

A blaze set shortly before midnight Monday inside of the Blossom Post Office caused more than \$2,500 in damage in fire, smoke and water damage to the structure.

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

Vacation In Ireland, Monastaries & Mountains

much I appreciate your telling me that you enjoy these articles. A special thanks to Mary Morehead who says "I love your travel reporting. Those of us who are to old to travel still need to hear about places we didn't make it to! It's so gratifying to know that readers are enjoying my sometimes lengthy tales. We welcome input from other travel-

Early on a misty, golden morning, our group set out from Dublin for the ancient monastery at Glenlough (I don't think I have that spelled correctly). Along the way we went through more beautiful scenary, deep rolling breakers, tinged almost turquoise blue and green, with enough power to be awe-inspiring, gentle hills and stately trees.

At the monestary we found mountains of unsurpassed peace. It was easy to stand among the huge stones that had comprised the cathedral and lift eyes up to towering mountains and feel the beauty of God's creation. It was interesting to hear that the small niches in the walls had once held clay jars...which helped the acoustics!

It is an area filled with legends and tales. Ann showed us an oddly shaped stone basin, filled with a few inches of water. A larger stone next to it has finger shaped impressions in it. Legend says that if one can fit fingers into the impressions, then put the fingers of the other hand into the bowl (this requires squatting down) a wish can be made and it will be granted.

The small basin never goes dry, and is said to have been formed centuries ago. St. Kevin resided at the monastary, and is said to have been able to communicate with the animals much as St. Francis did.

A man came with his newborn twin sons to St. Kevin, saying that his wife had died and how could he feed the infants. St. Kevin spoke to a doe, who then came twice daily and filled the basin with milk, and this the man used to feed his sons.

goes dry because of a small spring beneath it. Standing with the cool wind whispering prayers through the evergreens, looking at a valley with an almost other-worldly grace, the legend was much easier to believe .

The drive back definitely put our driver, Joe, through his paces, since the roads were narrow and winding and the bus could barely make the turns. Joe once more proved equal to the task, making what is a difficult iob look easy

Once back in Dublin we roamed around town again, once more impressed with the friendly folks we came in contact with.

The next morning wedeparted for Sligo, cutting across the country through scenary that wasn't as outstanding, but was interesting to those of us who enjoy seeing farming operations in progress. A swan surrounded by cygnets, an old man carving in front of a cottage, a young woman hanging washing while smiling at a little girl all stand out in my

In a village we witnessed a hearse going through the streets, the family and friends walking behind it.

At Sligo we had a wait before hotel check in time, and after lunch wandered down the street, for the first time in the rain. Five of us found an ice cream store and huddled in an archway out of the wet to eat and watch the world go by. Shortly a young man and his little boy drove through the arch. I mentioned the scuba diving logo on his van, and soon we were deep in conversation with him. We learned that the ice cream is all homemade there in the shop....and that scuba diving off the coast at Sligo is some of the very best in the world. "Why?" we asked and learned that the water was very clear and pollution free and that many of the ships that were a part of the Spanish Armada foundered along the coast. This means that treasure, armor, weaponry and the remains of these long-sunken ships make fascinating diving.

A small group of us decided to go to the famous Belleek china factory. This factory is just inside of Northern Ireland. Along the way we heard

much more about the problems that face the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland.

We were treated to incredible seaside scenes again, and caught glimpses of the castle that Lord Montbatten had once lived in Wawere shown the harbor where the Montbatten's boat was blown up by terrorists back in 1979. The IRA apparently wished to show just how close to the throne of England they could strike.

We crossed the border to the china factory, and enjoyed watching and hearing about the handmade parian china. The lustrous white ware, frequently studded with a few shamrocks is something of a hallmark, but we watched in fascination as the handwoven baskets and other items were created. Every step was painstakingly done, with quality checks performed after the various firings.

There are no rejects, no seconds with Belleek.

The museum displayed gorgeouspieces of china from the past, and of course the gift shop was well stocked with a wide selection of "goodies".

The next day was another cold day, with some rain. We wandered around the churchyard where the poet W.B. Yeats is buried. There on his grave are the cryptic words "cast a cold eye on life, on death, horseman,

A court barrow gravesite proved to be a highlight for me, as I looked as the stones used in burials that were not centuries old..but thousands of

We went over small country roads, seeing farmers digging and bagging peat by hand. We had to stop while a flock of sheep trotted along before us. At Aracan we ate at a bed and breakfast, finding the curried vegetable soup and sandwiches good, plus desserts that were absolutely sinful. Many of the shops were closed for lunch but we found some tapes of Irish folk music to take home with us. At a fishing village we saw the big factory ships, the smaller fishing boats and learned that Iceland, Japan and Russia routinely violate tiny Ireland's fishing rights ad they fear for their

From The Pastor's Heart



"What Must I Do?"

"Master, what shall I do to be sixed accepted?". The question comes from the Bible in its original form. The alteration comes from a modern world that is hurting from rejection, depression and abuse. Too many people have forgotten the concept of "being saved". They have lived in their world of helplessness for so long they are not looking for a Savior, but an acceptor. They do not understand that when Christ saves us from our sins, he is also accepting us for what and who we are.

The church, the body of Christ, has not done a good job in the role of acceptor of the lost, the needy the poor. We have perhaps made it even harder for a lost soul to feel accepted with our rules and regulations, excess baggage, that we require from the unchurched. It is time for this "exclusion" from the Gospel to stop! Christ said "Suffer the little children to come to me" not "make them suffer". When I am speaking to an unchurched person, in my mind, I like to sing "Just As I Am" to remind me that if Christ can except me, I can accept this person-just as they are.

Our community revival will be held at the end of the month. This does not give us very much time to reach out to those who need to be accepted. We must go to our neighbor now and ask them please to come, not to revival, but to salvation by means of revival. But I suppose many of us will have an excuse not to extend the hand of invitation. All of us are tempted to make rather ridiculous excuses to avoid others. One excuse is as good as another. Sort of like the farmer that asked his neighbor if he might borrow a rope. "Sorry" said the neighbor "I'm using my rope to tie up my milk." "Rope can't tie up milk, " the farmer replied. "I know," replied the neighbor, "but when a person doesn't want to do something, one reason is as good as another."


