second choice is not a real solution, according to Ormsby, since it's just a "matter of time" before the EPA rules already in effect will force everyone to stop placing trash bags out on the ground. The bags are opened by animals and scattered, or leak garbage and chemicals on the ground. According to Ormsby this

system must stop soon.

Billing is also a service issue to be considered by the Council. If the city collects the bill for the service each month (using the 104 gallon carts) then Waste Management would be responsible for the carts, but if each resident or business were billed directly from Waste Management then the resident or business would bear responsibility for theft or damage. The replacement cost of the carts would be \$66. Also, each customer would be required to pay three months billing in advance if they were billed individually.

This choice is not expected to be very popular with residents or business people, according to council members, although the city could expect to save a considerable amount of time and money if Waste Management handled the billing.

Details of the billing plans and trash pickup systems are to be worked out by the council at the next meeting.

One Dies, Two Injured In Wreck

One local man was killed and two more injured in an automobile accident near Miami, Oklahoma Friday, September 24th.

James Gatlin, age 68 of Powderly and a member of the board of directors of Community National Bank, Detroit, was killed in the accident while Seneca Cowan, also a member of the same board of directors, was in ICU at Miami Baptist Hospital Tuesday. His wife reported to Community National Bank officials that he had undergone nine hours of surgery to pin his leg, hip and shoulder, and to repair a serious scalp laceration. He

is expected to be hospitalized for some time but may be taken out of ICU Tuesday afternoon. Cowan is 62 and a resident of Detroit.

Bill Anderson, age 55, of Bogata, was also in the vehicle and sustained a collapsed lung and an injured leg plus lacerations, according to Community National Bank officials. He is expected to be released from hospital soon.

Anderson was pinned in the wreckage for forty-five minutes before being freed by the Jaws of Life.

They were on their way to a dog show in Missouri at the time of the

accident.

According to Oklahoma Highway Patrol officials the accident happened at 11:30 a.m. on the Will Rogers Turnpike.

OHP Trooper Jim Rhine said a truck, driven by James Lahman of Caney, was westbound on the turnpike when it apparently hydroplaned on wet pavement and crossed the median of the roadway coming in collision with the vehicle in which the local men were riding and also with two other cars.

Reports on the other accident victims were unavailable.

Genealogical Society To Honor Henry Stout

Henry Stout was born in Weakley Co. Tennessee in 1799. He left home at the early age of 14. He married Sarah Talbott in Arkansas. In 1819, he moved to Pecan Point, now in Bowie County, but then part of Red River County.

Henry was a unique character in that he was an adventurer, a scout, an Indian fighter, and a guide to early pioneers. He led many pioneers through the area and taught them how to adapt to the frontier way of life. He taught the settlers to use the bear for more than just meat. To render the fat for lard and to use the hide for covering.

Henry was also a guide for hunting parties. On one trip, he was

known to hit a bear in the head with the stock of his gun, breaking it, then killing the bear with a knife.

Henry was in Red River County until the 1830's when he decided to move on. His reason was that the land was becoming too populated. He moved his family to Wood County where some descendants still live.

The Red River County Genealogical Society will honor Henry Stout with a Special Pictorial Cancellation on October 2, 1993 at Clarksville. The cancellation will take place in front of the Post Office. The cost of the cancellation will be \$2.00, and will include an envelope and stamp.

Dutch Oven Breakfast

8 slices bread
8 eggs
8 link sausages (browned)
1/4 cup milk
1 can mushroom soup
1/4 cup green pepper (chopped)
1/2 cup onion (chopped)
3 slices bacon
1 1/2 cup cheddar cheese

In bottom of Dutch oven, place bacon. Tear up bread into bite size pieces. Stir eggs. Mix in sausage, onion, and pepper. Pour over bread and refrigerate overnight. Next morning mix milk and soup. Pour over bread mixture and top with cheddar cheese. Cook with ten briquets on top and bottom of dutch oven for 45 minutes. If a Dutch oven and briquets aren't something you have in your kitchen, you might want to use a pyrex dish in a slow oven.

Fruit Cobbler

Line Dutch oven with aluminum foil that goes up the sides most of the way. Put any type of pie filling in bottom. Sprinkle lightly with cinnamon, then 1/2 cup brown sugar. Sprinkle dry yellow or white cake mix on top. Pour 1 cup of 7-Up over the cake mix. 15 briquets on top and 10 under dutch oven for 30 minutes or until done. (or cook in 350 degree oven in pyrex cobbler sized dish)

Chicken Breasts With Mushrooms

6 to 8 chicken breasts (skinless)
1 stick margarine
1 large onion (chopped)
1/2 lb. mushrooms (sliced)
1 can chicken broth
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can evaporated milk
salt and pepper
Melt margarine in Dutch oven, saute' onion and mushrooms. Add chicken breasts. Mix chicken broth, soup, and milk. Pour over chicken breasts and cook 1 hour. 20 briquets on top and bottom. (Or use oven safe casserole dish with cover, and bake in medium oven.)

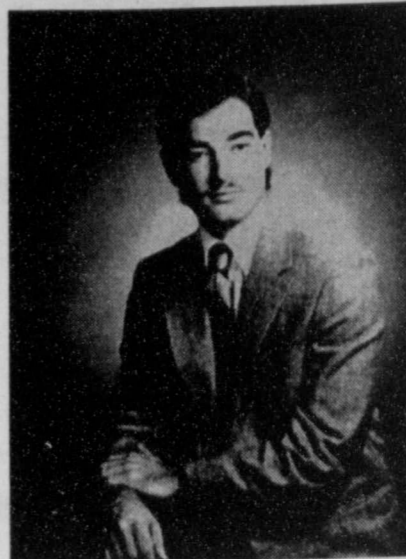

Again in the second quarter the Patriot defense scored, as they got a safety when sacking the Karnack Quarterback in the endzone.

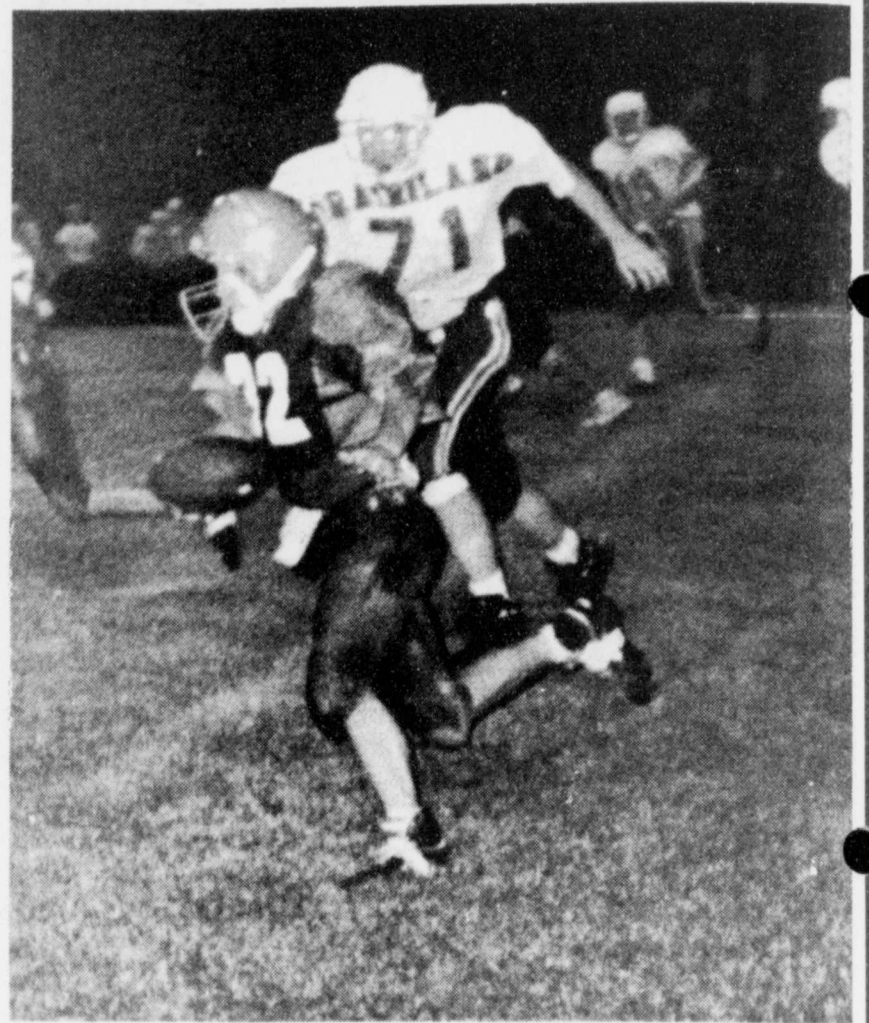
Late in the four quarter the Pats capped off the evening with one yard run by Swaim and the PAT.

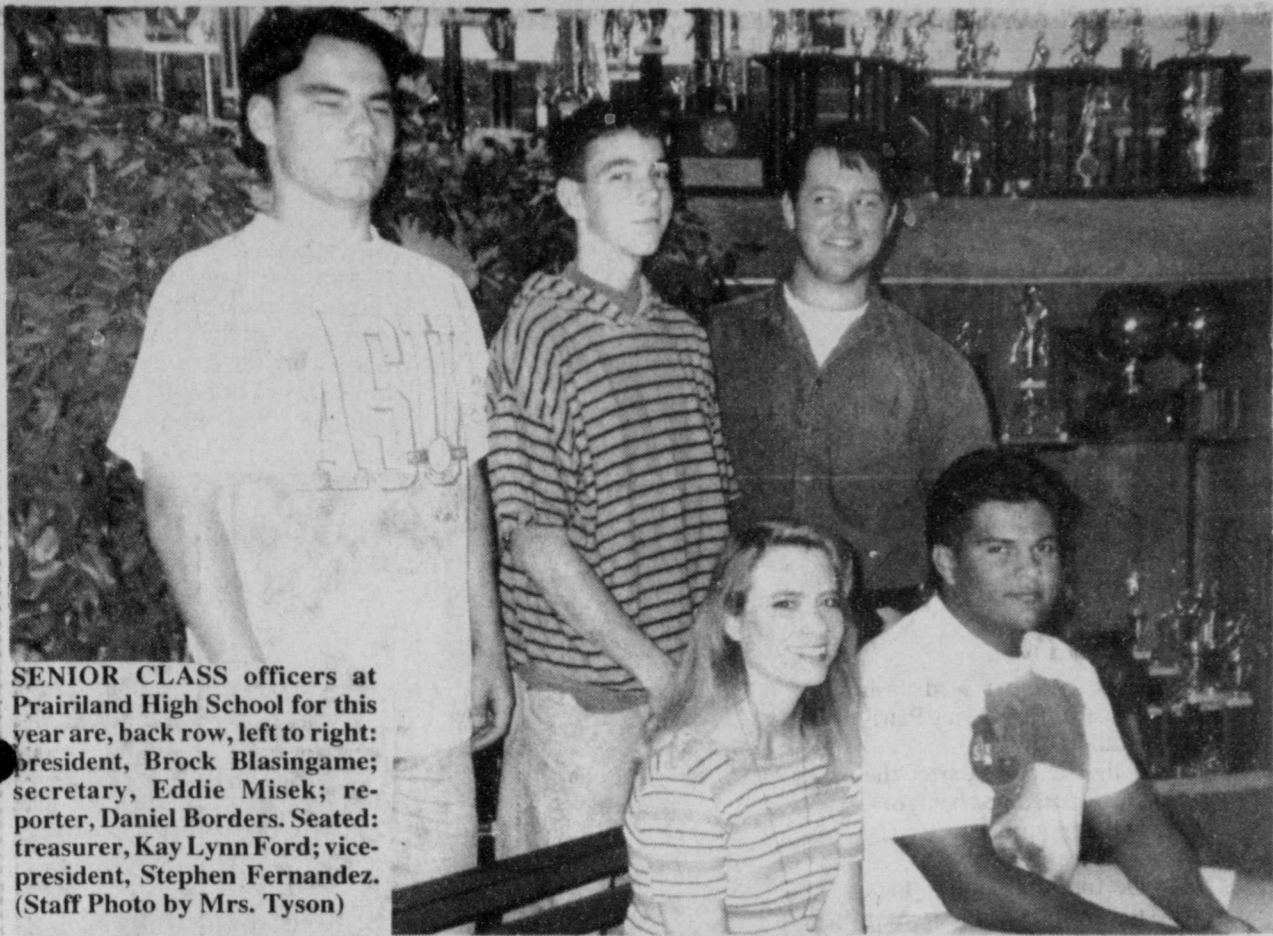

Wood Burners

Softwoods, such as pine, burn rapidly and contain resin or pitch. Use firewood which has been cut, split and dried out for at least one year for more heat and less creosote build up.

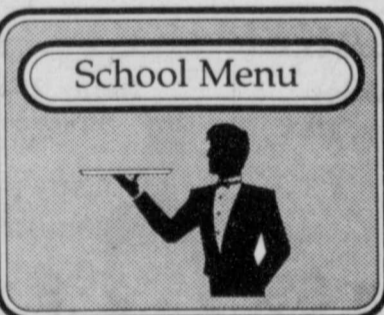

Prairiland CISD In Compliance With Section 504 Of Rehabilitation Act Of 1973

The Code of Federal Regulations #104.4 (a) states:
No qualified handicapped person shall, on the basis of handicap, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under program or activity which receives or benefits from Federal financial assistance.

This simply means that any student who has a disabling condition that creates a learning problem for that student could qualify for special instructions through our Content Mastery program or with "modifications" of his/her regular education curriculum.

Some of the handicapping conditions which would not necessarily qualify a student for the Content

Mastery program but could warrant some modifications in his/her regular education setting are:

- *dyslexia;
- *communicable diseases such as AIDS, AIDS related complex (ARC) or asymptomatic carriers of the AIDS virus (HIV), tuberculosis;
- *temporary handicapping conditions such as injuries, short-term illnesses;
- *behavior disorders;
- *chronic asthma and severe allergies;
- *physical handicaps such as spina

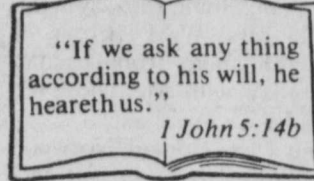

*other chronic and/or life-threatening diseases such as diabetes or cancer.

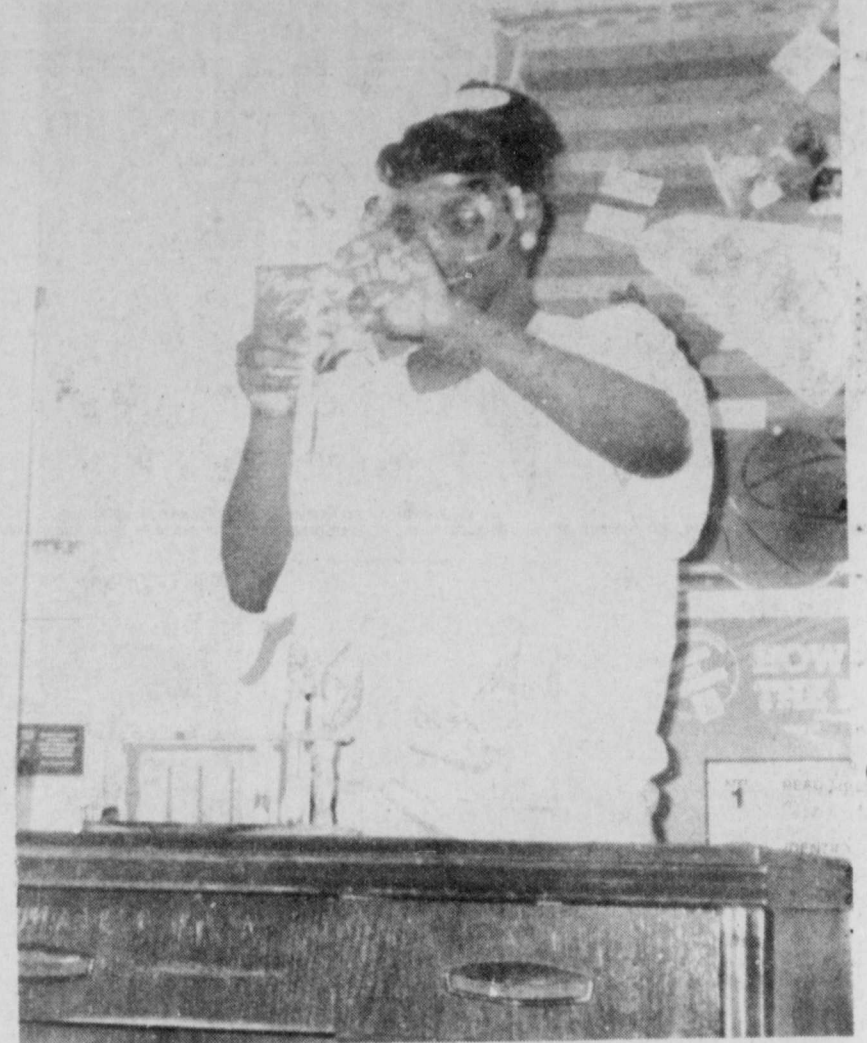

If you like hot spicy foods, seafoods and lots of toe tapping music (haven't met many Texans who don't), then you will love Lafayette Louisiana.

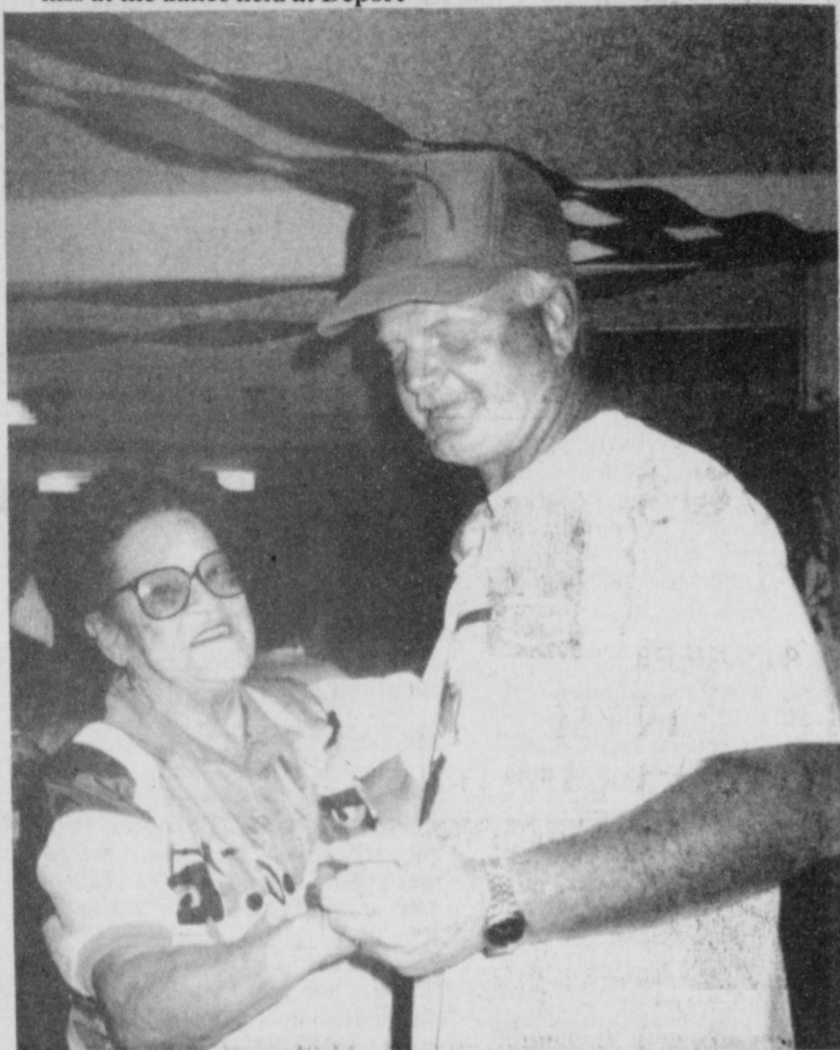

Fire Chief Duane Glover reported on the steps being taken on obtaining a Clas A pumper truck.

Members discussed taking the scheduled CPR course set for Sept. 25th at the fire station.

The CPR training is part of the ongoing training procedures to certify department members.

The next meeting is Monday, October 4th at the fire station.
