

Age-Related Macular Degeneration

Keeping Healthy

If you're over 50 and the telephone pole or door frame seem a little bent or crooked, you may have the earliest stage of macular degeneration.

The condition, a gradual destruction of a portion of the retina, affects about two percent of those 50 to 65 years old and about 11 percent

of those 65 to 75. People who have the problem do not become blind, but they may lose the ability to see fine details.

Because early diagnosis is the key to successful treatment, everyone over 50 should have regular eye examinations.

The use of vitamins or zinc to prevent progression of the disease is the subject of many investigations, but at present there is no scientific evidence to support their efficacy. There is also no conclusive evidence about whether blocking sunlight with tinted glasses can help prevent progression of the disease.


