TU's Generating Unit 3 Will Be Rebuilt By 1995

TU Electric confirmed today that generating Unit 3 of the Monticello power plant will be repaired and restored to service.

The 750,000 kilowatt unit has been out of service since November 14, 1993 when it was damaged in the collapse of its emissions chimney.

"Unit 3 will be rebuilt and operated as a lignite/coal fueled generating unit because it will provide TU Electric's customers with low cost power," said Gordon Hall, Titus/Camp County manager for TU Electric.

Because the costs will be covered by insurance, the decision to rebuild was not affected by the recent potentially adverse ruling on TU Electric's rate request by the Public Utility Commission.

Plans for future use of the Thermo lignite mine are not expected to be made until the time Unit 3 is back in operation. The Thermo lignite was

used only in Unit 3, and the mine was closed after the chimney incident. Hall said the comparative costs of various fuel sources and other factors will be evaluated before a decision is made on what fuel to use in the restored unit.

Engineering work on the restoration project has begun, but no schedule for repair and reconstruction of the unit has been determined. Hall said the unit is expected to be back in service during 1995.

"The Monticello plant continues to be an important asset to the 2.2 million customers of TU Electric, providing them with economical, reliable electric service," Hall said. "The plant and associated facilities also are of significant benefit to the economy of the Titus County area, and it is our intent to have the plant fully and safely operational without undue delay."

The collapse of the chimney dam-

aged some of the generating unit's structure and two start-up boilers, partially destroyed the scrubber and precipitators, and destroyed or damaged some coal handling equipment, electrical controls and other equipment.

TU Electric has retained consultants to investigate the cause of the chimney collapse. Planning and coordination of activities are being finalized, and on-site work will begin the week of January 23.

The company also has chosen Sargent & Lundy Engineers Inc. to direct the removal of the debris and Fluor Daniel Inc. to supply the labor and equipment included in the effort. That work will begin as the investigation into the accident's cause is completed and is expected to take several months.

An estimate as to the total cost to repair the generating unit has not yet been developed.

City Of Deport To Get Sewer Line Grant

The City of Deport unofficially has been awarded a \$233,000 grant to construct new sewer lines in the city.

The new lines will be built along south College Street, along Main Street on the south end of the city, across Hwy. 271 to the sewer plant. It will also go across Mustang Creek to Depot Street.

The new lines will be built of six, eight and ten inch lines. The substation at the sewer plant will also be redesigned.

The total cost of the project will carry a price tag of \$262,500.

If approved this will be the first step in replacing many of the city's sewer lines which were built in the 1930's and are at the point of having

to be replaced. The \$233,000 grant was awarded through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

Mayor Charles Foster states it could take anywhere from two weeks to three months to know definitely if the \$233,000 will be the final amount of the grant.

"There are just so many funds available and at this time the city of Deport will get \$233,000 of the original \$250,000 they applied for", Mayor Foster said.

However, Mayor Foster also states that there is the possibility of the city being awarded the total \$250,000 grant. "We'll just have to wait and see" he stated.

George Wolf Receives Heart Transplant

The family of George Wolfe has called to report that George received his heart transplant on Sunday, Jan. 23, and is doing very well.

He was moved to a private room on Tuesday, and has even spent a few minutes on an exercise bike.

They hope to have him home in about 10 days.

1 beaten egg
1 medium onion, chopped
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
1/4 tsp garlic powder
1/2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1 cup cooked wild rice, cooled
1 pound lean ground beef
Combine egg, onion, seasoned salt, garlic powder, salt and pepper. Add wild rice and beef. Mix well. Shape into four 3/4 inch thick patties. Broil 3 to 4 inches from heat 15 to 18 minutes or until no pink remains, turning once. Serve on buns. Serves 4.

Pork Chops With Mushroom Sauce
4 pork chops 3/4 inch thick
1/2 cups halved fresh mushrooms
1/3 cup chopped onion
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 Tbsp. margarine
4 Tsp. cornstarch
1/4 tsp celery salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1 cup chicken broth

2 Tbsp. dry sherry (optional)
Trim fat from pork chops. Place meat on unheated rack of broiler pan. Broil 4 to 5 inches from heat for 12 to 14 minutes or until no longer pink turning once. Cook mushrooms, onion and garlic in margarine until vegetables are tender. Stir in cornstarch, celery salt, pepper, and broth. Cook and stir 2 minutes more. Stir in sherry, if desired. Cook 1 minute more. Serve sauce with pork chops.

Crust-
Mix 1 cup chopped pecans, 5 Tablespoons flour, 1 stick melted margarine. Press into 2 pie pans. Cook at 400 degrees until brown, but don't burn. Cool Filling-
Mix 1 can Eagle brand Milk and 3/4 cup lemon juice well. Fold in large tub Cool Whip and 1 cup chopped pecans. Divide between two crusts. Keep and serve very cold.

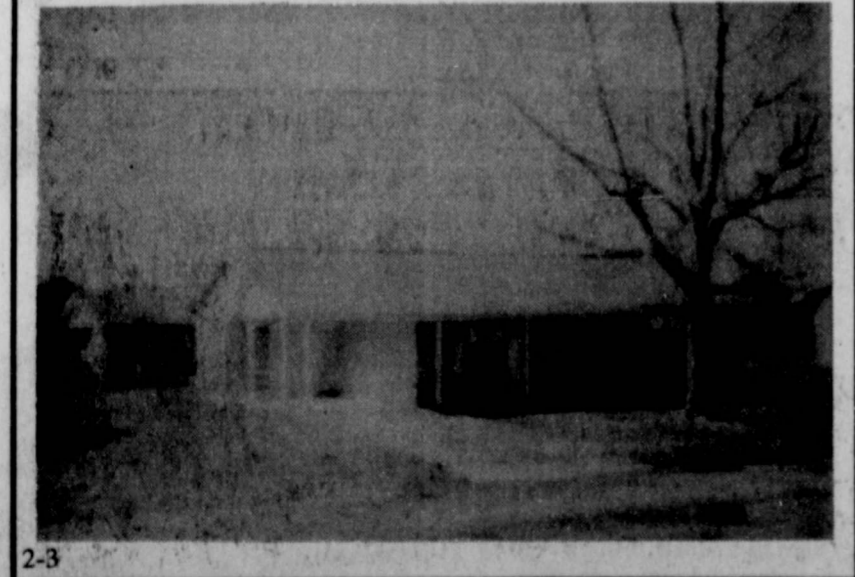
Community Concert Series Continues With Epic Brass

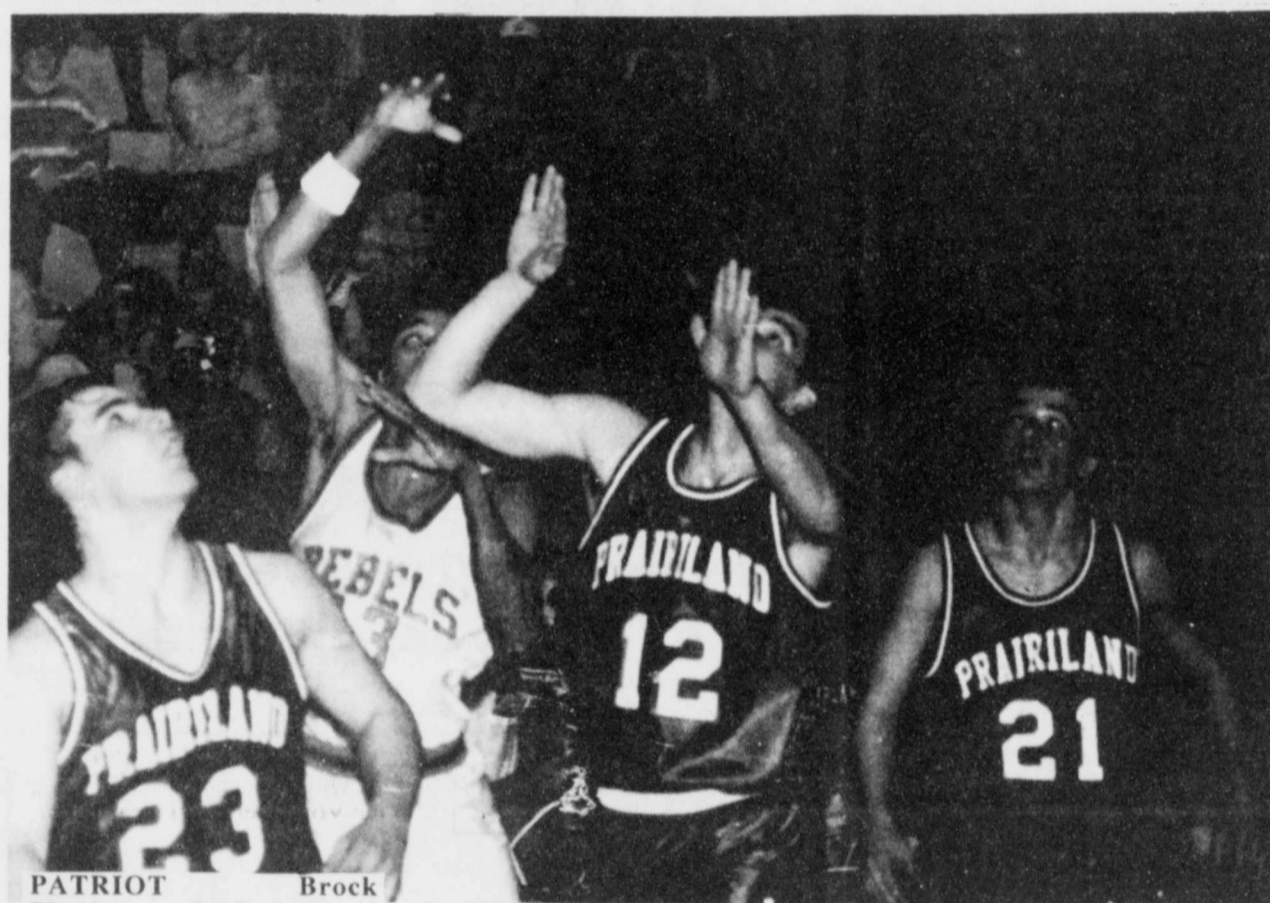
