Last Wednesday night, when the highways were a glaze of ice and more was falling, we crept around in four wheel drive, first to Paris to print, then back o Deport, then on to make

eliveries at Pattonville, Blossom, Detroit, Bogata, and finally our stop at Talco. At a convenience store a young man with a beautiful chocolate Labrador Retriever on a leash walked up. He had tried to make a curve just outside of Talco, went into a skid and wound up on a driveway culvert. The car was only two weeks old, and was pretty badly damaged. He and his wife lived in Tyler, but she was working in Paris that week and he was on his way to Paris to see her when the trip came to an abrupt end. Both were originally from New York ate and were quite unfamiliar ith the area.

Thomas and I listened to him trying to give directions to his wife and make arrangements for her to get a vehicle so she could come and get him.

We discussed the options, and finally told him we would take him on to Deport, where he could meet his wife. This would cut down on her road time by half.

We were a little nervous about this move .... after all, he was a stranger, and we knew nothing about him. Was he telling the truth? Was he what he seemed to be? Actually the dog was probably the deciding factor, she was due to have puppies in a week, and he was much more concerned for her than for himself or

We loaded the pair up and took them back to his car to get his uitcase and briefcase, which he put in the back of our vehicle. The dog was in the back seat also and he said he needed to find his checkbook, since the door to the car was damaged enough that it wouldn't

While he searched, Thomas decided to turn around. As Thomas drove down the shoulder of the road the young man leaped up and was running down the road, screaming "Stop, stop" at the top of his lungs. I barely heard him, and told Thomas to stop. He did, and the man collapsed into the back seat of the Jeep, panting and

aking all over. The poor man thought we had loaded up his dog, his suitcase and briefcase and were leaving him! The minute we stopped, he realized this wasn't the case. He and Thomas were apologizing to one another right, left and center, both of them feeling bad, Thomas that he had frightened the young man, and the stranger because he knew he had misjudged us.

But, the episode made me think about the fact that while we were worried about him...while we were uncertain about his honesty HE must have had the same thoughts about us! He had to weigh the possibility that we could do him arm...just as we had weighed the ossibility of him doing us harm.

All was well, his wife was waiting for him, we were safely home after a long, icy trip. But I think I'll always remember about the rope having two ends ... and as we face each other across that rope, it helps to remember that the person on the other end doesn't know our mind and intentions any more than we know theirs!

# Deport City Council Discusses Rate Increase

The Deport City Council discussed the 5% rate increase to be placed in effect on all Douglas Cablevision customers.

David McDonald of Douglas Cablevision explained the reasons for the increase to the Council during Monday's regular meeting.

Mr. McDonald explained the 5% increase will cost the basic subscriber approximately \$.96 per month more.

The big question concerning the issue is when the rate increase will

become effective. According to McDonald, the increase was to become effective March 1, however, the FCC rate freeze in effect was to be lifted on February 15. However, the freeze has been extended to May 15. Douglas Cablevision has appealed the ruling and depending on the outcome of the appeal, the rate increase could still

become effective March 1. The Council approved the financial reports, paid the bills and approved the minutes from the last meeting.

Also, three separate contracts to repair the City's water tower were approved. The three contracts will be to clean and paint the outside of the tower, inside the tower and install a new flapper valve. The total cost of the three contracts will amount to \$13,900.00.

The Council agreed to have McClanahan & Holms conduct their

The Council discussed a letter from Deport Housing Authority director, Melba Ladd, requesting a reduction in city taxes for the Housing Authority because of the unplanned added expense of the new trash pickup ser-

Councilman Duane Glover made the motion to award the reduction, just this one time, but the motion died

from lack of a second. Mayor Foster called for an election to be held May 7, 1994, to elect two full-time aldermen (council members) and one to fill an unexpired term. The unexpired term was created by Dana Norman moving out of the City Limits.

The Council approved the Volunteer Fire Department's election of Duan Glover as Fire Chief and Don

Denison as Fire Marshal for 1994. The Council agreed to purchase rubber boots for City employees. Council reviewed and approved a work policy and safety policy book, composed by City Secretary, Sharon Francis.

Council approved the new City insurance policy, which will provide insurance on equipment, fire trucks, liability insurance coverage on elected City officials and workmen's compensation for employees and members of the Fire Department.

The Council discussed letters that will be mailed to property owners who have open sewer lines. Theopen lines allow rainwater to enter the City's sewer system, causing an overload in the system.

Property owners with this problem will receive a letter explaining where their open line is located. Each property owner will be required to make repairs at their own expense. If repairs are not made, the City will then have the right to discontinue water service to those property owners. The leaks were found through smoke test to the City's sewer system conducted


### Six Selected For Gifted/Talented





# Country Cooking ( By Judy Screws

While I faxed at the Funeral Home, I talked with Dee Wood. She was reading a book which had recipes and tips for using Idaho Potatoes. They said that the true good baked potato is one which is baked without foil. The folks from Idaho, who should know about potatoes, said that if you use foil, you get a potato which tastes like a boiled potato. They advise that you use the no foil method and cook it until you can insert a fork into it easily. Dee is going to test this out for us and report. She is going to bake a foil wrapped and a bare potato side by side. We will wait for her potato report. A few months ago, I read a recipe in a magazine for roasted potato salad. I seems that you take new potatoes, cut them in quarters and roast them in the oven. When they are done you add chopped green onions, some other vegetables and a dressing and seasonings to make a potato salad. I can't remember all the ingredients and I don't know which magazine I was reading. I'd like to have this recipe if anyone else knows

While attending the Valentine Banquet at the nursing home, I spoke with a lady who told me that while she didn't know about the recipe for cornbread which is made with grits, she noticed a recipe for cornbread made with cream of wheat in the Bogata First United Methodist Cook Book. I will check on this. It could be that you could just use the grits instead of cream of wheat.

About six months ago, Nelda Belzung, of Mesquite (Nelda Faye Dodd) was looking for a congealed salad which had sour cream in it. I found the recipe and then lost it. Now I have it again. The recipe contains; 1 package cherry gelatin, 1 cup hot water, 1/2 cup cold water, 1-1 pound can whole cranberry sauce, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1/4 cup walnuts, and 1 cup dairy sour cream. You make the jello, let it chill, break up the cranberry sauce with a fork and stir into the cold jello. Then you fold in the celeryand nuts, and last you fold in the sour cream. Sorry I took so long on this, Nelda. Maybe you can use it next year during the holiday season or at Easter.
