



and wearing green on St. Patrick's Day ... when the words "Irish" come to mind, that tends to be what most of us think of.

But, as St. Patricks Day comes up this year, I began to give a little consideration to the event.

To begin with, it's sad that we tend to reduce a day that is to observe Irish Heritage in this county to an occasion for sales and a day to wear green or see a parade.

I conducted an informal survey Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of this week, and only found two people who thought they had no Irish in their background. Dozens and dozens of others replied that they had a great deal of Irish, or at least a little. Predictably, most of us credit our tempers to that particular national heritage!

The Scotch and the Irish make up a huge portion of many people in East Texas' background. This is due in part to a migration pattern. From a land of famine to the new country the Irish and Scotch poured to the eastern seaboard. They then migrated into the Smoky Mountains...probably because of that ability to settle new country and partially because the mountains reminded them of their long-behindthem homes.

As they became more crowded the dreamers and those still seeking something moved ever westward. Many of them stopped in this portion of the world, and stopped for good. I have a theory that they trickled further west, but when faced with the beginnings of west Texas, which is so very different from anything they had ever seen, drew back into he sheltering arms of trees and water that can be so comforting.



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Severe Weather Awareness

March 6-12 has been designated as Texas Severe Weather Awareness Week.

Each year brings the potential for violent weather --tornadoes, flooding and flash flooding, lightning, hail and thunderstorms--to our state.

, Annually large portions of the State of Texas are devastated by flooding and tornadoes. Lives are lost and citizens' homes are destroyed by nature's forces. Severe weather can affect any region of Texas, creating a need for state and federal assistance to citizens in the diaster area.

Here are some items of information and instructions about severe weather and what to do in case of severe weather. Several articles like *this will appear over the next few weeks.

During a Tornado Emergency: Keep abreast of the latest weahter information on the NOAA Weather Radio. NOAA weather wire service, or the press wire services. Remember to listen for/look for the special signals on these units that indicate a watch or warning has been issued. Tornado Safety Information:

A Tornado Watch is issued by the Weather Service when conditions are favorable for tornado formation. Continue normal activities during the WATCH but be aware that there is a possibility of tornadoes and severe thunderstorms. Keep listening to your radio and television. Watch and listen for tornadoes. Take shelter if you see or hear a tornado, or threatening condition approaches.

A Tornado warning:

are children at bedtime.

means a tornado has been reported

or detected by radar. The WARN-ING will tell you the last known location of the tornado and if possible, its speed and direction of movement. If you're close to the tornado, take cover immediately. Those farther away can take cover when a tornado or threatening condition approachs. Tornadoes are not always reported or indicated by radar. Be prepared to take cover whenever you

see or hear a tornado. **TORNADO SAFETY RULES**

If You See or Hear a Tornado take

the following safety measures: Seek inside shelter immediately. Protect your head and eyes, lie flat, make as small a target as possible. if you have a portable radio, take it with you

In Homes-get away from windows, doors and outside walls. Go to the basement. If you have no basement, go to a first floor bathroom, closet or room at the center of the house. If possible get under heavy furniture or cover your head with blankets and pillows.

In schools, get to the lowest floor or basement. Go to interior small rooms or hallways Stay away from windows and large areas such as auditoriums and gymnasiums.

In Public Buildings, go immediately to a designated sheter area, or to an interior hallway or small room on the lowest floor, stay away from windows. DO NOT GO TO YOUR PARKED CAR!

In Open Country: Move away from the approaching tornado at right angles, if possible. If there is no time to move away or find suitable shelter, leave your car and lie flat in a ditch or

depression. Avoid large trees, metal poles and other posible electical conductors.

Some Tips On Tornadoes ...

Mobile Homes: should be abandoned immediately. If there is no reinforced building or underground shelter nearby, take cover in a ditch or depression.

DO NOT leave your shelter until the storm threat is past.

DID YOU KNOW? The average number of tornadoes in Texas each year is 119 with an average of 11 Texans killed each year.

Tornadoes can occur anytime during the year, but are most frequent in Texas during April, May & June.

Tornadoes can occur at anytime of the day, but are most frequent in Texas between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. CST. Sometimes tornado outbreaks occur where tornadoes cause widespread damage over an extensive area. During the afternoon and eening of April 3rd and the early morning of April 4th, 1974, a "super outbreak" of 148 tornadoes across 13 states killed more than 300 people, injured more tha 6,000 and cause \$600 million in damage

Most tornadoes (about 7 of every 10) are weak with wind speeds no greater than 110 mph and a path length which averages 3 miles.

Strong tornadoes have wind speeds between 110 and 200 mph and a path length which averages 9 miles.

It has been rumoured that rivers, hills and valleys protect areas from tornadoes. This is not true. Tornadoes have been observed to cross rivers and valleys and to climb over mountains with little change in intensity.

PJC Offers Continuing Education Courses

plus a \$5 maintenance fee. This course will include basic theory of Windows use and applications' set with the software.

The Art and Science of Flyfishing will begin on Tuesday, March 22, from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and will run for 8 weeks on Tuesday evenings. The fee for this course is \$75. This class will teach all aspects of flyfishing. Areas to be covered are: tackle, casting techniques, basic entomology, and an introduction to flytying. 


