I don't believe I had realized that there are so many types of things to be seen on a short jaunt through the countryside.

The weather's fine, the days are sunny, take a mini-excursion of your own, keep your eyes open, and it's almost as good as a drive-through game park!

Chili Cookoff Has Old Favorites, New Things To Offer!

The Fifth Annual Deport American Legion and Deport Volunteer Fire Department Chili Cookoff is rapidly approaching.

The first event in the fundraiser will be on Friday night, April 1st at 5:30 p.m. with a chili and stew supper at the Deport American Legion Building. Adults and children over 6 years old will pay \$3 for chili, stew and all the trimmings. Children under six years of age will eat free.

At 7:30 p.m. that same night a big auction will kick off at the Deport Fire Station next to the Legion Hall.

The auction will have items from baked goods to farm equipment and lots of items in between. Special homemade fried pies will be featured as well as a number of other items.

The Saturday schedule of events is as follows:

Booths for arts and crafts, fun and activities will go on most all day. Games for children and adults will be going on all morning, from basketball tosses to "fish pond", with prizes and other games of skill will lighten the day.

A concession stand will be open to provide a variety of food items (like that delicious brisket) and soft drinks, chili cookoff tee shirts, and to sell raffle tickets and duck race tickets. This year's tee-shirts will feature the State of Texas, a big ribbon and the traditional symbol of this cookoff, the cotton and chili pepper. It will be a one-of-a-kind custom design, which will not be found anywhere else.

Buttons bearing the logo will also

be on sale.

The raffle items are always very nice and tickets will be \$1. There should be three items so there are three chances to win.

New this year will be classic cars. Everyone will have the opportunity to vote on their favorite old car, which will be awarded a trophy.

Competition among the chili cooks will be intense. There will be a People's Choice Award, which all attendees can vote on, a showmanship award, a fire department division, a Bean competition and Local and CASI divisions for the chili.

The Duck Race will be at 2:00 p.m. with tickets \$5 each. Tickets are available from Fire Department members, at the concession stand and at local businesses. First Place will be \$150; 2nd place, \$75; 3rd \$25.

It's fun to watch the little plastic "racing ducks" scooting down the creek, so come watch and root for YOUR duck to win!

At 2:30 there will be a bed race. If you haven't seen a bed race, you really should. Teams of nightshirt and nightcap clad racers push a bed, complete with occupant, down the street in front of the Legion Hall. The races are absolutely hilarious. Entry fees are only \$5 and first and second places will pay according to the number of entries.

Chili judging will be from 3 to 4 p.m. with awards given at 4:00 p.m.

There will be all kinds of arts and crafts booths set up on main street.

Booth fees are only \$5 and all sale proceeds are kept by the booth holder.

They should bring their own booth displays and tables.

No outside food sales will be allowed. Food and drink can be purchased through the concession stand.

Anyone who would like to sign up to cook beans or chili (or both) may do so. Entry fee is \$15, bean fee is \$5.

The whole day will be filled with fun, as the CASI (Chili Appreciation Society International) cooks are a grand and whacky bunch who keep things rolling. It's worth a trip just to see the showmanship these people come up with, and purchasing a tasting cup in the afternoon to sample their concoctions is worthwhile too.

This year trophies will be a pseudo newspaper titled the *Chili/Cotton Chronicle* and will be different from those in the past.

Local cooks are urged to enter the chili and bean contest. They follow the same rules and receive the same awards and have as much fun as the CASI "professionals". Trophies will be given in the local division, bean division, CASI division and for People's Choice and Showmanship.

Prairiland School Board Approves Roof Repairs

In a regular session March 21st the Prairiland CISD board met and worked through a busy agenda.

They recinded acation on band uniforms until a later date, and hired Judy Whittle as a half time custodian.

A bid from Shurtleff Sheetmetal of \$61,240 was accepted to repair roofs on Blossom and Deport campuses.

It was decided to approve 4-H activities as extra curricular.

An application waiver for Science textbooks was passed. The textbook list was approved.

In other action it was decided that the old Patriot symbol and a new Patriot mascot symbol would both be used.

The 1994-95 school calendar was approved by the board and it was decided that \$100 toward each cheerleader's expense would be paid.

Any eligible student will be allowed to tryout for cheerleader it was

decided.

A motion was passed that Cheerleaders will be at all high school football games, home basketball games and all sport playoff games and Junior high cheerleaders will be at football games.

The Prairiland School Board's six votes will be cast for Region VIII Board of Directors.

The board went into executive session at 9:20 p.m. and came out at 10:20 p.m.

After considering all evaluations and hearing recommendations, the contracts of all teachers, teacher/coaches, agriculture teachers and counselors were extended through May 31, 1995.

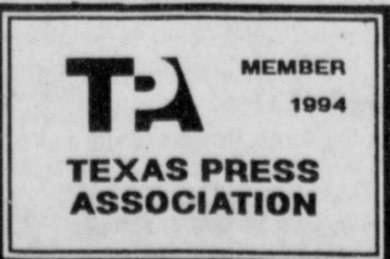
A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to give the administration permission to hire auxiliary people.

Our cook of the week is a lady who is quite well known in this part of the country. Joyce Alexander and her husband, Wayman, live in Talco. Joyce was a long time employee of the newspapers. She was the editor of Talco Times for many years. Mr. Alexander is a retired Oilfield worker. I understand that one of his claims to fame is that he has the most beautiful garden in Talco each year. Of course this means that Joyce has much produce to put up.

The Alexanders have 2 daughters, Brenda and Beverly, who both graduated from Rivercrest High School,

and two grandchildren.

Joyce is an active member of the First Baptist Church, of Talco. She is active in WMA and is Church Clerk. She is reputed to be at church every time the doors open. This is a nice reputation to have.

Joyce's recipes which she has chosen to share with us this week look wonderful. They are; Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties, Banana Nut Cake, Fruit Salad and Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf.

I thank Joyce for letting us feature her and her recipes this week. Hope you enjoy them.

March 24, 1994

Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties

by Joyce Alexander
1 (15-16 oz.) can pink salmon
1/3 cup minced onion
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg
1/2 cup flour
1 1/2 cups oil
Drain salmon; set aside two tablespoons of the juice. In a medium mixing bowl, mix salmon, egg and onion. Stir in flour. Add baking powder to salmon juice; stir into salmon mixture. Form into patties and fry until golden brown in hot oil.

Banana Nut Cake

2 cups flour
1 tsp soda
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
3 ripe bananas
4 tablespoons buttermilk
1 tsp vanilla
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Sift flour and soda; set aside. Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Beat eggs and add to shortening mixture. Mash bananas. Add to mixture then add flour and buttermilk alternately. Add vanilla and pecans. Bake in layers for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool before icing.
ICING:
1 stick margarine
1 box powdered sugar
2 ripe bananas
1 cup pecans
Cream margarine and powdered sugar. Fold in mashed bananas and add pecans. Spread on cooled cake.

Fruit Salad

1 can sliced pineapple (drained)
1 can Royal Ann cherries
1 cup chopped (or small) marshmallows
1 cup pecans
1 banana, sliced
1 large can sliced peaches
DRESSING MIX:
2 tablespoons sugar
2 egg whites
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup pineapple juice
Whip egg whites to a stiff peak. Fold into flour and sugar mixture, and add cup of pineapple juice. Cook until thick in a double boiler. Cool and add one cup whipped cream. Fold gently into fruit mixture just before serving.

Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 cup dry bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 eggs
1 teaspoon instant minced onion
1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce, divided
TOPPING:
Reserved tomato sauce
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
Mix together; beef, bread crumbs, salt, pepper, and eggs. Add onion and half of tomato sauce. Form into loaf in 9" x 5" x 3" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. In a sauce pan, combine topping ingredients; bring to a boil. Pour over baked meat loaf; bake 10 minutes more.

The United Methodist Women met Monday evening in the home of Mrs. Virginia Kirkland for their regular meeting.

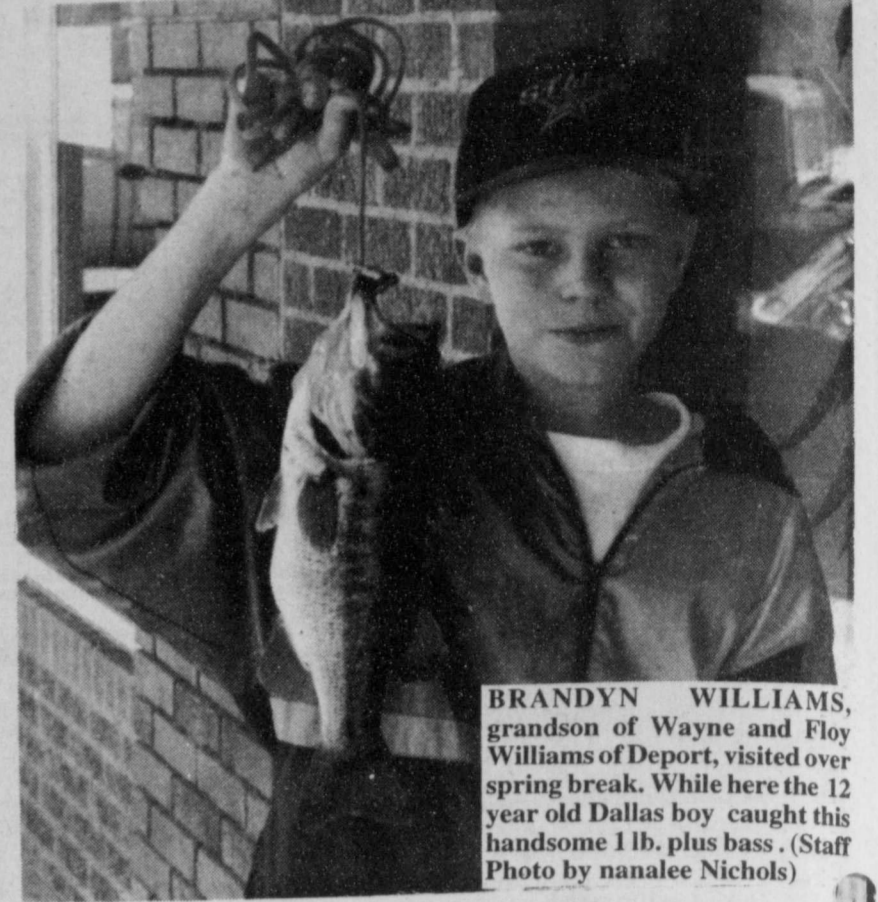
The president, Mrs. Martha Glover, presided and gave the devotional using prayer as her theme.

Notice To Ten Citizens Of Deport

During July of 1991, the City conducted a smoke testing survey of sewer mains and sewer services. The smoke testing indicated that a crack, hole or other unauthorized opening existed in the sewer service located on your property. This defective service lets excess rainwater into the City sewer mains. The City is required by FEDERAL LAW to reduce the amount of rainwater entering City sewers.

Ten citizens have been notified by letter that the opening in their service be fixed. We have a map at City Hall which describes where on the property the service defect was found, and what type of defect it was. If you need assistance in determining where and what the defect was, please call or come by City Hall.

Failure to make arrangements for fixing your service line will make it necessary for the City to discontinue water service.

Before your cover your line after it is fixed you must call the City so it can be inspected by the Water & Sewer Superintendent. We are asking for the cooperation of those who have been notified and have not responded. Please don't make it necessary for us to discontinue water service.




