## Three Ways To Notify Fire Department Of Emergency

Lamar County Fire Department members will begin using a paging system to be notified when there is a fire or emergency requiring their services beginning September 1st, 1994.

This new system is another phase in the process of converting completely to the 911 system.

For sometime now the county has been sectioned into areas and each fire department in Lamar County has been assigned an area.

This system was developed in order to assist 911 operators in alerting the closest fire department to respond to an emergency.

The old saying "it was a good idea, but it doesn't always work" applies in some cases.

If, for an example, an emergency occurs in the 652- phone exchange, but in Red River County there can still be some confusion in using 911 according to Deport Fire Chief Duane Glover.

The Fire Chief also says that 911 rules state that they must contact the fire department that shows in the mapped areas. Then, that department must call 911 and request additional help. 911 will not dispatch a fire department which is not in the mapped areas. The drawback to a fire department calling in to request additional help is that precious time must be lost while the fire department is enroute to the fire to learn if they need additional help are not.

If, in an emergency situation, a caller believes that they must have more help than a single fire department within their area can provide they can specify a fire department or fire departments by calling Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy's office at 737-2400 and request the fire department or departments that they

feel can best respond to their needs.

For a few months the Deport Volunteer Fire Department will still be available at 652-3241. Other area fire departments are also still available at their local number.

911 can be called and the fire department in the area the emergency occurs will be alerted.

In case the department in the area does not respond in seven minutes attempts to notify the department will be carried out again.

After another attempt and the department is unable to respond then the next closest department will be alerted.

911 linked with the paging system will be officially activated September 1, 1994. The call to 911 will result in the 911 operator dispatching emergency personnel to the scene by way of the paging systems.

Everyone should remember there are three ways to notify Lamar County Fire Departments.

1. Call 911
2. In Deport Area Call 652-3241
3. Or Everyone can call the Sheriff's Office at 737-2400 anytime.

As complex as this sounds, a little calm thinking can save time.

As an example...if there is a grass fire that is not threatening homes, life or structures, a quick call to your local fire department or 911 is fine.

But, if a house is involved and you feel that all the departments around will be needed, call the Sheriff's office and get them all moving at once by telling them that you need specific fire departments. Especially in the country where fire hydrants are not readily available every water carrying truck around is usually needed. Don't be too conservative...it is better to have too much help than not enough!

## Blossom Man Perishes In One-Vehicle Accident

Gary James Crawford, 35 year old Blossom resident, was pronounced dead at the scene shortly after 1:30 p.m. on Friday, August 19, approximately 1.3 miles west of Hugo, Oklahoma on U.S. Highway 70, when he lost control of the 1984 Chevrolet flatbed pickup he was driving, which caught fire and exploded, along with several containers of welding gases carried on the truck.

According to preliminary accident reports by Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Patrick Sunderburk, Crawford was traveling westbound when he lost control of the truck. Reports state the truck went off the roadway, struck an embankment and was forced onto its side. No indications why the truck went out of control were given.

The side saddle tank of the truck ruptured, causing the vehicle and three

gas cylinders on the bed of the truck to catch fire and explode, the trooper's report said.

Traffic was rerouted about two miles around the accident site until fires were extinguished and the chemicals were contained. Residents within a one-mile radius of the accident were evacuated for precaution. Kiamichi Railroad traffic was also held up for several hours during the accident clean-up.

Hugo Fire Chief Tom Pence said it took a crew more than four hours along with 7,000 gallons of water and 25 gallons of foam spray to extinguish the blaze.

Although only three tanks exploded, several tanks were extremely hot and on the verge of exploding when fire crews arrived. Pence said the fire was mostly caused from the truck's fuel supply.

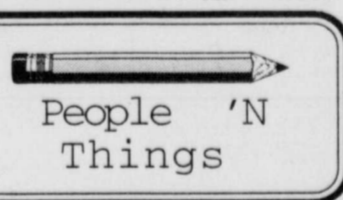
## O'Hare Issue Is No Longer Valid Issue

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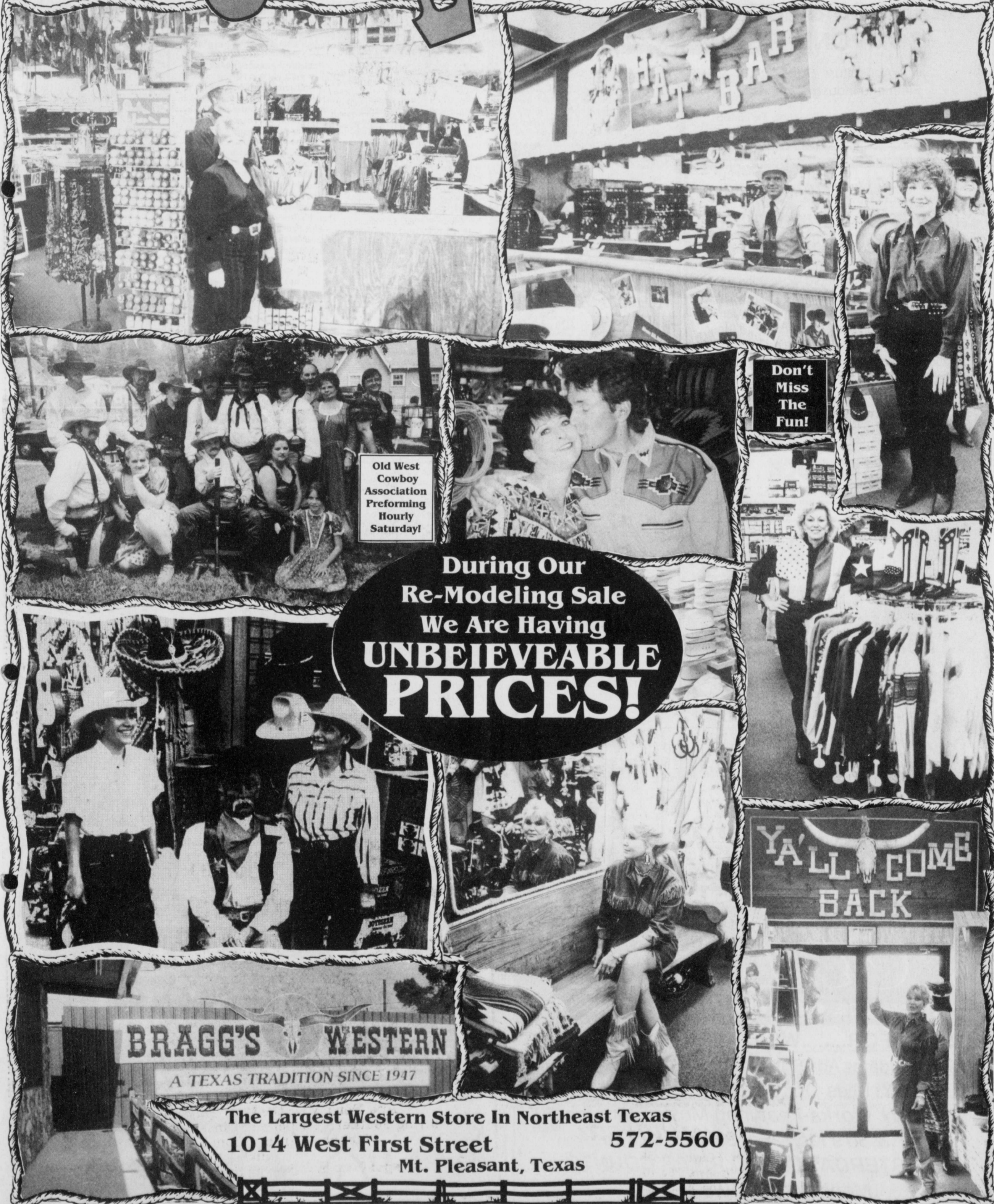

**Patriots Tie Leonard In 1-1 Standoff**

Patriot football '94 got underway Friday night in Pattonville as Prairiland battled the Leonard Tigers to a 1-1 standoff in a 20-play type scrimmage.

In junior varsity action, the visitors managed two early scores for a 2-0 win over the younger Patriots.

If people thought Coach Rick Connot would be displeased over the tie, they were quite mistaken. "We saw exactly what we were looking for. We know now that the kids we were depending on to get after it are indeed positive, spirited, and ready to go."

Too, we got a good look at some young players, and we found to our satisfaction that everybody belongs."

In the scrimmage, the Tigers had the ball on the first possession, and the Patriot defense showed up from that it had matured considerably from a year ago. After nine plays, the Tigers had exactly nine yards net.

The visitors overloaded the right side twice with pulling linemen for their first first down, and on the next play, quick Jared Hailey zipped 54 yards for the year's first touchdown. "That touchdown was my fault," Connot said. "I wanted to see how our kids would react to a stunt designed to stop the stuff Leonard had

just done twice, so I asked Coach Riddles to call a stunt for the defense. Unfortunately, it stunted us right out of the play."

Connot expressed pleasure that improvement could be seen in both the defense and the offense. And statistics agree with that analysis.

Carrying the ball only four times, James Dudley averaged nearly 14 yards every time he touched the ball, including a 51-yarder which set up the first touchdown. Stephen Swaim carried only 10 times, less than half as many as last year, but he made it could for a 4.6 average and the team's only score.

Except for the 54-yard scoring sortie, Leonard could earn only 96 yards in 38 snaps of the ball as the seasoned

Patriot defense expressed itself well. The most spectacular defensive effort was Chris Bramlett's interception in the late going. The senior line backer stepped in front of a Tiger in the deep flat, grabbed the ball, and went 34 yards back toward the visitors' goal before being hauled down.

A sudden burst of speed, such as Hailey's score, still can hurt the Patriots, but they proved much more capable of keeping such plays in front of them with recognition and reaction.

Probably the most telling observation of the night was one by an S&S Consolidated scout who scurried to the press box during the rain shower during the game. In preparing for the Patriots two weeks hence, he turned to his two fellow coaches and said, "They're a whole lot deeper than last year. You notice he has put new kids in all night to keep them fresh, and there hasn't been much drop off that I can see."

And that's the kind of scrimmage it was. A whole lot more satisfying than a 1-1 tie.

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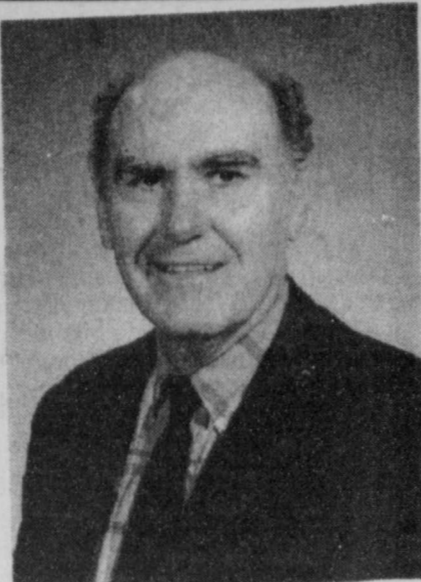
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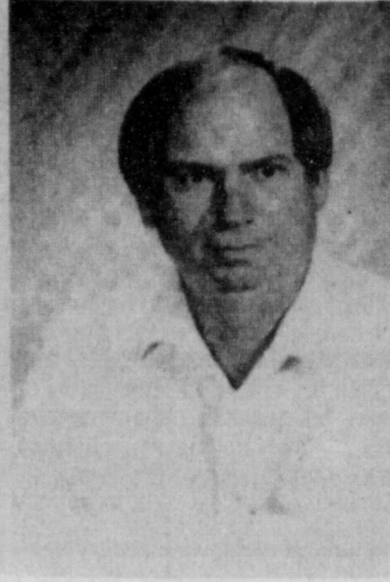

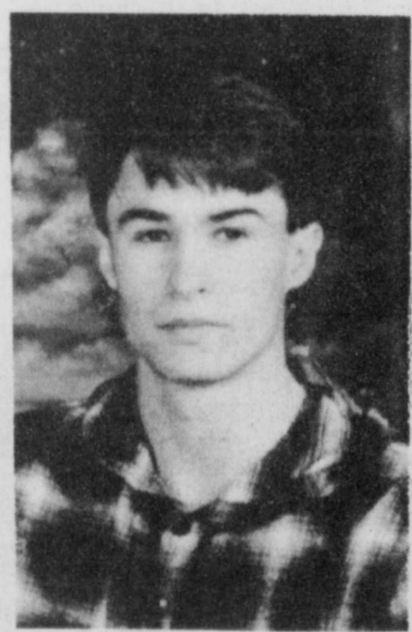

I told Him that I personally believed that the only people that would be in heaven were those who "loved Jesus". He agreed that the scriptures were in full support of that reply. At that time, I don't believe I really understood myself the full impact of that truth. What does it really mean to "love Jesus?" We can argue all day long about our denominational dogma which seems to do a good job at keeping the Body of Christ divided. I understand and truly appreciate the convictions that we all hold and those beliefs should hopefully be scripturally based...but what really matters is not what we believe...but what we practice. The most important theological question that you will ever need to honestly address is this: DO YOU LOVE JESUS? And before you answer that...go to the word and see what criteria Jesus himself laid down to measure your response to. In John 14:15, we are told "If you love me keep my commandments." The summary of all his commands are this: to love one another as He loved us.

After all, that is the earmark of the true believer: "By this will all men know my disciples, by their love for one another." (John 13:35) It is interesting how Titus 1:16 warns us of the time when "many would profess to know Jesus but by their actions they would deny Him." So ask yourself today with the convicting searchlight of the Holy Spirit shining in your heart...Do you really love Jesus with all your heart? If your answer is Yes, then ask yourself: How does my life demonstrate it? Regardless of what our denomination headquarters promotes, doesn't it all boil down to the simplicity of this...Do you really love Him? Think about it.
