


The Alexanders have 2 daughters, Brenda and Beverly, who both graduated from Rivercrest High School,

Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties by Joyce Alexander

1 (15-16 oz.) can pink salmon 1/3 cup minced onion 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1 egg

1/2 cup flour

1 1/2 cups oil

Drain salmon; set aside two tablespoons of the juice. In a medium mixing bowl, mix salmon, egg and onion. stir in flour. Add baking powder to salmon juice; stir into salmon mixture. form into patties and fry until golden brown in hot oil.

Banana Nut Cake

2 cups flour 1 tsp soda 1/2 cup shortening

1 1/2 cups sugar

2 eggs 3 ripe bananas 4 tablespoons buttermilk

1 tsp vanilla

1/2 cup chopped pecans Sift flour and soda; set aside; Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Beat eggs and add to shortening mixture. Mash bananas. Add to mixture then add flour and buttermilk alternately. Add vanilla and pecans. Bake in layers for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool

1 stick margarine

I box powdered sugar 2 ripe bananas

Cream margarine and powdered sugar. Fold in mashed bananas and add pecans. Spread on cooled cake.

During July of 1991, the City conducted a smoke testing survey of sewer mains and sewer services. The smoke testing indicated that a crack, hole or other unauthorized opening existed in the sewer service located on your property. This defective service lets excess rainwater into

the City sewer mains. The City is required by FEDERAL LAW to reduce the amount of rainwater entering City sewers.

We have a map at City Hall which describes where on the property the service defect was found, and what type of defect it was. Failure to make arrangements for fixing your service line will make it necessary for the City to discontinue water service.

Before your cover your line after it is fixed you must call the City so it can be inspected by the Water & Sewer Superintendent. We are asking for the cooperation of those who have been notified and have not responded. Please don't make it necessary for us to discontinue water service.




