

Dr. Mavis Kelsey Publishes Book On **Courthouses Of Texas**

The book features a wealth of living history with pictures of 254 courthouses in the state's county seats. Kelsey is an amateur historian, art and book collector, and a founder of the Kelsey-Seybold Clinic in Houston. The historic courthouses are a valuable architectural heritage, he says, and he

The Prairiland JV boys lost the consolation game to the Rivercrest JV team 56-43. Jeremy Day had 20 points in the contest.






Lady Patriots Shock NL & Paris
