





Other Patriots on the Sox team are Rhett Fendley, Cory May and Issac Unruh.




Clean-up Days will be June 10-11 for citizens of Deport only. Clean-up will be within the city limits only.

pinch of salt Mix well, pour over first mixture and bake at 325 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes. Cake will not be firm in middle and will fall after removing from oven.

Mix pudding and cold milk. In another bowl beat Eagle Brand milk and cream cheese. Fold in cool whip. Then mix with pudding mixture. Put sliced bananas and vanilla wafers in bottom of bowl. (Make 2 layers) Four 1/2 mix over each layer of wafers and bananas. Chill before serving.

1 8 oz. carton of sour cream

1 large onion chopped fine 1 cup cheddar cheese grated

1 can cream of celery soup- no water dash of garlic powder Topping

1 tube ritz crackers crushed

1 stick margarine melted 1/2 cup sliced almonds

Rub casserole dish with butter. Put corn, green beans in baking dish. Mix sour cream, onions, cheese, celery soup and garlic powder. Pour over beans and corn.

Mix crushed ritz crackers, butter, and almonds . Pour over casserole and bake 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees until golden and bubbly.

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
