




# Lady Patriots Take 2nd In McDonald Shootout

Talking about vision! We were in a partnership crusade with an evangelistic team from the State Baptist Convention of Indiana which was being held in Mongu Baptist Church in Western Province in Zambia. T.B. Smith of Indiana and I (Fred) were meeting in the afternoon with members of teh church, seeking to help them in planning for the future. When we asked them to share their vision for their church by the year 2000, Mrs. Munena, a widow with eight children, answered with confidence, "We want to have 5,000 members in our church by year 2000." I swallowed and suggested to her that surely she meant 500 since their church averages about 50 on Sundays. She again responded, "No, 5,000!" Not wanting to be negative. especially since we had been teaching on faith and that we must expect great things from God, I went to the blackboard and sketched a rough map of Western Province where we have only one church and one mission. I asked them to tell me where new Baptist churches are needed. Immediately, hands went up and within a few minutes, they had identified 10 different places where Baptist churches are needed; also, we agreed that we must find a way to reach the people in hundreds of villages across the Zambezi River which are difficult to reach logistically because there is no bridge over the river, the pontoons are not very safe, roads are almost non-existent, and the and is so deep it requires a 4-wheel drive vehicle to travel. Nevertheless, we all agreed that, after all, if their one church can multiply herself to start churches in those 10 locations, plus find a way to witness to those villages along the river, surely they can have a combined number of 5,000 members by year 2000. And what was I thinking of my initial reaction to Mrs. Munene when she expressed her vision? "O ye of little faith....." Sensing their seriousness about starting new churches, we asked if they would like to start a new church that very week. They all agreed. We changed our plans and held services in Manushakende, 14 miles south, on that Saturday night and about 100 were saved. We started a new church the next morning. Praise the Lord!

The above story is one of many blessings of our recent crusades which were held in three small towns in Zambia with the help of Baptists from Indiana. In all, 2,500 were saved and many more made rededicatins to the Lord. We praise our Heavenly

We have had a goo dyear in our respective ministries since our last newsletter. In Joy's ministry, Bible Way Correspondence chool, the student membership continues to grow and many are accepting Christ each year. Not only are people being saved brough these Bible studies, but many are being strengthened in their faith. Recently, a letter was received from a member who wrote that his marriage was in trouble and he had already sent his wife back to the village. Then he read the Bible Way book, "Christian Marriage and Family Life", and received the biblical guidance he needed to save his marriage. We thank God for this victory. In music and outh ministries, Fred has seen steady growth in several areas. We had our first festival for women's choirs only, and were blessed by the singing of 15 choirs. Added to the 34 other choirs which participated in our general Lusaka festival, we set a new record with 49 choirs participating this year. More than 200 young people were saved in our different music and youth conferences throughout Zambia during the year. As you can see, Zambia continues to be very open and

In August our second son, Randy, and his wife, Dana, and their lovely daughters, Sarah, Katie and Rachel, accepted God's call to "return to Africa," where Randy grew up. Randy is teaching and coaching at Rosslyn Academy n Nairobi, Kenya, a 12grade Christian school sponsored partly by the Foreign Mission Baord of Southern Baptists. Randy and Dana were in teh process toward eventual approintment with the Foreign Mission Board; howeve, r when this opportunity came to go on a threeyear contract directly with the school, they felt this is God's will for them at this time. They are settling in well and are adjusting to life there. Please pray for them.

Gary, Barbara and Emily are still in Ft. Worth and doing well. Valerie is in Arlington and Bruce is in San Antonio. Both of them have received promotions in their jobs and are happy about that. 

cup all-purpose flour

½ tsp. baking powder

1/3 cup margarine, softened 1/3 cup crunchy peanut butter

1/3 cup sugar 11/4 tsp. Sweet 'N Low granulated

sugar substitute

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 tbsp. chopped, unsalted peanuts



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

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# Holiday Entertaining? Keep Food Safety In Mind

Delicious food is often a special part of Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday events. Entertaining for family or friends on a small or large scale is fun, but often demanding, and definitely needs to be done with food safety in mind.

When planning a large scale event, keep in mind that preparing and handling large amounts of food will take planning ahead of time for safe preparation, storage and serving. If large quantities of food will be prepared ahead of time, quickly cool and refrigerate them. Divide into portions and store in shallow containers. Deep containers increase the time the center of a pot of food stays warm, encouraging bacterial growth. Consider the amount of refrigerator space

If perishable foods are picked up from a deli or purchased from a caterer, transport them quickly, and serve immediately; or if purchased ahead of time, transport them quickly to your refrigerator where they should remain until serving time. If you're purchasing a large quantity of food items such as meat trays or any perishable foods, ask that they be packaged in small portions, or do this when you get home. By doing this, you can replace trays often at the party event and not leave one large tray out for too long.

If holiday meals are served buffet style, this may mean that the food remains on the table as guests come and go. This is not the safest situation, as foods left at warm room temperatures are susceptible to bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness. Plan serving times so that perishable foods do not remain at room temperature for more than two hours. Use smaller portions on the serving table, and replace them often from the heat source in the kitchen or

On the serving table, or in the kitchen, keep hot foods hot. Chafing dishes may or may not keep foods at the necessary temperature of 140 degrees F. or above. Keep cold foods cold on the table by nestling serving containers in beds of ice.

When replenishing foods on the buffet, it's best to replace containers, rather than putting fresh food in a container that contains food that has been sitting out, especially if the food

has been at room temperature. Make your holiday events special and food safe by following safe food handling practices. If it is an event to remember, make it a pleasant one. Protect you and your guests from foodborne illness.


So may you give into the spirit this season, and reap the rewards - for the biggest reward is in the heart!

# Beware of Nutrition Claims In Women's Magazines

What types of nutrition messages are the readers of women's magazines receiving?

One recent study showed an overall increase in nutrition claims referring to the absence of specific dietary substances such as fat, sugar or cholesterol from food and beverage products. Many of the nutritional claims reflected topics related to the dietary guidelines recommendations. All advertisements were used to appeal to consumer concerns about taste, convenience and quality. Nutrition

Why are these women's magazines so full of nutrition information? Women tend to be especially interested in nutrition information. They read this more from magazines and other forms of print media.

claims varied by product type adver-

Some of the leading women's magazines have nutritionists, dietitians or home economists responsible for their nutrition articles or food/recipe sections. This increases the reliability when research-based information is used. Beware of some nutrition-related articles not written by dietitians, nutritionists or home economists. These articles may make weight loss claims or claims for use of certain nutrient supplements seem too good to be true. One example is the hype for chromium picolinate touted for weight loss. Chromium picolinate has not been approved for weight loss by the Food and Drug Administration. Consumers need to realize that weight loss comes only by changing lifestyle habits, including exercise and low-fat eating. No "magic bullets" for weight loss exist.

If you have noted some nutritional claim that may be questionable, misleading or inaccurate, contact the local county Extension Office for research-based information related to the particular nutrition claim.


