
Deport Sox Take 1st In Paris League

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

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Vacation In Ireland, A Beautiful Experience, Once We Got There!

As we continue with our "Irish stories", I will assume that many of you have heard of the "Ring of Kerry". This is often touted as some of the most beautiful scenary in the world. And, the claim is true, true, true. Never have we seen anyplace prettier. Mountains climb from sea level up into the sky, while peaceful valleys, bearing farmsteads like jewels, sweep down the the Atlantic ocean. rivers tumble, singing (as all of Ireland seems to do) songs of joy, lakes are cuddled closely by the embrace of the hills. The thing that makes the drive known as the ring of Kerry so exceptional is that there isn't just a mile or two of this breathtaking scenary....but miles and miles and miles of it! The weather was sunny and perfect, and everyplace we stopped we once more encountered the friendliness that is the hallmark of a proud people.

While driving down narrow, twisting lanes, our guide told us of the legends and superstitions of the Irish. If you sweep your floors out the door you sweep your luck away...it should be swept to the hearth or picked up.

A single May bush or Hawthorne in the middle of a field is left because it used to be believed that it was a tree special to the fairies. Farmers believed that they would have bad luck if they angered the "little people" by removing this tree.

Along the way we saw wild rhododenrons, foxglove, fuchias and bog cotton. The white glow of hawthorn and golden coins of gorse brightened our way.

We stopped at a peat bog. Peat is a strange thing to an East Texan. Used to coal, natural gas and oil, peat appears to us to have been "almost coal" but wasn't compressed quite enough. It absorbs water like a sponge. It is trenched and drained, then dug and stacked to dry, then re-stacked to dry again. After it is completely dry it can be burned in cookstoves and fire places. Commerical peat-harvesting operations dig peat for power plants and for making a fire brick much like charcoal. There only remains about forty years of peat for these large commercial operations. Some Bogs

unique portion of ecology.

Peat burns without sparks, and provides a pleasant smelling fire.

In the afternoon we went to see Muckross house, a beautiful stately home surrounded by gorgeous lawns and gardens.

The woodwork inside, which was done by local craftsmen, was absolutely stunning. Handcarved and hand inlaid furniture could only create a feeling of awe at those long-ago art-As usual in Europe, back when

these homes and castles werebuilt

they were well provided with ser-

vants to keep the huge places clean and running smoothly. The amount of work it must have taken is amaz-That night we had a party at "The Fisheries" at Killoglin, a small vil-

lage near Killarney. Huge, fresh salmon steaks and other good food was set before us as we heard locals play, sing and dance. A local school master was the

master of ceremonies. Two young girls danced the traditional Irish jigs, and a child about ten played the accordian. While it was definitely not "polished" entertainment, it was absolutely delightful. On our trip back to Killarny, late that night, Ann sang various songs to us, and for the first time we became aware of what a lovely voice she has.

The next day we headed towards county Cork. As rural people, we enjoyed watching the beautifully kept farms with their lovely little gardens pass by.

The wide river Lee swept by as we came to Youhal (pronounced Yawl). During that time Ann spoke to us about the settlement, history and strife that has disturbed Ireland over the

We began to gain a better understanding of the cruel actions the English took against Irish Catholics. For a long time Irish Catholics could not own land, vote, educate their children or celebrate any part of their religion. Over 3,000 priests were hung, and it is no wonder that the Irish still hold a lot of bitterness against the English. The provisional

are being preserved since they are a IRA, however, is not that well thought of, nor is it's equivilent group, the are protestant terriorists. It is hoped that there will be peace soon, as the IRA and Britain are supposed to be negotiating a peace. After the hundreds of years of bitterness, however, it may well be an uneasy peace at best.

We saw a Penal Altar, a stonealtar in the hills where mass was celebrated in the 1800's. There people gathered to worship in secret. A pure spring flows near the altar, and locals still come to pray and leave fresh flowers.

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The spring is said to be good for the eyes and people bathe their eyes in the good water.

On the road again to Blarney we once more passed peaceful countryside. Little glimpses of children scattering corn for chickens, old men in rubber boots (wellies) striding out to check their cattle kept us interested.


Blarney castle has 120 steep stone steps up to where one kisses the Blarney stone. Lying down, grasping rails, one must bend back to kiss the stone that is said to bestow the gift of eloquence. I passed on that one, partly because of my arthritis and the steps and partly because people who know me insist I already have too much gift

Instead we did some shopping and roamed around the castle grounds.

At the town of Waterford we went through the crystal showrooms Waterford is the premier crystal worldwide, and the huge trophies, presentation bowls and incredible works of art, all hand blown, cut, polished and engraved, were truly ncredible.

At the Bridge Hotel in Waterford we had time to walk the waterfront, which, unlike waterfronts in most of this country, was quite safe.

After supper, which we had with Susan and Ernesto, a couple from New York, also on our tour, we went out to Jack Leigh's pub. 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Bill Buckman Is 1994 Texas "Top Gun"

Bill and Joyce Buckmnan participated over Memorial day week-end in the Texas 17th IHMSA State Bigbore Handgun championships in Abilene. International Handgun Metallic Silhouette Association has members internationally who compete with open sighted handguns shooting at steel targets in different shapes. A match usually consists of 40 targets-- 10 chickens at 50 meters (55 yards), 10 pigs at 100 meters, 10 turkeys at 150 meters and 10 rams at 200 meters (219 yards). Targets are fired on at banks of 5 in a time limit of 2 minutes. Target must be knocked off stand in order to score hit. (Ram weighs approximately 55 pounds). The exception to "animal" and distance is often in shoot-off (ties) when competitor may be called to shoot at 5 chickens at 200 meters. This 17th annual match was Bill's 17th and Joyce's 16th. Bill along with friend Mike Stinson of Midlothian has atended all 17 championships.

In this 17th at Abilene, Bill and close friend, Richard Porter, of Sweetwater set at least five Texas state championship match records. Before this state finals there had not been a standing score greater than 30 posted nor a 3 gun aggregate over 110 nor a 4- gun aggregate over 146. (Aggregate total score is based on 10 targets at each distance in categories of always standing then 2 Or 3 of the freestyle positions in revolver, production and /or unlimited according to which aggregate -120 or 160) Bill on third relay of first day posted a record 32 standing international class then later a production international class score of 39 missing the first 50M turkey. (International class is ne highest class of shooter and the class in which Richard and Bill both

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
are classed with all four categories.) Richard Porter closed first day with a revolver international score of 38 and a perfect 40 in unlimited international class. Bill goes to line early second day posting a 36 in revolver fInt. class. Richard then shot a super 31 standing Int. score to have Bill edged 109 to 107 of 120 possible. Bill came back to line in the afternoon to fire a perfect 40 in unlimited international class now having Richard 111 to 109 of 120 but also setting record 147 of 160 4-gun aggregate. Richard, an excellent production international class shooter falls short for a 38 but total ties Bill's 4-gun of 147. A couple of other competitors still had a chance at titles but all fell short of catching Bill or Richard.

The afternoon of the third and final day is th day that really brings on the spectators. It's the time for the shoot-offs for trophies where needed. And there was to be many. Richard and Bill were both in a shoot off or two but a committee added to the crowd enjoyment and decided on an aggregate shoot-off for the ties 4-gun aggregate although Bill had won by virtue of ram count (totaled more of farthest target, the rams). This was to be highest title, it needed a shoot off for sure and this was a new rule. Bill felt pretty good for he knew he had won standing state champion due to highest score of 32 and he also was aware that if loosing aggregate shoot off he would take consolation 3- gun champion. (A single competitor could not receive both) Bill also knew Richard Porter to be one of the finest IHMSA competitors in the nation for he had won or placed in many categories at International championships thourgh the years. Bill's shooting abilities were really on the line

-- Richard had been one of Bill's dearest friends for 16 years. If it just wasn't for the highest honor of

match....but it was! Shoot off begins in revolver category with chickens placed at 200 meters. Bill gets one more than Richard. Bill, a little surprised, they both are called for production, again samechickens at 200 meters. They both struggle but Bill remains one ahead as both add only tartget total. Unlimited, a real crowd pleaser, is next and at this point it will take 4 of 5 score to remain in contention for unlimited champion, a title Bill had taken in 1987 in Midland, but most of all each needed to add to their aggregate total. Bill beats Richard 4/5 to 3/5 which puts him up two in aggregate total and also in true pursuit of unlimited title. Bill is told to remain on line to go against the international classed Mondo Renteria of Sweetwater who was the only other 40 unlimited competitor (of 10) who had gotten 4 or 5 in "first go"F. With Joyce as spotter and timekeeper; Bill nails chicken # 5 as Joyce counts down 5-4-3. Five of five 200 meter chickens versus Mondo's second only 4 of 5. Joyce and Bill were excited for second champion honor of match but the hard part was coming up--chickens at 150 meters shot at standing not freestyle (lying sown). Richard charges hard for title getting one more than Bill but he had fallen short in total. As cease fire command is given Richard is handed consolation 3- gun champion cap and Bill is given the cap designation the top honor of year-Top Gun--4 gun champion.

Bill will compete in International Championship later this summer.
